



## Pair Charged With McMoy Store Burglary

### Man and Woman are Free On \$5000 Bond

A 34-year-old man and a 19-year-old woman have been charged with night time burglary of McMoy's Clover Farm Store in Eastland.

Charges were filed this past week against James E. Warden and Murel Charlene Brigman. Both listed their hometown as Denison.

The pair was charged with the \$3000 safe cracking job, but both are now free on bond of \$5000 each.

Sheriff J. B. Williams and Eastland Police Chief Ray Laney said the woman cased the McMoy job and acted as watchout for Warden. Mrs. Brigman was freed by her bondsmen after spending just over an hour in the county jail. Warden was arrested earlier in the week and was released at the same time Mrs. Brigman gained her freedom. County Attorney Earl Conner Jr. will seek indictments against the pair at the next meeting of the Grand Jury.

Burglars entered the Clover Farm store in Eastland the night of March 27. They broke into two safes, taking an estimated \$3000 in currency. Included in the loot were a number of valuable old coins.

Eastland Policeman Neil Seabourne was credited with starting the investigation which resulted in the pair's arrest. Seabourne spotted a 1959 Oldsmobile in Eastland which matched the description of a car witnesses had seen at McMoy's the day of the burglary.

He ran a check on the car to determine ownership, but by the time he received radio notification the driver of the car had left Eastland, traveling east. He sent out a radio alert and the car was later spotted by Weatherford police parked near a bottling plant, which burglars had attempted to enter.

The occupants of the car fled, but Weatherford police later arrested Warden. Seabourne and Chief Deputy Sheriff Johnny Boyd went to Weatherford and inspected the car and found a bag full of tools under the hood of the vehicle. Pliers, saws, a sledge hammer and a wide variety of other tools were discovered.

The car was left in Weatherford at a garage. Later Mrs. Brigman claimed the car and was arrested. Sheriff Williams returned it to a woman from Weatherford, and had barely reached Eastland with the suspect before bondsmen appeared to demand her freedom.

The MacMoy safe job was the latest in a series of burglaries in Eastland County towns. Three other safe breakings are under investigation by the Sheriff's Department. Ratliff Feed Store in Ranger, McGlasson's IGA Store in Cisco, and the Maestic Theatre in Eastland have all had safe burglaries.

Sheriff Williams said all of the other jobs followed the "same pattern" as the MacMoy burglary. The pair are charged only with the MacMoy burglary, however.

### Voting Light In Two Local Elections Today

Voting got off to a light start here this morning in two local elections.

Apathy was notable among voters in both the City election and the Water Board election. At City Hall only a handful of voters had registered their votes by noon today. Three city commissioners are unopposed in their bids for reelection. They are Virgil Seaberry Jr., Jack Germany, and Bob Perkins.

Also unopposed are the two Water Board candidates. They are M. H. Perry and Grace Pipkin. Voting is taking place at the courthouse.

Polls will close at 7 p.m.

Two Eastland County accidents resulted in injuries to five persons Sunday.

Three persons were injured when a 1956 Mercury station wagon overturned 7 1/2 miles west of Rising Star on Highway 6 at 2 p.m. Driver of the car was Mrs. Opal Rutherford Matthews, Route 1, Anton. She said a tire blew out and she lost control. Her son, Tommy Edsel Matthews, 11, and her mother, Mrs. Lennie Rutherford, and Mrs. Matthews were all treated for cuts and bruises at the Rising Star Hospital.

The second accident occurred at 10:45 p.m. Sunday on State Highway 16, three miles south of Strawn and about 300 feet from Highway 80. A 1953 Pontiac driven by Harold Lee Cox of Abilene failed to make a curve and Cox was held overnight in Ranger General Hospital for treatment. Wanda Larel Shannon, of Stamford, a passenger, suffered bruises.

