BOYS AND GIRLS WIN

Junior High Sweeps Meet

Eastland and Olden made a clean sweep of the Olden Junior High School tournament, with Eastland's boys and girls winning both championships and Olden taking both the boys and girls consolation crowns.

Eastland's boys downed Lingleville 34-11, for championship honors and the girls handed tough Olden their first setback of the year in winning, 33-31.

For Eastland's girls it was the eighth win of the year without a loss. The game was the first real contest of the year for Eastland, in fact.

Eastland's boys won their eighth game in nine starts.

Judy Seabery scored 13 points in the game against Carbo and had 43 for the entire tournament. Wanda Arther had 10 points against Carbo and 41 for the tournament and Kay Morton scored 34 points.

J. D. Ables was high scorer for the boys with 17 points against Lingleville. He had 42 points during the entire tournament. Gary Culpepper scored six points in the finals, Wayne Harris had seven and Tommy Beck eight.

Olden's girls beat Lingleville's girls for the consolation honors and Olden's boys downed Desdemona in the consolation finals.

Routine Meeting Is Held Monday By Commissioners

County Commissioners held a routine meeting Monday, completing their morning with a tour of the jail.

Commissioners accomplished the following business:

(1) Heard reports of County Agent J. M. Cooper and Assistant County Agent Curtis Boase.

(2) Accepted the resignation of Elbert Denton as justice of the peace of Precinct 5.

(3) Okayed the purchase of a pickup truck for Precinct 4 (Cisco) from A & G Motor Co. of Cisco.

(4) Approved a motion to advertise for bids on a new truck from Precinct 1 (Ranger-Eastland).

(5) Okayed the re-financing of a \$9000 note by Precinct 4, in order to reduce the interest from six percent to four percent. The road machinery note will be repurchased by the First National Bank of Cisco. Commissioner Carl Lamb said the move would save the county \$128 in interest.

(6) Authorized County Clerk Johnson Smith to determine if the office of registrar of births and that of justice of the peace could be split.

(7) Decided to tour the jail to see if repairs requested are needed.

Kenneth D. Butler of Eastland received word last week that his brother-in-law, D. Henry Tilton of Washington, D. C., died of a heart attack Thursday night.

Mr. Tilton was recently retired from the State Department.

Gray Matter—

Joe Joins Ranks of Anti-We Writers

According to his own column, the good editor of the Eastland Telegram is thinking seriously of getting out of the ranks of those columnist who use "we" when they really mean "I" and coming over and joining the common herd. Virgil's old buddy from the plains, Editor Joiner of the Rolls Banner made a New Year's resolution this year that he was through with his oring ways of saying "we" for "I". Joiner departed from the ways of his youth and now calmly writes "I" for "I" and "we" for "we". It makes his column so much more interesting. I doubt if he'll ever fall from grace on this score again.

One of the great mysteries of this life is why some newspaper people use "we" for the first person singular. I guess I've thumbed through just about half the English books written, some of them were still in the manuscript stage and never saw the light of print, but I can't find any real justification for using "we."

The only time it seems to be proper to me is when the writing represents the actual collective thinking of a group of people, such as a thought arrived at after a conference of a board of editors and the editorial coming into print as a result of that conference represented the collective thinking of the people at the conference. This would sanction the use of "we" in a policy-making or policy-stating editorial of a paper with more than one editorial writer or with more than one editor, but for a regular one horse job, I don't see any use in the so-called editorial "we" except in those few cases where it does mean "we" and refers to something more than the thoughts of the individual writer.

But we do see "we" used these days by almost all the columnist in place of "I." I asked some of these fellows why they do it and the answers are a little surprising. Some of them try to pass off an excuse that almost everyone else does it, so why shouldn't they. Once in awhile a columnist tells me that he thinks "we" less egotistical than "I." He argues that "I" is the most egotistical word in the English language and it shouldn't be used any more than one can help. On the other hand I argue that there are times when "I" is the best word that can be used under the circumstances, so why not use it instead of going around the block to go to the nearest corner. Sure, "I" is an egotistical word. That's the definition of the word "I." But to turn the thing around a bit and compare the thing by calling one's own self "we" seems to be more egotistical than to say "I" when "I" is meant.

Can one be more egotistic than to attempt to pass one's self off as being more than one person and assume the identity of a group? Perhaps so, but I doubt it.

An interesting example of how some people can use the first person plural when referring to the first person singular is the case of the amusement columnist of a paper in one of our larger Texas cities. This fellow, was writing about his New Year's "watch" party (they must have been watching the glass) and telling about how badly he felt the next morning.

His head was aching so badly he said something about "our heads splitting wide open and our eye-balls almost pulling themselves right out of our heads."

Abilene Reveals Plans to Move Court of Appeals

Taylor County took another step forward Monday in efforts to move the 11th District Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland to Abilene.

Abilene has long had its eye on the juicy court plum, but the Monday effort, announced as a plan to take the court away from Eastland, was the first open shot fired in what promises to be a real battle.

