MOORE about... EASTLAND

A tip of the hat to Gorman voters.

One hundred and twenty-three persons turned out to vote in an uncontested election for the city commission race there. As a comparison, only 54 Eastland citizens voted in our city election.

We think Eastland has a rather poor voting record in all local elections.

Remember Butch Norrell, the Cleburne golfer who blazed his way to the championship in last year's Lakeside Country Club tournament? Those of you who do remember the blonde, 21-year-old, will be saddened to learn of his death last week. He dropped dead on the No. 9 green at Corpus Christi Country Club.

Every now and then we spot something we wish we had written, but didn't. In this month's "Department of Public Safety Chaparral" there's an article entitled "What Is A Policeman?" that's worth reprinting, we think. The author was not listed. Here it is:

Policemen are human (believe it or not) just like the rest of us. They come in both sexes; and mostly males. They also come in various sizes. This sometimes depends on whether you are looking for one or trying to hide something. However, they are mostly big.

Policemen are found everywhere. On land, on the sea, in the air, on horses and in cars and sometimes in your hair. In spite of the fact that "you can't find one when you want one," they are usually there when it counts most. The best way to get one is to pick up the phone.

Policemen deliver lectures, babies, and bad news. They are required to have the wisdom of Solomon, the disposition of a lamb and muscles of steel and are often accused of having a heart to match. He's the one who rings the door bell, swallows hard and announces the passing of a loved one; then spends the rest of the day wondering why he ever took such a crummy job.

On TV a policeman is an oaf who couldn't find a bull fiddle in a telephone booth. In real life he's expected to find a little blond boy "about so high" in a crowd of a half-million people. In fiction he gets his help from private eyes, reporters and "who-dun-it" fans. In real life, mostly all he gets from the public is "I didn't see nothing."

When he issues a traffic ticket, he's a monster. If he lets you go, he's a good egg. To little kids he's either a friend or a bogeyman depending on how the parents feel about it. He works "around the clock," split shifts, Sundays and holidays and it always kills him in a jester says: "Hey, tomorrow is a big holiday, I'm off, go fishing." (That's the day works 20 hours.)

Policemen is like the little girl, who when she was good, was very good, but when she was bad she was horrid. When a policeman is good "he's getting paid for it." When he makes a mistake, "he's a grafter and that goes for the rest of them, too." When he shoots a stick-up man he's a hero, except when the stick-up man is "only a kid, anybody could see that."

Lots of them have homes, some of them are covered with ivy, but most of them are covered with mortgages. If he drives a big car he's a chiseler, a little car, "Who's he kidding?" His credit is good; this is helpful, because his salary isn't. Policemen raise lots of kids; most of them belong to other people.

A policeman sees more misery, bloodshed, trouble and sunrises than the average person. Like the postman, the policeman must also be out in all kinds of weather. His uniform changes with the (Continued on Page Three)

