Eastland Lions will try their light bulb sale again Tuesday night. Gordon Smith, drive chairman, said Lions will begin their canvass of the town at 7 p.m.

Lions will offer a "real bargain" in light bulbs, Smith said, and at the same time give Eastland citizens a chance to help a worthy cause. Lions will sell sacks of bulbs at \$2 a sack. Each sack will contain four 100 watt bulbs and four 60 watt bulbs.

Fishing Rodeo Rules Listed

Rules governing the annual Fishing Rodeo to be held at Lake Leon on April 24, 1960 from 4:30 a.m. until check-in time of 3 p.m. that afternoon.

Entry fee is \$2.00 per angler and two anglers will fish to a boat as a team, tube fishing, wading, one-man boats or fishing in separate boats will not be allowed. Contest is for legal black bass and crappie which may be caught by any legal means from Lake Leon.

The weigh-in station will be at Lake Leon Dam. Fish must be fresh caught and will be weighed live weight. The entry list will be closed at 6 p.m. Friday, April 22, 1960.

Perkins Finds Italy Is Fresh and Green

(This is the third in a series of stories written for the Telegram by Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, who is traveling abroad. The following article was mailed from Rome Feb. 27.)

By JOSEPH M. PERKINS
Yesterday morning the Genoa agent for the Lykes Line saw me off on the train for Rome. I let him make the reservations and he did well because I had the best window seat in a first class compartment.

The railroad interested me greatly, with its electric locomotive and good train equipment. Soon after leaving Genoa, the train followed the Mediterranean shore southward along the western part of the Italian peninsula. For the first two hours of the run we were in mountains and side spurs of the main mountain chain frequently extended out into the sea so that the track went through dozens of tunnels through the igneous rock. Some of the tunnels were more than a mile long and they came along so frequently that the train for perhaps twenty or more miles spent more time in tunnels than in the open. The coach in which I rode was right behind the locomotive and the engineer used the whistle at every opportunity. As usual on a train I wanted to inspect it, so I strolled through the eleven cars, the first three being first class then came the second class and last of all a combination baggage and mail and express car divided into compartments.

I stood a while at the back of the train watching the Italian countryside recede behind the train. The country had just had a general rain and looked fresh and green in the bright sunshine. Peach trees were in blossom and men, women and children were at work in vegetable gardens. The country was open, with many farmhouses. After about three hours the train stopped at Pisa but I did not see the leaning tower. South of Pisa we went through limestone country and I noticed several good sized marble working establishments by the side of the track. Some of the marble was very pretty but as the train went by very rapidly I caught only fleeting views of it.

Arriving at Rome at about four in the afternoon I felt for the first time that I was really alone. The fine Roman terminal impressed me and there were

signs and directions everywhere but I could not read them! However I noticed a priest carrying a suitcase, and not headed for the taxicabs, so I concluded that he might check it. I was correct. He led me, unknowingly, down some stairs to checking counter where I checked my two small bags. I am very happy to be traveling with so little luggage. There are no parcel lockers in Rome.

I purchased a map of Rome at the newsstand and sat down and studied it. My guide book listed three or four good medium priced hotels that are used by Italians rather than by Americans and I chose one of these. I am located about three blocks from the railroad terminal in a fine modern hotel which reminds me of some I have enjoyed in Mexico.

This forenoon I got the hotel clerk to direct me to the Yugoslavia Embassy where I went to obtain a visa for travel in that country. He told me take Bus 78, to get off at via Azuni and walk to via A. Monti Parioli 20, which I did, and found the Embassy nicely located on a hill in a fine residential section of Rome. There was no English spoken at the Embassy but fortunately the forms that I filled out had directions printed in three languages among them being English. In twenty minutes I walked away with my visa for which the fee was 620 liras, or slightly more than a dollar.

I have often heard of the instant attachments sometimes occur between members of the opposite sex and today I witnessed one. When I alighted from Bus 78, a nicely dressed and very, very portly gentleman stepped out of the bus just ahead of me. Just at that time a sweet little maid about



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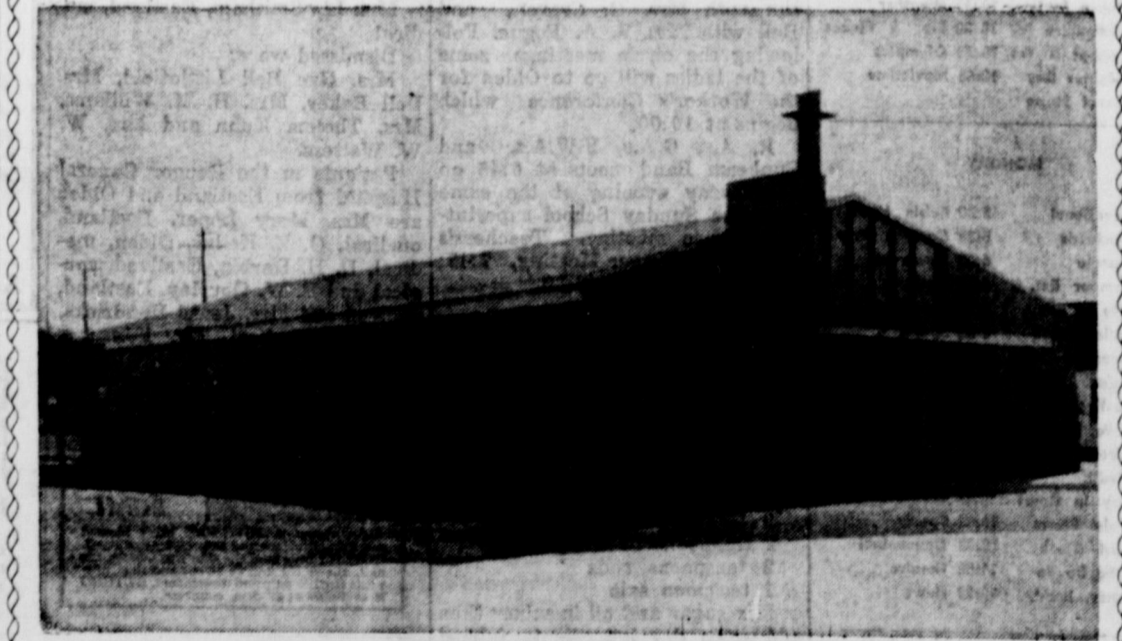
