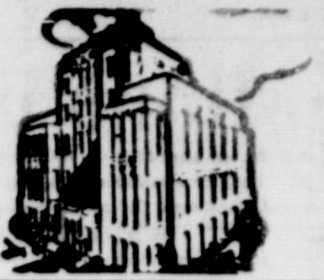

## Army Recruiter Is In Eastland Each Wednesday

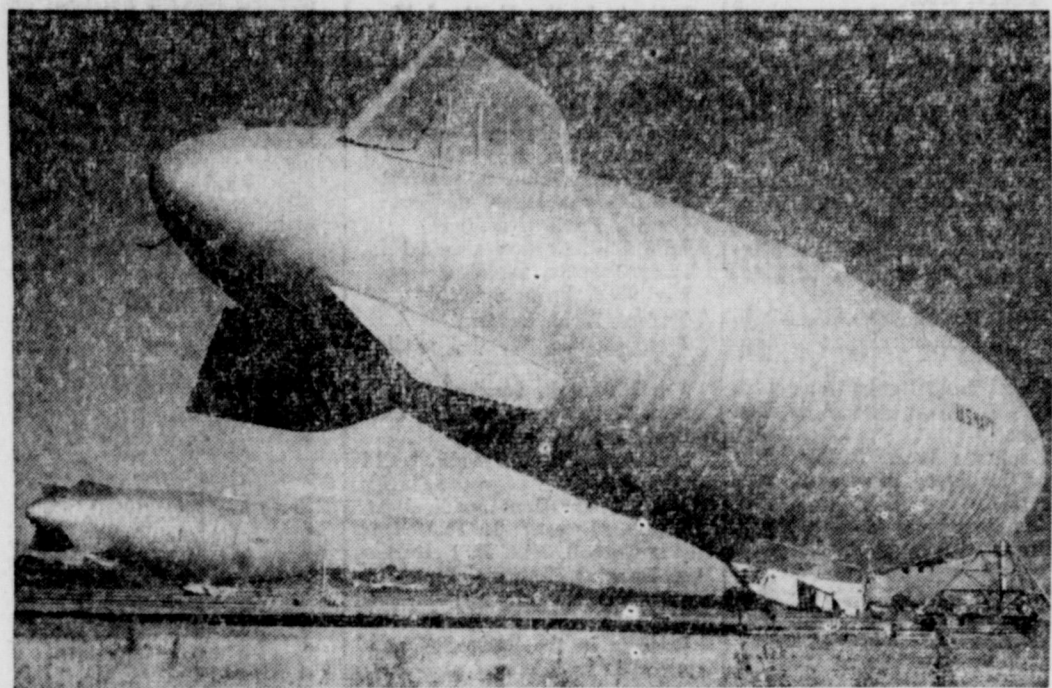
Another U. S. Army Gyroscopic enlistment option is now available to qualified young men who desire to go to Europe, S.F.C. G. H. Barnes, announced today.

The new option allows young men who qualify to enlist for the 1st Battle Group, 15th Infantry, with assignment in Europe.

This makes three pentomic units for which qualified young men may enlist to serve in Europe. The other units are the 2nd Battle Group, 4th Infantry, and the 2nd Reconnaissance Squadron, 7th Cavalry. All of the units are elements of the 3rd "Rock of the Marne" Infantry Division. The 3rd Infantry Division is one of the most decorated divisions in the U. S. Army.

Anyone enlisting for service with one of the units may take advantage of the "buddy enlistment," which allows qualified young men and their friends to join together and choose the same unit and overseas assignment.

Further information on qualification requirements and termination of these three Gyroscopic enlistment options may be obtained from SFC Barnes at the local Draft Board each Wednesday.

Designed for potential use in connection with Uncle Sam's radar warning nets, both of the flying "eyes" have a capacity of about 1,500,000 cubic feet of helium in their gas cells. Twenty-one men crew each blimp, and each is powered by two outrigger-mounted engines.

# City's Fire Losses Are At High Mark In 1958

Eastland fire losses were the highest they have been in the last three years in 1958, Chief Billy Jack Johnson said today in releasing his annual report.

Chief Johnson announced that losses totaled \$20,000 during the past year. Those were losses reported to the Fire Department. He said that it is possible that losses reported to insurance companies, but not to him, may increase the 1958 total.

While the losses were higher than in recent years, Chief Johnson said he did not think the city's present low insurance key rates would be affected.

Two large fires were blamed for most of the losses charged against the City in the past year. One, a residential fire, destroyed the Norman Guess home, and the other damaged Ernest Frozen Foods.

In 1957, fire losses were at a record low of \$2,847. In 1956 the loss here was \$17,000.

Chief Johnson credited an alert

Fire Department and a cooperative public with keeping the fire loss down here. He said he believed Eastland was fortunate to have one of the best fire departments anywhere. He praised both his paid firemen and volunteers for "a good job."

