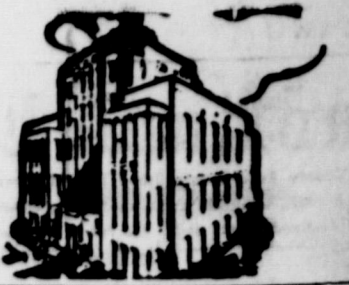

Eastland Miscues Give Albany Victory

Mavs Win Statistic Battle, Little Else

A rattled Eastland team which tried to play wide open football couldn't do anything right Friday night, and the end result was a sound 37-14 whipping at the hands of Albany's Lions.

The Maverick's, probably to the surprise of many fans, soundly trounced their opponents as far as statistics are concerned, getting 15 first downs to just seven for Albany, but statistics didn't tell the story.

About the only thing in the list of statistics which would help a fan understand what happened is

It was a game of errors. The Mavs' pass defense leaked badly, but other than that the locals defeated Albany well. The Lions simply played to contain Eastland, playing a loose defense to halt the effects on a semi-spread thrown at them by Eastland. Their efforts were awarded.

Albany played everything safe, depending on the Mavs to make the errors. Eastland obliged.

In other District 7-AA games Ranger mowed down Dublin 26-6; Cisco got a 35-0 win over DeLeon; Ballinger lost to Class AAA Lake View of San Angelo 34-6; Winters edged by Hamlin 8-0; and Coleman tied Haskell 14-14.

Surplus Food Issue Dates Are Announced

Next issue dates for the County USDA surplus food commodities program were revealed today by J. J. Porter, administrator.

Monday, Oct. 13 will be distribution date for eligible citizens living in Eastland, Ranger, and Olden.

Pick-up date for residents of Rising Star, Okra, Carbon, Gorman and Desdemona is Tuesday, Oct. 14, and distribution day for citizens living in Cisco, Pioneer, Seranton and Nimrod is Wednesday, Oct. 15.

Voting to Determine Site of Pecan Show

Ballots will be mailed out by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association asking members and entrants in last year's pecan show to vote on the site of the annual show.

All persons who entered pecans in the show held last December are eligible to vote, whether or not they belong to the association.

Previous pecan shows have been held in Cisco, however bids were entered by Ranger and Cisco at the annual pecan tour last Monday, during the noon session at Rising Star.

T. C. Wylie of Ranger and Sam Kimmell of Cisco, representing their respective Chambers of Commerce, submitted bids for the show. Voting by mail will determine the show site. Returns will be counted at the County Agent's office by Arthur Littlefield of Eastland and Cecil Shultz of Rising Star.

Letters have been sent out by the agriculture committee of the Chamber of Commerce at Ranger asking exhibitors and members of the association to vote for Ranger as site of the show.

WEATHERFORD (Spl.)—After a three-year fight with cancer that left him bedridden two weeks ago, a 19-year-old Eastland boy last week realized his ardently cherished ambition of becoming an Eagle Scout.

Richard Williams, who came to the Pythian Home in Weatherford nine years ago with his five brothers and sisters from Eastland, was an enthusiastic Boy Scout at the home and completed his main work for the Eagle Scout award before he was stricken.

He is a graduate of Weatherford High School and completed one year's study at Weatherford Junior College. He attended Youth Boy Scout six consecutive years and in 1955 was named a member of the Longhorn Council group to attend the Philmont Boy Scout Camp at Cimarron, N. M., and was chosen as one of the leaders of the Texas-New York group that worked together at that camp.

During his stay at the home he often took younger Scouts out on week-end hikes and until he became bedfast often was consulted by the juniors on Scout problems. He has served as president of his Methodist Church Sunday school class, of youth work in his church and of sub-district youth work.

FACTS ABOUT YOUR UNITED FUND

The Eastland County Chapter of the American Red Cross, which is cooperating fully with the Eastland United Fund Drive, has the following approved budget for the next fiscal year.

Home Service, \$1700. (Included are loans charged off as uncollectable, grants, telephone and telegraph charges, some transportation of worker, postage, and part of other office expense. During the past 12 months 513 families have received some type of help at a total cost of \$1697.45).

Disaster Service, \$100. (Total cost to the chapter during the past 12 months was \$91.76).

First Aid and Water Safety Service, \$150. (Total cost of this program during the past 12 months was \$159.80).

General Management and operating facilities, \$400. (Total cost during the past 12 months \$398.72). Total \$2350.

Total expenditures of the Eastland County chapter during the past 12 months, all of which have been approved by local committees, according to Earl Woody, treasurer, have been \$2,407.73.

The Eastland County Chapter's assigned share of the national organization fund requirements for the next fiscal year as established by the Board of Governors of the American Red Cross is \$3,529 making a total goal for the Eastland County Chapter of \$5,879, of which Eastland's part is \$1,750.00.

