

First Christmas Daze Is Friday

The biggest Christmas shopping program ever tried in Eastland will be inaugurated Friday night when Eastland stores open from 6 to 10 p.m. to welcome Santa Claus and hundreds of holiday shoppers.

There will be hundreds of dollars worth of merchandise certificates given away. Santa will be seated on his throne on the north side of the square to pass out candy to all the boys and girls and a special music program will be presented by the Junior High School band on the south side of the square.

Santa's helpers will mingle among the holiday shoppers handing out some 250 gift certificates. Some of the certificates are worth free merchandise, others can be cashed at any Eastland store for any article the lucky person desires and others are worth large cash discounts on items.

And there are some real attractive certificates. For instance winners will be able to get a \$14.95 dress of their choice for just \$4.95 at one store. Another store will give a \$25 certificate on the purchase of a TV set; another 10% off on any merchandise in the store, another \$15 off on the purchase of any coat costing \$24.95 or more; and another \$5 off on the purchase of two new tires.

Those are just a few of the real bargains available. Other stores are giving out certificates offering merchandise free if you just visit them before Dec. 24. This is the first of three Christmas Daze promotions. The next two will be held on Friday, Dec. 16 and Friday, Dec. 23. One other thing! If you receive a certificate and cash it in, you will be eligible to have your name placed in the hopper for the following Friday night and again Dec. 23. Fifty dollars will be given away both of those nights. And if you don't like to walk there will be free sleigh-rides all over Eastland.

Extra cash premiums will be paid on the top native seedling nuts exhibited at the eighth Annual Eastland County Pecan Show, to be held in Cisco, 14-15, it was announced today by Hank Sims, Eastland, president of the County Pecan Growers Association.

Sims' organization with the Cisco Chamber of Commerce are jointly sponsoring the affair which also includes a pecan bake show and a pecan queen contest.

An extra \$25 has been made available, through a voluntary contribution, for the owners of the winning entries of nuts in both the named and the unnamed native seedling nuts, commonly called "natives", in the pecan growers' jargon.

In both divisions the extra prizes are \$6 for first, \$4 for second and \$2.50 for third.

Entries from any nurseries are prohibited for the above prizes.

The named seedling is a nut that bears some resemblance to its probable parent, an improved or papershell variety. The unnamed native seedling is one that does not bear any resemblance to any so called improved or papershell variety.

The above is in addition to the regular premium of 1 for first and 75c for second place in both divisions.

The National Pecan Shellers and Processors Association, Chicago, will award a trophy to both the grand champion seedling and the grand champion improved variety.