Eastland County citizens were already unhappy with Abilene for their opposition to a plan in the last Legislature which would have strengthened the 91st District Court. Now the Abilene announced goal is to move the 11th Court of Civil Appeals.

Taylor County Commissioners voted Monday to buy six lots on the block east of the courthouse. The Abilene Reporter-News said this would be "... for future expansion purposes and with the possibility in mind that the 11th Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland might eventually come here."

"There has been some work here this year designed to bring about introduction of a bill in this Legislature to bring about the move," the Reporter - News declared.

"Proponents here feel that chances of the move could be enhanced by any action taken by Taylor County to facilitate such a move, such as providing suitable quarters for the court."

The Reporter - News stated that Taylor County Commissioners said it may be at least three years before an actual building program is started. It was emphasized, however, that Abilene would like to get the present Legislature to vote in favor of moving the court.

M. O. Hazard, Staff Native, Dies In Home

Funeral services for M. O. Hazard, a native of Staff, will be held Wednesday at 2:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church in Eastland with Rev. K. C. Edmonds of Ranger, Rev. Tommy Knott of Staff and Rev. Harvey Kimbler of Eastland officiating.

Mr. Hazard was found dead in his home this morning. He apparently had suffered a heart attack. He was born March 26, 1881 in Staff and had lived in that community all of his life. At 77 he was still active as a rancher.

Mr. Hazard was a member of the Staff Baptist Church. He was preceded in death last year by his wife. Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Allen Crosby of Staff and Mrs. Bill McFadden of Duncan, Okla.; one step-daughter, Mrs. Jewell Foville of Desdemona; three sons, Maurice of Eastland, Boyd of Morton Valley and Owen of Odessa; one brother, Cotard Hazard of Eastland; one sister, Mrs. Pearl Bourland of Eastland; 17 grandchildren, and 23 great-grandchildren.

Burial will be in Eastland Cemetery under direction of Hamners Funeral Home.

Dyess Major Says US Ready to Strike Back

Maj. Wayne M. Spray of Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene, Monday gave Eastland Rotarians a new idea of the job which the Strategic Air Command is doing. Speaking at the club's regular noon luncheon, Maj. Spray pointed out that SAC is now able to attack any point in the world on "a very short notice."

He told Rotarians that Dyess now has some 6,000 airmen stationed in Abilene. There are 1,000 homes on the base itself and an additional 2,000 families from Dyess live in Abilene. Maj. Spray estimated that because of the air base, 20,000 persons are added to the Abilene community.

Henry Fullman was in charge of the program.

He said this ability to strike back has kept "... us out of a major war since 1946."

Dyess AFB is a member of the SAC command. Spray pointed out that the United States has bases which completely circle Russia, and SAC bases are located all over the world.

Following a brief talk, the visiting officer and Sgt. J. M. Massey showed film slides. Maj. Spray gave a running commentary on the slides.

School Census Is In Progress In Eastland

Parents who will have a child entering the public schools for the first time next year, and have not already registered their child with one of the local public school faculty members were urged today to contact one of the local principals at the school not later than Friday, January 29, in order for the child to be placed on the S-holastic Census for the 1959-60 school year.

In order for a child to enter the first grade next year the birthdate must be on or before Sept. 1, 1953. Supt. Wendell Siebert said, "It is very important that all children who will enter the first grade next year be placed on the official census, and if you already have a child in school you will automatically be contacted by one of the faculty members." Siebert explained, "If it is possible however, for the school to know about your beginning 1st grader if there are no other brothers or sisters in school at present, and it will be necessary for the parent to personally contact the school in such instances."

Ballinger, on the other hand, beat Ranger, 54-36, and Winters, 60-47, but lost to Cisco, 55-49, and to Coleman, 55-38.

Only Ranger appears to be out of the title picture. The Dogs have lost four straight. Eastland, Ballinger and Winters all have 2-2 records and Coleman and Cisco have 3-1 records.

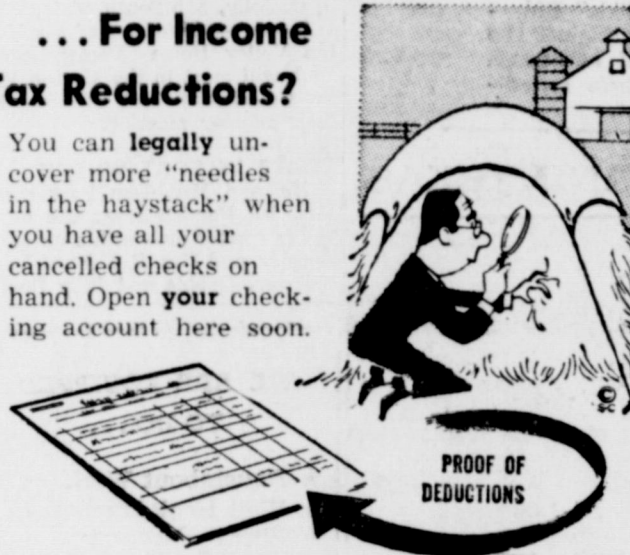
