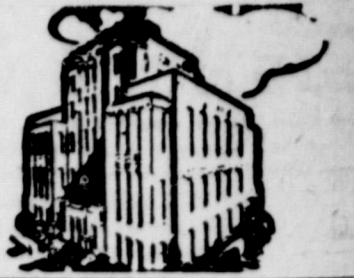

Anna Little Is State Queen

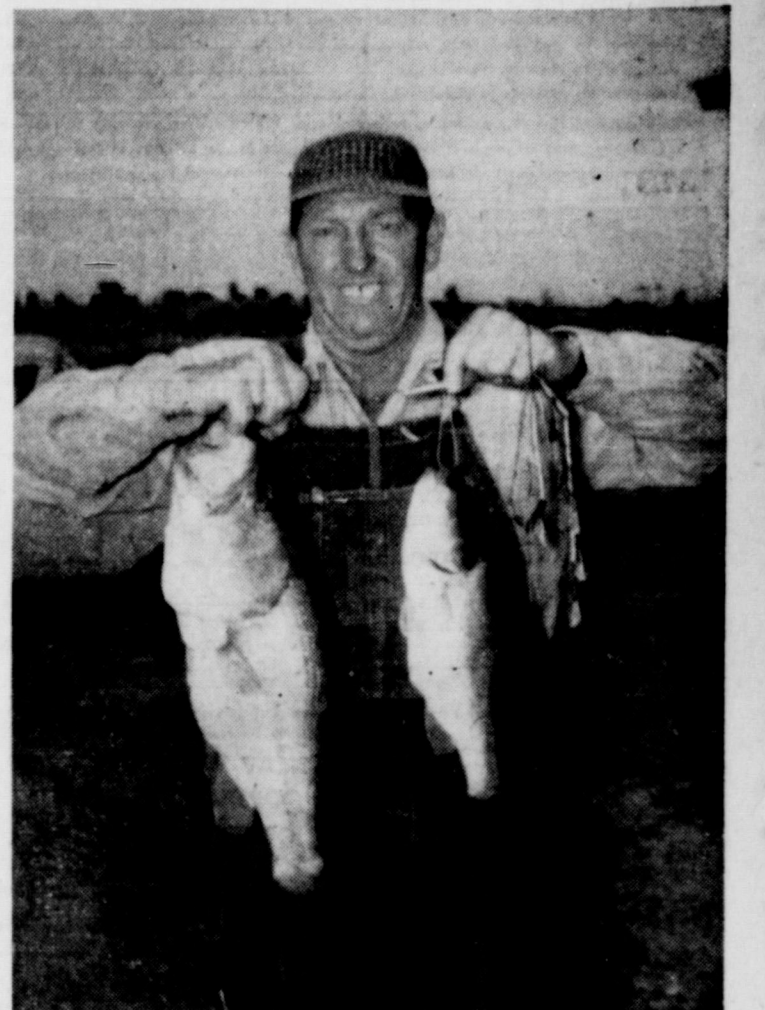
Anna Little, 18, of Rising Star was crowned State Pecan Queen at the annual convention of the Texas Pecan Growers' Association in Austin this week.

Previously Miss Little has won the titles as Pecan Queen of Cisco, of Eastland County, and queen of the Rising Star Fall Fair.

About 200 pecan growers from throughout the state gathered for the convention.

Crop prospects for 1958 in this area were reported at 70 per cent. North Texas is expected to yield a 40 per cent crop.

All sections of Texas and other states reported that heavy spring rains and heavy insect infestations cut short this year's crop.

Eastland All-Stars to Test Clyde Monday

Eastland Little League All-Stars head for Cisco Monday for first round play in the Area 6-B tournament. Clyde will be the first round opponent of the Eastland Little League, with the game slated for 8 p. m. In the first game of the series, Ranger will meet Cisco. Winner of the two games will meet Tuesday night for the championship. Winner of Zone B will earn the right to participate in the Area 6 tournament in Graham July 17-18.

City Has Soft Spot In Heart For Scouts

Eastland has a soft spot in her heart when it comes to the Boy Scouts of America, another of the United Fund Agencies. This comes through no accident, for Eastland has a far greater percentage of her youth take advantage of this program than the national average. In one two year period, 1952 to 1954, Eastland had eight boys become Eagles, the highest rank in scouting, and Eastland troops have continually lead the Comanche Trail Council, which includes several counties, in individual and troop advancement.

Eastland has two troops and one explorer post located in the two log cabins on the top of park hill and if a person is just driving

around on Tuesday nights he will probably see a game of "Capture the Flag", which consists of two teams with a cloth tied in a tree above each side's jail. Jelly Fish In Lake Leon? Sure Looks Like 'Em!

Jelly fish in Lake Leon? That's the report Bruce Pipkin of the Sports Center in Eastland was putting out Friday, and he had proof to back it up.

Walter Colburn of Olden brought in four of the suspects Friday morning. They are round and about the size of a dime. The four are almost the color of the water and swim by retracting and expanding. They have hairs all around the circle and look much like pictures of flying saucers you may have seen.

Jelly fish are common in salt water, but in fresh water they are most uncommon. In fact, a reporter couldn't find anyone who had ever heard of them before.

Pipkin said a college biology teacher (he couldn't remember if she was from Ranger or Cisco junior college) identified the four as fresh water jelly fish. He has them on display.

