Mavs Out to Hand DeLeon First Setback

MOORE about... EASTLAND

Charlie McCoy and other non-football news readers can skip over these first few paragraphs. For here is how this week's District 7-AA football games look in our liguriv crystal ball.

Before we get into this week's predictions, however, let's go back and look over how we came out last week. We batted .800 last week, getting all but one game right. We correctly picked Coleman to upset Carrol Shelton's Mavs are extra tough on pass defense this year, and that has been a serious problem here in seasons past. The Mavs, in two games, have intercepted five passes, and on two of these occasions have hung six

points on the scoreboard as a result. With a record on one win and one loss so far this year, Eastland has made 53 points to just 26 for their opponents. Many of those points have come directly from a tough defense, however. Only 19 first downs have been made against Eastland and the Mavs have hung up 28. And the Mavs have made 377 yards rushing in two games for 247 Dublin and Hamlin. While the 219 yards passing

made by Mav opponents looks like a lot at first glance, a close check proves otherwise. Only one touchdown has come from passing and nearly of the 11 of 33 passes completed actually cost the opposition yardage. Then too, the times would-be passers have been smothered before they could pass doesn't show up in these statistics.

Another point which has been somewhat overlooked is the fine punting average the locals have. In seven punts, Eastland has averaged 34 yards a kick. Quarterback Clint Humphreys kicked on all but one occasion, and Larry Hollis didn't hurt the average that time with a 31 yarder.

The Mavs have been penalized seven times for 75 yards and the opposition has lost 160 yards in 17 penalties. The blackest mark on the Mav book is six fumbles lost. They gathered up five of their opponents, however.

Larry Hollis edged out Billy Don Turner last Friday in the yardage gained race, but Turner was just one yard short. Hollis got 57 yards in 14 tries for a 4.1 yard average. For the year he has made 105 yards in 37 tries for a 2.8 yard average.

Turner made 56 yards against Dublin in 12 tries. On top of that he had a 53 yard dash nullified by a clipping penalty. That gave him a 4.7 yard average for the night and pushed his total yardage to 72 in 17 carries for a 4.2 season average.

Humphreys was content mainly to let his other backs do the running for the night. He made 19 yards in nine tries (counting one time he had to eat the ball for a nine yard loss on a pass attempt) for a 2.1 yard average. He has 88 yards in 21 tries and a fine 4.2 yard average.

James McElreath showed up great in the second half of the Dublin tilt and had the best average for the night. He got 50 yards in just six carries for a great 8.3 yard average. For the year he has made 67 yards in 13 tries and has a 4.5 average, the best in the Mav backfield.

Mike Manning has carried the ball 10 times in two games, and has an average of 2.7 yards in 10 tries. John Stroud has two carries and two yards to his credit and Roger Taylor has a four yard average in two trips.

And while there is no keeping the backs from getting most of the headlines, the play of the Mav line has been most noticeable this season. Such boys as Knicky Arther, Michael Lisenbee, Charles Martin Stanley Reed, Phillip Lewis, Don Hazard and Marvin Agnew, can be singled out for extra credit.

