Storage stocks of turkeys on October 1, 1958 reached a new record for that month, 161 million bounds almost three times the 10-year average for that date. Mc-Haney predicts that production in 1959 will approach or exceed the record and that prices to growers will be lower.

Reasons behind this prediction include the increasing extent which turkey production is being encouraged by financing, contracting and organization similar to plans followed by the broiler industry. If integration proves as successful in turkey production it has in the broiler business, McHaney believes that production will be maintained at high levels in future years.
