### Maybe Ball Control Isn't So Effective

The Eastland Mavericks have done something during the last two easyweeks which doesn't make it easy for experts to figure out. They held possession of the pigskin for fewer offensive plays than did their last two opponents, but beat them both, on soundly.

The Mavs got off just 59 plays against DeLeon Friday night, while the visitors ran 68. Against Dublin the locals had possession of the ball 61 times and the Lions could call the ball their own for 63 plays.

The experts will tell you that the way to win a ball game is to hold on to the ball. They may be wrong, however. For in Eastland's only loss, a 20-14 setback at the hands of Hamlin, the Mavs had the ball 73 plays and Hamlin only 60.

Eastland has now scored 61 points and given up 26. The Mavs have netted 39 first downs to 28 for their three opponents, and lead in the ground game by 518 yards to 355. The locals have been touched for 284 yards passing, however, and haven't managed to

Operational costs of the Eastland County government will be \$410,330 during 1959, a budget approved this week by the County Commissioners Court shows.

The budget, prepared by County Auditor Earl O'Brien, is slightly less than the 1958 budget and the county tax rate will remain unchanged.

O'Brien's figures were approved without changes by the Court, and individual commissioners praised the auditor for his work.

Estimated expenditures for the year are considerably higher than estimated revenue, but this is typical of past budgets. O'Brien estimated that total receipts would total \$319,418. Proof that they were higher than estimated is evident in that an ending balance of \$223,223 was predicted, while the actual ending balance was \$267,338. However, the county's beginning balance is lower now than it was a year ago when \$316,646.37 was left on the books.

This year's tax rate will again be .80 per \$1000. The rate was the same in 1956, 1957 and 1958. Only 19 other counties in Texas have as low or lower tax rate.

This year's breakdown of the .80 rate shows a determined effort to strengthen the county's general fund. The general fund will get .60, the jury fund .3, the road and bridge fund .07 and the road and bridge sinking fund .10.

Last year's budget allotted .55 to the general fund, .05 to the jury fund, .10 to the road and bridge fund, and .10 to the road and bridge sinking fund. Year before last the general fund got only .35. A Constitutional amendment passed in 1956 allowed the Court to raise the general fund levy, however.

## Commissioners Approve County Budget of \$410,330 For 1959

Operational costs of the Eastland County government will be \$410,330 during 1959, a budget approved this week by the County Commissioners Court shows.

The budget, prepared by County Auditor Earl O'Brien, is slightly less than the 1958 budget and the county tax rate will remain unchanged.

O'Brien's figures were approved without changes by the Court, and individual commissioners praised the auditor for his work.

Estimated expenditures for the year are considerably higher than estimated revenue, but this is typical of past budgets. O'Brien estimated that total receipts would total \$319,418. Proof that they were higher than estimated is evident in that an ending balance of \$223,223 was predicted, while the actual ending balance was \$267,338. However, the county's beginning balance is lower now than it was a year ago when \$316,646.37 was left on the books.

This year's tax rate will again be .80 per \$1000. The rate was the same in 1956, 1957 and 1958. Only 19 other counties in Texas have as low or lower tax rate.

This year's breakdown of the .80 rate shows a determined effort to strengthen the county's general fund. The general fund will get .60, the jury fund .3, the road and bridge fund .07 and the road and bridge sinking fund .10.

Year before last the general fund got only .35. A Constitutional amendment passed in 1956 allowed the Court to raise the general fund levy, however.

O'Brien estimates that \$121,836.44 will come from ad valorem taxes and \$219,462.50 from other fees, fines, etc.

Here is a breakdown showing the condition of each county fund: The Road and Bridge Fund will begin the year with a balance of

\$146,540 and estimated revenue is listed at \$152,863, giving total resources of \$299,403. Of that amount, \$9,292 will be transferred to the 1945 road and bridge refunding bonds fund and expenditures are estimated at \$189,811.

That will leave an ending balance of \$100,389.

The Jury Fund will have a beginning balance of \$15,587, receipts of \$4,628, total resources of \$20,216, estimated expenditures of \$7,918, and an ending balance of \$12,297.

A beginning balance of \$20,050 is shown for the General Fund and receipts are estimated at \$99,597, giving the fund total resources of \$119,627. Expenditures are estimated at \$78,259, leaving an ending balance of \$6,088.

### Rehabilitation Center Served By Mrs. Johnson

Mrs. Marene Johnson of Eastland was one of 29 persons named as members of the Area Advisory Committee of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center at a banquet held this week in Abilene.

The annual dinner, held outdoors at the modern West Texas Rehabilitation Center building on Hartford Street, also served to introduce new officers and directors of the organization. New officers for the year 1958-1959 are: Frank W. Meyers Jr., president; Z. Oswald, vice-president; Homer Scott, treasurer; Mrs. John Matthews, secretary, and Dr. Donald McDonald, medical advisor. Three new directors were announced at this meeting: Mrs. Richard Sullivan of Dyess Air Force Base, and James H. Daniel and Caleb Reed of Abilene.