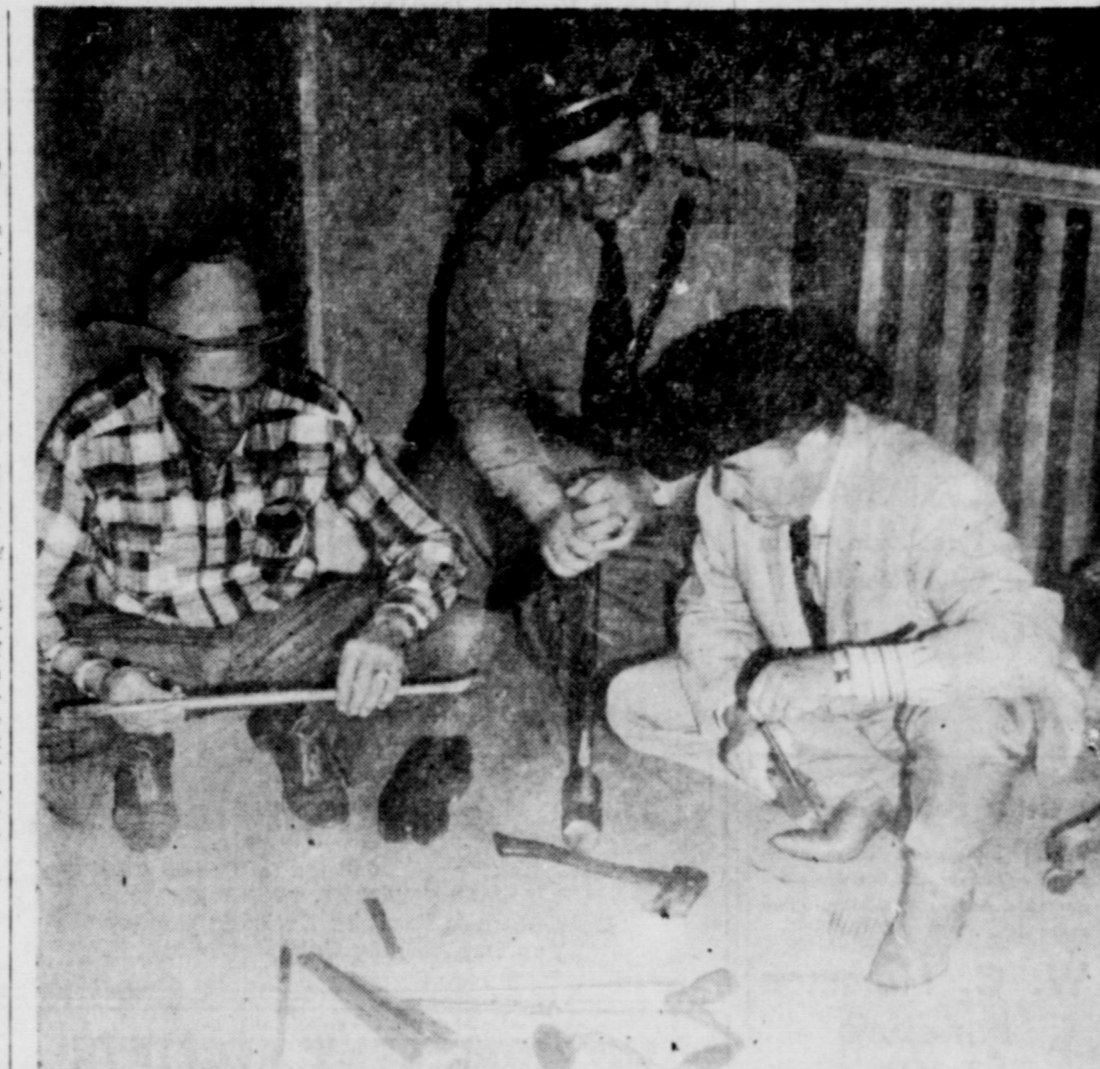
Some years ago, the load limit for trucks in our state was 7,000 pounds. That was then thought to be ample for the needs of both the public and the trucking industry.

## Eastland Hospital Board Announces Policy Changes

Members of the Eastland Memorial Hospital Board of Directors today announced an alteration of hospital policy regarding visiting and accounts.

Following is a prepared statement issued by directors:

Eastland Memorial Hospital, built through the joint efforts of many citizens of Eastland, opened its doors June 1, 1952, to serve the people of Eastland and surrounding areas. Not being entitled to financial assistance from the County or State, it has been necessary to manage the Hospital in a manner similar to the management of a private business. No business without tax support can keep its doors open for an extended length of time without making expenses of operation.