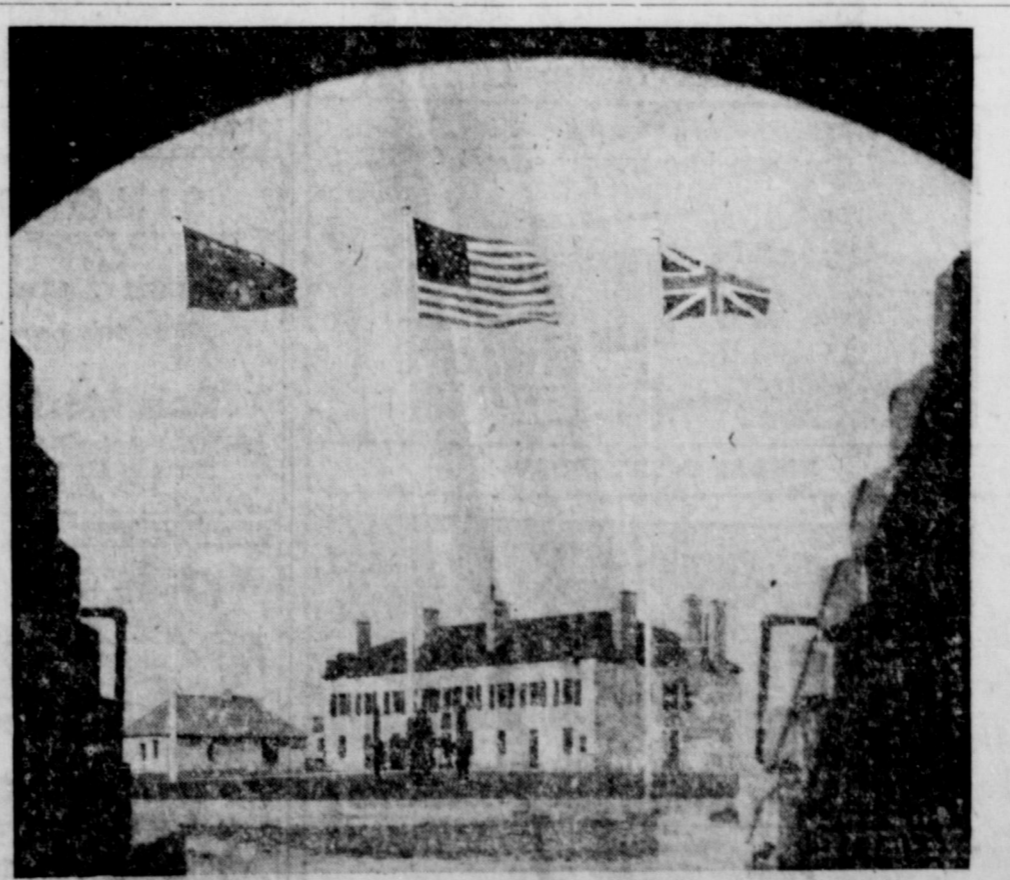



Milk Sales Show Increase

COLLEGE STATION — Sales of Class I milk by handlers operating under the regulations of the North Texas Federal Order increased 26 percent from 1952 to 1957.

This statement is made in a bulletin just released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station entitled "Trends in Sales of Milk in North Texas."

Whole fluid milk sales accounted for most of this increase, states the bulletin. Sales of homogenized milk increased from 441,311 quarts per day in 1952 to 691,670 quarts in 1957, while regular milk sales decreased from 109,924 to 12,370 quarts per day during this period. This indicates the growing acceptability of homogenized milk and the decreasing importance in consumers' minds of a "cream line" appearing at the top of a bottle of milk.

On a quart-equivalent basis, daily sales of flavored milk and drink increased from 14,476 to 30,922 and skim and fortified-skim increased from 4,988 to 12,563. Half and half increased from 6,289 to 11,604, coffee cream decreased from 5,431 to 2,478 and whipping cream increased from 2,440 to 3,026 quarts per day.

The sales trend is toward larger containers and more sales at wholesale and in paper containers. Total sales of Class I products generally are higher during the fall and winter. Termination of