Shelley V. Smith, executive of the center, announced formation of an advisory committee of leading business and professional men and women to help the rehabilitation center meet the growing needs of the area. Director Smith said that in the past year, 13,791 treatments have been given at the center. So far, in September, there has been 544 patients processed, at an average patient load per day of more than 50 patients. This is a record.

The Rehabilitation Center is an out-patient rehabilitation center treating all types of physically handicapped free of charge. Requirements for admission to the center is referral by a member of the American Medical Association for the operation of the center are obtained from United Fund of Abilene, the private individuals through West Texas. Of the Center's 200 patients being treated at present time, 50 percent of patients come from outside here.

## Search Continues For Missing Frankell Woman

An organized search for a missing 40-year-old Frankell woman went into the third day, today, with reports indicating that no trace of her has yet been discovered.

No clues or foot prints have yet been uncovered in the vast search, that might indicate the whereabouts of the woman.

Missing since Monday morning, Neva Langford (Johnson), daughter of Hemp Langford, was last seen wearing a dark cotton house dress. She lives with her father and step-mother about one mile south of Frankell.

Close to 100 people combed the area near Necessity and Frankell Wednesday in an effort to trace the woman. At the same time, two helicopters and two light planes from Walters Air Force Base at Mineral Wells aided in the search. Reports early this morning indicated that the helicopters would continue flying over the area through today.

Police officers from Ranger have been among a good number of area people who have been on the scene. Assistant Chief of Police Don Butler and Charlie Isbell have been over the search area. Isbell, who went to the area last night with Ed Williamson of

Ranger, reported that only a few people in cars were continuing the search at that time.

Other reports have indicated that if the woman is not found soon, it is probable that she could die from exposure. From all indications, the woman has completely disappeared without leaving a trace.

She was first reported missing Monday morning, and friends and relatives searched for her that night when she failed to return to the house. She was last seen on the James T. McCleskey Ranger, near her home, about two and one-half miles south of Frankell.

First organized search began Tuesday afternoon, when the Ranger National Guard unit and the Ranger Volunteer Fire Dept. were called. Guardsmen left for the search area at 1 p.m. accompanied by several high school boys, and the Firemen left about 5 p.m.

get back but 242 yards of it through the air. But Eastland hasn't passed much. They have a record of seven completions in 24 tries and the opposition has hit 17 of 50. The Mavs have intercepted six passes and lost two of their own that way.

Clint Humphreys has a fine 35 yard punting average in 10 boots. Blavieck opponents have kicked the ball 11 times for a 30 yard average. The Mavs have been penalized 10 times for 90 yards and have gained 165 yards through 18 penalties assessed against their opponents.

Eastland's worse record is the 10 fumbles lost. They grabbed nine of their opponents to partially heal the wound though.

Larry Hollis, who Mav fans are still talking about for his vicious tackling against DeLeon, was also the big Mav ground gainer Friday. He got 71 of the 141 yards netted by Eastland. Hollis ran the ball 18 times for a 3.9 yard average. For the year he has made 176 yards in 55 trips for a 3.3 yard average.

Mike Manning got 29 yards in eight tries to rank second in the running department against DeLeon. His average for the night was 3.6 yards a try. For the year he has a 3.1 yard average in 18 carries, having netted 56 yards.

Clint Humphreys got 17 yards in eight carries for a 1.9 yard average. He has 105 yards to his credit in 30 trips for a 3.5 season average.

Billy Don Turner ended up with 23 yards to his credit in eight trips for a 2.8 yard average. He has 95 yards for the year in 25 carries for a 3.8 yard average.

Humphreys has completed six of 23 passes for the year for 114 yards and Hollis has three completions in seven throws for 11 yards.

Mrs. A. E. Cushman announced that mission study will begin the first meeting in October.



The Permanent Improvement Fund will begin the year with an estimated balance of \$22,040. No receipts are estimated and expenditures of \$2000 are shown in the budget, leaving an ending balance of \$20,040.

Receipts of \$58,200 are estimated for the Officers Salary Fund, which will begin the year without a beginning balance. An additional \$35,279 will be transferred from the General Fund to exactly meet estimated expenditures of \$93,479.

The Interest and Sinking Fund will have a beginning balance of \$62,431 and receipts of \$24,659 for total resources of \$87,091. Estimated expenditures are \$27, leaving an ending balance of \$59,132.

All other funds (Hospital, County Farm and 1954 Road and Bridge Refunding Bonds) will begin the year with a balance of \$708. Receipts are estimated at \$1,350, and a \$9,202 transfer from the Road and Bridge fund will be made, for total resources of \$2,058. Estimated expenditures are \$10,902, leaving an ending balance of \$358.
