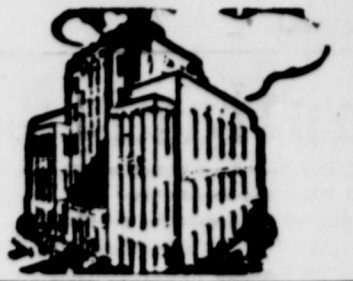

## Mavericks Take 39-12 Win Over Dublin

### Local Eleven Hits Stride In Victory

Overcoming a fumbling spree which kept them scoreless in the first quarter, the Eastland Mavericks got down to serious work Friday night and smashed the Dublin Lions, 39-12, despite an unusual spread formation and a 205 pound fullback thrown at the locals by the Lions.

The spread wasn't as big a surprise to Eastland as was big Joe Templeton, who was moved from center to fullback just for the Mavs. Templeton ate up five-yard banks of yardage for the first few minutes of the game, but slowed down after some vicious Maverick tackles.

Eastland had as many and possibly more fans at the game as did Dublin, the host team. The game was a non-district affair matching two Class AA eleven's.

Things looked rough as the game got underway. The Mavs lost three yards in as many tries on their first series of plays and then Quarterback Clint Humphreys went back to punt from his own 42. He got off a beauty and it fell into the waiting arms of Joe Hicks. Hicks crossed with Bill Pettijohn on his 25 yard line, handing off to the Dublin speed merchant. A great fake by Hicks put Pettijohn in the open. He ran into trouble at the 50, got two good blocks on the Mav 50 and then threw off the only Mav to touch him. The 75 yard sprint put the Lions on top 6-0, but Hicks failed to sneak over for the extra points.

Eastland fumbled away the ball the next two times they got possession, but a stout defense featuring Knicky Arther, Mike Legeben, Humphreys, Jimmy McElreath and Charles Martin refused to bulge.

The Mavs got their first real drive going in the last few minutes of the initial period. Billy Don Turner came into the game and put new life in the Mav offense.

Starting from the Mav 27 Turner picked up 11 to the 38, then Larry Hollis ripped off 15 to the Dublin 47. Turner got eight, Hollis two and Turner another four to take it to the Lions 33. Then Hollis got another five and Humphreys matched his run for another five yards and a first down on the Dublin 23. From there Turner took it to the three, then on the next play the Mav left side of the line opened a gaping hole and Turner hit it to go over untouched. Hollis passed to McElreath for the extra point and the Mavs were never behind again.

The tough Mav line successfully bucked a fourth and two tries from the Lion 48 to give Eastland the ball on the 49 just four plays after the first Eastland score. It took just four plays to punch it across, with Humphrey passing to End Philip Lewis for 37 yards to the 10 in the biggest ground gainer. The touchdown came on a nine yard pass from Humphrey to his other end, Stanley Reed. Hollis passed incomplete on the extra point try.

Still in the second period the Mavs got another score. Tackle Gary Lusk pounced on a Dublin fumble on the Lion 13. Hollis got three and Turner four, then Humphrey blasted over from the six. Humphrey passed incomplete this time on the points after try.

Eastland marched 63 yards following the opening kickoff of the second half. Hollis, McElreath, Humphrey and Turner took times about biting out from two to six yard gains, then McElreath found himself an opening and dashed 26 yards to the Lion 10 yard line. Hollis took it to the three in two plays over the right side, then Humphreys rode to paydirt behind his hard charging line. Again a pass try for the extra points failed.

Guard Mike Lisenbee raced 48 yards for the next score after intercepting a pass off the arm of Joe Hicks. Lisenbee just turned on the steam and outran three Lion defenders. This time Humphreys put his toe into a place kick for the point after to make it Eastland 33, Dublin 6.

Hollis got the next Eastland score on a two yard plunge. Charles Eoff went back to punt from his own 48, but the hard charging Mav line pounced on him at the 35 before he could get his kick off. Two penalties for defensive use of the hands (grabbing face bar) drove Dublin back to their own two, and Hollis did the rest. Humphrey failed to convert.

Dublin regained some glory by getting the final touchdown. It came on a 12 yard pass from Quarterback James Bassett to End Dag Pendleton. The extra points run failed.

