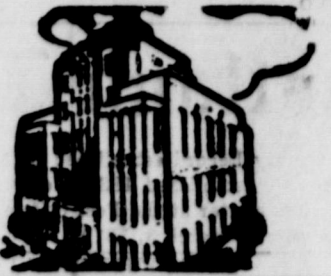

Individual participants included Govan, who also ran a leg on the 440-yard relay team; Ronnie Jones, Donald Lewis and Fred McDonald, other members of the relay team; Fred Adams, shot put; and James Woodruff, 100-yard dash.

The Tigers have gone to the State Meet four times in the past five years, winning first place for the boys twice and the girls once. Coach is Garland Washington.

CYRUS FROST RE-ELECTED MAYOR

City Is Given \$3200 To Improve Airport

Eastland City Commissioners re-elected Cyrus B. Frost Jr. as mayor last night, received a check from the Chamber of Commerce to pay for improvements at the Eastland airport and played host to the Cisco City Commission.

Under the Eastland City Charter, citizens elect five commissioners and the commissioners select their own officers. Three commissioners, Jack Germany, Virgil Seaberry Jr. and Robert Perkins, were re-elected April 7. Other officers, all who were re-elected, include Tom Wilson, vice chairman; Germany, treasurer; and Perkins, assistant treasurer.

H. J. (Herb) Tanner, Chamber of Commerce manager, was on hand to present the Commission with a \$3235 check to pay for hard surfacing one runway at the City Airport and lighting the runway. Tanner said one other \$100 gift had been pledged.

Record Number of Fishermen Swarm Lake for Fishing Rodeo

A record number of fishermen—190 teams made up of 380 individuals—competed in the fourth annual fishing tournament of the Fort Worth Anglers Club at Lake Leon, Sunday.

The 190 teams entered marked an all-time record for the club, the previous high being 98 teams. And the 380 fishermen were the largest group of anglers ever present in one day at the lake.

A crowd, estimated between 2,000 and 3,000, were present for the bass and crappie events.

Dick Darmon of Fort Worth, chairman of the fishing rodeo, called it a high success, beyond all expectations. He commented favorably on the hospitality extended by the Fort Worth anglers by Ranger and Eastland.

A total of 35 trophies and awards went to the winners in the two divisions, following weighing-in by the dam. Judges were Morris George and David B. Pickrel of Ranger and Grady Pipkin of Eastland.

Biggest bass, weighing four pounds, 13 ounces, was brought in by the team of Dave Hawk of Austin, defending state bass champion, and George Kellam, outdoor editor of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Also placing in the biggest bass division were M. J. Bemis and Gaylon Gilbreath; T. W. Thornton and R. K. Shelton; and Roger Harkins and Spot Nunn, all of Fort Worth, in a three-way tie for second place. Each of the teams pulled in a four-pound, 12 ounce bass. Twelve other teams were presented with awards for individual bass catches.

Largest string of bass—weighing in at 24 pounds, 12 ounces—was brought in by Gene Bills and Tom Butler of Fort Worth. Coming in second was the team of Wallace Chambliss and Tom Butler of Fort Worth; third were J. D. Lagardinos and C. L. Richards of Fort Worth. Awards went to 10 other teams for strings of bass.

F. C. and Terrell Williamson of Ranger were presented with a trophy for catching the largest individual crappie, weighing two pounds, nine ounces. Second place winners were Betty McKay and W. C. Timmons of Fort Worth, with a two pound, two ounce catch. Third were C. P. Goodwin and N. R. Brasher, Fort Worth, with a one pound, 14-ounce, crappie.

Two teams tied for first place honors for the largest catches of strings of crappie. Team members are R. L. Dowell and Arlon Causey of Fort Worth and Mr. and Mrs. U. A. Fowler, also of Fort Worth. Coming in third were Opal Bringer and Mrs. Ted Watters, Fort Worth. Fourth were Mrs. Felix Anky and Felix Darden, Jr., of Fort Worth.

Fishermen were located in every corner of Lake Leon early Sunday morning as the events got underway. By weighing-in time, at 3 p.m., a large crowd of spectators were gathered at the dam.

Sports writers present for the tournament included Kellam; Andy Anderson, president of the club who writes for the Fort Worth Press; and Jimmy Browder of the Abilene Reporter. A 16-foot boat was made available to press and camera men by Fleet Form Boats of Fort Worth through L & J Supply Co. of Ranger, operated by Bob Jones, sales manager for the boat firm.