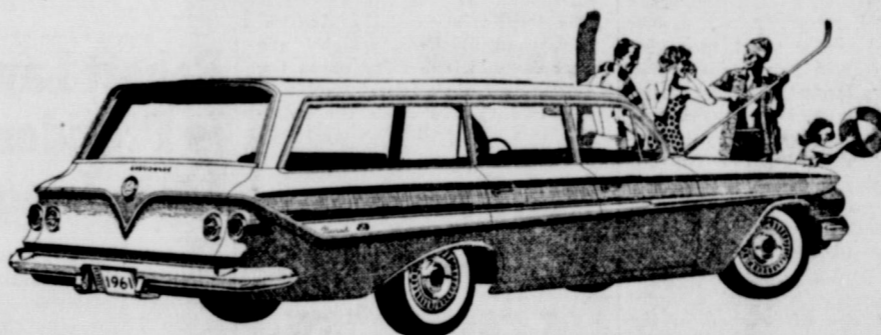

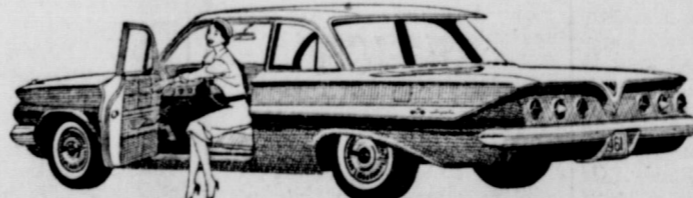

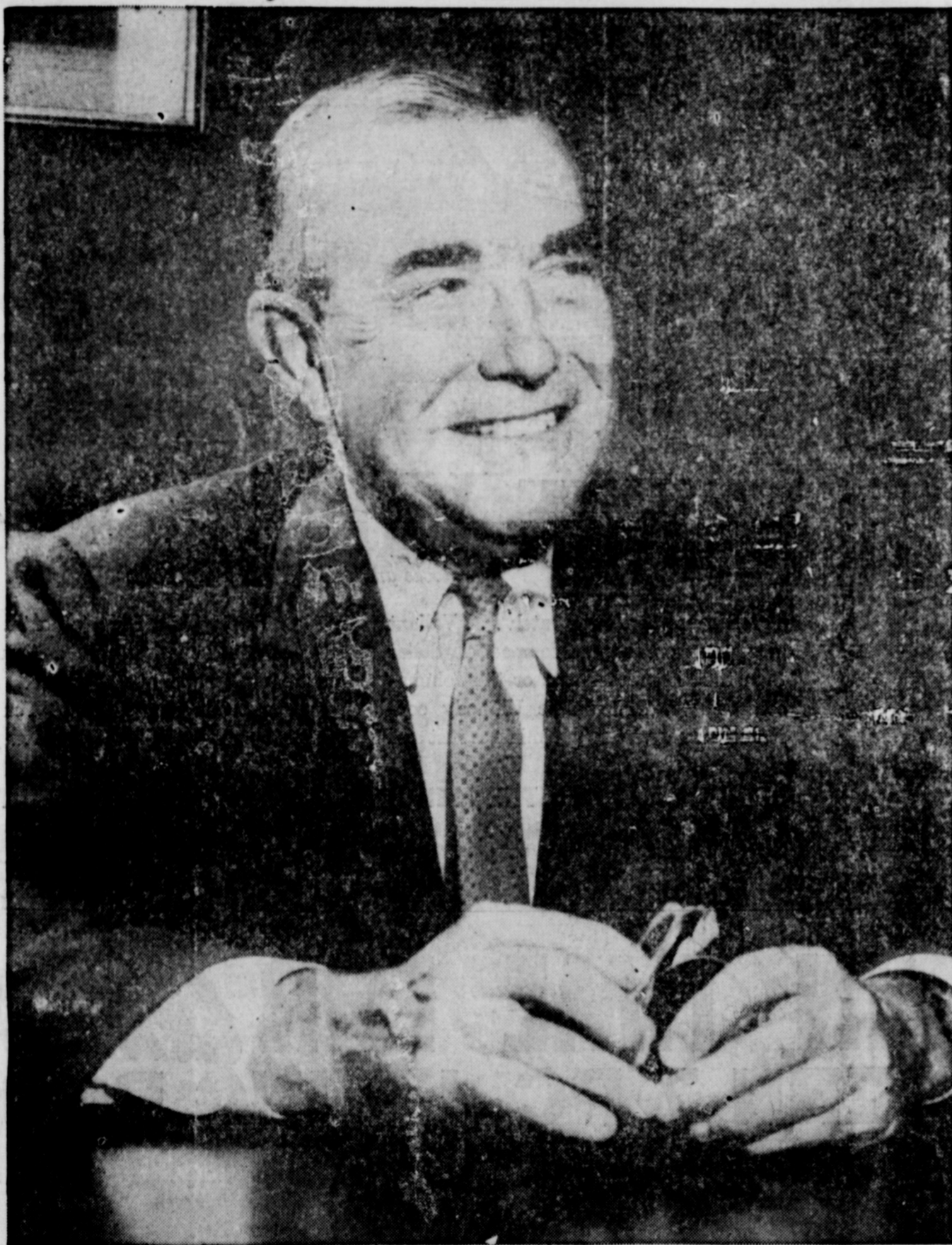

The chief complication of statistics is entitled "Accidental Poisoning by Gases and Vapors." Published by the Texas State Department of Health, it says there were 44 such deaths in Texas in 1959.

