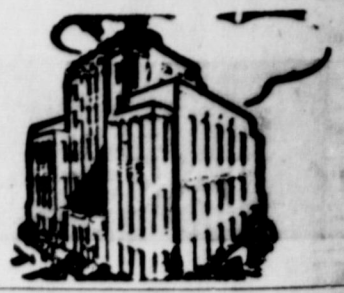

## BEST IN EIGHT YEARS

# July, 1958 One of Wettest In History

Eastland County farmers have long maintained that if they could get some good rain in July and August they would make a bumper peanut crop.

August hasn't rolled around yet, but many a prayer has been answered this July.

In Eastland the official rain measurement during the period has been 4.08 inches so far this month. That's the most rain in July since 1950 when 4.50 inches was recorded.

Much more rainfall than the 4.06 recorded here has been reported in some sections of the county. The results have been that peanuts are looking the best they have in many, many years.

This has been the fourth wettest July on record, a check reveals. Records have been kept here since 1911 and only in 1950, 1938 and 1926 has more rain fallen in July. The wettest July came in 1938 when 6.84 inches fell. In 1926 4.38 inches was recorded.

Total rainfall for the year now stands at 19.27. That combined with the record 43.26 inches which fell last year made that a county wetter than it has been in many a day.

Last year, when the all-time rain record was set, only .75 of an inch was recorded in July and .41 in August. That hurt the peanut crop. In July, 1956 only .30 inches was recorded.

Average rainfall for Eastland County for a year is 25.83 inches. That means that 5.56 inches must fall in 1958 to have an average year. Farmers could use more than that, however.

There is also considerable interest in the lieutenant governors race here. Ben Ramsey, seeking an unprecedented fifth term, has met unexpected strong opposition from George Nokes.

Attorney General Will Wilson is unopposed, but three men are seeking the Supreme Court associate justice. Place 1, post. They are Robert W. Hamilton, Wilmer B. Hunt and J. Edwin Smith.

Frank P. Culver is unopposed in his race for associate justice of Place 2 and Ruel C. Walker has no opposition in his bid for place 3.

Sarah T. Hughes is challenging Joe Greenhill for the place 4 Supreme Court seat, however.

Kenneth K. Woodley is unopposed for his seat on the Court of Criminal Appeals after winning a fight to ban the name of his only opponent from the ballot because of too little experience as an attorney.

And Olin Culberson again has no opposition in his race for railroad commissioner. Also unopposed are Robert S. Calvert, comptroller of public accounts, and Jesse James, state treasurer.

Bill Allcorn is opposed by L. J. Dimmitt in the race for commissioner of the general land office. Two men are seeking to unseat John C. White as commissioner of agriculture. They are Glenn H. Kothmann and Tom Griffin.

Clyde Grissom of Eastland is unopposed in his race for re-election as chief justice of the 11th District Court of Civil Appeals, and

Esco Walter faces no opposition in his bid for a first term as associate justice. Walter was appointed to the Court by Gov. Daniel after Judge Milburn S. Long's death.

Three familiar names appear under the state representative spot on the ballot. Paul Brashear, the incumbent, is opposed by C. H. Dawson and Omar Burkett. Both Dawson and Burkett unsuccessfully sought the post two years ago. Burkett, however, formerly held the position.

## Kincaid Feed Adds Mobile Feed Mill

Kincaid Feed and Turkey Hatchery today announced the purchase of a new Daffin mobile feed mill which means that Eastland County farmers can now have their home-grown feed mixed right on the farm.

In announcing the new service, the four owners of Kincaid Feed—Alvin, Aubrey, Don and Robert, said farmers will be offered a free grind at their farm as a demonstration.

"With our new Feedmobile," they said, "we can now drive right up to the farmer's bin-door, grind anything he grows for feed, mix the ground material with high-protein commercial concentrates and other additives, and blend in warm liquid molasses. There's a pneumatic unloader on the Feedmo-

bile's mixer-blender which quickly pipes the finished formula feed to wherever the farmer wants it."

The new service, according to the Kincaids, will greatly reduce the amount of labor and time normally needed to get feed prepared. It will also enable farmers, he said, to maintain an uninterrupted supply of fresh, productive rations since the mobile mill will serve farms on a regular route schedule—even during planting, haying, or harvest time.

# Key Posts at Stake In Primary Saturday

## Six Thousand Expected To Vote In This County

An estimated 6000 Eastland County citizens will go to the polls Saturday to vote in the Democratic primary election. They will help select Democratic flag bearers for United States senator, and a number of key state, district, county and precinct offices.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Interest in the primary is high, due both to a heated contest in the Senate race and the county judge's race, and several other contested races.

