where a Smithsonian Institute research associate, Abbott, has predicted this area will have a very real dry summer. Abbott published a long-range forecast for 32 areas across the state. He predicts the same conditions will prevail again in 1961. The forecasts are based on Abbott's theory of a seven-year weather cycle under which precipitation may be foreseen for many years in advance. Abbott contends that his mathematical calculations, which take into account many factors, have been largely accurate through the years.

New Lightning Program To Brighten Eastland

Eastland will take on a new look in the near future. City commissioners have given final approval to engineering plans submitted by Texas Electric Service Co. whereby all street lighting will be brought up to prescribed specifications.

Fourteen new 400 watt mercury vapor fixtures will be installed and 41 new incandescent lamps are to be added to street corners. The incandescent lamps will include 26 115 watt fixtures and 18 295 watt fixtures. Four 92 watt fixtures

now in use will be removed and new fixtures will replace them.

Cost of installing the new equipment will be paid for by Texas Electric. The utility firm, under its city contract, must also pay the cost of repairs. The City

will pay only for the electricity used.

Frank S. Y. is district manager of TESCO, said Eastland citizens will see a very noticeable improvement. He said the new facilities will place Eastland's lighting above normal.

Work on the installation of the new fixtures is expected to begin immediately.

Mayor Cyrus Frost, speaking for the City Commission, said that the street lighting improvement program is a continuation of the administration's program of keeping at least "one good major project" going at all times.

He said the lighting improvements will mark the first time Eastland has had a completely new engineering lighting program at one time.
