The show will be held in the Rawson Building, same site as the 1959 show, it was said. A quart of pecans constitutes an entry according to Hank Sims, Eastland, president of the growers group. Entries must be in by 9 A.M. on the 14th. They may be left at either the Cisco or the Ranger Chambers of Commerce office in those two towns or in the county agents office in Eastland prior to this date however.

Nuts entered must have been grown in 1960 by the person exhibiting them. All first place entries will be sent to A&M College for the state show. Growers are limited to one entry each of the 'improved' or papershell varieties but there is no limit on the number of native seedling entries he may show.

H. G. Hancock, Horticulturist from the A&M College Extension Service will again head a judging team that will begin work, on the large number of entries expected, shortly after noon on the 14th of December. Completion of the judging will likely not be until mid-afternoon on the 15th. The show has been rated as the largest in the state.

Varieties of nuts with less than three entries will be judged and ribbons and cash premiums awarded. Those with three or more entries will receive both cash and ribbons. Those wishing a copy of the rules and regulations may obtain one from Ben McKinnis, Secretary - Treasurer, Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, Eastland, Texas.

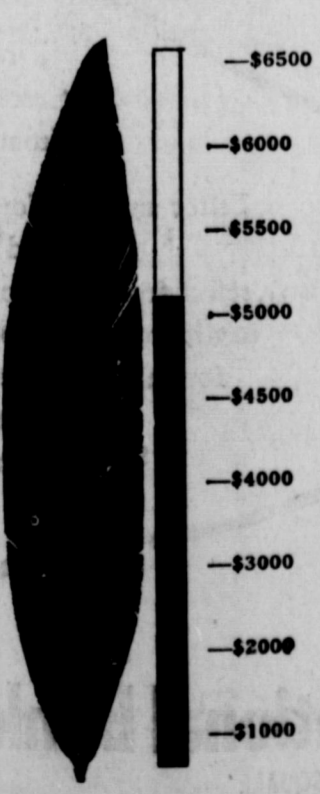
Commissioners Have Routine Meet Monday

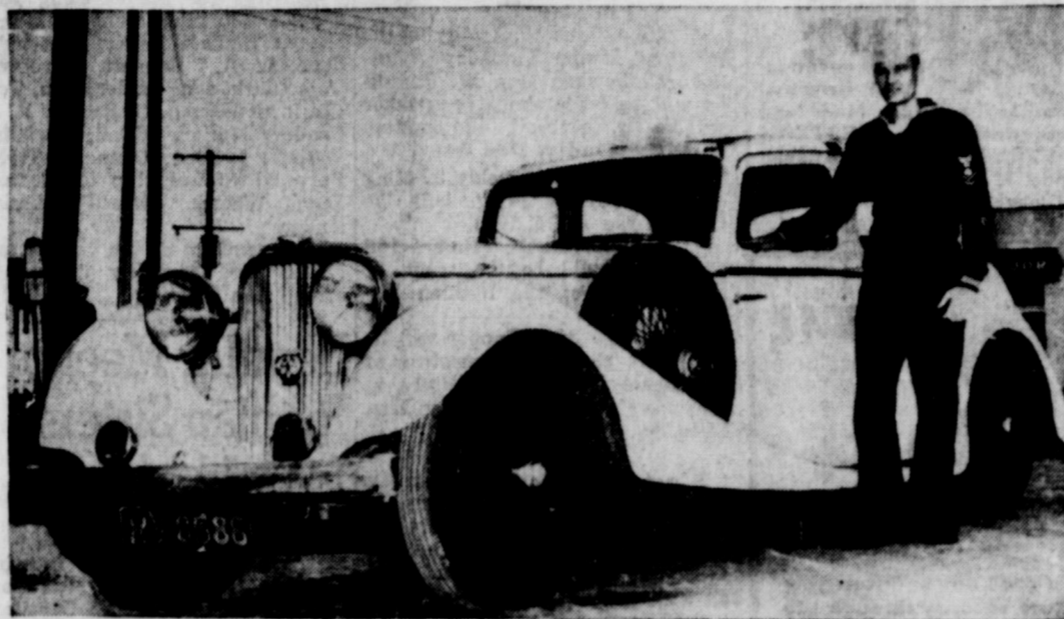

Armed Bandit Gets \$130 Cash

A lone armed bandit walked into the Blackwell Gulf Service Station on Highway 80 in Ranger shortly after 1 a.m. Tuesday, pulled a gun out of a paper bag and relieved the station attendant of approximately \$130 in cash.