Some were caused by open gas jets which should have been closed tightly or capped when in prolonged disuse. Others were the result of inhaling certain toxic chemical substances.

But most poisonings by "gases and vapors" are the direct result of carbon monoxide - the silent killer.

During the chilling days of winter, hardly a week goes by that someone somewhere in Texas does not die from carbon monoxide poisoning.

Such deaths come under the broad heading of "accidental", but a more apt heading would be "careless".

The fact of the matter is that carbon monoxide poisoning is the end result of improperly adjusted heaters, leaky vents or none at all, and lack of ventilation in rooms where any kind of fire is burning.

Perhaps the greatest danger lies in the tasteless, odorless, and colorless character of carbon monoxide. Unless you have complicated testing equipment and keep checking about every 15 minutes, there is absolutely no warning of the presence of the gas until symptoms appear.

Even these symptoms are masked. A seemingly mild headache, slight watering eyes or a touch of stomach upset are easily mistaken for a cold; when they may really be early symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning.

If sleeping in a closed room with a faulty heater burning, death may come without waking or warning. In fact most carbon monoxide deaths follow this pattern.

Regardless of the heating fuel, precautions must be taken, since carbon monoxide is the result of incompletely burned fuel.

Proper venting should be installed with outlets leading outside the building and carefully checked for leaks. Under all conditions ventilation is a must, if nothing more than a "cracked" window. (A weekly feature from Public Health Education Division.)

I Give You Texas

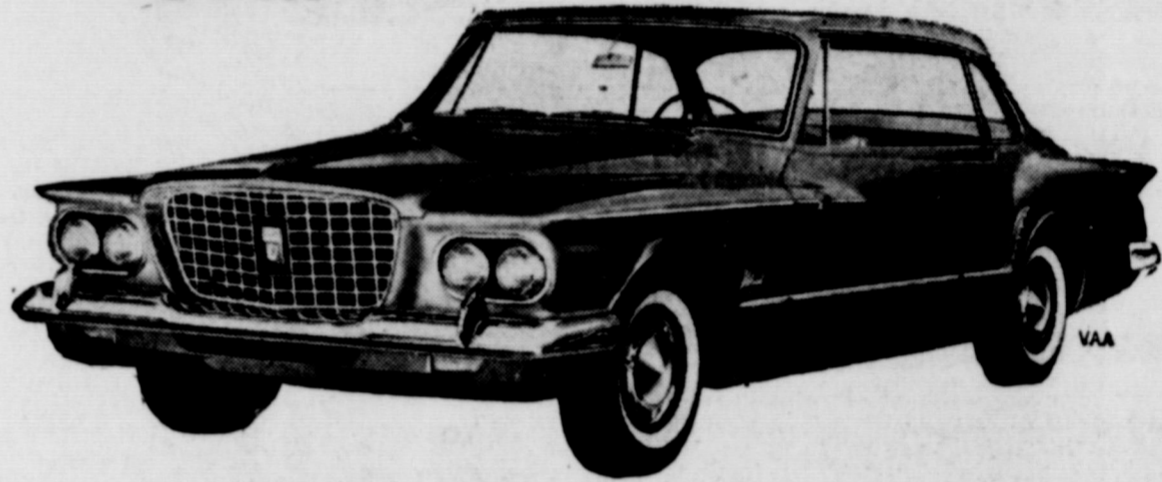
Participation in the clinic is limited to tax practitioners and representatives of large industrial establishments. The Internal Revenue Service says space and ma-

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Good Farm Records Can Boost Income

Extra income can come from well kept farm or ranch business records. Some errors in business decisions are unavoidable, points out C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist, but adequate records can often help farmers and ranchmen reduce the chance of wrong ones.

