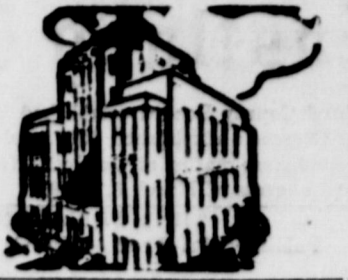

We were looking through some old newspapers files the other day and came across some old funny papers. And did you know what? Back in about 1930 funny papers were actually funny.

Today's comics, for the most part, are about as funny as the soap operas on radio and TV. Everywhere we look we find someone in even worse shape than we are. For months we have sweated out Kerry Drake, knowing each day would be his last on earth (or paper), and when Dick Tracy was in that hole starving to death we woke up nights with hunger pangs.

Tax-Man Sam Sez Internal Revenue Service

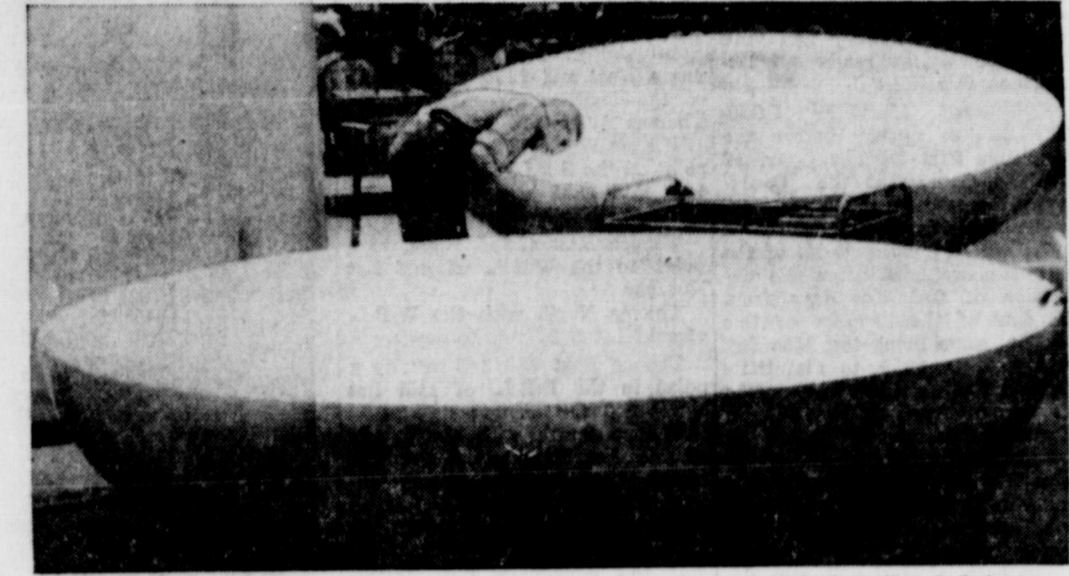

Cancer Crusade Is Not Just Fund Drive

The American Cancer Society Crusade is not just a drive for funds, Mrs. R. L. Carpenter, Eastland Chairman, said today.

"To knock out cancer we will need a 'one-two' punch," she said. "The number one goal of the Crusade," she explained, "is to save one out of two of those who develop cancer. That is the number who could be saved by broad application of present knowledge and skills instead of one out of three we are now saving."

"The second target of the Crusade is for funds urgently needed to step up the Society's nationwide research program which offers a promise of solving the cancer problem. That promise has never been as great as it is today. Until that final goal is reached we must apply every bit of knowledge and skill to saving lives today."

"Many life-saving leaflets will be given away in our house-to-house canvass here," Mrs. Carpenter said. "They will also be available at American Cancer Society information booths. The leaflets are designed to save lives that might otherwise be lost to America's number two disease killer by alerting those who receive them to the dangers of neglect and delay."

She explained that while more lives are being saved every year due to improved methods of treatment, needless deaths still occur because the disease is not diagnosed in time. Regular health check-ups are the best safeguard, she pointed out, to protect the family, and the home.

Mrs. Carpenter was confident that the crusade will be successful.

Eastland Has Numerous Libraries, Survey Shows

By VIRGIL MOORE When you think about National Library Week, which begins Sunday, your thoughts usually go to the public library.

Eastland is fortunate indeed to have an outstanding public library, but that one institution is just one of many libraries to be found here.

