Fishing Rodeo Set at Lake Leon Sunday

More Than 250 Enter In Events

Fishermen began descending upon Lake Leon as early as Thursday, trying out their luck before participating in the annual fishing rodeo of the Fort Worth Anglers Club to be staged at the lake tomorrow (Sunday). Over 250 individuals are expected to compete in the bass and crappie divisions. About 150 fishermen had signed up for the events, Thursday, a record entry for the contest.

Reports indicated that bass, crappie and catfish are biting, and the weather picture seems to indicate that Sunday will be a good day for catching them.

Many Eastland and Ranger residents are joining the Fort Worth Anglers Club in order to participate in the contests. They will be competing with fishermen from Fort Worth and from over the State for 24 trophies and about 40 merchandise prizes, made available through Ranger and Eastland merchants.

Trophies will go to both team members (with two fishermen composing one team) in places one through three in both divisions, and the prizes will be awarded to winners in places four through eight.

Dave Hawk of Austin, defending state bass tournament champion, has accepted an invitation to compete in the rodeo.

Trophies will be awarded to the heaviest bass and heaviest string of bass catches and to the heaviest crappie and heaviest string of crappie. The awards are on display at Chamber of Commerce offices in Ranger and Eastland, at the Eastland National Bank, the Commercial State Bank in Ranger, and at sporting good houses in Fort Worth.

Fishing will get underway at day break Sunday and continue up to 3 p.m. A weighing-in station will be set up in a tent by the dam.

Black bass and crappie may be caught by any legal means. Fish must be fresh caught and weighed live weight.

An angler team will be eligible for only one set of trophies or prizes in each division.

Boats for newsmen and TV camera crews will be made available by Fleet Form Boat Co. through the L & J Supply Co. of Ranger. Newspaper men and photographers from the area are expected to be present.

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Conrad Miller Among Aggies to Make Field Trip

Conrad Miller of Eastland will be among the 33 Texas A&M College students who will make a three-day field excursion to study practices in South and Southwest Texas beginning May 4.

Plans for the trip were released today by Don Huss, assistant professor in the Department of Ranger and Forestry Management.

The theme for the field trip will be "Range Management Practices for the Praecliff Ranch." Ranches which are carrying out range management practices on a practical basis will be visited. Emphasis will be placed on the economy of these practices and their influence on livestock production and soil and water conservation.

Examples of practices to be studied are: brush control by chemical and mechanical methods, root plowing and reseeded, rotation grazing, deferred grazing, range reseeding and proper stocking. The trip will include studies of specific ranching problems in three major grazing areas: the Hill Country, Rio Grande Plains and Gulf Coastal Prairie.

Arrangements have been made by Alan H. Anderson of the Soil Conservation Service at San Marcos to visit the Pfleger and Ray Ranches of Hays County on May 4. The group will be guest of Holt Machinery Co. of San Antonio on the night of May 4. A program has been planned which will include a Bar-B-Que dinner. May 5 the group will tour the

Rising Star and Gorman fought it out for the District 32-B track championship Thursday afternoon in Gorman, and Rising Star came out on top with 67½ points to Gorman's 49.

Desdemona finished third with 18½ points, Carbon was fourth with nine points and Olden fifth with three points.

District records were set in the pole vault, shot put, broad jump, 440-yard dash, 220-yard dash, 440-yard relay, 880 yard run and mile relay.

Eastland Students to Attend H-SU Annul High School Day April 25

Eastland students will be among hundreds of high school students from all parts of Texas, New Mexico, Louisiana and Oklahoma who will visit the Hardin-Simmons University campus Saturday, April 25, for the annual High School Day.

Transportation to Abilene will be provided by the First Baptist Church of Eastland to those students who do not have their own way of going to Abilene for the event.

Activities at H-SU will be jam-packed during the day. Already in fullswing will be "Rodeo Days" on the H-SU campus set for April 23-24-25. H-SU students will don western regalia for the special observance with male students engaging in rivalry with beard-growing contests. The National Intercollegiate Rodeo is set for performances each evening with an afternoon performance Saturday.

Also on Saturday's agenda will be a track meet with the H-SU cinder men meeting teams from five other colleges at the McMurry College track, and spring football scrimmage at 12 noon in Parra-more Stadium on the H-SU campus.

The High School day program will begin with registration at Rose Field House at 8:30 a.m. Campus tours and visits to classrooms and dormitories are scheduled during the morning.

A variety program featuring Sam Baugh, head football coach, is set at Rose Field House 10:15 a.m. Visiting students will be guests of the University at a barbecue in the University Dining Hall at noon.

All departments in the University will hold open house from 12:30 to 2 p.m. with special displays and guided tours planned.

Turner Takes First In Lows For Mavs

Billy Don Turner was Eastland's only bright spot in the District 7-AA track meet held Thursday in Abilene. Turner was clocked at 21.1 in the 180 low hurdle event to take a first place for the Mavericks.

Eastland took fifth place in the tourney with 10 points. Coleman won the meet with 42 1/3 points with Ballinger taking second place with 42.3 points. Cisco, the pre-meet favorite, paced third with 36 2/3 points, and Winters was fourth with 19 points. Ranger did not enter the meet.

Turner also grabbed third place in the 120-yard high hurdles. Dalton Hoffmann of Ballinger set a

new record of 15.3 in the event. Mike Manning was third in the 440-yard dash and the Maverick mile relay team finished fourth. Members of the relay team were Turner, Hamning, Rodger Taylor and Jimmy McElweath.

Bill Miller of Winters was the most impressive lad of the day. Miller jumped 23 feet to win the broad jump, setting a new district record by more than two feet, and registering the second best jump of the year in Texas schoolboy field events.

In all eight records were broken. Other new records included Burl Farmer's 11-8 pole vault for Coleman, Ballinger's 440-yard relay time of 45.3, Pat DeBusk's 51.2 time for Coleman in the 440-yard dash, Calvin Kirk's discus throw of 120-10 1/2 feet for Ballinger, John Adams shot put of 49-6 1/2 feet for Cisco, and a three-way tie in the high jump event by Billy Hammer and Adams of Cisco and Jerry Harris of Cisco. The jump was 5-11 feet.

Rain Aids Area

The best rains of the year fell this week in Eastland County, greatly brightening the agricultural outlook.

Rain in the early hours of the morning Friday and again early Saturday morning totaled an inch in most county areas. In Eastland the official measurement was .81 of an inch Friday and .35 of an inch Saturday, bringing the two day total to 1.16.

The Cisco area reported the heaviest rainfall. As much as 1.80 inches was reported in that part of the county. The south part of the county received approximately one inch as did Olden and Ranger.

The rainfall brought the total amount of moisture for the month to 1.48 inches. Only 2.69 inches have fallen so far this year. The weatherman says more showers can be expected in the next few hours.