Records of 1960 operations may prove very helpful by showing the amount of income from various enterprises and total gross receipts; indicating the total cash expenses and reflecting items of greatest outlay; aiding in determining depreciation deductions for tax purposes and reflecting the amount of net profit or loss for the year. Profit or loss, says Bates, should

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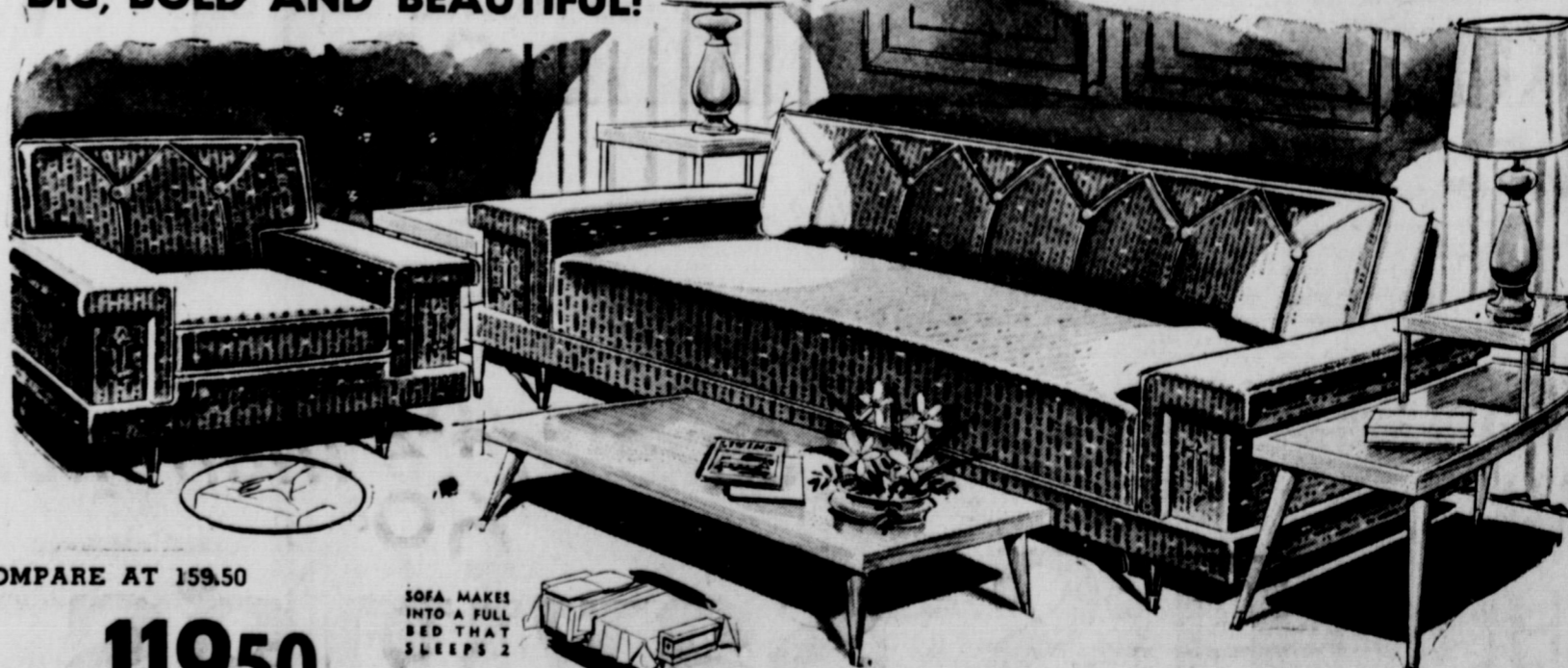

