### Businessmen Plan Something Special

Eastland businessmen held a meeting for the most elaborate Christmas shopping days plan ever proposed here yesterday afternoon, and from all indications the large majority of the businessmen, both those in the downtown area and those scattered throughout the city, plan to back the program originated by Horace Horton, president, all the way.

Horton's plan is for Eastland businesses to stay open from 7 until 11 p.m. three Friday nights in December. Santa will be in Eastland all three of these nights. He will be stationed on the north side of the square where he will talk to visiting children and give out candy tickets which will be good for candy at the various stores.

In addition each cooperating merchant will give away five bonus certificates each night. That will mean that some 300 certificates will be given away to those persons in the crowd each Friday night. The certificates will be worth big discounts on merchandise in the various stores.

Cash prizes will be given away the last two Friday nights. To be eligible to win a person must have redeemed one of the gift certificates.

Businessmen will make an all-out effort to decorate stores, and the downtown business area will be decorated as never before. Merchants already have started receiving Christmas merchandise and Horton said that Eastland stores will be better stocked this Christmas than they ever have before.

### Sportsmen Can Assist Wardens

Fishing without a license continues to top the list of game and fish violations in the State. Wardens filed against 178 persons in September for failing to have the required fishing license, according to J. B. Phillips, assistant director of law enforcement, Texas Game and Fish Commission.

This is a slight drop from the 198 arrests made the same month in 1959, but a big increase when compared to the 29 persons found fishing without licenses in Sept. 1956.

Game wardens apprehended 123 persons last month for game law violations. Twenty-five of these were hunting in closed season, 17 were hunting from automobiles, 12 failed to plug their guns for three shells and 10 were hunting at night.

"It is evident that some people are determined to hunt and fish without respect for laws which have been established to preserve our game and fish," said Phillips. "They don't realize that by their very acts of illegal hunting and fishing, they are hurting themselves as well as those who do respect our game laws."

All the mail addressed to 1316 South Seaman, Eastland, Texas ends its devious travels by falling into our living room floor, the mail box being merely a chute through the outside wall.

One morning I picked up a post card which read: You are hereby notified to appear for petit jury duty on such and such a date. I read the rest of the mail and decided to call Gene about the jury notice so that he could arrange to be off work or off jury.

Somehow in the process of dialing, I managed to turn the card over. It said nothing about Gene's reporting for jury duty. When he answered I said hello and waited very politely for him to state his reason for calling me.

Incidentally, during the trail, I learned that I was acting under what is legally called a sudden emergency. All I knew at the time, however, was that I was incoherent, which frightened Gene badly. A house on fire, an impending tornado or any other fore natural event he could have coped with easily enough. A speechless woman was something else again.

The first words I uttered were, "I cannot serve on a jury."

To the silly question why, I gave several reasons. I didn't know how. I didn't even know where to report.

Gene: "There's no prerequisite for serving on a jury except either owning property in the country or being married. As for where to go, you just ask the elevator attendant."

Me: "A fine husband you've turned out to be. You're supposed to protect me from jury notices and such."

Gene: "The lawyers will talk to the jury panel—that will be everybody who was notified to appear—and select the 12 needed for the jury."

Me: "I do know how many people are needed for a jury."

Gene: "Congratulations."

Me: "I know something else, too. I know people can get out of appearing. I've heard lots of people say they did it."

truly important were fair exchanges for the time spent.  
After the completion of the trial, Judge Cole talked to the jury, offering to answer questions, thanking us for our service.  
In closing his talk, Judge Cole said, "Without being too dramatic about this, I honestly believe jury duty is as necessary to a democracy as military service. Serving on a jury is a privilege as well as a duty. Only when people realize this, will they serve readily."  
Without being too dramatic about this, I agree with him.

According to Phillips, the good sportsman (those who realize the need for game and fish laws) have always been a great help to wardens, by reporting violators and suspicious activities. "They are wise in doing this. These individuals, along with the landowners, should be congratulated for this great service. Once again, as the hunting season arrives, violators can expect an ever-growing pressure as wardens and all good sportsmen join together to promote game law enforcement in Texas."

### State Acreage Allotments for '61 Cotton Set

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced state acreage allotments for the 1961 crops of upland and extra long staple cottons.  
The upland allotment for Texas was set at 7,849,196 acres which includes 10,686 acres as the State's share of the national reserve. The Agricultural Act of 1958 authorizes a national acreage reserve of 310,000 acres for appointment among the states on the basis of the estimated needs for additional acreage to establish minimum farm allotments as provided by legislation.  
The extra long staple acreage allotment for Texas was set at 21,893 acres out of the national allotment of 63,740 acres.  
The State allotment will be apportioned among the counties to establish county allotments and these will be further broken down among the individual farms of the counties in accordance with the provisions of the law and regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture.  
Farmers who were engaged in the production of cotton will vote in a national referendum on Dec. 13 to determine whether marketing quotas will be operative for the 1961 crop—upland and extra long staple. At least two-thirds of those voting must approve quotas if they are to continue in effect.  
Only one allotment-price support program will be available to upland cotton growers for 1961. If marketing quotas are approved in the referendum, price support will be available to upland growers who comply with their farm allotments at a level within the range of 70 to 90 percent of parity. The exact level of support will be announced at a later date. If quotas are not approved, allotments will remain in effect and price support at 50 percent of parity will be available to upland growers who comply with the allotment program.  
The USDA announcement noted that farm acreage allotments will be mailed to operators of cotton farms prior to the Dec. 13 referendum.

Wash and Wear Garments On Display Today

Wash and wear garments will be displayed at the Texas Electric Service Company in Eastland Tuesday and Wednesday when Mrs. Frances Rooney, TESCO home service advisor conducts a continuous demonstration of the benefits of the all-electric laundry. The display will include a number of washable items that have been washed and then dried electrically and similar items that have been dried on the line, to demonstrate the softer texture and freedom from wrinkles in the items dried electrically.

One of the most interesting displays will be identical sets of cotton prints that have been laundered 20 times. One piece in each set was dried each time in an electric dryer, a second piece was dried out of doors, and the third piece was left unlaundered as it came from the store shelf. This display shows the damaging effects of sunlight on prints and other washables. Mrs. Rooney also will have sets of bath towels that have been washed 20 times. One set was dried each time in an electric dryer and the other set was dried outdoors. It shows how the dryer keeps towels fluffier, retains their original colors and eliminates damage from wind whipping. Other items for comparison that have been dried in an electric dryer will include sweaters, corduroy garments, bath mats, men's shirts and sport slacks, and wash-and-wear lingerie.
