Omar Burleson Seeks Re-election To U. S. Congress

On January 11, 1960 application was formally filed by Congressman Omar Burleson for his name to appear on the ballot for the Democratic Primary Election on May 7.

"My bid for reelection to the Congress of the United States is, of course, based on my record of service," Burleson states. "I make no claim of perfection. Doubtless, mistakes have been made, as is usually the case in all human endeavors, but two guiding principles have been constantly followed, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest possible degree in my actions in the Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect my constituency and our Nation."

Burleson was born and raised on a farm between Anson and Stamford in Jones County. He attended rural school, graduated from Anson High School, attended Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University, and graduated from Cumberland Law School, following which he had postgraduate law at the University of Texas. He married Ruth DeWeese, daughter of Reverend R. D. DeWeese, who pastored Baptist Churches in West and South Texas.

He served as County Attorney and County Judge of his home County of Jones. Later he became a Special Agent for the F.B.I. He served three years in the United States Navy in World War II, mostly in the Pacific Ocean Area. After the war he was elected to the 80th Congress and has been reelected to succeeding Congresses. He is now Chairman of the House Administration Committee in the U. S. House of Representatives.

Burleson points out that many vital issues have had to be faced in the years he has represented the 17th District in the Congress. "Many more loom before us. With constancy, I have striven to face these problems with the courage and good sense required," he says.

"As the record will definitely show, on many occasions I have found myself in the minority, but have never failed to exercise the right to vote and to do as I thought best. This has especially been true in connection with the needless spending of Federal money. The record will show that at every single session of the Congress I have voted for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department, and far below that actually appropriated by the Congress. This has been the case in all matters except National Defense. In this instance, I have always voted for those things calculated to make and to keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world.

"At all times I have tried to represent the very best interest of every segment of the economy in our 17th Congressional District. Many times we do not accomplish all we think should be accomplished, but I believe those who have familiarized themselves with my record will know that I have done the best possible under all the circumstances which must be met.

"In domestic matters, the record will prove my opposition to the empowerment of the Federal Government on State and local affairs. As the Federal Government has grown to its colossal proportions, the threat of centralzed power in Washington has increased. To this I am opposed, as my actions prove. Big government and high taxes are the result of many activities of the Federal Government which should be reserved to the States. Big government with its far-flung operations has created needless waste and extravagance.

"It has been my purpose to conduct myself at all times in a manner worthy of the trust and confidence which has been placed in me. (Continued on page two)

Adults Eligible To Enter Stock In County Show

The annual County Livestock Show at Eastland, March 25-26, with 534 animals already entered, promises to be one of the largest ever held in its long history, according to show officials.

Approximately \$1,500 in cash prizes will be distributed to the FFA and 4-H Club boys and girls with prize winning animals during the two-day affair.

Adults are eligible to show, but compete for the ribbons only, it was said.

Each of the junior exhibitors are limited to two animals in each fat animal class except the FFA and 4-H Clubs. The fat animal division of fat pigs, fat lambs and fat steers is limited to junior exhibitors.

The Eastland Auction Company will give three \$10 cash awards to the boy or girl who does the best job of fitting, grooming, showing and keeping the animal stalls and the aisles neat and clean during the show.

One award will be for swine, one for cattle, and one award for sheep. D. S. Buchanan and Lloyd Coan are co-owners of the Eastland Auction Company.

Entry fees of 50 cents for sheep, 75 cents and hogs, and \$1 for cattle will be charged. This is a new ruling. Fees are to be used to defray expenses of the show and to help in construction of new facilities at the show grounds.

Postmaster Explains There Is Good Reason Some Things Can't be Mailed

Are you one of the few who take offense at being asked what your parcels contain when they're presented at the post office for mailing?

"If so, please believe that the receiving clerk is not prying into your private affairs," says Postmaster Marene Johnson-Johnson. "He is only doing his duty."

Some of the things that people would like to transport through the mails pose a natural hazard to postal personnel and to other mail matter. For example, fire-

arms, explosives, radio-active materials, reptiles, chemicals, and liquor are capable of inflicting serious damage, and so are unmailable except where special permission is granted.

Packages of items that are unquestionably mailable sometimes contain written matter without its presence being shown through proper endorsement. "This can cause delay in delivery, unnecessary inconvenience and expense, or even confiscation of the parcel," says Mrs. Johnson.

Written matter may be enclosed in a parcel if postage covering the enclosure is added to the postage for the parcel. Mailings such as this are known as combination mailings and should be endorsed by the mailer "First-Class Mail Enclosed." This endorsement may be placed on the parcel by printing, rubber stamp, longhand, or in any other manner, but in all instances the endorsement should appear below the package and above the address.

"Written messages are very helpful to the addressee when they accompany the parcel," says Postmaster Mrs. Johnson. "But if additional postage must be collected on delivery because of the sender's failure to state that written matter was enclosed, the message may not be so well accepted."

"So when you next take a parcel to your post office and are asked about its contents, remember that the only desire of the receiving clerk is to be helpful. When mailability is in doubt, the burden of proof rests on the mailer. The way to be safe is to call your Postmaster when you have questions of any kind regarding the postal service," she said.