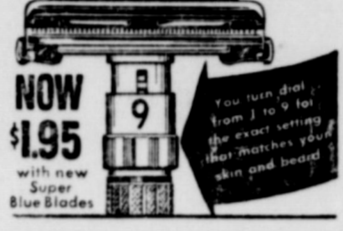

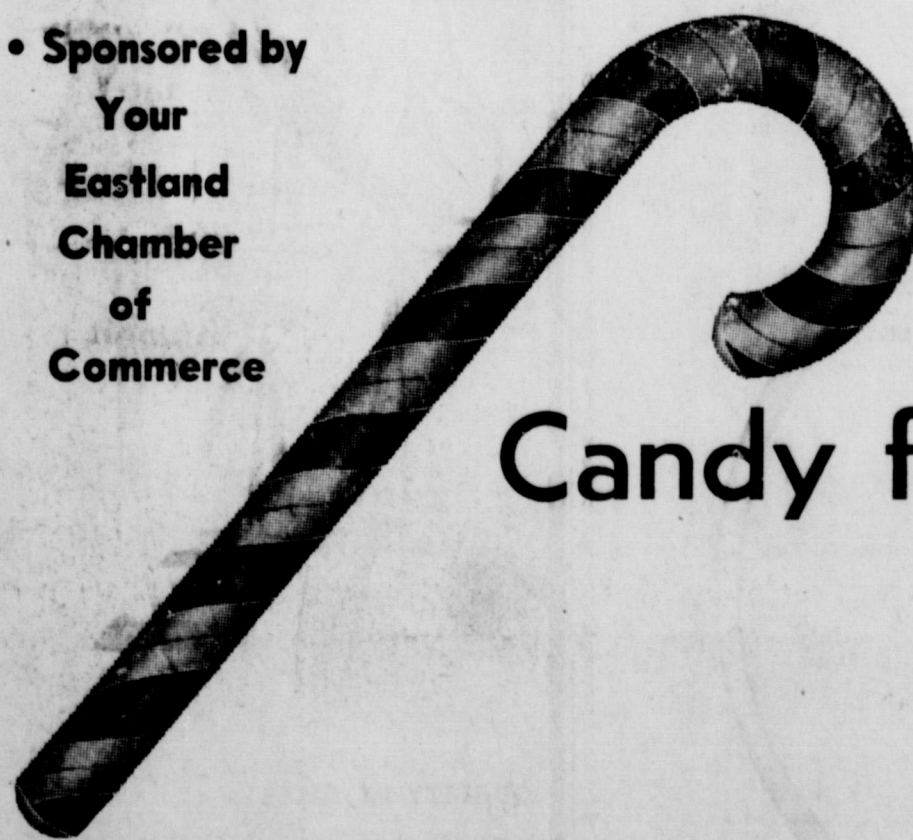

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Space Program Mission Assigned To Air Reserve

The selection of 434th Troop Carrier Wing Air Force Reserve to augment Air Force Space Capsule Recovery Operations is the result of an Air Force decision to use the capabilities of its reserve forces in the space program.

The decision, previously announced by Dr. Joseph V. Charyk, Under Secretary of the Air Force, in a speech to the National Guard Association on October 11, listed three mission areas involved. They are: Space Capsule; Space Surveillance; and, Airlift Support of Missile Site Activities. The 434th Wing commanded by Brig Gen John O. Bradshaw, has its headquarters at Barkalar AFB, Ill. The Wing will continue in its present Troop Carrier role with a wartime assignment to Tactical Air Command and will have Capsule Recovery as an additional Mission.

Under present plans, each of the three squadrons which presently fly C-119 aircraft, will have three or four specially equipped C-119's to be used when the space program includes recovery of capsules over land masses. Aircraft for space capsule recovery will come from the 6594th Group in Hawaii. Remaining crews will be trained at the home stations of the Air Force Reserve Troop Carrier Squadrons.

The 6594th Recovery Control Group received world-wide recognition for its recovery of the Discoverer XIV Capsule on August 19 and the Discoverer XVII Capsule on November 14.

The 69th Troop Carrier Squadron located at the U. S. Naval Air Station (Hensley Field), commanded by Lt Col William J. Crandall, is equipped with C-119 aircraft. How the local unit will fit into any new mission, such as the 434th Troop Carrier Wing has been assigned, cannot be ascertained at this time, Col Crandall announced.

In view of the announced Air Force policy of deriving productive peacetime benefit from the training of its Air Reserve Forces, we look forward to any assignment in this or any other program.

Regulations On Holiday Jobs For Teenagers

There may be ample time for gift buying in the 30 shopping days before Christmas, but the time is shorter for youngsters seeking holiday jobs.

"Many types of employment are permitted for high school students under the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act," according to Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions in Dallas.