Other District 7-AA teams also did okay. Winters defeated Anson, 12-7 in an upset; Coleman defeated Comanche, 22-14, in another upender; Ballinger lost to strong Stamford, 38-6; Ranger was downed by Mineral Wells, 30-22; and Cisco had an open date.

## City Commission Is Requested to Issue Home TV System Franchise

Eastland City Commissioners Thursday night were asked to grant a franchise for a community television system.

The Commission took the request which was made by representatives of the Community Television Co. of Abilene, under advisement. They told Maurice Nickson and W. A. Simmons they would give their answer at their next meeting.

Nickson and Simmons told commissioners they would guarantee

good reception for five channels including three major networks. "We would offer off the air pickup to start," they said, but indicated that in time to come microwave, now frozen by the government, might be offered.

They indicated that the company would make an \$80,000 investment here and would hire two fulltime employees, an office manager and a technician.

They said the company would receive and transmit through a

coaxial cable. Construction of a 300 foot high antenna east of town would be necessary. Aerial surveys have been made they said, indicating good reception from five channels.

The company recently was granted a similar franchise by the City of Cisco. Simmons told commissioners that the firm needed no assistance as far as financing is concerned. Under the contract offered, the City would receive a two percent franchise tax.

Commissioners were told that the company anticipated a \$10 tie-in charge for homes here, with a monthly charge of \$6. Simmons and Nickson said a survey showed some 500 TV sets are in use here. The company anticipates 600 subscribers to their cable service.

**Other Business**

In other business, Jim Beard met with the Commission to ask that a five plug be installed at the corner of Dixie and Salsosa. Beard is to meet with the Commission at its next meeting to discuss his request.

Commissioner Tom Wilson, who was asked to study the city budget by Mayor Cyrus Frost, told other commissioners he felt the city lacks adequate controls in its accounting system. Other commissioners said that lack of money prohibits the purchase of business machines Wilson said are needed to bring the system up to date.

City Manager Jimmy Young revealed that the City recently purchased a mover for the City's tractor after the old one wore out.

A request to open up a road in Hillcrest addition was read. Mrs. Marene Johnson, said 23 homes could receive mail delivery if the road was open. The Commission agreed to open the road at a later date.

Young was authorized to accept a bid of \$211 from Noble Soutres to repair the City Hall roof.

Mayor Horton also signed a proclamation declaring the week of Sept. 17-23 to be Constitution Week in Eastland. The request was made by Mrs. Alex Spears of Cisco, chairman of the Charles Crawford Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Commissioner Bob Perkins recommended that the City pass a plumbing ordinance, and he was asked to check into other town's ordinances and report at the October meeting.

The Commission revealed that a request made by Don Hill, owner of the Connellee Hotel, had been approved. Hill earlier had asked the City to drop penalty and interest charges on back taxes on the hotel. Hill pointed out at that time that he had recently acquired the hotel and that the tax taxes stood against it. He said he was willing to pay up the back taxes if the City would drop the penalty and interest charges.

## Brownie Troop Is Being Organized

Eastland will have a Girl Scout Brownie troop if nine local mothers have their way.

A meeting was held Thursday afternoon at South Ward School and nine mothers were on hand to discuss what Eastland can do to organize something for the city's young girls.

Following the meeting Mrs. Edie Gallagher and Mrs. Kerman Bend were named as organizers for the Brownies.

Mrs. Austin Flint of Cisco, area representative, was at the meeting to explain work done by the Girl Scouts.

Youngsters in trouble turn up frequently on our front pages these days. It is worth noting that Girl Scouts don't provide this kind of news item, she said.

"It isn't that Girl Scouting is set up as an antidote to juvenile delinquency. It is simply that Girl Scouts are so busy with activities that are challenging and fun and exciting (and constructive), that they've no time nor energy nor interest left over for the other kind of behavior."

"The real news about Girl Scouting is not that it prevents juvenile delinquency but that it develops in youngsters the integrity and self-reliance and ingenuity and capacity for leadership that assures their own and their community's well-being."

"You associate Girl Scouts, perhaps, with hiking and camping and wearing cute green uniforms. But, what else do they do? Why should you be genuinely glad to give the program your support?"

