Gorman to Kokomo Road Is Approved

County commissioners approved a farm-to-market road project which will connect Gorman and Kokomo. The project was approved after commissioners held their chest discussions with R. P. (Buddy) Haun, newly appointed resident engineer.

The project, which has to be approved by both the county and the City of Gorman, will cost an estimated \$140,000. The county will provide right-of-way for the highway except in Gorman, and the City will secure right-of-way there.

The vote on approving project was three to one with Commissioner Bob Carter of Rising Star abstaining.

Courthouse authorities couldn't remember when "an acceptance vote on state funds for a farm-to-market road in Eastland had met with anything but a unanimous vote.

The State Highway Dept. in the past has withdrawn money from a county when the right-of-way was not secured by commissioners. This has never happened in Eastland County, but funds forfeited in other counties in the district has been used here.

"I'm all for Froggie (Commissioner of Precinct 2 J. M. Bennett of Gorman) getting all the roads he can, but I want something for myself," Commissioner Carter said.

Commissioner Carl Lamb of Cisco said he was going along on the project since he thought the

entire county was helped anytime pavement is put down. But he too said he thought his precinct should get more attention, and he pointed to the Airport Road leading to Lake Cisco as a road he thinks should be put on the FM Road program.

Haun told commissioners that the Highway Department decides what roads should be paved strictly on need. He said that the only yardstick used is traffic count. Commissioners J. B. (Tip) Arther and Bennett said they thought Highway Dept. recommendations should be followed at all times.

Date for the United Fund Kick-off drive has been tentatively set for Oct. 25, Dick Spalding, drive chairman, announced today.

Jan Robertson, a freshman at Texas Wesleyan College, Fort Worth, has been awarded a National Methodist Scholarship by the Board of Education of the Methodist Church. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. W. Robertson of Eastland, Miss Robertson is majoring in music.

The National Methodist Scholarship is one of TWC's highest honors—a special honor in this case, since it is usually awarded to upperclassmen. It pays the student's entire tuition for the year. Students selected to receive the scholarship must have high academic standing, a record of participation in church activities, and must show promise of future leadership.

Funds for the scholarship come from local Methodist churches throughout the nation on Methodist Student Day, which comes on the second Sunday of June each year.

Ralph Baggett Funeral Rites Set Wednesday

Funeral services for Ralph Baggett, 54, will be held Wednesday at 2 p.m. at the church of Christ in Eastland with Gary Adams, minister, officiating.

Mr. Baggett died sometime Sunday of a gunshot wound. He was born March 6, 1906 in Gainsight and had lived most of his life in Eastland County. He was an employee of Lone Star Gas Co.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Jackie Baggett, a University of Texas student; his mother, Mrs. Mattie Baggett of Eastland; two brothers, Raymond of Wichita Falls and Davis of Austin and two sisters, Mrs. Willie Botes of Macon, Ga. and Mrs. Pearl Bryan of Throckmorton.

Peace Justice C. E. Owen Tuesday morning returned a verdict of suicide. Mr. Baggett's body was found on his ranch, which is north of Eastland just in Stephens County. He was sitting in his car and a .22 rifle was by his side.

A bullet entered just below his chin. His body was found at 6 p.m. Monday by his wife and Judge Owen said Mr. Baggett had been dead at least 24 hours when found.

Burial will be in Gainsight Cemetery.

Rangers Edged By Apaches Saturday

The fighting Ranger College Rangers tied into the number one rated Tyler Apaches Saturday night and came within inches of pulling the upset of the year as Tyler staged a last half comeback to emerge with a 29 to 25 victory.

The Rangers led by halfback Frank Rice who gained 132 yards on 15 carries, including a 98-yard scoring run, racked up a 25 to 8 halftime lead, but the Tyler Apaches came back in true championship style in the second half to edge the Rangers out.

The hard hitting Ranger defensive line stopped the Apache ground attack, but couldn't contend with the accurate throwing of Quarterback Jimmy Lyons, who hit seven of 12 passes.

From that point Ranger quickly moved to the nine yard line while Rice went over for the first score. The try for extra point was good and Ranger led at the end of the first quarter 6 to 0.

Early in the second quarter Tyler had Ranger with their backs to the goal by a well placed punt that died on the Ranger one yard line. On the second play from scrimmage, which was the two yard line, Rice broke through the hole in the middle of the line, shook loose from two tacklers on the ten yard line and dodged the other on the fifteen and out the Tyler safety for 98 yards and another six points. Kenneth P. kicked the extra point, making score 13 to 0.

score. Boxley too the kickoff on the 20 yard line and returned it 40 yards to the Ranger 40. Two plays later Quarterback Tim Falgout hit End Gene Staples for a 28 yard pass and score. Carlee Manchester ran the extra points to make the score 13 to 8 with Ranger leading.

Jerry House took the kickoff and returned it 37 yards to the 41 yard line, but the Rangers were forced to punt and Tyler took over on the 25 yard line. Two plays later Tackle Marvin Agnew intercepted a Tyler pitchout and raced 29 yards for a touchdown. Again the try for extra point was no good and Ranger led 19 to 8.

The final Ranger core came with two minutes left in the half with a fumble recovered by Phillip Reed putting the Rangers in business on the Tyler 47 yard line. Fullback Printiss Gidney Gidney made the final yard in the drive to give the Rangers a 25 to 8 halftime lead.

In the opening minutes of the second half Ranger stopped a Tyler drive on their own six yard line, but Tyler held and forced Ranger to attempt to put out of the end zone and blocked the punt for a safety and two points.

This break seemed to give Tyler the needed spirit to make their comeback.

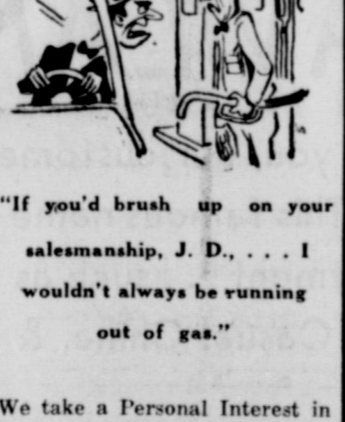
