Clyde Smith to Play In New Mexico Event

Clyde Smith, center and middle linebacker on the Ranger College football team, has been selected to play in the Fifth National Junior College All-American football game to be played in Albuquerque, New Mexico, Dec. 10, 1960. The second football player at Ranger College to make All-American, he is one of 44 players selected from 130 American junior colleges that play football and will play with the East team.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Smith of Carrollton, Smith attended Carrollton High School, where he graduated in 1959. He was active in student affairs and received many honors while in Carrollton High. He was elected junior class favorite and best all-around senior boy. He was president of his senior class and was a member of the student council. He participated in football, basketball, and baseball, lettering in football and basketball two years and baseball three years. He served as captain of both the football and basketball teams in Carrollton High. In his senior year he was named on the all-district and all-area teams and received Honorable Mention on the all-state team. He also received a trophy as the outstanding athlete of his school his senior year.

At Ranger College Smith has participated in both football and basketball, lettering in both sports. He was chosen for the All-Texas Junior College Athletic Conference team in 1959. He was named Lineman of the Week in the Dallas Morning News JC Stars this fall for his performance in the Tyler Junior College - Ranger College game. A scrappy 185-pound center, Smith played a heroic line-backing role as the Rangers gave Tyler a big scare before losing 29-25 in the last four minutes of the game. Reflective Plates Reduce Rear-end Auto Collisions

Automobile license plates made of reflective material that glows brightly in the headlights of oncoming cars at night can effect significant reductions in rear-end collisions, the number one nighttime driving hazard, according to a report on the first national study of reflective plates conducted by the engineering experiment station of the University of Illinois.

Reflective plates on vehicles parked or stalled adjacent to unlighted highways enable an approaching motorist to detect and steer clear of the stopped vehicles in time to avoid rear-end collisions, the Illinois study indicates.

University engineers analyzed motor vehicle collision statistics compiled from 1955 to the present by the Department of Highways in Minnesota, one of the first states to adopt reflective plates, and concluded that a significant reduction in nighttime rear-end collisions could be attributed solely. Abey States Hungary Could be Free Today

Rotary Chief Puts Chief Blame On UN

Joseph A. Abey, president-elect of Rotary International, charged Monday in a speech at Eastland, that Hungary would be a free country today if the United Nations had taken the same steps during the Hungarian uprising that they have in the Congo.

Abey, who was speaking at a joint meeting of the Eastland, Ranger and Cisco Rotary clubs, recently returned from a visit to Hungary. He maintains that the man on the street in Hungary holds no ill-will toward the United States because this country did not come to their aid, but they are unhappy with the United Nations.

And he says that Hungarians today are hoping and praying for another world war. People behind the iron curtain believe that only a war between Russia and the free countries of the world can return their freedom.

Abey, who will become president of Rotary International July 1, was heard by Rotarians from Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Longview, Fort Worth, Stephenville, Abilene, Wichita Falls, Breckenridge and Brownwood at his luncheon address. On July 1 he will become chief executive of the worldwide service club which is comprised of more than 10,700 Rotary clubs with a membership of nearly 500,000 in 119 countries on six continents.

For the 1960-61 fiscal year, he is a director of Rotary International and a member of the executive committee of the board of directors. Abey has been publisher of six newspapers in Tennessee, Virginia and West Virginia and is now circulation director of the Reading, Penn. Eagle-Times.

The noted Rotarian was introduced by Bob Blake of Brownwood, district governor. Blake was introduced by Frank Denton, president of the Eastland club.

The Eastland Rotary quartet provided musical entertainment. Members are Bill Collins, Ronald Burton, Dick Spalding and Mack Beazley.

Speaking of the Hungarian uprising, Abey said he was proud of the fact that Rotarians in Vienna aided Hungarian refugees during the uprising.

Abey told of speaking to one

young girl who will soon become a teacher. She told him the Russian account of the Little Rock Ark. school strike. According to the Soviets President Eisenhower ordered out Federal troops to fight down the uprising Negroes and in one day alone ordered that 3,600 be killed.

Russia and the United States are now involved in an industrial war, Abey believes. He declared the Russians hope to destroy America by eliminating United States markets.

Iron curtain countries would like to join the Rotary team, the spokesman said, but they can't because of politics.

In conclusion, Abey urged Rotarians to give themselves to youth and to understanding. By doing so, he said, the world can have peace with the leadership ability "we now have."

State Farm Bureau Adopts Policies At Annual Meet

State policies to guide the Texas Farm Bureau's actions in the 57th Legislature next year were adopted by voting delegates to the organization's annual meeting Nov. 9-12 in Dallas.