"Let's go to the source. Let's ask a Girl Scout—that seems fair enough. Ask her what Scouting has done for her. She may tell you, 'I've been working for a home-maker's badge, and you know something? Housework isn't drudgery, as I've always thought—it's pretty good at it. Cooking, for example—it's not just putting something in a pan and lighting the fire under it. It's an art, and I'm learning to cook with imagi-

ation. You should taste the lamb stew I can make! Out of this world! And cheap, too. Then, there's budgeting and marketing—I did the marketing for a week and spent less than Mother usually does—what do you think of that?"

"She talks with pride and enthusiasm about chores many girls have to be wheeled or coerced into doing. Another Girl Scout may answer your question this way: 'We've been working on a community project. I never dreamed that running a town was so complicated! We've visited City Hall and learned about the Council meetings and talked about some of the things decided there—several of us are going to talk to the Police Chief and the Fire Chief. We're going to find out what the Sanitation Department does and how the water department operates. I had no idea that city government was so important in our daily lives!'"

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### REV. SURFACE ELECTED MODERATOR

## Eastland Will Host Abilene Presbytery

The Rev. Eugene H. Surface, minister of the First Presbyterian Church in Eastland, was elected moderator for the Presbytery of Abilene at the autumn meeting of the Presbytery held Thursday in Brownfield, and Eastland was selected as the next meeting place of the Presbytery.

Attending the Brownfield meeting with Rev. Surface was David B. Vermillion. The Presbytery consists of churches in some 25 Texas counties from Strawn to the New Mexico line. The meeting comprises all the ministers who were members, plus an elder from each church.

Rev. Surface announced following the meeting that the 12 Presbyteries of the Synod of Texas will soon become seven in number

for more efficient government of the rapidly growing Presbyterian Church.

The churches from Merkel to Strawn in the Presbytery of Abilene will be joined with those in Wichita Falls and Fort Worth Presbyteries, and a few churches in Brownwood, Waco and Dallas Presbyteries, to form the Brazos Presbytery, which will be more compact than the present Abilene Presbytery.

Mr. Surface, who was ordained

in 1930, was elected in the city which he first served as pastor.

The last meeting of the Abilene Presbytery will be held next autumn at Eastland. The Presbytery was organized here, 75 years previously, on Nov. 20, 1884. Eastland and Strawn are the only two surviving charter churches.

Week before last, the Rev. Mr. Surface was a delegate from Abilene Presbytery to the Synod of Texas, meeting at Trinity University, San Antonio, in which University he was a professor for some eight years. Next May, he will be a Commissioner from Abilene Presbytery to the General Assembly of the Church, which meets at Indianapolis, Indiana.

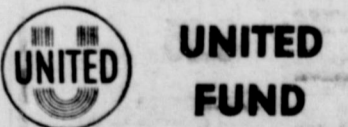

## What Makes Some W. Texas Towns Shrink While Others Grow? Read On!

ABILENE (Spl.) — West Texas' population has increased a whopping 45.4 per cent since 1950, a survey by one of the Southwest's leading population analysts reveals.

The survey, made by Dr. R. L. Skrabanek, a sociologist on the staff of Texas A & M College and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, was published in the current issue of West Texas Today, monthly magazine of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Skrabanek's survey, which covers the entire 132-county region served by the West Texas Chamber, shows that West Texas now has a population of nearly three and one-half million people compared with less than two million in 1940 and slightly more than two and one-third million in 1950. Heaviest gain in population

since 1950 was scores in the Permian Basin area of the region. The Midland-Odessa-Big Spring area has increased its population by 104 per cent since the last U. S. Census, Dr. Skrabanek states.

Although, as Dr. Skrabanek points out, "not all areas of West Texas have shared equally in this growth," each of the WTC's 10 administrative districts has gained population since 1950... ranging from 12.9 per cent for the Permian district with least gain to the District with largest gain to the Permian Basin district's tremendous 104 per cent.

"Naturally the question arises as to why certain areas are being drained of people while others are increasing their numbers so rapidly. There are dozens of minor reasons but it is relatively easy to determine a few that get to the heart of the matter quickly," Dr. Skrabanek stated.

"With but few exceptions, factors that have caused rapid population increases in certain areas of West Texas are oil and gas developments, irrigation and the presence of large population centers that attract a lot of people. On the other hand, those areas that are heavily dependent on farming and ranching without any industry to take up the slack have been and will be losing population," the analyst declares.

Population estimates for 1958 indicate that 54 counties in the 132-county WTC area now have fewer people than they did in 1950. Thus, about two out of five counties in West Texas are declining in population.

