And James will be a long time forgetting when one Scout decided to place crawfish in the beds of other Scouts on an overnight campout. Screams in the middle of the night like you have never heard startled the scoutmaster awake.

Another time, in the Scout Hut, Reid stepped outside a while, and when he returned the but was blacked out. He took three steps and off of the rafters three big Scouts came down on his back. It took just nine treatments to repair the damage to his back, he claims.

Then one year Reid had the hard task of explaining to a couple of highway patrolmen how a stack of highway signs happened to be near his tent at summer camp.

One the way to camp, Reid had a flat on his car. He stopped to fix it, and while he was busy putting on the spare, his Scouts were busy loading up the car with signs.

On another overnight campout, a group of Ranger Scouts visited the tents of Eastland Scouts while they were away and threw all of their food in Hagaman Lake. The only thing that was left to eat was three boxes of pancake mix which Reid had thoughtfully brought along. James claims he cooked pancakes for six hours the next morning before he filled up his troop.

vice tell what steps could be taken to fight rats here. Asked to appear before the Commission, the rodent experts said that the domestic rat is the big problem of most cities in this area. They pointed out that the field rat, which is more common here than the domestic rat, is not a disease carrier and for most part will not enter homes and businesses. The domestic rat, however, depends on man for a livelihood, and is a disease carrier.

City dads took under advisement a recommendation that one city worker be named to combat a drive against the rats in the business area. The Wildlife Service will provide supplies at cost if the City agrees to enter the plan.

City manager Young told commissioners that City employees voted overwhelmingly in favor of a municipal retirement program. The program will cost the City \$250 annually, and employees will match that figure.

First reading of an ordinance granting the Community Television Co. the authority to operate in Eastland was read. The second and final reading is slated for the next monthly meeting.

The franchise to operate here is not exclusive. Under the agreement of the ordinance, the company can operate here for the next 15 years, with the City getting two percent of all gross profit. The firm has 120 days to get all needed permits from the FCC, and six months after that date to begin work on the system.

Community Television Co. proposes to build a tower here which would receive five stations in black and white. Some of the channels would also offer color.

Dr. M. A. Trendwell was reappointed by the Council as city health officer. His appointment is for one year.

**Cemetery Plan Okayed**  
A long proposed cemetery program was approved unanimously by commissioners. Under the rule of the Commission all new sections of the cemetery which are opened will be modern, with monuments flush with the ground, and no curbs.

Commissioners agree the new system was needed in order to lower costs of maintaining the cemetery. They also voted to set up a new policy of selling grave spaces instead of lots. Under the new plan, an individual may buy one grave space or as many as they desire. In the past only lots were sold, four grave spaces was the minimum space sold by the city. All lots will be sold for \$25 in the future.

The City Manager reported that \$443 in delinquent taxes had been collected and \$13,000 in current taxes have been paid since Sept. 1. That means that 1958 tax payments have already reached 25 percent of all assessments.

Commissioners discussed the purchase of a new fire truck to fight rural fires, but no action was taken. The lease agreement on the police car was also debated, but no decision was reached.

All commissioners were present and Mayor Cyrus Frost presided.

# United Fund Kickoff Breakfast Is Slated

## Drive Will Begin At Seven Tuesday

A determined group of volunteers will roll their sleeves up Tuesday morning and go out to see that the 1958 Eastland United Fund drive goes over the top.

A kickoff breakfast will be

held at 7 a.m. Tuesday in the roof garden of the Conselle Hotel for volunteers. The \$6500 financial drive is under the direction of Steve Potts.

Boy Scouts will serve as alarm clocks Thursday morning, making wake-up calls so there will be no excuses about over sleeping. Clyde Young is chairman of arrangements for the breakfast and M. H. Perry will serve as master of ceremonies.

The 1958 goal include five agencies. Agencies and their quota of the budgets are:

- The Boy Scouts, \$1800.
- The Red Cross, \$1750.
- The Eastland YMCA, \$1500.
- The Salvation Army, \$900.
- The United Defense Fund (USO), \$350.

The newly organized Girl Scouts have asked to participate, but the 1958 quota was already set and the application was received too late for the Girl Scouts to be included in the drive. However, Potts said a \$200 contribution would be made from the emergency fund of the UF if the fund drive is oversubscribed this year.

An advance gifts committee headed by Billy Frost is already at work. Tom Wilson and Virgil Seaberry Jr. are members of the committee.

Team captains this year are Feri Lehredo, Everett Plowan, J. C. Poe, Norman Guess, Gordon Coldston, Eddie Gallagher, Bruno Knifus, Willard Griffin, Jimmy Young and Elmo Webster. Each team captain will name several volunteers on his team.

