Death on the highway is becoming something which we tend to overlook. The reason for this, of course, is that it has become so commonplace. We realize how terrible the situation is only when it strikes

An annual report just released by the Texas Department of realize the real danger. During 1958 there were but five days in which someone did not die on Texas highways.

Take January for instance.

There was not a single day in which someone did not die. Not that January is an unusual month, the same can be said of February, March, May, October, November and December. During January, 166 persons died. That's an average of more than 30 persons a week, and as many as 15 persons died in one day. For the year, there were 1,684 traffic deaths in Texas. That's about the number of persons who live in Gorman and Carbon combined.

Eastland County contributed 15 deaths to this cause. There were also 89 persons injured. And yet, knowing all of this, it appears that driving habits are getting worse, not better. Better take a look at yours.

#### **Notary Publics** Must File New Oath and Bond

Secretary of State Zollie Steak ley has announced that he will re tary public commissions but that ach person must re-qualify by the filing of a new oath and bond with the county clerk of his residence between June 1, 1959 and June 10, 1959.

Steakley emphasized that no taries public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires the county clerks to ap prove notary bonds.

Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment hould apply to his county clerk by May 20. Application during thi period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of reappointing present notaries. Secretary of State Steakley fur-

ther pointed out that each person applying for a commission as notary public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the county clerk.



Washington, D. C .- Farmers are justly aroused at the proposal f the Secretary of Labor to give the Federal Government control over farm wages and working conditions.

Although the entire history of Congressional action on farm employment makes it crystal clear ployment shall be exercised by the big unions in the North and East, wants to set a minimum wage now applicable only to business en-

As a matter of fact, not only has the Congress never given such authority, but has expressly denied the Executive Branch of Government any such power.

Several bills have been introduced in the Congress which would bring agricultural workers under the so-called Fair Labor Standards Act. These bills are not likely to be passed, or even receive favor-Hollywood V-Ette Vassarette plant able consideration in the present Monday after their luncheon meet- | Congress, but in spite of this probability, the Department of Labor now attemps to control farm labor as it now protects industrial and order farmers to pay transportation of workers from distances

In addition to this action by the Department of Labor, a second proposal relates to the use of Mexican national farm workers, so vital to our seasonal agricultural economy. The Department would assume complete authority over all farm labor, a power which the Congress has never granted but has specifically denied.

A group of congressmen from agricultural areas have had several meetings with Secretary of Labor Mitchell, and at the first meet-ing he agreed the order appeared contrary to the intent of the Law. Shortly afterwards, however, new proposals with the same intent were made, which were even more rigid.

Behind this action to rule decree is obviously an intent to destroy the Mexican National Labor Program, despite its enactment by Congress, and to use the instru-ments of Government to bring (Continued on Page Three)
