This terse drama is by a Texan, born and raised in Dallas and is a first-person account of life in a German prison camp. With simple, smooth-flowing language, the author recreates the dangers, tense atmosphere, passions and humor of a war camp. A significant facet of this moving book is Simmons' account of religion and its force in prison desperation. You'll find this one hard to put down. "The Lincoln Lords"—Cameron Hawley. Again Mr. Hawley displays his unique ability to make every reader an on-the-spot participant in the dramatic world of business. This is the story of a marriage, deeply probing and warmly compassionate, richly detailed, intimately revealing.

"No Room In The Ark" by Alan Moorehead. 

the very distinctive name.

In 1935 the class invited the late Mark McGee, Fort Worth attorney, as the speaker for the annual banquet.

The speaker in 1936 was Judge J. E. Hickman, the class's original teacher. As a result of a vacancy on the State Supreme Court, Judge Hickman was promoted from the 11th Court of Civil Appeals here in Eastland to the Supreme Court Commission. This caused him to have to move from Eastland and the class of course had to find a new teacher. The new teacher was Virgil T. Seaberry, who took over in 1935 and taught the class for 10 years.

So Judge Hickman returned in 1936 to his former class as the speaker at the annual banquet. He also spoke again in 1938, making him one of only two men who've had the honor to speak twice at this annual affair. The other man is Dr. Philip Walker, a former pastor of First Methodist Church here in Eastland and now District Superintendent of The Methodist Church for the Sherman-Denton District. Dr. Walker spoke in 1937 and in 1951.

He appeared in 1937 as a recent pastor of the Eastland church and in 1951 as the successful pastor and author of a fine book of special merit, "Hound Dogs and Men."

As the record stands now, as far as I am able to gather information on the subject, the record crowd was on March 17, 1939. The speaker at that time was Lynn Landum, columnist and editorial writer for the Dallas Morning News. Attendance was 330 men and boys.

The 1940 speaker was, like this year's speaker, a football coach, Rusty Russell of Masonic Home of Fort Worth. Russell later was head coach at Southern Methodist University.

The 1941 speaker was an executive from the Magnolia Petroleum Company of Dallas named M. J. Norrell (one account has his name spelled as Morrell). He was one of the personnel officers with Magnolia.

The files of the Eastland Telegram during the war years of 1942-45 are a little hard to work in and I couldn't find anything on the banquet during that period although I do know it was held throughout the war period. I don't at this moment remember who any of the speakers were for any years in that period, though.

The 1946 speaker was Lt. Col. Robert Ray Herring of Breckenridge.

On February 21, 1947, a Waxahachie boy came to town to speak to us. Paul Richards, the baseball man, who is now manager of the Baltimore club of the American League, addressed our gathering. He not only is one of the finest minds in baseball but he's a speaker who comments here or there that occasion were long remembered.

I also found it a little hard to go through the files of the paper for the years up to 1954. Dr. Gaston Foote, past of Fort Worth's First Methodist Church, spoke at that time. But I can't find the file for the 1955 banquet.

In 1957 Dr. Sterling Wheeler of the faculty of Southern Methodist University was the speaker.

A Boy Scout executive and a prominent worker with boys in Dallas, Lawrence Melton, of Dallas, was the speaker.

In 1958 Dr. Douglas Jackson, professor of theology in Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, was the principal. Dr. Jackson has held a revival here in Eastland too, but I don't remember if it was before or since he addressed the Father and Son Banquet.

In 1959 the class turned to the only Eastland man, who was still living in Eastland at the time he was invited to address the banquet. That honor falls to Eastland's own Virgil T. Seaberry, Sr., former president of the State Bar of Texas. Those of us who heard him are convinced that Eastland has in Mr. Seaberry one of the really great statesmen and gentlemen of the nation right here at the homeplace.

Now comes time for another banquet. The boys down at the 9:49 Bible Class have done it again. They've arranged for another great speaker to address the boys and men. Charles Moser has a record of successful coaching behind him that a lot of other coaches would envy. He is still at Abilene but I'm personally convinced that he could have been head coach at the University of Missouri if he had wanted the job.

If you remember, a year or so ago that job became vacant and officials of the school wanted to interview Mr. Moser for the vacancy. As was his custom in December, he had a team in the playoffs for the state 4A title and Mr. Moser was too busy with his own team to be in Missouri at the time of the proposed interview. Some will say that he doesn't know for certain whether he could have gotten the job or not even had he been interviewed. But I don't hold to that theory.

After talking to Mr. Moser I'll bet a dime to a hole in a doughnut that Missouri would have jumped at the chance to get him. But he didn't show up for an interview because his high school team was playing that day. That's the sort of fellow I like.