A total of 87 fire alarms were answered during 1958 by Eastland firemen. Chief Johnson said

that more than half the alarms were outside the city limits. The local fire department receives \$25 a month from the county to help pay the expense of fighting out of town blazes.

One death was attributed to fire in the Eastland area in the past year. Albert Wood was fatally burned in a grass fire near his home northeast of the city.

## I GIVE YOU TEXAS

The death this fall of Sam Zimbalist was a loss to the world, for he was the producer of many motion pictures, several of which deserved the title of great.

To the writer of this "column", his going meant the loss of a friend.

In the winter of 1939-40, I went to Hollywood to assist in the writing of "Boom Town." There, it was my good fortune to be associated with him. He was tall, handsome, well-proportioned, in his 30's, quiet, modest, friendly and considerate. The association lasted four months - until the script had been completed.

It was 11 years later before I returned to Los Angeles. Hollywood is known for its short memory - but this cynical truism was not true of Zimbalist. He learned of my coming and sent word for me to call him, which I did. He invited me to visit the studio. I felt that the invitation was being extended from a sense of courtesy so I said:

"It has been a long time since my connection with 'Boom Town' and while that experience was important to me - perhaps a turning-point in my life—it wasn't important to anyone else. You are a very busy man and I just wanted to say hello."

"Where are you having lunch tomorrow?" he asked. "Come out and have lunch with me."

So I accepted. His secretary "saw" still "Miss Marge," and she smiled a greeting and said she recalled me.

Zimbalist and I chatted for an hour. He had recently completed "Quo Vadis" and he showed me replicas of Roman soldiers, chariots and other mementoes of the epic.

Then we went to the commissary for an unhurried repast. He greeted actors, directors and executives as they came down the aisle and he would say, "I want you to meet my friend from Texas."

In response to my question, he told me something about himself—born in Brooklyn, not completing high school, coming to Hollywood where he began as a messenger and eventually "did almost everything but act."

Then he said, musingly, "I sometimes wonder whether I have invested my life wisely."

I replied, "Many may wonder

that about themselves—but you need not. You are at the top of your profession; you are with the biggest company in its field in the world; you have produced pictures which have brought romance, adventure and happiness into the lives of untold millions in every part of our earth."

We returned to his office. I did not want to take more of his time but it was an hour later when I rose for the third time, that he permitted me to leave.

"I have enjoyed this," he said. "Don't ever come back to Los Angeles without seeing me."

But the next time I was there, he was in Italy making "Ben Hur"—the picture he was still making when he died in Rome.

"King Solomon's Mines," "Quo Vadis," "Boom Town"—these are among his great monuments.

I have worked for, and with many men but none was more patient, understanding and appreciative, or more truly a gentleman than Sam Zimbalist.

I am glad that I told him that, the last time I saw him.