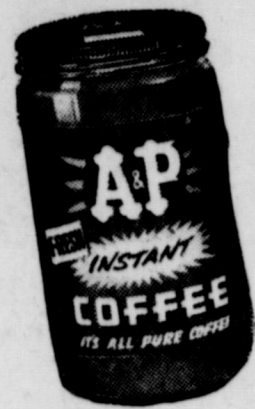

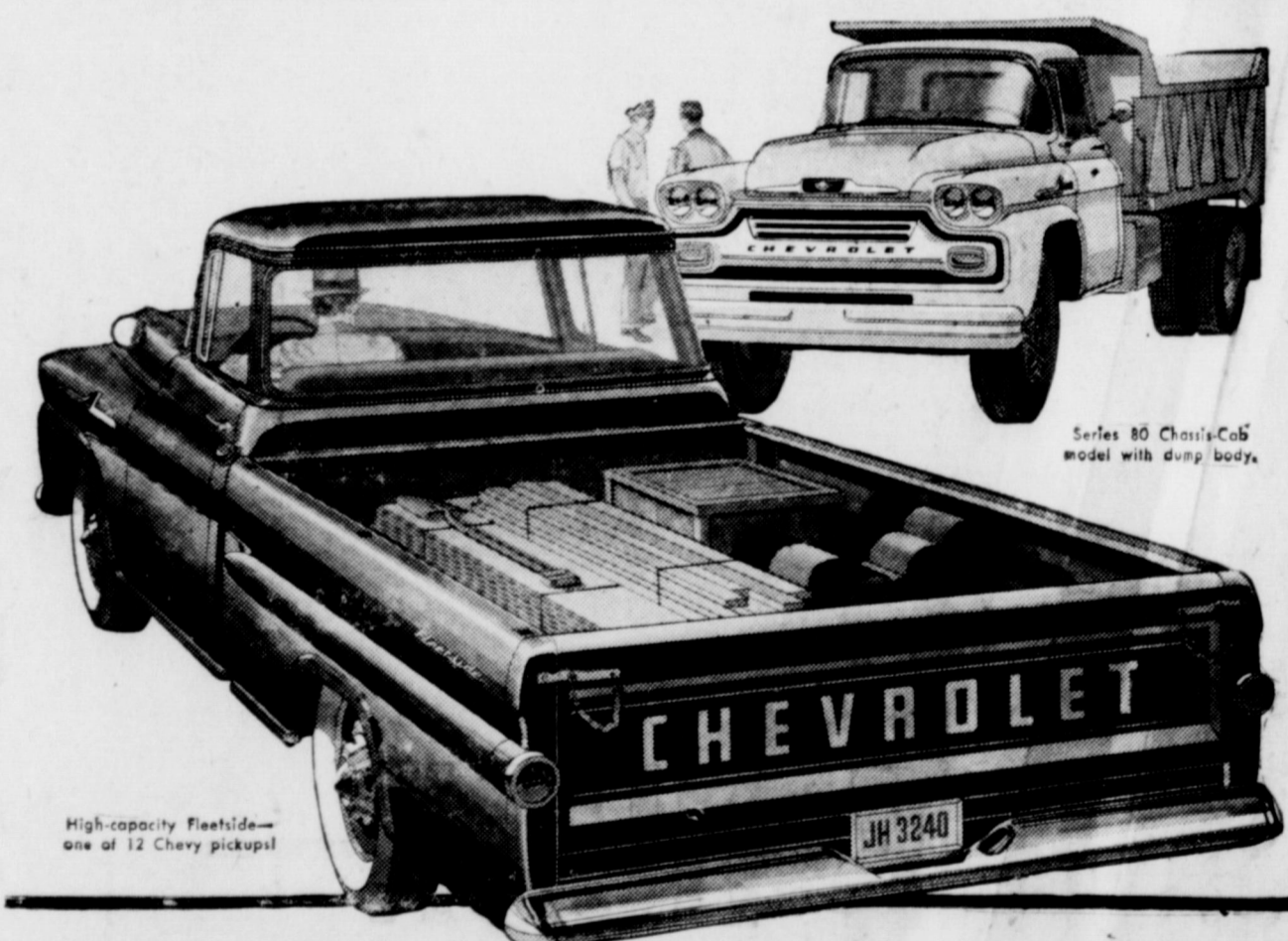

State Motorists Are Urged to be Safety Conscious

Speaking from his Austin office, J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, issued a special plea to Tex-

as motorists, this week as he asked them to be exceptionally safety-conscious during the first few weeks of the new school year. "The arrival of September means the driving habits of every Texan will necessarily undergo a radical change," Musick said. "Because, with the opening of school doors, nearly 2,000,000 pupils, 76,000 teachers and more than 8,000 school buses will be

added to the Texas traffic scene." "The safety expert said motorists who have become accustomed to driving through school zones at regular speeds—during summer months—would have to constantly remind themselves that these areas are now filled with children. "A stopped school bus is another sign for needed extra caution," he said, "and the law is explicit on this point."

When overtaking and passing a school bus, the Texas Motor Vehicle Law states:

"The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

VA Benefits Can be Reduced

An estimated 200,000 servicemen who have GI insurance policies under in-service waiver of premium payments might—in the event of death—cause their survivors to receive reduced benefits payments, says Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA regional office in Dallas.

On the other hand, he adds, in some cases an in-service waiver might increase the VA benefits survivors would receive.

Onstot says the generally higher death payments authorized last year by the Survivor Benefits Act do not apply to the survivors of those who die while their GI insurance policies are under in-service waiver of premium payments.

However, such survivors may be eligible for the old and generally lesser amounts of death compensation payments.

"Generally higher" or "generally lesser" do not mean "always," he cautions.

