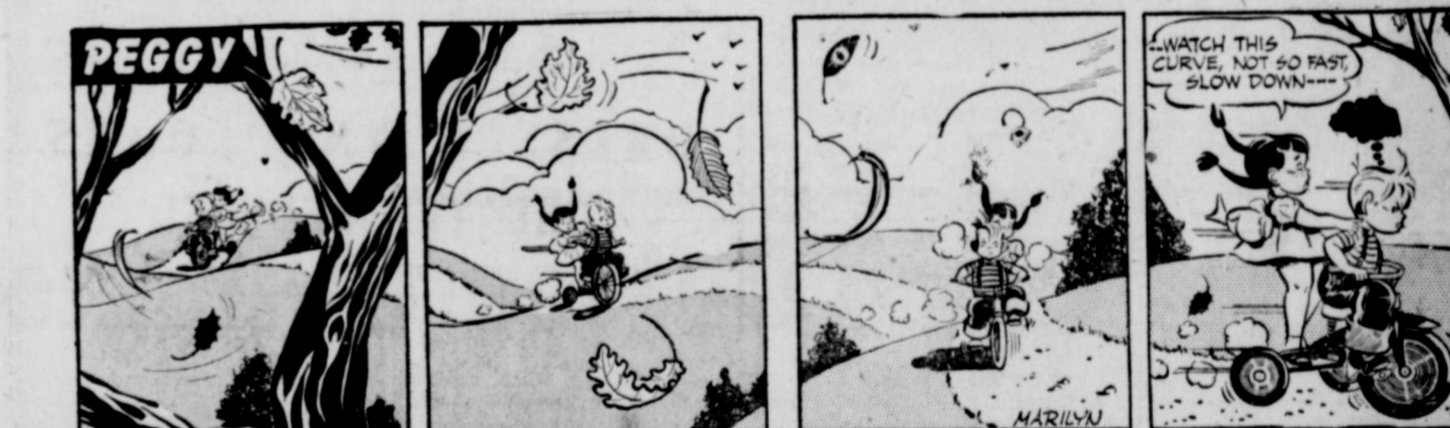

### Planning, Management and Rain Answer To Adequate Winter Pasture

Rain alone will not provide the grass needed for winter grazing. A. H. Walker, extension range specialist at College Station, says planning and management of the range may be the most important as the supply of moisture

in determining how much grass will be available for livestock feed during the winter period.

Walker points out that many areas of the state received heavy rains only a short time ago but because the soil was bare much of it was lost to run-off. Planning and management would have helped the situation.

Now that winter is at hand, the specialist says livestock producers should save all of the feed they possibly can. Hay, alfalfa, or other feed must be purchased, but it now, he says. Plant annual grazing crops and here he points out that producers who dusted in small grains and legumes are far ahead of those who waited for rain.

He says pastures which have been deferred should not be grazed until after frost because livestock will graze off the seed heads before they have a chance to fall to the ground. He suggests that a protein supplement of one to two pounds for cattle and an eighth to a quarter pound for swine be fed each day where the livestock is running on dry grass.

Finally, the specialist points out, droughts are not new to Texas and urges livestock producers to plan their operations and manage them to take care of the drought years.

### List Prices On New Pontiacs Are Announced

List prices on the new 1955 Pontiacs were announced today by Jack Muirhead, owner of Muirhead Motors.

The list prices were lowered on two Catalina models and raised moderately on other models.

On the two Catalina models, available in the Star Chief and 870 series, which are expected to represent 40 per cent of total production, list prices were reduced \$51. Prices on the completely redesigned station wagon were increased \$24. All other models which also feature the 180 horsepower Strato-Streak V-8 engine and panoramic styling were increased \$59.

In addition, Muirhead announced that Pontiac's power steering, which was reduced in price by \$40 last year, will be cut an additional \$25 on 1955 models for a new low price of \$100. All other accessories remain approximately the same.

All prices announced today by Pontiac include the new General Motors freight and price adjustments which were announced Tuesday. For Pontiac the maximum charge for freight in areas 1200 miles or more from Pontiac will average \$162, a substantial reduction in some areas over previous freight charges. This, of course, will result in additional savings to many customers in those distant areas.

"The 1955 new features built into the 1955 models represent Pontiac's long established policy of building greater dollar value into every new car while maintaining prices well within the reach of the American buying public," Muirhead said.

### Inspection Rush Expected After First of Year

Texas, individualists that they are, have already started a potential waiting line at the State's automobile inspection stations.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that the waiting line was shaping up now to precede the inspection deadline next April 15th.

The Public Safety Director based his conclusion on the fact that auto inspections at mid-October were running more than 100,000 behind the figure for the first month of the 1953 inspection period. He said that undue waiting to secure a check of their vehicles may be averted by motorists if they will visit one of the 4,000 inspection stations at an early date.

