**Stamford Youth Named Champion Junior Cowboy**

Bobby Wedeking, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Wedeking of Route 3, Stamford, has been chosen world's champion typical junior cowboy of 1954. He is a sophomore at Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, and will try out for the intercollegiate rodeo team of the university this fall.

The honor which Wedeking won was based on rodeo events during the past year, winding up with the Snyder rodeo.

It was also based on neatness, friendliness and other qualities. No one who uses alcoholic beverages, profane language or who smokes was eligible for consideration.

In rodeo events, he has been riding cutting horses and showing quarter horses. He has also been taking part in bull-riding, bareback bronc riding and calf-roping. Wedeking trains cutting horses and roping horses in his spare time. He grew up on a farm and has used farm activities to help him make money since he tried his skill at raising 4-H club calves.

He has been elected president of the Abilene Southwestern Junior Championship Rodeo Association and was elected director of the bull-riding events.

The Stamford youth was champion of the open class, lightweight division last year as a freshman at Hardin-Simmons and has been a Golden Gloves champion for two years.

A hand-tooled saddle and a gold and silver belt buckle will be presented to Wedeking for his appointment as world's champion typical junior cowboy of 1954.

**RANGER BULLDOGS TAKE 35-6 BEATING FROM C-C WOLVES**

COLORADO CITY (TNS) — In the fading seconds of the final quarter the Ranger Bulldogs in their first football performance of the season managed to generate speed enough to pull together a scoring combination and make their only touchdown in a game that saw the Colorado City Wolves take the long end of a 35 to 6 score, Friday night at Colorado City.

This was the heaviest defeat suffered by a Ranger High School football team in a number of years.

With 16 seconds remaining on the clock, a 16-yard bullet-like pass from the arm of Quarterback Scott Forney into the waiting arms of the Bulldog left end, Jerry Cantrell at the Colorado City goal line gave Ranger its only scoring of the night. The try for extra point failed.

The Bulldogs looked sluggish as compared to the heavier and speedier Wolves, who at times ripped the Ranger forward wall to bits. In like manner the Wolves time after time broke up Bulldog attempts at ground gaining.

The flashing speed, and fighting spirit that characterized the Bulldog team of last year was lacking in Friday night's game. Fumbles were frequent and costly.

Colorado City picked up all its 35 points in the first three quarters of the game.

The most dazzling play of the game was a 90-yard gallop by Hollis Gaine, the left halfback for the Wolves, who took the ball from his own 10-yard line and raced across the Bulldog goal line unhampered. Gaine, was a fleet-footed ball carrier and out-ran every Bulldog who tried to stop

him after he got into the clear. The Wolves laid down excellent interference for the ball carrier and got him into the open with little difficulty.

On a fourth down punt from the Wolves 44-yard line, Scott Forney had aimed for the coffin corner, and kicked out on the 10-yard line. It was on the first play after taking possession of the pigskin that the Wolves sent Gaine racing down field for their final touchdown of the night.