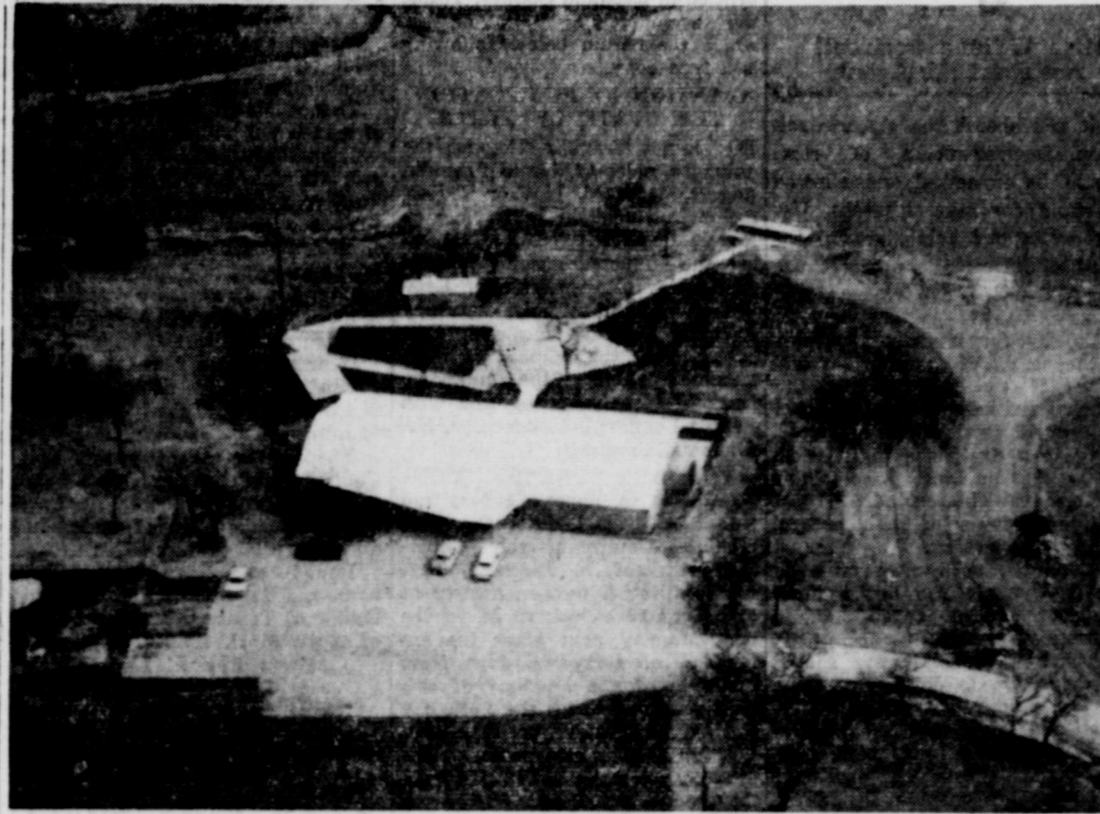
The Methodist Men's Club will meet Thursday at 7 p.m. for their regular monthly meeting. Carl Garrett will be speaker for the occasion.

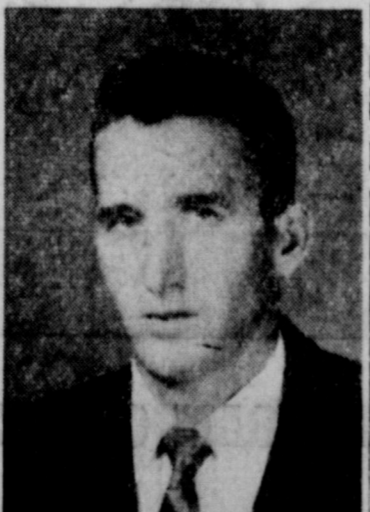

William Clements Doing Student Teaching Now

Public schools in 35 Texas cities are cooperating with North Texas State College this semester in the training of prospective teachers.

The NTSC School of Education has placed more than 450 college students in these cities as student teachers. Most of them are assigned in Denton, Dallas, and Tarrant Counties.

In towns outside of Denton County, the student teachers spend full time in the school for nine weeks. They teach a one-half day schedule for a full semester in most of the Denton area schools.

Under the guidance of the classroom teacher and school principal, the students assist in planning and carrying out the regular instruction program as part of their work toward earning teaching certificates.

Cold Weather Doesn't Slow Down Area Scouts

Cold and damp weather did not call off the second part of the Comanche Trail Boy Scout Junior Leader Training Course over the weekend. Approximately 60 boys attended the outdoor half of the training at Lake Leon. The first stage of the course was held in Breckenridge, March 21 and 22.

The boys learned how to cook in the open, how to take care of emergencies such as people falling from trees and drowning persons, and how to follow a trail using only a compass.

The adventure trail which all the boys took was exactly what the name implies, an adventure. At the beginning of the trail the boys were to identify some tracks made in a tracking pit. It was a test of the boys' observation in knowing trail signs and how to read them. Next on the trail was a mined area in which the boys were to find a buried mine. The mine was a buried alarm clock which could be heard ticking if the boy was alert and used the mine detector properly.

Further down the trail the boys were confronted with an emergency. On the ground was an unconscious boy who had fallen from a tree. He was not breathing and was bleeding from a wound on his right forearm. It was up to the boys to administer first aid and get the victim to the next aid station. This was one phase of the program which indicated more work should be done to maintain adequate first aid knowledge.

Another emergency came a few minutes later when shouts for help were heard from the water front. Rushing to the scene the boys found a man and his boat sinking. Throwing a rope to the man in the boat was not as easy as the boys thought. After several throws of the rope the boy in the boat was finally pulled to shore and saved.