Eastland County has long been a stronghold of W. Lee O'Daniel, candidate for governor, and the outcome of the county gubernatorial race is attracting some state-wide attention. Gov. Price Daniel is generally conceded as the odds-on favorite in the race, but he has two opponents, O'Daniel and Henry Gonzales.

Political observers here classify Eastland County as one of the counties which could go either way in the Senate race. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, seeking his first full term, has drawn a strong opponent in William Blakley. Yarborough, in races with Allen Shivers and Price Daniel for governor, carried the county in some elections and lost it in others. Conservatives have worked hard to swing the county into the Blakley column, and Sen. Yarborough spoke in Eastland in behalf of his candidacy.

There is also considerable interest in the lieutenant governors race here. Ben Ramsey, seeking an unprecedented fifth term, has met unexpected strong opposition from George Nokes.

There are two county commissioners posts at stake in the primary. In Precinct 4 (Cisco) six men are seeking the post now held by J. E. McCannies. Candidates are Clifford R. Pippen, Carl Lamb, Don Rupp, Carl D. Gorr, J. J. (Jake) Honea and Clarence B. (Runt) Dill.

## Local Precinct Conventions Set Saturday at Two

Twenty-five precinct conventions will be held in Eastland County Saturday at 2 p.m., and the results of the conventions will decide who will control the Democratic party in the county in the coming two years.

The fight which has been waged between conservative and liberal elements during the last few years is expected to continue to some degree. Conservatives have controlled the county for years, and their control is not expected to be seriously challenged, however.

Ranger has been the main stronghold of liberal voters in Eastland County in past conventions, and that group is again expected to control the two precinct conventions there.

Here in Eastland the Precinct 1 convention will be held at the courthouse and the Precinct 2 convention will be at City Hall. Conservatives are well organized here and there is little doubt that they will lose their control.

Precinct 1 can name 24 delegates to the county convention and Precinct 2 can have as many as 17.

Jay Blevins, county chairman, urged all Democrats to attend their conventions and select delegates who will vote the way they desire in the Aug. 2 county convention.

In all 175 authorized delegates can be selected Saturday to attend the county convention. Ranger can send 37 delegates, Cisco 44, Eastland 41, Rising Star 13, Gorman 14, Carbon 5 and Olden 4. None of the other precincts have more than three authorized delegates.

# Game Preserve Barbecue And Rally Well Attended

Members of the Sabanna Valley Game Preserve Association played host to almost all Eastland County candidates Tuesday night, and a large crowd was on hand to listen to the politicians talk and eat barbecue.

It was a typical old-time political gathering, and TV apparently didn't keep anyone away.

H. R. (Pop) Garrett served as master of ceremonies for the night and Ted Underwood was timekeeper. Each of 12 candidates gave five minute talks.

Omar Burkett, seeking the state representative seat now held by Paul Brashear, stressed the fact that he stands for economy in state government. He said he would stand on his record, and said his record would show that his kind of economy was the kind that balanced the budget.

Burkett said he was for REA and stressed that he is well known in Austin.

Brashear was the second speaker. He also said he was for REA and added that his vote "... simply implies that I am keeping it rural."

All three candidates seeking the Precinct 2 (Gorman) commissioner's post spoke. A. M. Thurman has favored keeping School Buses and rail routes in good shape above all other roads and the incumbent, B. M. Bennett, said weather controls what a commissioner can do as much as finances. The other candidates, Buck Foster, just urged Precinct 2 citizens to give him their vote.

Clarence Dill, seeking the Precinct 4 (Cisco) commissioner's seat also was on hand. Johnson Smith, running for re-

election as county clerk, pointed out that during his administration 35,000 birth certificates have been permanently recorded on microfilm. He also said when he took office eight years of cross indexing needed to be done, and pointed out that it has now all been taken care of.

Arlon E. Smith, the other candidate for county clerk, said that if elected he would do his best "... to cut all unnecessary spending that might be going on in the office."

Roy Lane, incumbent in the district clerk's race, vowed he would continue to render the "most most efficient service that can be given." He pointed with pride to the fact that during his administration not one mistrial had resulted because of failure of the clerk's office.

Richard Cox, Lane's opponent, declared he would eliminate the assistant from the district clerk's office, and do "all the work myself." He asked voters to give him a promotion.

Clyde Garrett, running for county judge, said his opponent hadn't given all the facts about the county financial condition. He said the general fund has only