The four do meet the description Webster gives for jelly fish. The dictionary describes jellyfish as, "Any of various marine free-swimming coelenterates having a body of jellylike consistency; a medusa. Many have long tentacles with stinging hairs."

City Commission Meet Postponed

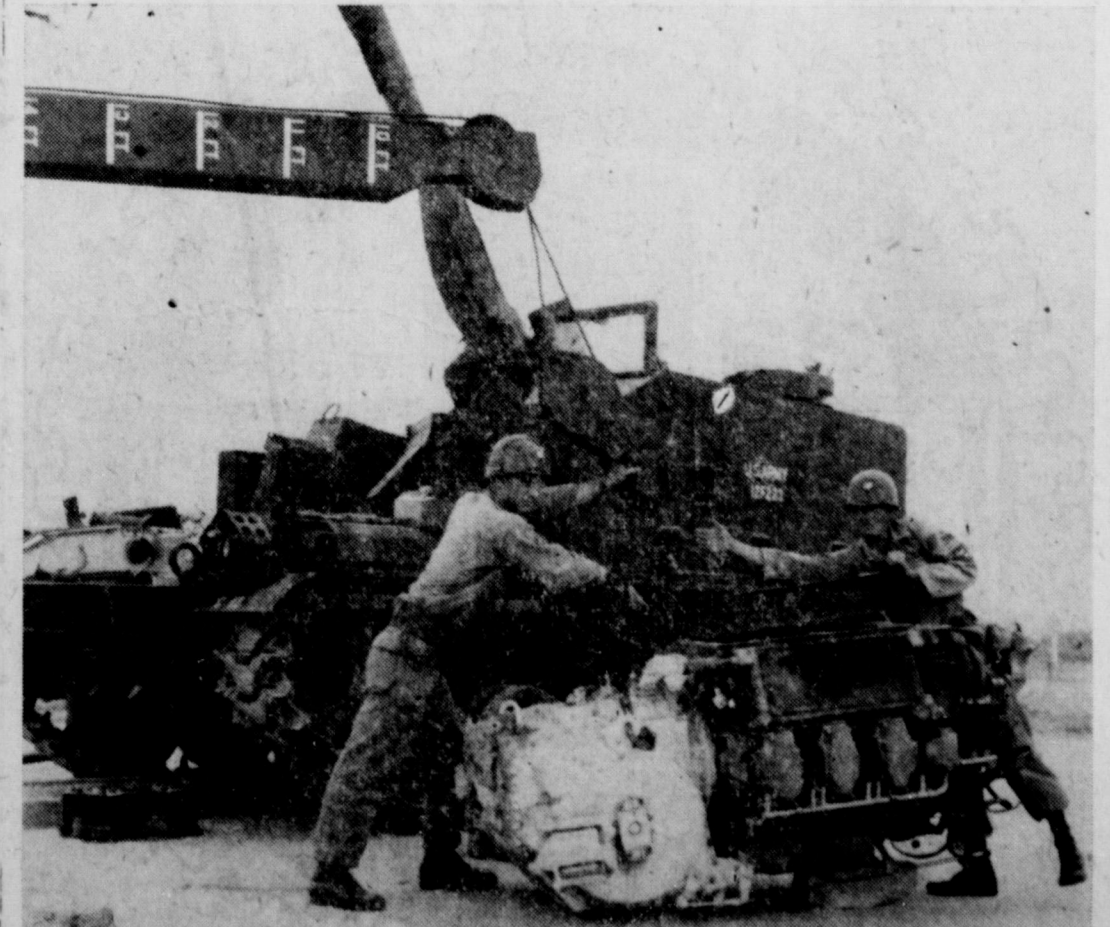
Eastland City Commissioners postponed their regular monthly meeting which was to have been held Thursday night.

hot weather months ahead. Some careful planning now plus lots of will power will lighten the load a bit.

There is no safe way to get rid of excess weight overnight. There are some important factors to consider in starting a weight reducing campaign. First, check with your doctor before starting any plan to lose weight. Many factors play a part in whether a person should reduce and how fast he should lose weight.

Studies have shown that the most effective weight reduction diets are low calorie, high protein, and low carbohydrate. However, a variety and balance of essential foods is still needed by the body. Nutritionists point out also that it's easier for a person to stay on a reducing diet which includes a variety of foods as well as foods which are familiar to the individual.

A good breakfast is always important, even in a reducing diet. Each day's food intake should include two to three cups of milk (may be skim milk), one or more servings of meat, fish, or poultry, one egg (or at least four or five a week), two servings of vegetable (one dark green or yellow), to or a reducing diet which includes one citrus, at least one tablespoon of butter and two or three servings of bread or cereal.

If you're really concerned about losing weight, get a calorie chart and start counting your calories. Remember that you can reduce the number of calories amazingly by omitting rich desserts—like pie, cake, and doughnuts.

It's commonplace nowadays to have a long life. Proper food can help to make those extra years happier and healthier. Complaints of a chronic tired feeling, gloomy outlook on life, anxiety over small things, and loss of sleep often are caused from being poorly nourished. The right food helps the body to be at its best, and if illness strikes, a wellnourished body responds better to treatment than one in a run-down condition.

Age doesn't change the kinds of food needed by the body for proper functioning. Some adjustments may be needed to take care of special problems. For instance, overweight may become a problem as activities decrease unless the amount of food is decreased too. A good plan is to cut down on the amount of food eaten, but not to cut out any food as long as it does not cause discomfort. The Texas Food Standard is a reliable basic guide for planning meals for any age.