"None of the 4,000 stations are too rushed to give you prompt attention at this time," Garrison stated, "but if the figures for the first month's operation under the

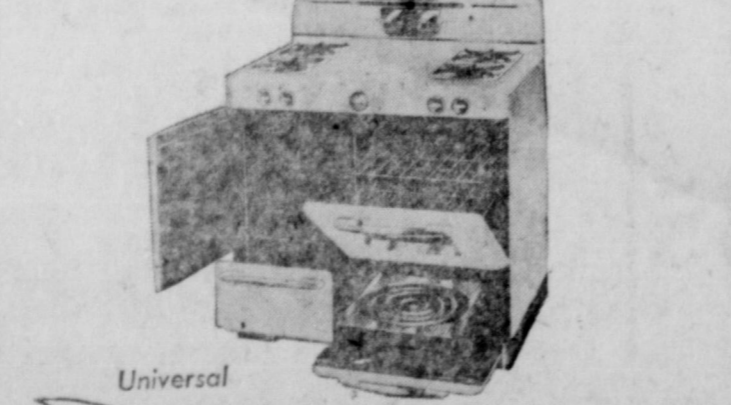

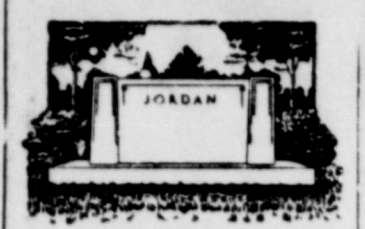

**'New Sign of Life' To Appear On Highway With Inception of Radar**

A new "sign of life" will appear on many of the highways of Texas this month. It's a new highway traffic sign and, like most of the others which are familiar roadside markers to motorists, it is designed to prevent costly motor vehicle accidents and save human lives.

These new signs will read "Speed Limits Radar Enforced" and the Texas Highway Department has slated their early construction in order that they will be in place by mid-November when the Texas Department of Public Safety is expected to begin the operation of Radar equipped patrol cars on the principal traffic arteries throughout the State.

Texas will thus join 31 other states and 50 cities which are currently employing Radar as a device for lowering the traffic accident rate due to excessive speed.

During the past several months the Texas Department of Public Safety has conducted an educational demonstration program of the Radar units in each of the 16 Texas Highway Patrol Districts within the State. Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the DPS, says that these demonstrations have been staged for the benefit of members of the press, radio and TV as well as for public officials, including judges and prosecutors, in order to acquaint them with the operation and the accuracy of the devices.

"We know of no instance," said Garrison, "in which those who have witnessed these demonstrations have failed to acknowledge the accuracy and the fairness of this method of coping with fast drivers."

The Public Safety Director also pointed out that speed continues to be the principal contributing factor in the State's fatal traffic accident picture. He emphasized that Radar is no "cure-all" for the traffic problem and, in no way, replaces manpower in the enforcement of the speed laws.

"Rather," Garrison added, "we consider it only as another tool to be utilized in protecting the public against the consequences of the acts of the thoughtless, the careless and the indifferent drivers who constitute a menace to the public safety by driving too fast for conditions."

According to Garrison the "Speed Limits Radar Enforced" signs will be erected immediately outside the city limits of towns on the approach to stretches of highway where the mobil Radar units will be employed and just inside the state lines on those roadways where they will be in use. Additional signs will be placed, also, between the cities where it is deemed necessary to inform the public of the enforcement procedure being employed.