Each chapter's assignment is based on the population and the individual family income of the county or district served plus Red Cross experience based upon the 10 most recent years records.

Soil Conservation Voting Set Tuesday

A very important Soil Conservation District Supervisor election will be held Oct. 7, 1958 at 7:30 p.m. in the Texas Electric Conference room in Eastland. A conservation film, about 25 minutes in length, will be shown prior to the election. Coffee and doughnuts will be served to the group.

The election will be for the purpose of electing a supervisor for Sub-Division 5 of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District. Sub-Division 5 of the district includes that portion of Eastland County in the Upper Leon SCD lying north and east of the M.K.T. railroad which runs from Gorman, to Cisco, and extending to the Wichita Falls and Southern railroad on the east which runs from Ranger to Desdemona.

This SCD was organized by interested landowners on Dec. 14, 1940 under the provisions of State Law. It is a sub-division of State government and is directed by the local people through an elected governing body of five landowners known as the "Board of Supervisors." Term of office of a supervisor is for five years which means that an election is held each year in one of the five sub-divisions of the district. In this way the Board is composed of four men and the newly elected supervisor. Last year, B. B. Hickman of Rising Star, representing sub-division 4 was elected supervisor. F. M. Spurlen of Eastland is presently serving as supervisor of sub-division 5. He took this office after an election held in Eastland on Oct. 6, 1953.

"The supervisor of your district can do much to further conservation on the lands of our area," an SCS spokesman said.

Landowners, over 21 years of age and residing within sub-division 5 are eligible to vote. Landowners are encouraged to vote and assure themselves that a good, interested, well qualified conservation farmer or rancher will be elected to serve their conservation needs and interest. Certainly your district supervisors are deserving of the people's full support on this matter of soil and water conservation so vital to each of us."

Eastland Army Captain Praised In Resolution

Capt. Alfred H. Pautot, retired Army officer, died in July, 1957, but the men he led during World War I still praise him as a great leader.

This week Capt. Pautot's widow, who makes her home at 401 South Oak Street, received a resolution from the Last Man's Club, which is composed of men who served under Capt. Pautot in "B" Battery, 151st Field Artillery during World War I. The 151st was a National Guard outfit, and 40 of the men who are still living signed their names to the resolution.

Before his death, Capt. Pautot had served as permanent honorary president of the Club.

E. H. Beckmon, secretary, of Minneapolis, Minn., wrote Mr. Pautot a personal letter enclosing this resolution:

"Whereas our beloved Captain Alfred H. Pautot passed away July, 1957, he is resolved by his comrades in Battery "B", 151st FA assembled at their 40th reunion, that an expression of sympathy be extended to Mrs. Pautot.

"Captain Pautot was greatly admired by the entire Battery for his efficiency and outstanding courage as an officer, for his personal interest in the men serving under him, and for his great contribution to the successful record achieved by his Battery and the entire 151st F. A. Regiment. His passing is a great personal loss to everyone who knew him."

Reid is a native of Eastland. He has been with the bank for the past three years and was with Piggly Wiggly for eight years, part of that time as manager, before joining the Eastland National staff.

MOORE about... EASTLAND

Although we have often maintained that Eastland has the bad habit of trying to live in the past, let's jump back 20 years today to October, 1938. The trip back shouldn't take long, it's just a few steps back to the old Telegram file of that year.

Football was deserving of some front page coverage in those days, too, we note. In fact a glaring headline, "Football at Night Looms as Possible," greets one's eye immediately. We read that for just \$2200 the football field could have lights. It was believed it would take 10 poles, 30 reflectors and 30 1,500 watt bulbs. The Telegram noted that only Abilene, Cisco, Ranger and Eastland did not have lights in the district.

And H. J. Tanner, who was then manager of the chamber of commerce just as he is today, announced that Eastland would have a special day this year at the State Fair. Sounds familiar!

The theatre boys were about the same as today. A story in the Telegram told of a "live man eating cannibal" from the Maylanian jungles on display in front of the Lyric theatre. The cannibal was brought to Eastland to advertise "Boo-oo" which was showing at the Connellee. Parents were warned not to let their children get too near the cage "as he is very dangerous and might hurt them."

There was a big double page ad back in the old Telegram. "Lottief's Department Store Quits" the banner read. It was a typical going out of business sale (and Eastland survived it). Some nice specials, if you get there in time. Men's suits for \$10.95 and bed sheets for 49c each.

(Continued from Page One) to inform themselves as to the proper time to register.

Several misconceptions about the legally required time to register cause most of the late-comers, Colonel Schwartz thinks. There is some belief among young men that they can wait until they are 18½ years old to register.

As a matter of fact, the law requires that a man register on his 18th birthday, or within five days thereafter. Colonel Schwartz pointed out that all males born since August 30, 1922, are legally obligated to be registered under existing law, except those not yet 18.