As a last item in the adventure trail the scouts were tested on how well they were living up to the scout slogan of "Do a good turn daily." Mike Machen of Breckenridge was attempting to start his pickup by pushing it. For a moment it looked as if the boys would pass him by, but the scouts finally did come through with their good turn and helped him push his truck.

The compass trail was one laid out by degrees of the compass. The object was to show how a trail could be followed strictly by compass. At the end of the trail was a pot of gold—orange. The oranges were used as dessert for the trail cooking. Each boy had with him a coffee can which he used in making his coffee can casserole. The casserole consisted

of hamburger, potatoes, onions, and carrots.

Sunday morning Rev. E. E. Mulliner, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Cisco talked to the boys on the importance of little things adding up to greater and better things. After church service the boys went to various demonstrations put on by members of the staff. One of the favorite and best demonstrations was that in camp cooking. Werner Bendorf of Breckenridge and Bob Slaughter of Eastland showed how chicken could be cooked in a hole with hot rocks and how a peach cobbler could be mouth watering made in

a dutch oven with coals surrounding the oven.

Each boy attending the camp out received a medallion for his uniform, and a certificate showing that he had completed the Junior Leader's Training Course.

Troop 6 of Eastland received first place honor of having the cleanest camp site and Troop 111 of Cisco and Brownwood Troop 22 tied for second place honors.

Thanks were expressed for a water tank used in washing utensils which was donated by rancher Clint McCain of Eastland. The outing was held on the Hallenbeck place near Lake Leon.

so it will absorb the glycerin solution. Several inches of stem should be immersed and allowed to stand for several weeks. Use half water and half glycerin. Instead of glycerin one might use 1 cup sugar, 1 cup vinegar, and 2 cups water.
To dry flowers naturally, pick at the height of development and strip off the foliage. Tie in bunches and hang with heads down to prevent undesirable shapes. Hang in a dry place until dried. An attic is an ideal place to dry if light can be excluded. Light will rob flowers of their natural color while drying.
A seldom used closet will do for a drying place. But a basement or garage is too damp. Flowers will mold.
Although most flowers should be dried upside down, dry some of the plumed type of cockscomb and salvia in a tall container so that their heads hang over the edge.
Grasses are easy to do. Some are picked while green, others while brown. But all are dried upright in a peach basket. The same treatment applies to seed pods.
In drying fern, pick at maturity and press with a warm iron. Store between layers of newspapers from 4 to 6 weeks. Palmetto may be treated this way, also. Sage palm dries naturally in 3 to 4 weeks. Store grasses, cones, branches, and grains (such as wheat) in a box to dry.
Many wild flowers will dry successfully. The creamy white ones will absorb hot dye (the kind used for fabrics) as soon as they are picked. Hydrangeas should be picked just after peak of the blooming period, when blossoms began to die on the bush. Store until completely dry.
Blossoms of these flowers must be bleached before dyeing to produce bright, clear colors. Use a solution of half chlorine bleach, agent and half water; bring to a boil and remove from the heat. Place a few blossoms in the solution and stir with a fork for even bleaching. Rinse in cold water and spread on the grass, hedge or shrubbery to dry in the sun.
To gift or tint leaves, weeds, and grasses, bronzing oil is mixed with powdered pigment, which is available at most paint and paper stores. Also available is a ruby bronze and oil mixture in gold, aluminum, rose or green. Poster paint is practical for some materials. This oil will float on top of water. Dip leaves or material down into water and as it is brought up the gilt will stick to the leaves. Allow to drain and dry.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington D. C. — While United States Foreign Policy is concerned with happenings in our front door, our back door may be very much ajar.
Quite naturally, our first concern in the weeks ahead is what happens in Berlin. The interest on the revolt in Tibet is high because there is some hope the situation may develop into a major revolt against the Communist Chinese.