If your Hospital profits,

which to date it has not, such profits are kept in the business to replace equipment as it wears out, to hire additional help when needed, to maintain the present building and equipment and to provide for additional services for the patient. No private individual profits by the running of your Hospital.

Why has your Hospital not broken even? Because a large percentage of patients are not paying their accounts at the hospital. More than \$45,000 in delinquent accounts appears on the books, an average of more than \$6,000 a year since the Hospital opened. How could any business operate for long losing \$6,000 a year?

This situation has arisen for a number of reasons. Many patients have been admitted to the Hospital who could not afford to pay for the services rendered. These persons should have gone to another hospital in the county which is supported by tax money through the County and maintained for persons who cannot afford to pay for their hospitalization. Other persons who can afford to pay their accounts have not done so.

No person delinquent in his account with the Hospital shall be admitted as a patient until satisfactory arrangements have been made to pay such delinquent accounts.

To remedy this situation and put your Hospital in a position where it can continue to stay open, the Board of Trustees has inaugurated a program of effective collection of past due accounts. In addition, it has adopted the

Dear Editor,

There seems to be considerable confusion in the minds of many Texans and even some political leaders in Austin as to what is the "gas industry."

We see much official concern about the plight that Texas producers suffer for lack of markets for oil in stiff world-wide competition. We know that the petroleum industry generally has suffered a 25 percent drop in earnings this past year. This has been reflected in a drop of 10,000 in the industry's Texas employment figures and some \$19 million state petroleum production taxes.

Yet, curiously enough, we note several tax bills before the Leg-

islature which add to the industry's woes. One of those is advocated as a tax on big gas companies and out-of-state consumers, but actually it hits the same Texas producer who has suffered other economic reverses. This is because most oil producers are also gas producers and in most cases are the same taxpayers. Most gas is found in the search for oil and about a third of it comes out of the same well as the oil.

To accept these "tax gas" proposals (gas producers already pay \$42 million a year in taxes

There will be a variety of ready-to-cook sea foods; also heat and serve types that take only a few minutes to prepare.

Citrus fruits and apples are still leading the fruit parade. Limited supplies of fresh strawberries are arriving now in many stores.

At the fresh vegetable counter, potatoes, celery, carrots, cabbage and turnips are economical choices. Increased supplies of asparagus are expected and prices should drop somewhat. Fresh tomatoes are retailing at lower prices than at this time last year. The supply comes mostly from Mexico and quality is food for the season. Leave tomatoes at room temperature until fully ripe, then serve.

**Choosing a Steak for Broiling**  
A tender broiled steak makes any meal or picnic a real occasion. Extension foods and nutrition specialists have some suggestions for selecting a steak for broiling over a charcoal fire.

First, look for a well-marbled steak. By marbling we mean a steak when fat is interspersed within the lean. A well-marbled steak will usually be tender and juicy when broiled if it came from a young beef animal.

The food shopper has no way of judging this last point but Federal meat graders do—and the shopper can take advantage of their knowledge by using U. S. grades as a guide in selecting a picnic steak.

USDA Prime and Choice grades provide steaks which are best for broiling. You can easily tell if beef is Federally graded. On the fat covering you will find one or more purple shield shaped stamps enclosing the grade name and the letters USDA. This shield grade mark is registered in the U.S. Patent Office for your protection.

In addition to knowing the grades of beef that are good for broiling, it is important to know what cuts are appropriate. Porterhouse, T-bone, sirloin, and club steaks are the best. However, a rib steak compared favorably with these in tenderness and flavor, and usually does cost less per pound.

For a delightfully, well-rounded meal—one with good taste as well as flavor—select your broiling steak with a careful eye, and get that one that best suits the needs of the occasion.