Several factors determine which is the greater benefit, he says. These include the serviceman's number and kind of dependents, and his basic monthly pay.

Not affected by an in-service waiver is the payment of the GI policy proceeds to the designated beneficiary or beneficiaries, he points out.

Servicemen whose policies are still under in-service waiver should determine whether—in event of death—the waiver's existence would be in the best interests of their survivors. If not, they should cancel the waiver and resume full payment of premiums, Onstot advises.

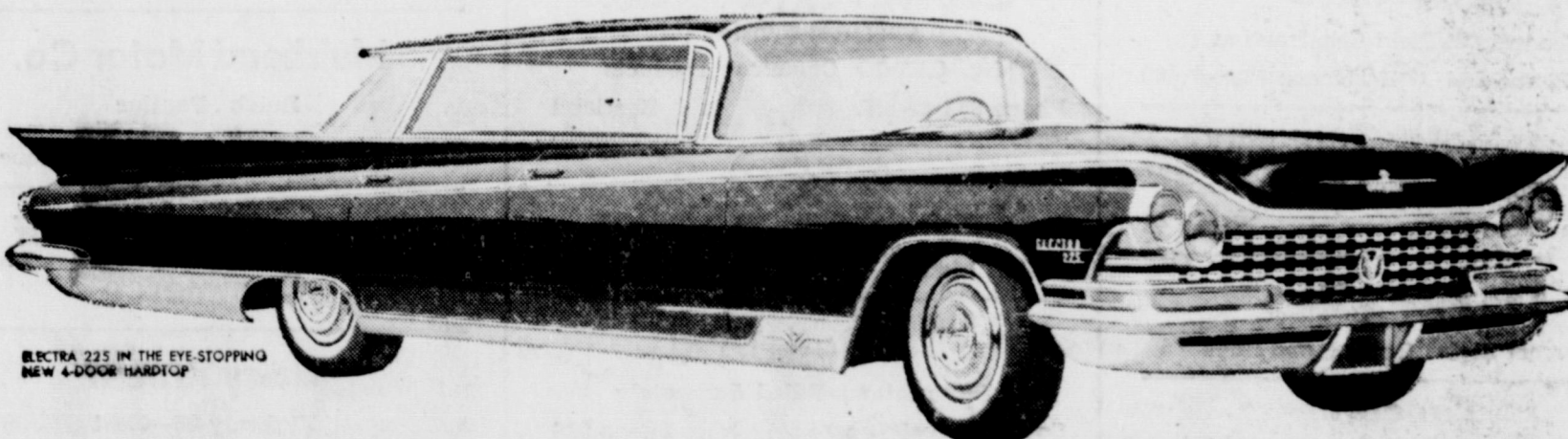

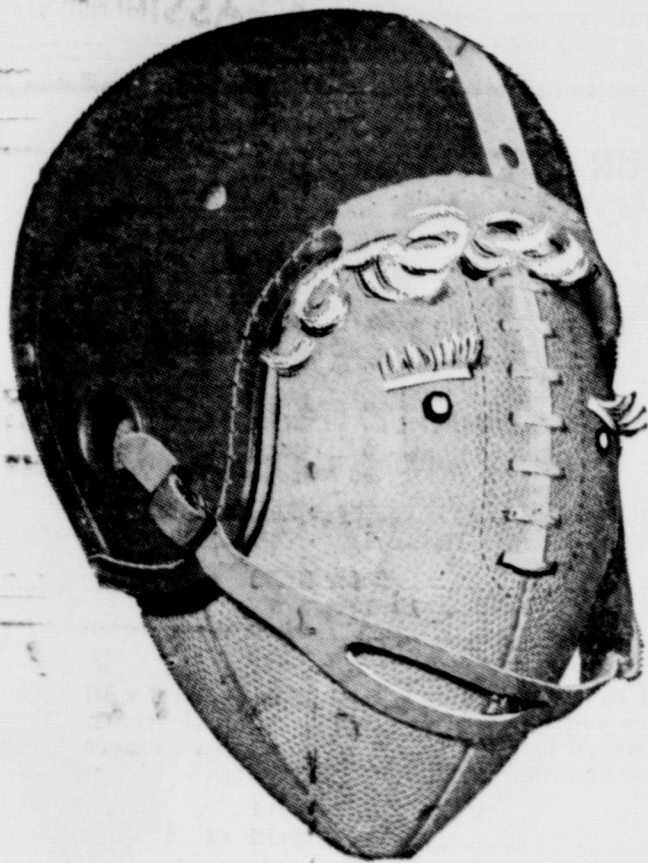

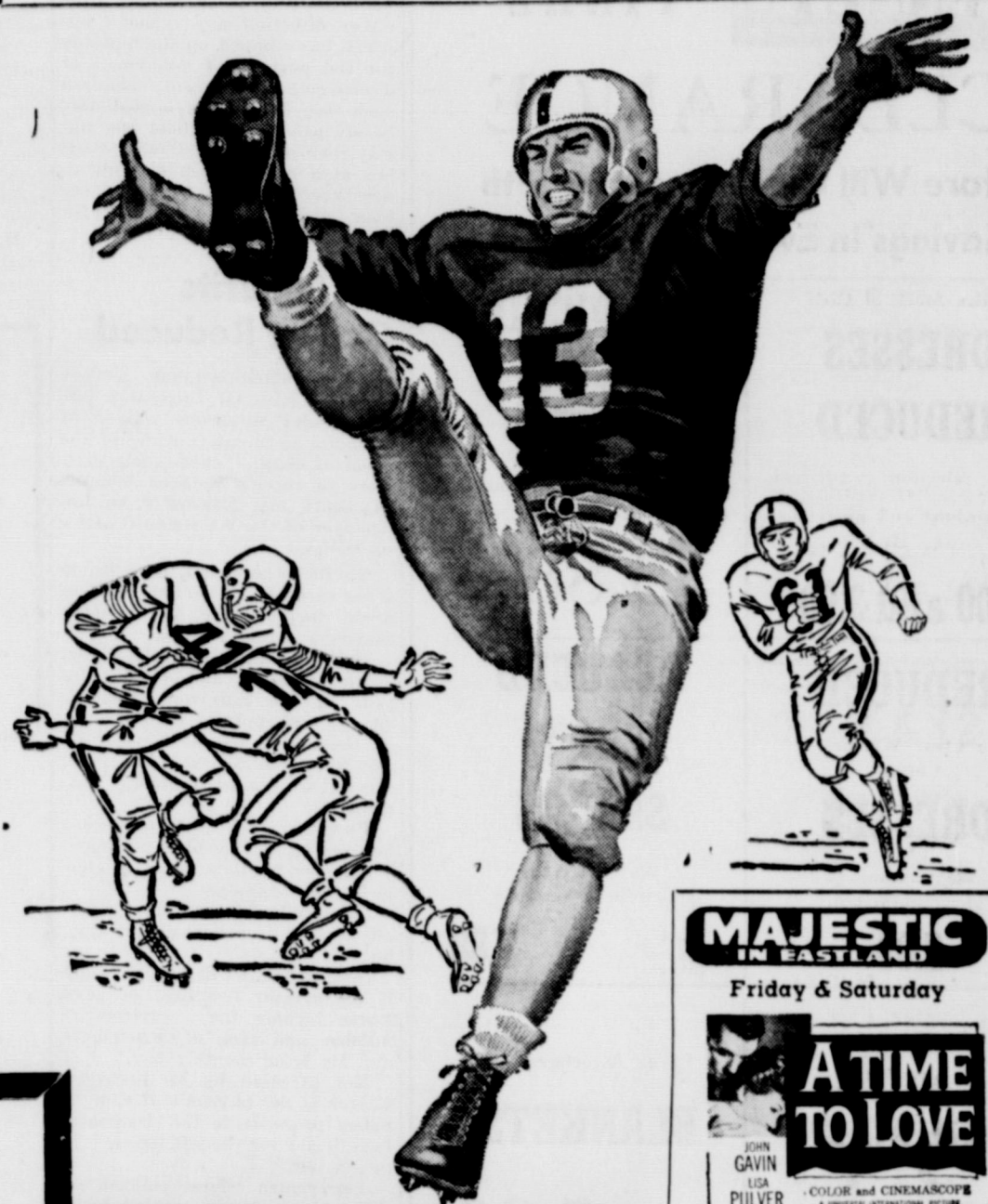

New Postal Rates Make It More Important to Use Good Practices

Postmaster Marene Johnson noted today new postage rates make it more important than ever to use good mailing practices. She gave these suggestions on how to mail most economically and efficiently:

Mail early in the day.

