



Farm Census Shows County Farm Flight

A study of the 1959 census of agriculture which was released last week by the U. S. Department of Commerce shows there are 334 fewer farms in Eastland County than in 1954, but at the same time it indicates there are more acres now in farms than five years ago.

20 fruit-and-nut farms, 22 poultry farms, 17 dairy farms, 368 live stock farms, 185 livestock ranches, 36 general farms and 646 unclassified farms.

Circus Performances Are Set Wednesday

The circus will set up a tent city just west of the Eastland city limits on the Homer Williams place on Highway 80.

This will mark the first appearance of a big circus in this area in about seven years. He is a member of the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club.

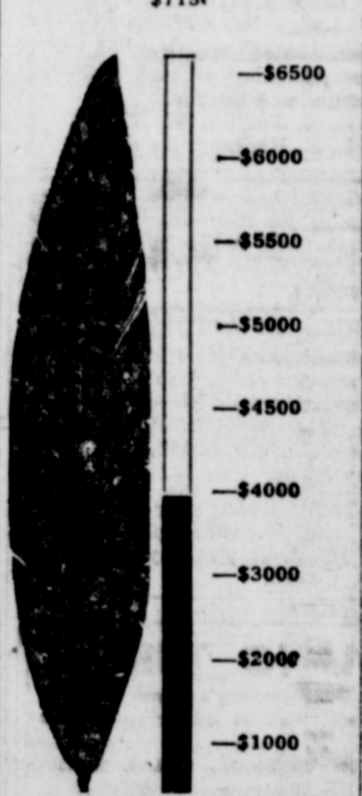

Ranger College received the opening kickoff to begin a first quarter defensive battle that saw only four first downs made in the first quarter. Six of the ten punts in the ball game was made in the first quarter. The only show of offensive power staged in the first quarter was a 39 yard pass play by Navarro that carried to the Ranger 30 yard line, at which point the Rangers stopped the drive and took over on downs.

In the second quarter Navarro mustered one good drive that carried to the Rangers one foot line, but the Ranger defense, which was outstanding during the entire game, held at that point by recovering a loose ball that bounced into the end zone on a Navarro fourth down attempt. Ranger took over on their own 20 and moved the ball out to midfield when the first half ended in a 0-0 deadlock.

Following a lengthy halftime period in which the Ranger High School Band, the Bomberettes of Farmers Branch, Navarro Seniors and Band, and the Range-anns, all performed and the Homecoming Queen's coronation took place, both teams came back with the defenses fired up even more than in the first half.

Ranger threatened one time in the third quarter when they moved the ball down to the Navarro 26 yard line after Pat Blakely recovered a fumble on the 30. A field goal attempt was blocked and Navarro took over on the 8 yard line. From this point Navarro moved into the fourth quarter with a drive that carried 98 yards, aided by a fumble recovery by Gus Candy on the Ranger 34 yard line, following a fumbled punt by Ranger's safety. The Rangers put up a goal line stand that held

Navarro to six yards in four tries, but the fourth down try made the goal line with only inches to spare. Halfback George Anderson carried the ball over and Bubba Hyler kicked the extra point to give Navarro a 7 point lead with five minutes gone in the fourth quarter.

Ranger came back following the kickoff with a determined drive led by Fullback Mike Leonard and Halfback Jerry House. The drive carried for 72 yards and a touchdown. A pass from Quarterback Clinton Humphrey to end Dick Stephenson, good for 20 yards, accounted for the score. The extra point try failed and Navarro still led 7 to 6.

Navarro received the kickoff and after three downs were forced to attempt a punt. The determined Ranger line rushed with Paul Free, Martin Day and Phillip Reed, blocked the punt and recovered the ball on the 30 yard line. From this point Ranger moved the ball down to the Navarro 14 yard line as time was running out. Kenneth Hari kicked the game-winning field goal.

Navarro had time to run three plays, but the Ranger defense, with five safeties playing deep to prevent a long pass, stopped Navarro's desperate passing attempts and time ran out with Ranger holding the 9 to 7 lead.

The Rangers will have an open date this week and travel to Brenham on Nov. 9, to take on Blinn in their final conference game.