## Hospital-

(Continued from Page One)

(1) Persons other than those described in Sub-paragraph (1) above, though producing an insurance policy providing for hospitalization coverage deemed adequate as in said Sub-paragraph (1), shall not be admitted as a patient prior to his depositing with the hospital the sum of not less than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00).  
 (2) Any person seeking admission as a patient who does not or cannot produce such insurance policy, shall not be admitted as a patient prior to his depositing with the hospital the sum of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100).  
 (3) No deposit shall be required prior to admission of emergency patients, nor until such patients ceases to be an emergency case. As soon as such emergency ceases to exist, or sooner, should the admitting employee of the hospital determine that there are one or more persons in attendance upon said patient or in the immediate area, who are legally responsible for the care of such patient then a deposit in an amount determine as in Paragraphs A. (1), A. (2) or A. (3) above shall be required. Failure to make the required deposit by the time such emergency has ceased to exist shall make such patient eligible for dismissal from the hospital.  
 (4) Payment for hospitalization and services rendered:  
 (1) Assignment of insurance benefits. Upon admission to the hospital, a patient or some one legally responsible for the care of such patient, shall execute an instrument assigning to the hospital all benefits accruing to such person under the terms of any hospitalization insurance policy in which such person is named as an insured, either individually or as a member of a group of insured, such assignment to cover all such benefits accruing under such insurance policy as the result of the accident, illness or disability requiring hospitalization.  
 (2) Inadequacy of insurance coverage. When, in the opinion of the superintendent of the hospital, an insured patient is no longer covered by insurance or such insurance is no longer adequate to pay for the hospitalization of the patient, such patient shall be tendered a statement of the amount due the hospital in excess of such insurance coverage, for the seven day period following the date such insurance became inadequate. Failure of the patient or others legally responsible to make arrangements satisfactory to the superintendent for the payment of such amount within 24 hours after receiving such statement, shall make such patient eligible for dismissal from the hospital.  
 (3) Weekly payments required. Statements of the amounts due the hospital shall be rendered weekly to the patient or to those legally responsible. Failure of the patient or others to make satisfactory arrangements for payment thereof within 24 hours after receiving such statement, shall make such patient eligible for dismissal from the hospital.  
 (4) Return of unused deposit. Upon dismissal from the hospital the patient shall be refunded the unused portion of any deposit made by him or on his behalf upon his admission to the hospital.

D. Admissions of persons indebted to hospital:  
 No person shall be admitted to the hospital as a patient who is indebted to the hospital for past services rendered, said debt being more than Thirty (30) days past due. A person shall be considered as indebted to the hospital if such services were rendered to him or his family. "Family" shall include husband, wife, unmarried minor children, dependent parents and any person from whom either of said husband or wife inherited property of sufficient in amount to cover the debt owed the hospital.