There is a number of other highly valued libraries in Eastland. All five schools have excellent highly valued libraries in Eastland. All five schools have excellent numerous law libraries, medical libraries and many other private libraries as well.

For instance, the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals has a library here which has been valued as high as \$100,000. The Court receives an appropriation of \$2000 annually to purchase new law books, and Homer Smith, clerk, says the valuation placed on books purchased by the State is now estimated at \$25,000. In addition when the court was first brought here, the local Bar Association presented a law library to the Court which was valued at \$50,000.

In addition to the Appeals Court library, one local attorney says there are enough law books

in Eastland to fill up a 15 room building.

Complete medical libraries are also owned by Eastland's physicians. The various churches have excellent libraries, and the many ministers have libraries of their own. A braille library is owned by the First Baptist Church.

Other persons, too numerous to list, have their own private libraries.

The Eastland Public Library, a Thursday Afternoon Club project, has more than 10,000 volumes. Eastland High School has 3,000 volumes, valued at \$10,000 dollars.

South Ward and West Ward each have more than 1,000 books and each school also has film strip libraries valued at \$500 each, tape recorders and 15 mm projectors.

Junior High School has 350 volumes, including many classics, 25 Medal books, 65 biographies, the complete American Adventure series and the American Heritage Series.

There are 300 volumes in use at Douglas School.

So while the theme of this year's Library Week is "Wake Up and Read," you can see that Eastland is fairly wide awake already.

During this week, however, a special emphasis on the importance of reading is being stressed. Displays are planned at all schools and in downtown buildings.

Mrs. Cecil Collings is chairman of the Library Week Committee, which is named each year by the Thursday Afternoon Study Club.

An important event also took place this week for the Juniors as they placed the order for their senior rings, which will be presented to them next September.

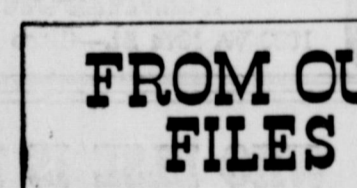

DISCOVERER 1—Shown, above, is the business end of Discoverer I, first of Uncle Sam's satellites to be launched in a north-south orbit from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif. The entire unit, rather than an instrument payload alone, was designed to orbit the earth. It was backed up in launching by a modified version of the Thor intermediate-range ballistic missile. Intermittent radio reports from Discoverer I gave the Air Force this tentative information on its position in space: Orbit: once around the earth every 96 minutes. Closest approach to earth: about 150 miles. Farthest distance from earth: about 550 miles. Estimated life in space: about one month.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

This columnist requested Congressman Ralph J. Rivers of Alaska for an Alaskan anecdote and the following was kindly sent:

One day in 1932 when I was a young lawyer practicing in Fairbanks, Alaska, a mine worker from the creeks walked into my office and asked me to represent him as he was going to be sued. I soon found out that the two adversaries had purchased tickets for marking their guesses on the day, hour and minute of the breakup of the ice in the Tanana River at Nenana. Each ticket had cost one dollar. About 56,000 tickets had been sold, and the winner or winners were to get about \$54,000.

The breakup was late and all the early guesses were no longer any good. On the night of the 13th of May a group of the boys were sitting around in the mining company bunkhouse at Chatanika, and in talking about the pending breakup, Olson, by client, stated that he had a ticket for the 14th and Johnson divulged that he had one for the 15th.

Johnson said to Olson, "I'll pool my chances with you." Olson said, "O.K." (Meaning that if either of their respective tickets won, they would split the proceeds 50-50.)

The next day the ice went out on the day, hour, and minute shown on the ticket held by Olson, which was one of three winning tickets and represented a windfall of \$18,000.

When Olson came off the job that evening, Johnson met him, shook his hand, and said, "Hoorry,

which it followed in certain court decisions in such cases that the persons who have pooled their chances were not in pari delicto and that the courts would entertain actions to enforce an agreement for the division of a contingent fund upon the occurrence of the contingency.

After admitting to a meeting of minds as to the law of the case, it was decided not to start any litigation lest such action "kill the ice pool" which was a time honored classic in the realms of northern sporting events. Johnson agreed to settle for \$6,000, being convinced that his action had taught Olson a lesson, and Olson gladly agreed to take the remaining \$12,000.

Thus the two contending parties emerged in good standing in the eyes of the law as they were not in pari delicto, and the tickets produced four winners—the two contending parties and the two lawyers.