Some young men think that membership in the National Guard or the Reserves excuses them from registration, but it does not.

If a young man joins the regular services for full-time duty before he is 18, he does not have to register when he is 18 if he is still in service.

But when he gets out, the law requires that he go to a draft board and register within 30 days. For example, if he joins the Army at 17 and stays in 10 years, he must register for the draft at age 27. The law would not obligate him for further service currently, but it obligates him to register.

Draft registration in Texas is expected to reach about 66,000 in 1958.

HOW DO I KNOW I AM SAVED?



"I regularly attended a small town church until I moved away six years ago," Mrs. M. said to a pastor whom she had invited to her home to help her with a disturbing spiritual problem. She came quickly to her point. "Can I be certain I am saved?" she asked. Before he could answer she gave reason for the question: "Once I heard a Bible teacher say that we can never be sure; we'll have to wait until death to know." The pastor's answer began with these words from the Bible: "If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved" (Romans 10:9).

He continued, "You see this verse does not say perhaps, maybe, some of the time, or that you will have to wait until you die to find out. Instead, it says positively, 'Thou shalt be saved.'" Again and again the Bible states this clearly. Many other verses of assurance were quoted by the pastor, and she came to see clearly the reality of Christian assurance. She began eagerly to study what the Bible had to say on assurance, and was no longer beset by doubts as to the permanence of her salvation.

If one never has questions concerning his spiritual life he is an unusual person. Many faithful Christians have moments of uncertainty. For example Thomas, one of the

twelve disciples of Jesus, doubted that Jesus had risen from the dead, and is generally remembered for his doubting spirit, but after he met the risen Saviour in the upper room, and had a deep personal experience, he no longer doubted (John 20:25-29).

Doubt may be dispelled by one's memory of his conversion. One man often said: "In my own life, when doubting shadows begin to fall across my mind, I rush my thoughts back to that night nearly forty years ago when, in the little white frame church building, I came face to face with Jesus Christ and gave myself to him in simple faith."

Mrs. M. again became a regular church attendant and a good student of the Bible in the Sunday school. A few months later, when the pastor again visited her, he found her radiant in her faith and happy in her Christian experience. She was no longer disturbed by those who said that a Christian could not be sure of his salvation, for she knew in whom she had believed, and was convinced that she was able to guard what she had committed to him, her very own self (2 Timothy 1:12).

A Baptist pastor will be glad if you will ask him to confer with you about any spiritual problem you may have. He will share with you what he has himself learned about how to solve it.

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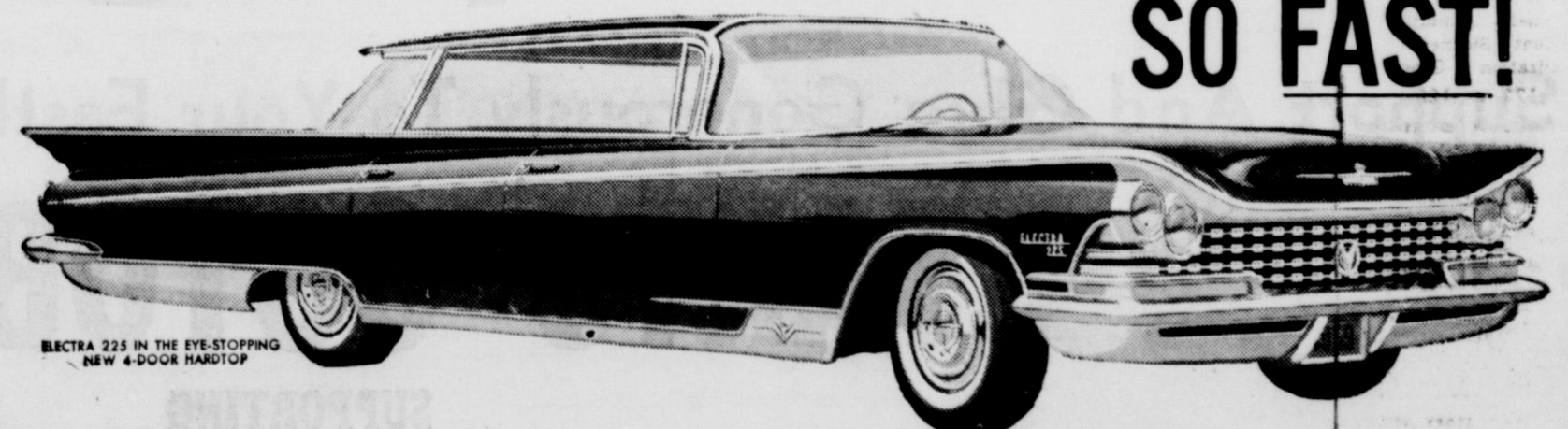
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Jehovah's Witnesses to Hear Guest Speaker Sunday Evening at Lecture