Among the more important state-level issues on which policies were set by the convention are farm-to-market road construction, sales taxes, education and farm labor. Recommendations to the American Farm Bureau Federation convention in December on national matters were also adopted by the 678 voting delegates.

Delegates recommended that no charge be made in the present system of allocating funds for farm-to-market road construction. The further stated that present funds now earmarked to build and maintain roads should not be eliminated or diverted.

In the controversial field of taxation, the delegates defeated a proposal for a state sales tax and favored, instead, more economy in government, plus enforced collection of personal property taxes. The TFB is already on record favoring a tax on natural resources.

As for education, the convention favored local control of public schools, especially regarding financing and curriculum. They urged that the youth be taught more about the "true history of our Country, our Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and our free enterprise system."

Another major issue at the convention developed over a proposal for a constitutional amendment to permit a compulsory check-off, by force of government, to finance research and promotion programs or various commodities. The delegates turned it down flatly.

Several important resolutions on labor were approved. One recommends state legislation regulating transportation and housing of migrant agricultural labor. This is intended to pre-empt this (Continued on page two)

A special Thanksgiving service is announced by First Church of Christ Scientist for 11 a.m. on Thanksgiving Day.

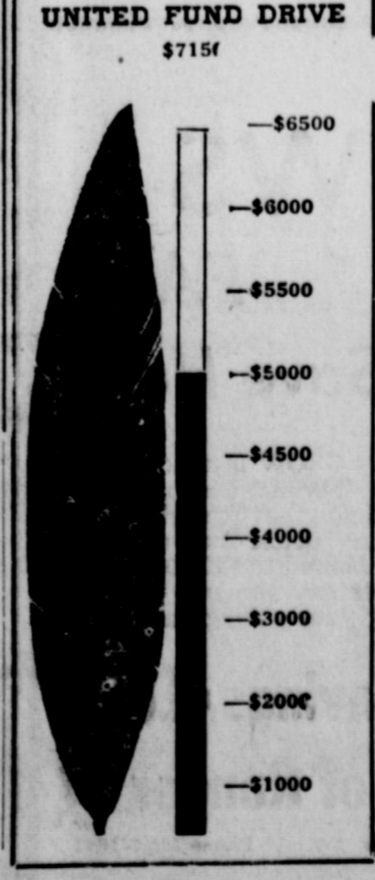
Opened to the general public, the service will be held in the Church Edifice at corner of Plummer and Lamar Streets in Eastland. No collections of any kind are to be taken at this service.

field and prevent federal intervention. Another resolution says that the TFB should begin an immediate investigation to determine farmers' rights and what protective measures can be taken against attempts to "force unionization" on farm workers.

In line with this, the convention went on record opposing licensing of crew leaders. The adopted resolution states: "An obvious aim of those who would license crew leaders is the forced and final unionization" of agricultural workers particularly "stoop labor." The delegates said that "while we defend the right of farm workers to organize and bargain collectively, it must be recognized that extreme fluctuations in weather and in farm commodity prices make it impractical, if not impossible, to impose industrial standards or industrial union wage scales and working conditions upon agriculture."

In other matters, the delegates also:

1. Recommended that pink bollworm regulations, especially in regard to okra harvest for seed, be tightened.
2. Favored the theory of competitive rating in casualty insurance "because we believe in the free enterprise system."
3. Opposed the present merit rating (point) system for casualty insurance.
4. Favored continuation of research for the control and eradication of anthrax, vesicular exanthema, foot and mouth disease, brucellosis, wheat poisoning, cattle grubs, blow fly, sand burn, and also scabies and scarpie in sheep.
5. Recommended that livestock entering state be subjected to strict enforcement of inspection regulations at the state boundary.
6. Recommended that mineral rights separated from the land be registered each year or terminated.
7. Reaffirmed previous policy on dis-annexation of farm land from city limits if utilities have not been provided within a five-year period.
8. Favored the publishing of attorney-legislators in local newspapers.
9. Favored limiting candidate to run for one office at a time.
10. Commend the peanut industry for establishing a voluntary program for financing research and promotion activities.
11. Favored stopping abuses under welfare programs and making public names of recipients.
12. Favored licensing of farm-used trucks on a monthly basis.

ly to the use of reflective materials on state license plates.

Reflective license plates, adopted by ten states, have secondary safety functions on the highway by increasing visibility of vehicles with faulty taillights and enabling motorists to determine the position of cars with only one headlight operating, the study reveals. They are also useful in aiding nighttime depth perception, the engineers say.

The primary value of reflective plates is to increase the visibility of cars left parked or stalled with lights out on unlighted streets or rural highways, areas in which nighttime rear-end collisions are common.