Potts said the United Fund is stressing the idea that the drive is not just one campaign, but five campaigns in one.

A new play has been set forth this year by Potts. It is the "bank withdrawal plan" whereby the Eastland National Bank has agreed to assume the work and expense of the withdrawal plan.

Potts explained, "It will work like this: The contributor signs a pledge card, authorizing a withdrawal from his account each month, of say, \$5. The bank takes this amount from his account each month and deposits it to the credit of the United Fund in the name of the donor."

Potts pointed out that this is a simple way to give to a fund that is a "year round working asset" for Eastland.

He also stressed that all contributions to the UF are tax deductible.

### O. C. Funderburk To Be Buried Here Monday

A former associate justice of the 11th District Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, Judge O. C. Funderburk, died at 12 p.m. Friday in a Palestine hospital following a long illness.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Hamner Funeral Home chapel with Rev. Harvey Kimbler, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating.

Judge Funderburk served as associate justice of the Appeals Court from 1928 until 1945. He was born Aug. 27, 1877 in Anderson County and moved to Eastland in 1919. He was a member of the law firm known as Funderburk, Strickland and Nickels.

Judge Funderburk graduated from the University of Texas law school in 1904 and served as assistant attorney general before being appointed to his seat on the Appeals Court by Gov. Dan Moody.

In 1946 Judge Funderburk moved to Tyler and was associated with the law firm of Brelsford and Brelsford. He retired in 1957 because of bad health and moved to Elkhart to make his home with his brother, Dr. W. O. Funderburk.

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# Best Peanut Crop Since 1950 Is Expected Here

Peanut harvesting is expected to start in full swing within the next 10 days, if the weather is fair, says T. C. Wylie, vice-president and general manager of the Ranger Peanut Co., Inc.

Wylie said, "We're open for peanuts right now." He indicated that the company would buy any peanuts in a marketable condition. Wylie is buying both for the government and for himself.

The firm expects to purchase 3,000 tons this season, and peanuts are bringing in \$204 a ton in the government loan.

Eastland County's peanut crop is the best since 1950, with an average of 20 to 25 bushels to the acre expected — according to an estimate by Wylie. Early harvested peanuts averaged 16 to 18 bushels per acre. An average yield is 15 to 18 bushels.

Acres in the county is about 31,000, compared with 22,000 acres in 1957. "This promises to be an excep-

tionally good producing year," Wylie said. From the standpoint of unrestricted acreage, the years 1948 and 1942 were also good, he indicated.

A total of 14 persons are employed at the plant at the present time, and this number is expected to increase.

Two tents will be erected for the celebration, one with a seating capacity of 1,500 for the program and the other to be known as a "publishing house," where denominational literature will be distributed.

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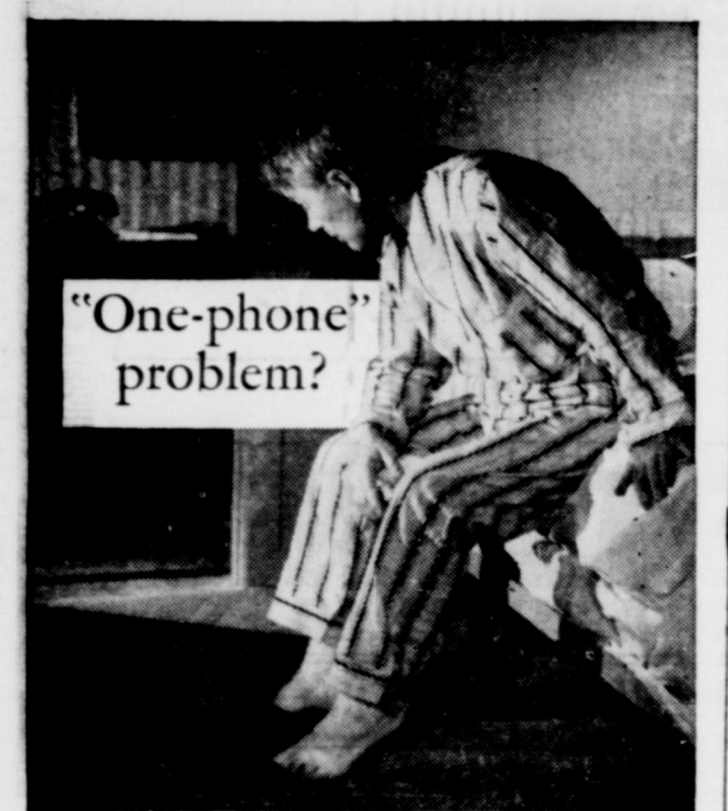
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