Complete award winners will be announced later this week.

Gray Matter

The habits of a people change over the years. The entertainment dollar people spend changes the course of its direction over the years.

This is easily noticed in a look at the new baseball season that opened this week. Baseball doesn't attract the crowds of people nor the interest it used to a few years ago.

Not too many years ago each spring saw little boys, little girls, big boys, and their admiring girl friends take to the baseball diamond like a flea to a good hound's hide. And the baseball fever lasted all summer, or up until the start of school in September. Usually the World Series would mark the end of baseball season for most of us kids as by the time the big series came off we were interested in football.

But the Spring meant baseball to us. Fortunately, old Connellee Park had a good baseball field. The Park was actually a horse race track and a baseball park. At the time the baseball park was built Eastland was in the old West Texas League, or was it the Oil Belt League, a Class D league of organized ball. Anytime the local professional club wasn't at home we kids used to make good use of the ballpark.

In 1928 the Eastland Mavericks baseball entry won almost everything they played, finally winning third place, I think it was, in the state. The Lobos that year were something to behold. Our Mavericks with the Coleman brothers, Marshall Watson, Chilli Overbey, Everett Legion, Charles Lafon, and a few others I could mention, beheld them in a series out at old Connellee Park. When the Mavericks got over beholding the Lobos the only people who would behold them were Cisco people.

The Mavs went on to mix it up with some professionals who were then playing for Waxahachie knocked our boys out of the running for the state title. A couple of fellows on the Waxahachie that year may mean something to most Eastland people. Art Shires I think was one of them. A fellow by the name of Paul Richards was on that ball club. He's the same fellow managing Baltimore in the big leagues now. Another fellow who later managed professionally was Jimmy Adair.

So I think it would be safe to say that the boys from Ellis County were gifted in the game of baseball.

During the Cisco series some followers of that club marched around our ballpark carrying a large sign saying, "Cisco, The Home of The Big Dam Lobos."

The big dam was relatively new then and those people to our west were very proud of it. That was before they had figured up the cost of the thing.

Well, the next day some of our fellows marched around the hall park with a larger sign reading:

Buckner Orphans Home To Receive \$322,999 Fund

The Texas Baptist benevolent committee voted to give Buckner Orphans Home \$322,999 from the Baptist General Convention of Texas cooperative program in 1960, recently in Dallas.

Total operating expenses for Buckners will be \$1,612,599 next year. The homes cares for 843 dependent children.

Other income of \$1,189,600 will be derived from individual gifts, endowment, memorials and rent.

The Buckner benevolences include children's homes in Dallas, Burnet, and Lubbock, two homes for the aged in Houston and Dallas, and a home for unwed mothers in San Antonio.

In addition to the \$1 1/2 million plus operating budget, the Buckner units will spend an additional \$250,000 on capital improvements next year.