In our back door is the Caribbean and Latin America. In this area there is a ferment inspired by Fidel Castro of Cuba and Betancourt of Venezuela. Munos Marin of Puerto Rico is seemingly supporting the Castro forces against the Dominican Republic's Trujillo. There is little doubt that Communist influence has a lot of fuel for the fire. Moscow would be presumed to have its eye principally on Berlin and Tibet, but we can also be sure their interest is high in the Caribbean.
The target of the so-called Castro forces is principally Trujillo, whose fall would be a great psychological victory and could start the downfall of several Latin American nations. Nicaragua is seemingly high on the list.
The United States is continuously in the middle of the powerful crosscurrents working right at our back door. The interest of American oil companies in Venezuela constitutes one of the dilemmas. Pressures from the oil companies to get a better deal in their take from Venezuela is a major consideration of our policies.
The big Naval Base at Guantanamo Bay on the Southwestern tip of Cuba is another major consideration.
It does not seem that either of these has any sympathy for the Fidel Castro forces.
Castro's bitter utterances against the United States is, of course, encouraging to the Communists. Nothing could serve their purpose better than for an outright major conflict to develop in our back door. If the revolutionaries are successful in marshalling sizeable forces, the entire Caribbean as well as a considerable

part of South America could become embroiled in a conflict. Unless ways and means are found to stop these developments, whatever side the United States takes will be wrong. The Communists are well aware that any conflict will help them and hurt us. Their theme is "peace in the Caribbean," but of course, it means exactly the opposite.
So while we are watching these places for removed from us which could possibly touch off a major war, a riot could occur in our own back yard which might be about as serious as anything which has ever occurred in the Western Hemisphere.

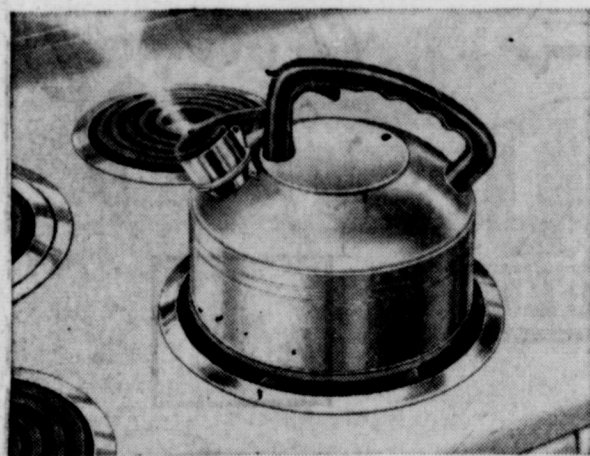

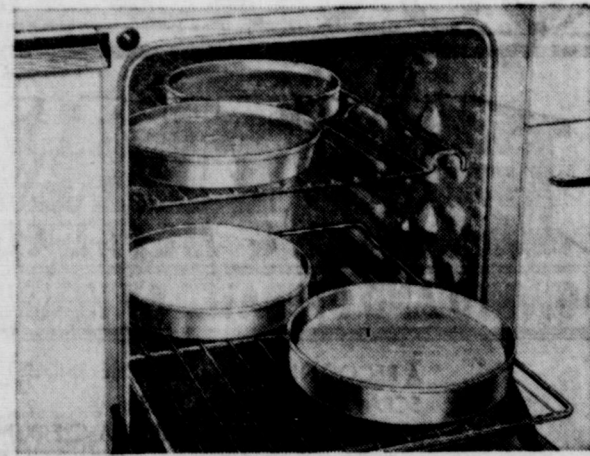

Bayer continued to have trouble with the Bermuda grass on the greens and he could do nothing for himself when it came to his putting. His final score was 73, or 3 over par.

Some interesting statistics show that Bayer hit nine drives for 300 yards or more, but in every case, despite the disadvantage of his shorter drives, Sam's devastating long-iron game put him on the inside for the pay-off putting on the green. Sam is no slouch off the tee himself, but he proved once again that while it's great to have the long ball, it's that short game that makes the big difference.

Snead ended his 1959 appearance on All-Star Golf with 13 straight victories, and a total of \$28,000 in cash . . . and he deserved every penny of it, giving millions of TV viewers a sparkling performance week after week. 