"With such a large number losing people," Dr. Skrabanek says, "the counties that gained had to have a large increase, since they not only had to offset the losses of others but in addition permit the West Texas area to register an increase of over one million as a whole."

The largest population increases since 1950 have been centered in the largest cities. Tarrant County (Fort Worth) gained almost a third of a million people in the last eight years; El Paso County (El Paso) has increased by more than 150,000; Lubbock (Lubbock) over 80,000; McLennan (Waco) by 60,000; Ector (Odessa) 50,000; Wichita (Wichita Falls) 55,000; Potter (Amarillo) over 55,000 and Midland (Midland) almost 50,000.

Not to be overlooked, however, are some of the less populous counties. Leading the list is Andrews County which boomed from 1,300 in 1940 to 5,000 in 1950 and an estimated 14,000 in 1958. Other counties which increased by an estimated 60 per cent or more in the last 8-year period are: Castro, Crane, Culberson, Hale, Moore, Parmer, Reagan, Reeves, Upton and Yoakum.

West Texas population in 1940 was 1,926,093; in 1950, the population was 2,364,088 (an increase of 22.7 per cent over 1940); and the region's population in 1958 is estimated at 3,438,064 (an increase of 45.4 per cent over 1950).

These mobile canteens are stationed at Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Big Spring, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, Longview, Odessa, San Antonio, Sherman, Victoria, Waco and Wichita Falls.

If a tornado should strike your town of Eastland, the Salvation Army would be here within the shortest possible time to give emergency relief. One or more of these canteens would be sent immediately to provide whatever emergency relief might be required.

In addition to emergency mobile canteens, the Army, when necessary, will secure the kitchen facilities of a church or school for mass feeding. Because many families may be left with only the clothing on their backs, the Salvation Army gathers donated clothing and distributes it to those in need.

Clyde Young, chairman of the Eastland Service Unit Committee of the Salvation Army said today that day-to-day welfare service are performed by local members of the committee who volunteer their time and services. In the event of a disaster, Salvation Army officers move in to help where necessary. He added that these services are financed largely through United Fund, and urged all citizens to give generously so that the Salvation Army can continue to "meet human need, at the time of need, at the point of need."

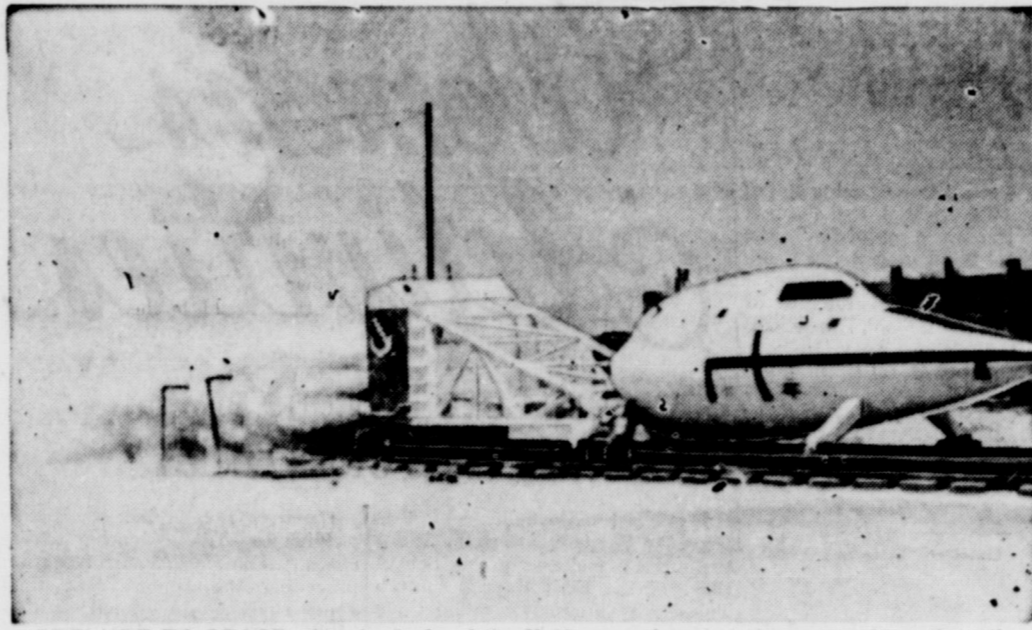