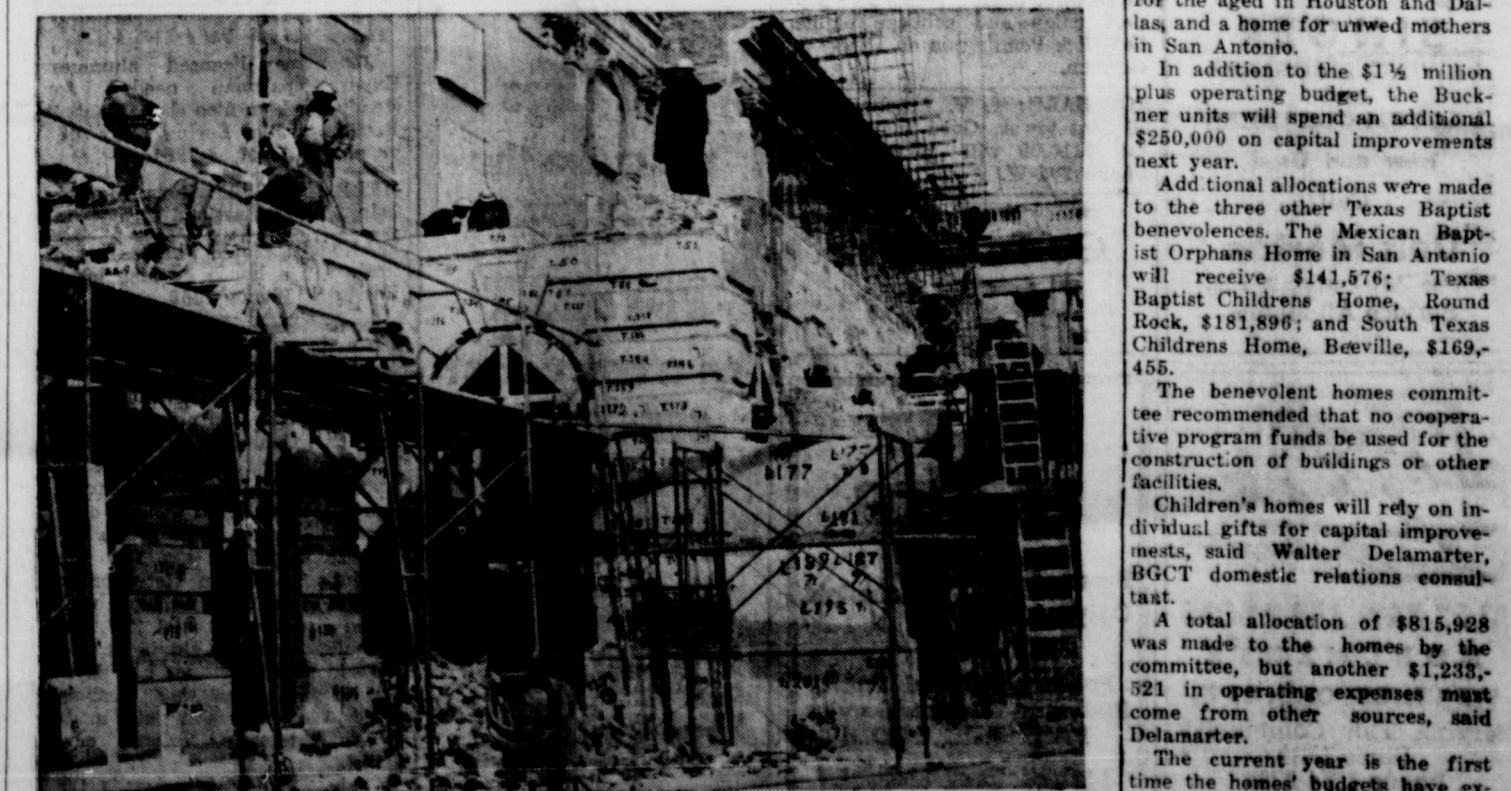
Additional allocations were made to the three other Texas Baptist benevolences. The Mexican Baptist Orphans Home in San Antonio will receive \$141,576; Texas Baptist Children's Home, Round Rock, \$181,896; and South Texas Children's Home, Beeville, \$169,455.

The benevolent homes committee recommended that no cooperative program funds be used for the construction of buildings or other facilities.

Children's homes will rely on individual gifts for capital improvements, said Walter Delamarter, BGCT domestic relations consultant.

A total allocation of \$815,928 was made to the homes by the committee, but another \$1,233,521 in operating expenses must come from other sources, said Delamarter.

The current year is the first time the homes' budgets have exceeded \$2,000,000 for operation expenses. Capital expenses will push the final figure to \$2,800,000 that the homes will spend in (Continued on Page 3)

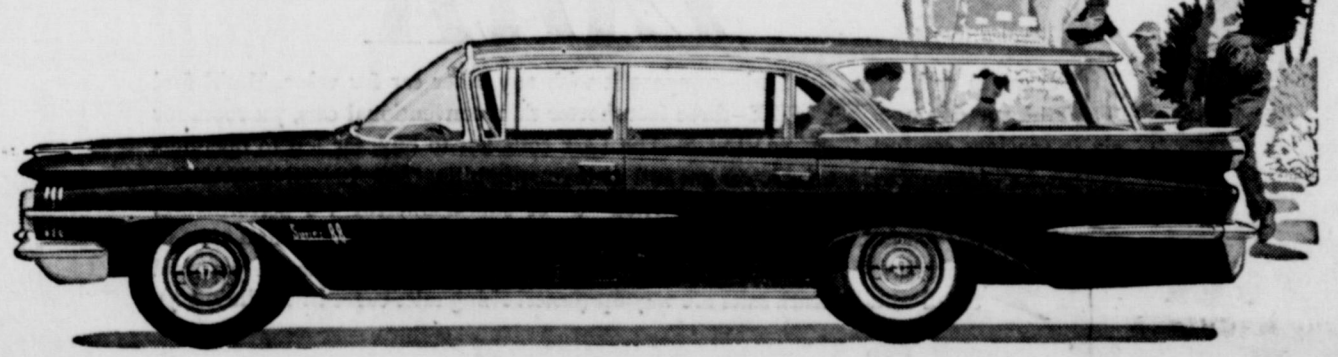

Many family members are double duty homemakers. Every person helps with some jobs at home daily and otherwise. All need to find ways to make the best use of time and energy for each chore. First, analyze the way you work. Watch yourself to see if you take extra steps or make extra motions when you work. If so, next time leave out the unnecessary steps. Why dry dishes when scalding would take less time and be more sanitary as well? Leave out steps, stoops, stretches and stresses by having cleaning equipment stored together for faster, easier cleaning.