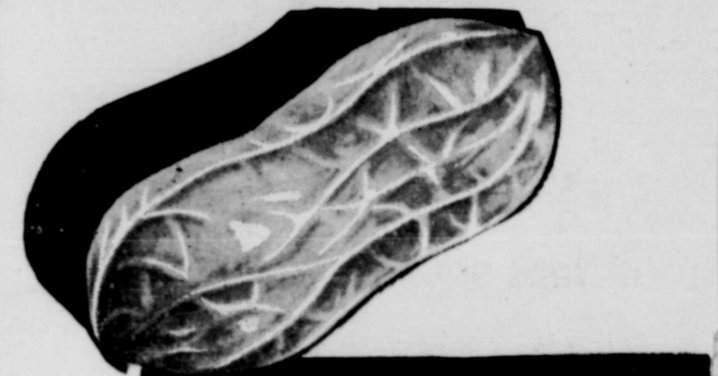

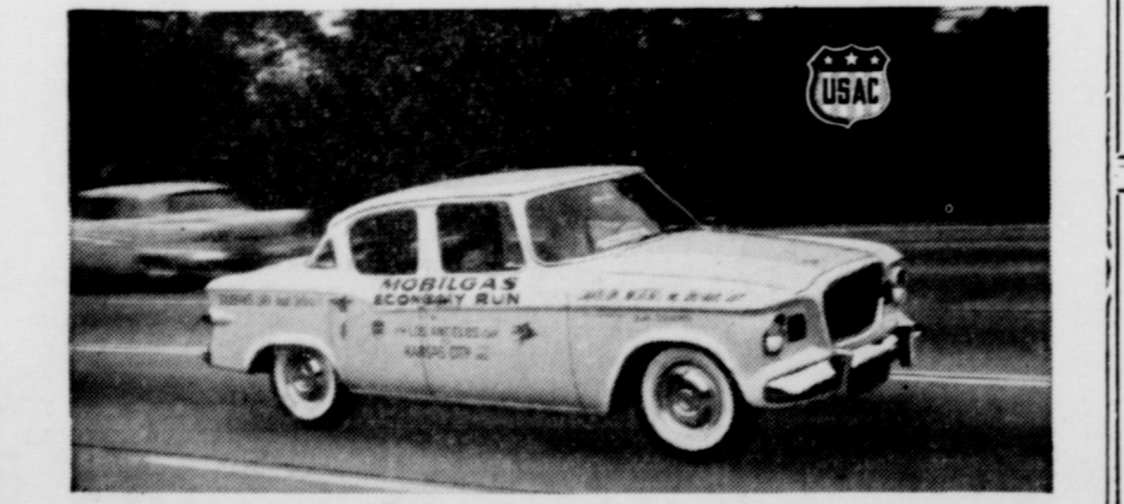

Price Cuts Noted In New M-W Sale Book

CHICAGO, Apr. 14—Diamonds, a girl's best friend, have been cut in price by 15 percent by Montgomery Ward in a special sale book being mailed to 5,000,000 customers this week.

The price reductions apply to all of the 190 diamond rings listed in the company's large spring-summer catalog distributed last January. These stones range from a four-carat emerald-cut diamond reduced from \$6695.00 to \$5690.75 to a \$16.95 three-diamond wedding band reduced to \$14.41.

Air conditioners and fans, man's best friend in the summer, are among the 20,000 merchandise items reduced an average of 9.58 percent in Ward's 520-page summer sale book, largest sale catalog Ward's has issued.

Price cuts on fans, air circulators, and dehumidifiers range from approximately 6 to 11 percent. A thermostat - controlled portable fan priced at \$54.95 in the spring-summer catalog has been reduced to \$48.88, a 3,000-cu ft. per minute circulator dropped 11 percent from \$32.45 to \$28.88. Air conditioner prices have been cut \$10 to \$16.

Price reductions on lawn and garden equipment, sports equipment, and outdoor living accessories and furniture carry out the sale book's emphasis on seasonal merchandise savings. On lawn supplies, price cuts average 15 percent, with some reductions as high as 32 percent. An 18-in. rotary mower which sold for \$54.95 in the spring-summer catalog is now \$37.59.

Typical reductions on other seasonal merchandise include a 20 percent cut on a water ski outfit from \$23.93 to \$19.50, a reduction on a barbecue brazier from \$19.95 to \$14.88, and a 12 percent reduction on a sun umbrella table.

Largest overall price cuts in the sale book are on home furnishings merchandise. Unfinished furniture, mattresses, draperies, curtains and slip covers have been reduced an average of 19 percent, jewelry and watches 15 percent, radios, high-fidelity tape and phonograph equipment more than 11 percent.

The summer sale extends to August 15.