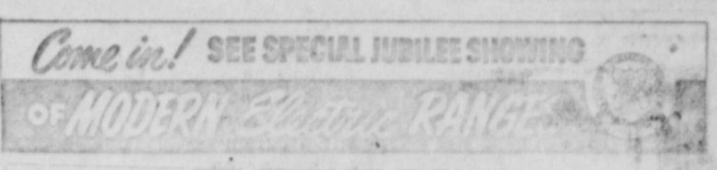

## RJC Enrollment Expected To Be 600 In 1956

Dr. Price Ashton, president of Ranger Junior College, indicated today in a reply to a State Legislative Budget Board telegram that college enrollment in the Ranger school would exceed 600 students by November, 1956. The estimate, made on the amount of growth of the college in the past few years, will be used by the Budget Board to write the year's appropriation bill. Dr. Ashton also said that there were 400 full time students enrolled at the first of this month, in determining eligibility for state apportionment at that time. He added that enrollment should increase to 540 within one year from now. If the estimated increase in enrollment materializes, state apportionment to the college would increase slightly more than \$25,000 next year and nearly repeat itself the next year. The state's apportionment table is scaled according to the number of students enrolled. The state pays \$230 for each student up to 250. All over 250 draw \$189 each. This year, Ranger Junior College had its depository increased by \$40,000. Next year it will be increased to approximately \$71,000 yearly and up according to registration figures. The apportionments do not affect the college's building program as revenue for construction is derived from a different source, however it is utilized for teacher's salaries and supplies. The college regulates the salaries of the various instructors. Dr. Ashton stated that the year before he was appointed president of the institution that the college received \$25,000 from the state on the basis of 146 enrollments. 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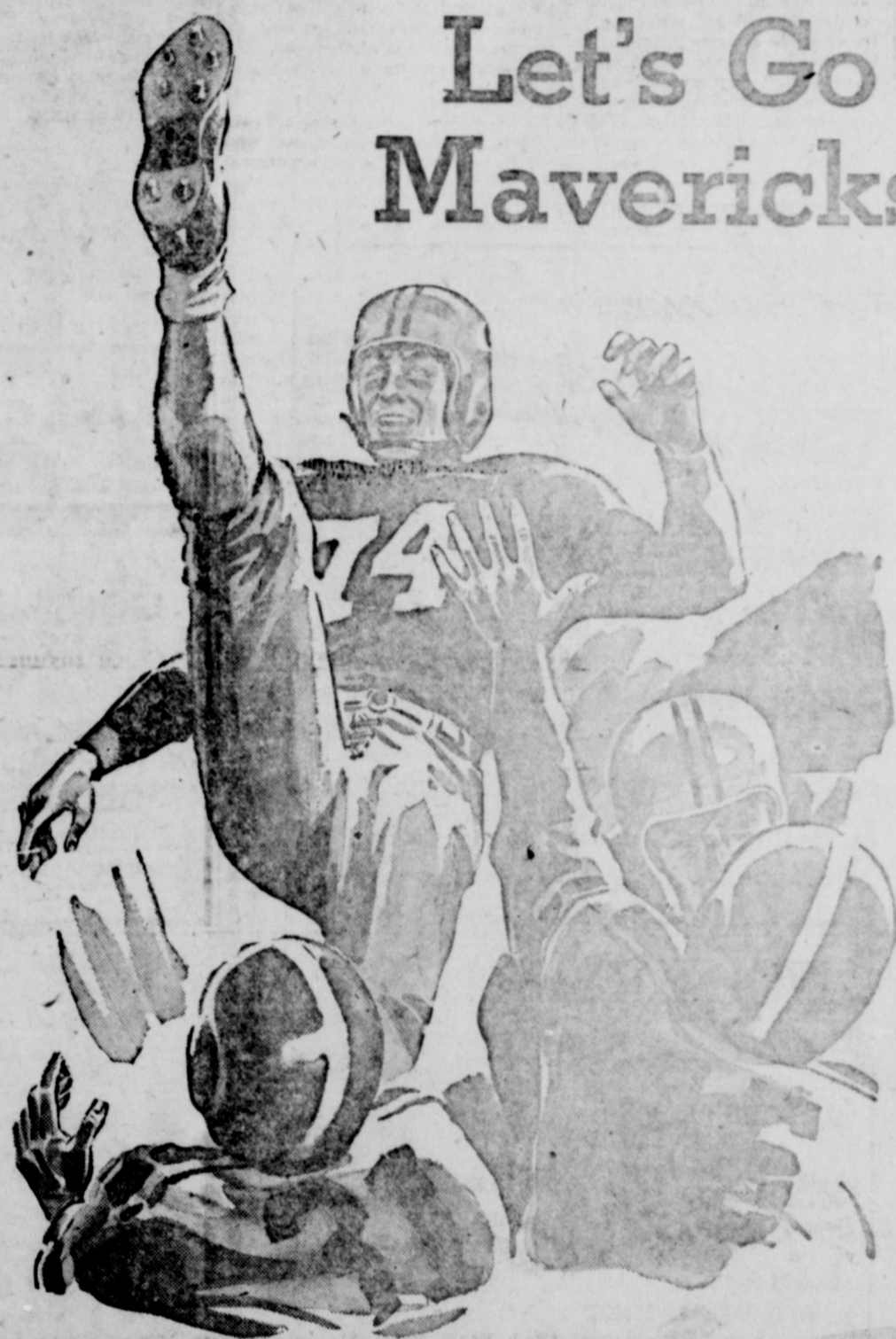

### PAA To Fly Jet Stream An Extra Month

For the third successive season, "Strato" Clippers of Pan American World Airways will begin scheduled non-stop flights between Japan and Hawaii in the Pacific jet stream on November 1, Willis G. Lipscomb, Vice President Traffic and Sales, announced today.

Because of advanced knowledge of weather forecasting and operational techniques acquired during the last two winters, Pan American reported that it will be able to lengthen the jet stream operations by a full month this season. In the past, the jet stream schedules have lasted through March, but during the 1954-55 season the 5800-mile non-stop flights — longest in commercial aviation — will continue throughout April.

Another important factor will be the introduction of a new type of General Electric turbo supercharger on the engines of the big

Foing "Strato" Clippers. The new equipment, currently being installed on Pan America's Pacific-Alaska Division fleet of 17 of the double-decked aircraft, will permit the Clippers to "get up-stairs" in a much shorter time — up to the altitudes where the "built-in tail winds" of the jet stream reach higher velocities.

1954 se seasons have called for an 11½ hour flight between Tokyo and Honolulu, cutting about seven hours from transpacific flight times, but during January and February much faster trips are made.

In fact, last February 9, the Clipper Queen of the Pacific made the trip in 9 hours 18 minutes, achieving an average ground speed of more than 425 miles per hour. During this flight, made at around 25,000 feet, Captain John H. Kelly reported tail winds which averaged 133 miles per hour and for one hour reached a velocity of 175 miles per hour.

Fan American, the only airline in the world to maintain regularly scheduled flights in the jet stream, was awarded the 1954 Frye Airline Performance Trophy for this operation.
