J. Allen Baird came to Abilene in 1948 as assistant production manager of Baird's Bakery. He was appointed plant manager in 1950. Elected to the board of directors for the bakery in 1954, he was made vice president in 1955.

He is a member of the Texas Bakers Association and is past member of the Board of Directors for the Texas Society for Crippled Children. He was president of the Board of Directors for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center during the organization and building program of the center in Abilene. During Baird's presidency the Rehabilitation Center grew from 17 patients to more than 200 and from borrowed space in a public school to a \$250,000 building.

Baird comes to Eastland to share with the Zeta Pi's of Beta Sigma Phi their interest in a humanitarian cause, the Easter Seal Campaign next spring.

Tangy Apple Showcase



The tantalizing flavor of this shimmering fruit salad is sure to spark family appetites and add glowing color to fall menus. Crisp walnuts combined with delicious fruits in apple-flavored gelatin make a tasty salad for luncheon or Sunday supper.

Amber Fruit Salad

1 package apple-flavored gelatin
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup hot water
1/2 cup pineapple juice
1/2 cup cold water
1 tablespoon lemon juice

1/2 cup diced apple
1/2 cup banana slices
3/4 cup (9-ounce can) crushed pineapple, drained
1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Dissolve gelatin and salt in hot water. Add pineapple juice, cold water, and lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Fold in diced apple, banana slices, crushed pineapple and walnuts. Pour into 1-quart mold. Chill until firm. Unmold and garnish with water cross and apple slices.

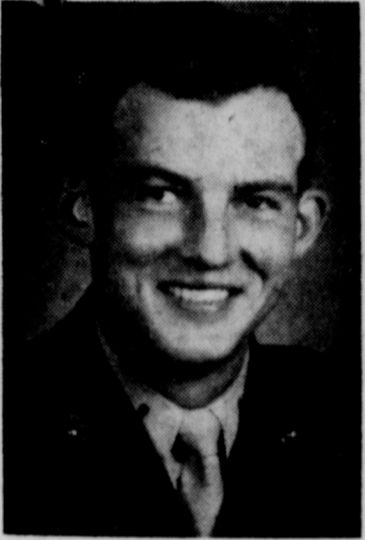

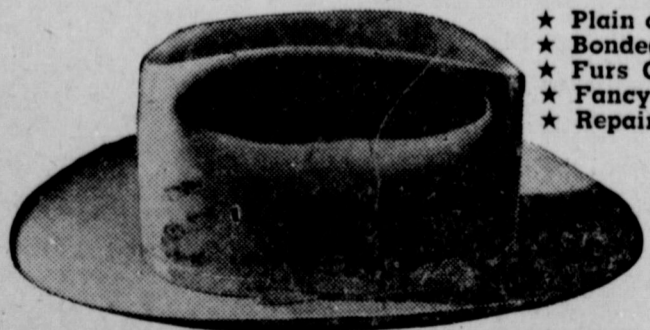

In conjunction with the sales and procurement divisions, may be set up to run only one or two of the houses, whereas others may run simultaneously in all houses.

Trained Personnel

When the Keith Company originally launched its merchandizing and dealers service programs, a group of men were thoroughly trained in dealer service work by the company, then were sent out for an initial complete check of all retail outlets in the Keith-served territory. They offered their services free of charge when a store owner or manager expressed an interest and found that store owners were willing and anxious to learn of new

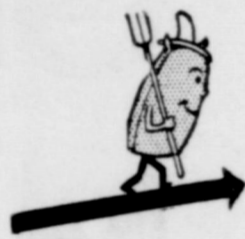