The Fair Labor Standards Act regulates child labor in interstate commerce or in the production of goods for interstate and foreign commerce. It requires a minimum age of 16 for most such jobs and an 18 year minimum for jobs in 15 types of hazardous occupations.

But, he said, the federal law permits children as young as 14 and 15 to work as sales clerks and office employees in retail stores and other businesses and industrial firms — provided they work no more than 8 hours a day or 40 hours a week when school is not in session. When school is in session children of these ages are limited to working 3 hours a day or 18 hours a week, and all their work must be done outside school hours and between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

A much wider range of jobs is open to older boys and girls, according to Mr. Rogers. But he reminded them of the hazardous occupations which require a minimum age of 18. Two of those are found frequently in business and industry — they are the jobs of motor vehicle driver and helper, and elevator operator. He said that work involving riding on a freight elevator, unless it is run by an assigned operator, is also prohibited to minors under 18.

The Labor Department official said employers could protect themselves against inadvertent violations of the child-labor provisions of the law by insisting that each young worker provide an age certificate showing him to be of acceptable age for the job. In Texas such age certificates are issued as a public service by Texas Employment Commission's local offices.

But many holiday jobs, including some in local retail stores, may not come under the federal law but may be subject to state law. In cases where the state and federal laws differ, employers should observe the higher standards, he said.

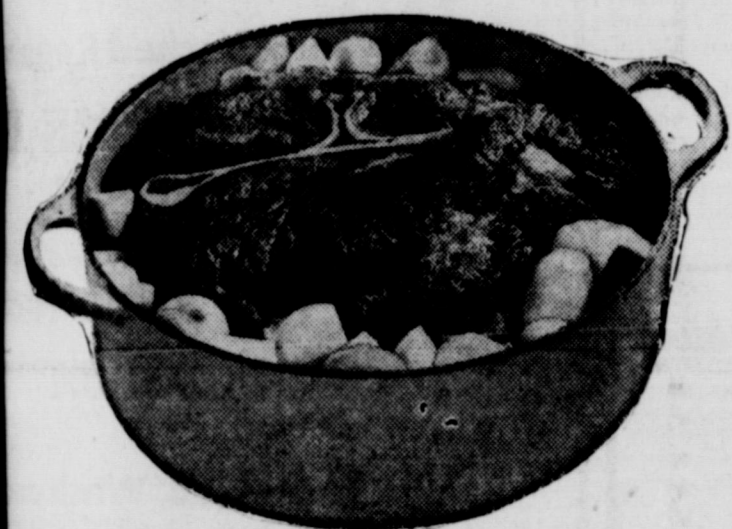



Program Earns Lasker Award Crippled Children

Pioneering a program of medical care which has vitally helped four and a quarter million handicapped children in the past 23 years has earned the Crippled Children's Program of the federal Children's Bureau a 1960 Albert Lasker Award.

The awards are made annually for "breakthroughs in medical research and advances in public health programs directly benefiting millions of human beings throughout the world" by the American Public Health Association.

This year's presentations were made by the Association and the Albert and Mary Lasker Foundation in New York last October.

The Crippled Children's Program, mainly administered by individual states, emphasizes high quality care and is widely approved by physicians, hospitals and local communities throughout Texas and the United States.

In Texas the total cases per year has risen an average of 14.3 percent per year from 4,532 cases in 1956 until 1959 with a record total of 6,473 cases.


Under the law basically, any child under 21 years of age and unable to pay is eligible provided he may be cured or his condition corrected so that he may be returned to a future of productive adulthood.

Children cared for under Texas' crippled children's program suffer a variety of conditions needing corrective treatment, devices, hospitalization or a corrective operation for certain conditions.

A breakdown of classes of cases shows most children under the program, administered by the Division of Crippled Children's Services of the State Health Department, need orthopedic services according to 1959 figures.

They are: congenital malformations—1,832; other disease handicapping conditions—874; diseases of bones and joints—978; cerebral palsy—732; and poliomyelitis after-effects—780.

Plastic repair of cleft palate and harelip—574—and burns—364—also account for a large portion in addition to other conditions including congenital heart lesions making up 339 registered cases in 1959.
