Banquet Honors Public Safety Men

Persons both within and outside the ranks of law enforcement should look upon it as a profession and not just another job, the head of the Department of Public Safety, said Thursday night in Midland.
Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., of Austin said Texans should do this because "law enforcement has lifted itself up by the bootstraps to where it is today."
The colonel was the featured speaker at a fleet safety banquet in Midland EEs Club, attended by approximately 100 law enforcement officials from throughout the state.
The banquet meeting was held specifically in order to award the 49-county DPS Region Four the first place award in the department's fleet safety contest.
Region Four with headquarters offices in Midland—includes Eastland, on the far eastern edge of the sprawling West Texas law enforcement area.
During the last year, personnel in the Midland region traveled almost 4,500,000 miles and their vehicles were involved in only one accident in each 347,000 miles traveled.
And in presenting the citation to Major Wilson E. Speir, the Region Four commander, Colonel Garrison complemented Speir and his men on their safe driving.
"We are professional police officers," he said.
"And as does the professional in any other field, we should work to set and maintain high standards of performance."
"Police generally are becoming aware that the police fleet is a challenge to management, and the fleet safety program is a management activity."
"The fleet safety contest is a management device designed to keep the attention of supervisors and officers alike focused on a serious and complex operation problem."
Also during his talk, Colonel Garrison said law enforcement officers "must be able to make split decisions in one second—and be right."
"We aren't allowed even one mistake," he asserted.
The DPS' veteran director termed law enforcement "that thin blue line between order and good government and anarchy."
The second place citation in the department's fleet safety contest went to the 48-county Waco DPS region—Region Six—and was presented to the region's commander, Major W. J. Elliott, by Lt. Col. Joe S. Fletcher of Austin, the DPS assistant director.
Host organization for the banquet was the Texas Motor Transportation Association, represented at the meeting by Jack Bryan, director of public relations and field service.
The master of ceremonies for the banquet was Sgt. Phil A. Zeissel of Austin, the fleet safety coordinator for the department.
Two Eastland law enforcement officers—Texas Highway Patrol Sgt. J. O. Turner and Motor Vehicle Inspection Patrolman Carl Boustead—were present for the banquet.

V. A. Denies The Endorsement of Any Solicitors

Door-to-door solicitors implying they represent the Veterans' Administration or have the endorsement of the VA for a product are acting without permission or authority.
This statement was issued today by Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA Regional Office at Dallas, in response to inquiries from individuals and groups seeking verification of verbal statements made by agents soliciting subscriptions or funds, or selling products in behalf of veterans.
"The VA does not endorse any product, project or commercial endeavor for the profit of individuals, organizations or corporations," Onstot said.
Onstot added that the VA neither endorses nor condemns door-to-door solicitations in behalf of veterans, but it advises those who may suspect claims made in such endeavors to check with their Better Business Bureau or any community organization acting in that capacity.

Director of Chanters In Eleventh Year

Dr. Richard C. von Ende, director of the McMurtry Chanters, who will appear Sunday morning at the First Methodist Church, is in his 11th year of touring with the mixed choir.
Dr. von Ende has had more than 25 years of teaching in the field of music, coming to McMurtry with 15 years under his belt.
Prior to coming to the Abilene institution, he was professor of music at Texas State College for Women. Before that he was head of the music department at Bethany College in Bethany, West Virginia. He previously served as public school music supervisor in Pennsylvania in the cities of Chicon, Butler and Pittsburg.
Dr. von Ende received his doctor's degree from the University of Pittsburgh. Both his masters and bachelors degrees in music were received at the College of Fine Arts, Carnegie Institute of Technology. He has done other post-graduate and post-doctoral study at Grove City College and Pennsylvania State College.
His wife, Gennie, is a member of the college faculty also. Resuming her teaching after a three-year leave of absence, Mrs. von Ende is assistant professor of ceramics.