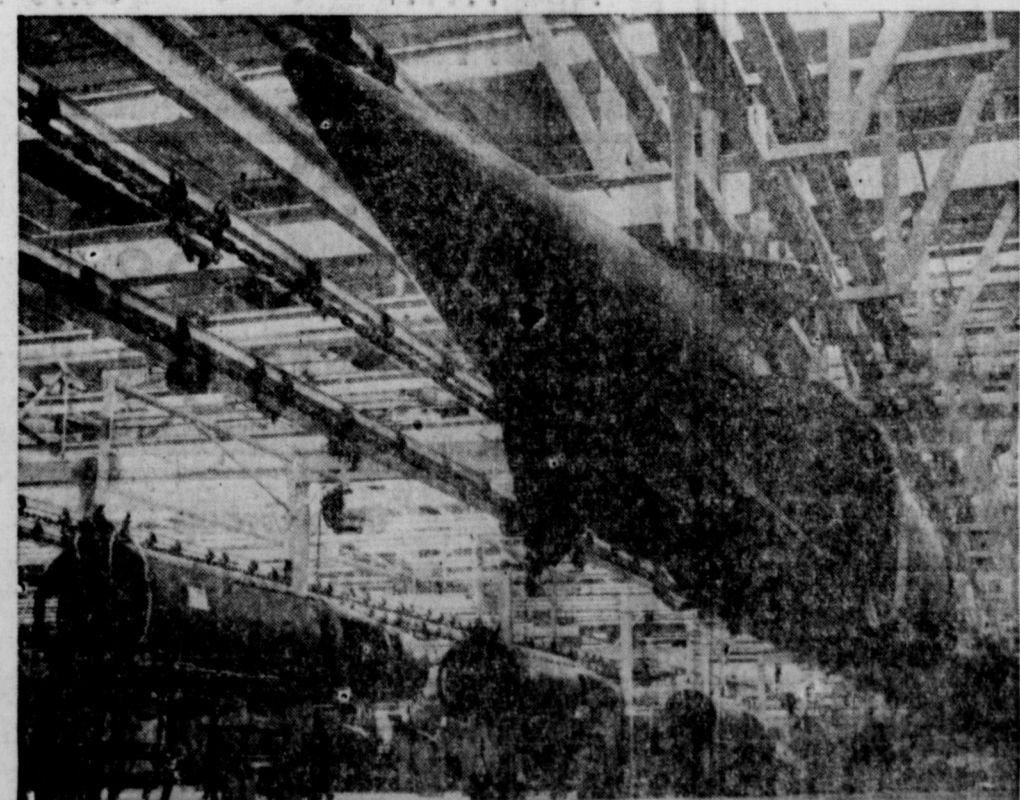

## First Federal Savings Show Increase For '58

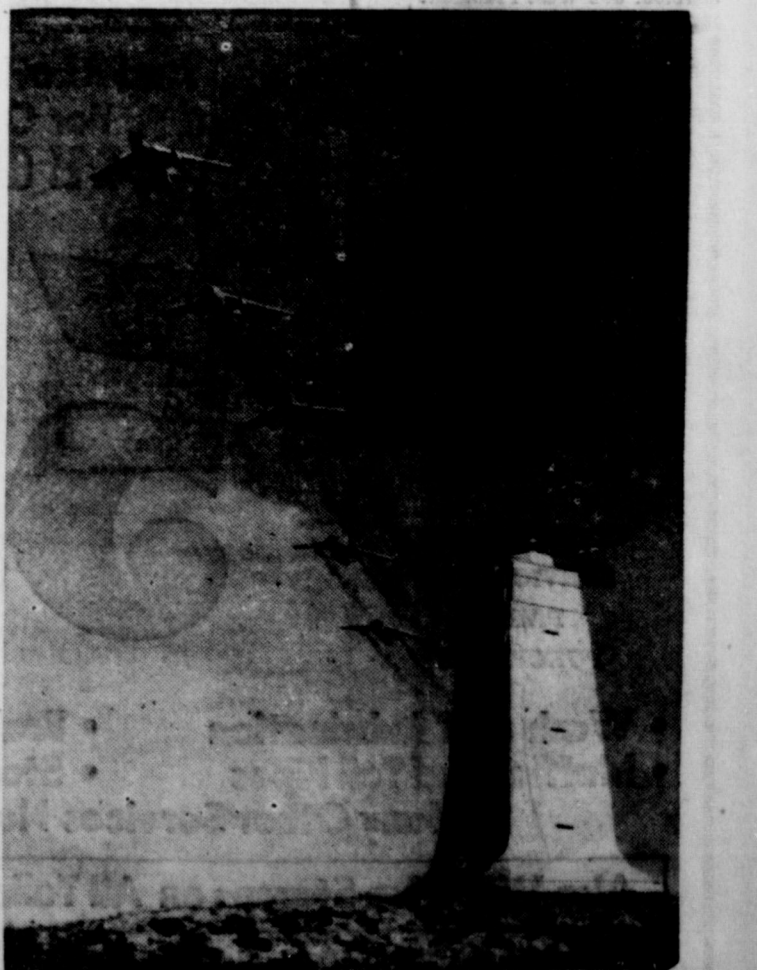
Liabilities are listed at \$907,515.75, including a surplus of \$9,948.16.

**FAVORITE RECIPES**

The Italian dish of "pizza pie" has become a familiar dish in the American kitchens — with all members of the family loving it. When we speak of pizza pie we think of a main dish of the menu — well, here is a "sweet pizza pie." It is different and brightens the menu of any meal.

**Pizza Pastry**  
(for one 13-inch pizza pan)  
2 1/4 cups sifted enriched flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup sugar  
3/4 cup shortening  
6 tablespoons water

In mixing bowl combine flour and salt. With a pastry blender or two knives cut in shortening until mixture looks like coarse cornmeal.

Sprinkle water over mixture, one tablespoon at a time, and mix lightly with a fork until all the flour is moistened. With the hands gather dough into a ball. On a lightly floured board roll out pastry into a circle 1/8 inch thick and about 1 inch larger in diameter than the pizza pan.

Place the rolling pin across one half the circle and clip one side of the pastry to one side of the pizza pan and unroll pastry over the pan. Trim edge leaving 1/2 inch overhanging.

Fold overhanging edge back and under, flute the edge against the rim of the pizza pan. Prick pastry generously with a fork and bake at 425 degrees for about 15 minutes or until lightly golden brown. Cool before filling.

Once baked and cooled, fill the crust with a creamy pudding mix and top with fruit in a variety of flavors and colors. The arrangement of the fruit is limited only by one's imagination and whim. The pies are best served with a lightly sweetened whipped cream.