When sewing, have the equipment conveniently arranged so that you can turn away from the machine and press seams as you complete them. Make shopping trips count for more by having a list. Arrange cosmetics for quick, efficient grooming, keeping everything used convenient. If you work, it will save time in the morning if you decide what to wear the night before. That goes for school children, too. These and many other techniques will give you time to read, relax or just visit with family members and others. Let children help. . . children are imitators. They learn first from parents and other family members in the home. Give them a chance to know the joy of accomplishment and to develop a sense of responsibility early in life by letting them help do many little things, suggest ideas, etc. Management principles like sharing work, leaving out needless parts of a job, working in a comfortable position, using both hands, using the best tool for the job and organizing time will be learned from observation and example. The mother's good work habits are sure to be carried over to a large extent. Patience pays when it comes to teaching a child to do a job. You will get best results if you let the child know what is expected; explain why things need to be done, when and where they should be done, demonstrate how to do them correctly, and supervise while they practice a few times. Weekend visitors usually call for extra food and entertainment. Avoid last minute fuss by advance planning and preparation. Arrange ahead for the foods to serve, the preparation and service, table decorations, etc. "Foods and Fun With Friends", a special bulletin prepared by specialists, gives information on invitations, recipes and suggestions for preparing refreshments for large or small parties. Teenagers will find the information helpful, too. Get a copy of this bulletin at your county home demonstration agent's office.

It would be difficult to exaggerate the hold which the late Pop Boone, sports editor of the Fort Worth Press for many years, had on the sports fans of West Texas. That spell went back to the palmy days of the Fort Worth Cats and to coin the phrase "Atz's of the old Record." By the way, the team was originally known as the Panthers—the first to shorten the name to Cats and to coin the phrase "Atz's Cats"? I was editing first one and then another paper in the Oil Belt—at Eastland, Ranger and Cisco—and, along with Pop's other followers, read his column avidly. He used to write a lot of amusing things about a pitcher, name of Tiny Goodbred, who worked mainly in relief and in keeping his teammates in a good humor. Pop called him "the sheriff of Muleshoe" and was always quoting him—like once when he said that Tiny said it was so dangerous in the pitcher's box that he had just perfected two inventions. One was a spring that, as soon as the ball left the hurler's hand, would cause a shield to shoot up in front of him and the other was also a spring that, soon as the ball was thrown, would open a trapdoor and the pitcher would drop into a pit. First time I ever met Pop was in Abilene in 1942 when Abilene, defending state champions, met (and lost to) the Cisco Lobos. Pop remarked that both teams had the same colors—gold and black, whereupon a smart-aleck young news-paperman said, "Yes—an act of the legislature requires all West Texas teams to have the same colors." Pop didn't get offended; in fact, he quoted my remark in his column. Cisco that season had a mascot, who weighed about 85 pounds and his number was "100". Right near the end of the game, when the Lobos were way ahead, Coach W. B. Chapman might send the tiny fellow in as quarterback for a down or two. Cisco was going to meet Oak Cliff in the state semi-finals and the day before the game the mascot chatted with a graying, quiet-spoken chap. Afterward, the coach asked, "Well, Jack, what did you think of Pop? The lad's eyes widened and he gasped, "Was that Pop Boone?" and nearly keeled over when he realized that the man he'd been talking to with such ease was the famous sports writer. That will give you an idea of how friendly and unassuming Pop was. Incidentally, the Lobos lost to Oak Cliff and the next day, Pop published a picture of the mascot with a headline that was a classic: "Oak Cliff broke his little heart." 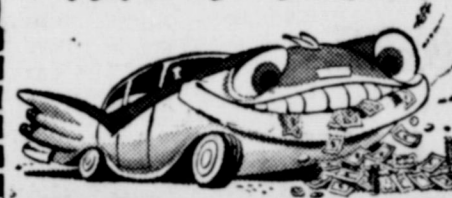