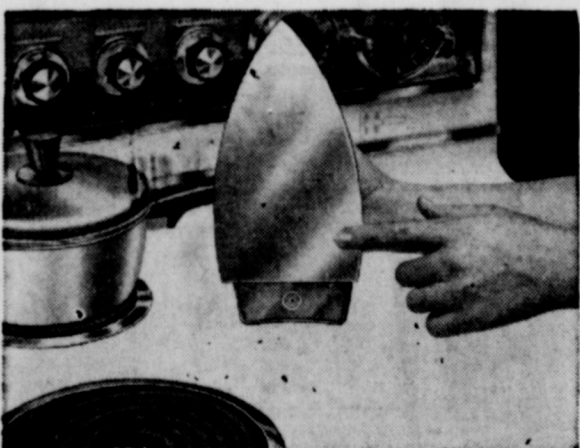

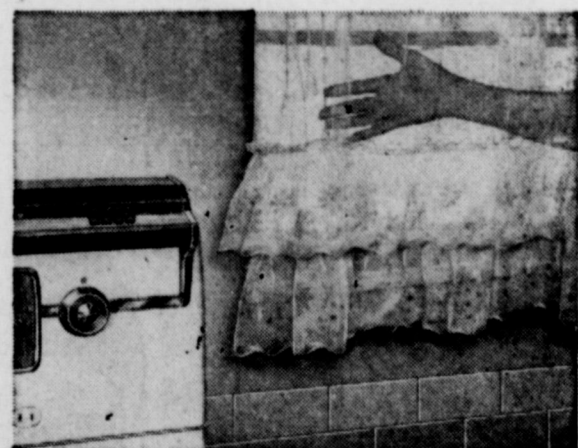

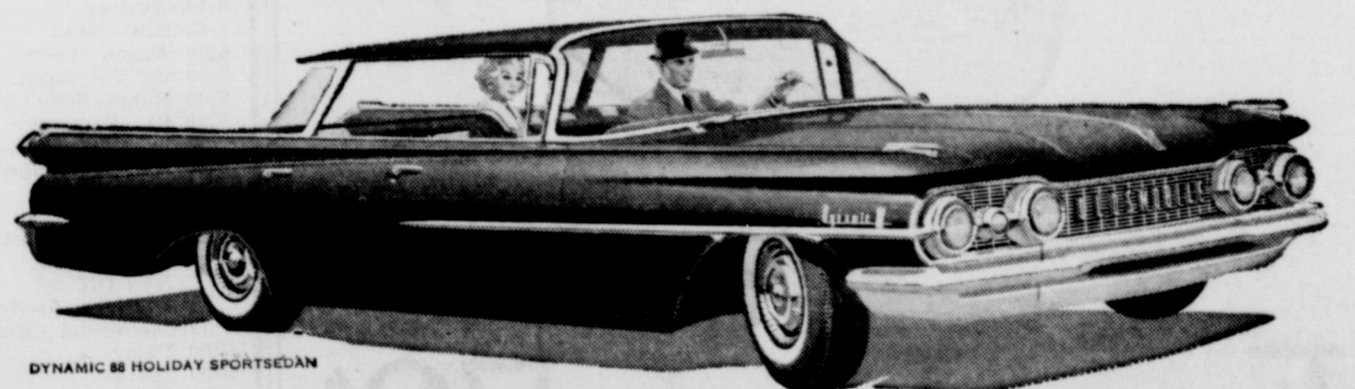

ned gasoline which had to be emptied by hand. Of course this took more labor than it takes now to replenish the gasoline stock of a filling station. And as Mr. Jones had a flock of good strong boys each of the young lads had to at some time or other in their budding business careers get good wholesome work-outs juggling gasoline cans loaded to their fill. Robert Steel, Francis and Prentice all three got considerable experience on the business end of a gasoline can.

That's where the boys built up their fine muscles. That's the way they stayed in condition and Francis was in such fine physical condition that at about 120 pounds he played in some of the roughest and toughest football ever played in this part of Texas. He played on the high-school team when the age limit of high-school athletes was a little higher than it is now and the boys were a little bigger in proportion to their age, except Francis. He still weighed his approximately 120 pounds when he graduated from high-

school. Ned found out that he would rather work on trucks than deliver gasoline from them and quite early in life he made one of the best mechanics to pick up a pair of pliers since Henry Ford started the assembly line.

Ned found a home when he got hold of a good piece of truck machinery. And he knew truck engines and transmissions like most of us know the back of our hands.

Ned didn't pay too much attention to brand names. When he went to work on a truck he'd put it in running order even if he had to use parts originally intended for two or three other makes.

Ned used to have a Reo that he sort of used for a personal car. I guess that's because it had a prettier cab than some of his other trucks. But he went everywhere in that truck. Close examination of the Reo turned out that the engine was of one make, the transmission of another make and the rear-end assembly of still another make. As far as I know Ned was the first mechanic to make an operational truck unit out of three different trucks. And he used that truck for a lot of hauling and it was the best truck on the job as long as Ned drove it, but let somebody else get a hold of it and it acted like a high-strung horse and didn't operate so well. For some reason or other no one else seemed to develop a knack for making it work.

Using his father's truck to work on, Ned soon found out that he had a native inclination for mechanical work. He'd rather work on a truck than unload one, so the local Texaco agency in Eastland had the slickest running and best-tuned engines in the trucking business as long as Ned got to tinker with them.

My personal admiration for Ned's handiwork is sometimes spellbound, however, when I recall what I think was his most amazing job of truck engineering.

Ned once came up with a deal that he had assembled that I haven't yet figured out how it worked and I'm not sure that I can explain it. But in its simplest form here is what he did. He took the transmissions out of two trucks, hooked them together in reverse order and had a transmission of double power than the manufacturer made the single transmission to be.

Why the thing didn't pull two directions at the same time is more than I can understand. Looks like it ought to run forward and backwards at the same time but it'll pull like a hungry horse pulling the plow home on the last corn row before suppertime.