Frank Maupin, the station attendant, said that the bandit walked in and pulled the gun out of the paper bag and told him to put all the money into the bag. The bandit then asked Maupin's billfold and Maupin asked him to leave him the papers and cards out of the billfold. The bandit looked into the billfold and seeing that there was only \$7 in it, tossed it back to Maupin and said, "you might need this for your family."

The bandit then took Maupin back to a storage room in the back of the station and tied him up with adhesive tape. Maupin freed himself in a few minutes but the bandit had made his escape before Maupin could get a look at the get-away-car.

Officers were notified within fifteen minutes of the holdup and a description was put on the police radio.

City Police, Constable Ralph Veal and Deputy Sheriff Johnny Boyd are working on the case but no clues have been located at the present time.

Lone Star Gas Company is laying an additional 47 miles of natural gas gathering pipe lines in the West Central Texas counties of Palo Pinto, Erath and Stephens.

The extended gathering system provides a market outlet for some 37 recently completed wells in the three counties, a Lone Star official said. The additional gas will be transported to the Dallas-Fort Worth area, he reported.

Cost of the new gathering lines is estimated to be in excess of \$750,000, it was noted.

The new pipe lines are being laid as a result of several recently negotiated gas purchase contracts covering more than 200,000 acres in the three counties. Development of this acreage is continuing and is expected to accelerate during the next two years, the Lone Star official said.

The additional gas will be transported through Lone Star's previously announced 52-mile, 18-inch transmission pipe line scheduled for construction from Springtown to Gordon early next year.

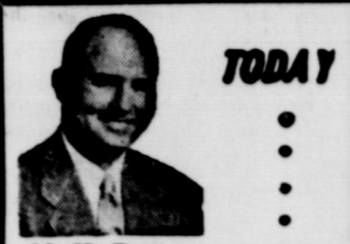

Veterinarian Gives Advice On Buying Breeding Gilts

College Station — Be cautious when you buy gilts to breed for next spring's pig crop. Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian, warns that you should study the disease record of the herd very carefully before buying. Remember that even healthy appearing animals may carry a disease, and new stock could bring on a disease which would result in abortions or inferior gilts at farrowing time.
At least four chronic diseases are serious, and other diseases are important. Leptospirosis and brucellosis are serious diseases which are not usually recognized until they cause abortions. Two other serious diseases are atrophic rhinitis and virus pneumonia, both of which are not usually recognizable until the pigs are several weeks old. Enteritis and chronic erysipelas are also common diseases, Patterson continues.
Even if there is no record or evidence of disease in the herd, it's still a good idea to have gilts tested for leptospirosis and brucellosis. Hogs can carry other of these diseases without showing symptoms, and both diseases can be transmitted to humans.
The only way to detect atrophic rhinitis is through a physical examination, and this is not always easy or reliable. Dr. Patterson says to be alert for signs of atrophic rhinitis, crooked snout, sneezing and stunted growth are indicators of the disease.
Chronic pneumonia has been an increasingly serious problem in swine for several years. A specific virus is the cause of much of this lung trouble. There is neither a reliable test or treatment for the disease. It seldom causes death, but it does cause unthriftiness and increased susceptibility to other lung infections. Be extremely careful to avoid bringing it into a herd, the specialist advises.
Take care of parasites promptly. Parasites, especially mange and worms, which may cause little trouble in the gilts may cause serious trouble for the baby pigs. Roundworms can be controlled by

proper measures, but it may take repeated applications. Spraying for parasites should be done during warm weather if possible. Some of the newer compounds will do a good job of controlling lice and mange.
Be sure to have the gilts vaccinated against erysipelas. And do not neglect to vaccinate for cholera—the most dangerous of all swine diseases, Dr. Patterson concludes.