Many mailers allow letters to pile up until the end of the day before mailing. This often causes the mail to miss connections and may delay delivery as much as

24 hours.

Separate out-of-town mail from local mail.

If you have large quantities of mail, bundle them before mailing with "local" and "out-of-town" bands which are available free at most large post offices.

Use the Complete address.

Complete street number, rural route or post office box number should be used on all mail. Be sure that the name of the street is complete with avenue, parkway or drive. Avoid abbreviation of street and state names. Incomplete addressing is often unnecessary, too, because mailers have full address available.

Use zone numbers wherever possible.

It is surprising how many people fail to do this, even when the zone numbers of the addresses are well known to them. The zone number specifically identifies the particu-

lar part of a city to which the mail is addressed. This provides faster handling and speeds the delivery of mail bearing similar street names. Be sure to include your zone number in your return address.

Check your postage scales.

All mail with inadequate postage is now forwarded. If your scales are incorrect, this can mean embarrassing postage due collections must be made from the addressee. This can generate resentment, and ruin the value of letters, particularly business letters. Also, letters with inadequate postage require extra handling and may be delayed.

Where it may be necessary to prove that a particular letter was delivered, "Certified mail," offering many advantages of registered mail at less cost, is a good way of cutting down on postage bills. (Be sure, however, that cash and irreplaceable papers are sent by registered mail.)

Consult your local postmaster if you have a mailing problem.

The Post Office Department is as anxious as you are that your mailings be correctly prepared.

Your local postmaster will be happy to advise you on technical mailing problems arising under new postage rates and how to use the mails most economically and efficiently.

A working wife must meet several limitations in order to qualify. Widows are eligible in some cases. If you have child care expense in your family, a check of the tax instructions on these expenses and a careful record of your expenses may be in order.

5,575 Deaths Have Occurred In Texas In '57

(Editor's Note: The following story was received from the Texas Safety Association, Inc. We localized the first paragraph to bring the message home. This is a suggested editorial.)

What if a disaster wiped out every man, woman and child in, say, a half dozen small Texas cities? Places such as Brady, Cisco, Quanah, Eastland, Alvin or Ranger.

Indeed, the entire state would be profoundly shocked.

Yet a total of 5,575 accidental deaths occurred during 1957, in Texas, according to the Texas Safety Association. Seventy-five more than the population of any of the above named cities of 5500 people.

Further, Texas accidents for the same period injured 6,93,045 persons. A number that is comparable to the present total estimated populations of Dallas and Gal-

veston on combined, with 4,045 to spare.

Each year the accident-disaster strikes Texans. And each year we suffer an economic loss in excess of \$440-million, or about \$49 for each child and adult in the entire state.

What can be done about these tragic losses? Of course numerous efficient and dedicated organizations, both state and public, have been working on the problem for years. They have done an outstanding job of holding the line—even in making gains in the many fields of accident prevention. But the real answer can't rest with OTHERS.

If there is any panacea for our accident problems, it is the one given to us 2,000 years ago—the Golden Rule. The application of this simple guide for our behavior may appear futile, but it is the answer. Individuals cause the accidents and only individuals can stop them.

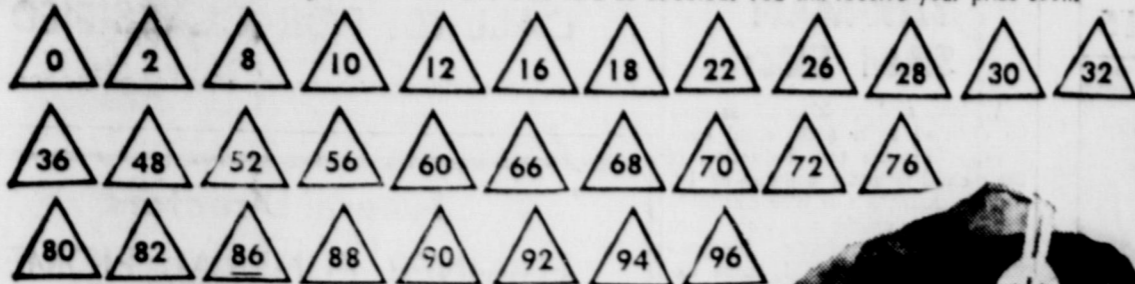
