COUNTY, CITY AND SCHOOL Financial Position Of Agencies Bright

The County of Eastland entered 1959 in a rosy financial position, a study of financial records reveals.

Eastland County's net debt total only \$95,928, or \$4.80 per capita. That is one of the best records in the entire state. The county, with an assessed valuation of more than \$20,000,000, thus has a net debt of 0.46 percent of its assessed valuation.

The county just owes \$15,000 on the modern courthouse building and that payment is not due until 1961. There is a buildup of \$4,670 in the interest and sinking fund now to meet the permanent improvement bonds.

The county, if no new bond issue is approved in the next 10 years, will be free of bonded indebtedness in 1969.

Two local governmental agencies have shown remarkable improvement, financially, in the past few years.

The Eastland Independent School District's indebtedness has been reduced to \$141,932. That compares most favorably with other county school systems, as the chart below reveals:

The City of Eastland has great-

ly lowered its bonded indebtedness too. City officials in the past 12 months actually sought out non-mature bonds which they could retire.

Farmers Urged to Attend Social Security Meeting

Can a farmer or a rancher secure old age assistance benefits under the social security program? Are farm and ranch people covered under the same social security system as people in other occupations?

If farmers and ranchers are eligible then when, where and how do they make the payments? How many payments do they make and at what age can they begin to draw any benefits? If a farmer or a rancher make a few payments and then dies can his widow draw any benefits under the program? If so how much can she draw?

These and many other questions will be answered at a special meeting for Eastland County farmers and ranchers and their wives next Thursday afternoon, Jan. 22 at 2 p. m. in the county courtroom on the third floor of the county courthouse in Eastland.

"All farmers and their wives are cordially invited to come and be with us," J. M. Cooper, county agent said.

"If you wish to write down your questions on a slip of paper and give it to me just before the meeting."

Either C. M. Vaden, field representative or R. R. Tuley, Jr., district officer manager of the District office of the Social Security Admin., will be at the meeting to answer the questions and explain the program.

Mavs Scare Cisco; Coleman Tilt Next

The Eastland Mavericks threw a real scare in the Cisco Lobos Tuesday night, but finally fell before the Lobos' vast reserve strength, 46-41 in a District 7-AA contest.

The Mavs led at halftime and were behind only one point going into the final period. Cisco used a two platoon system and started a fresh unit in the final stanza.

The Mavs were 20 point underdogs in the contest, but the game was nip and tuck all the way. Friday night Eastland takes on another power. Cisco is rated as the district favorite, with Coleman

second. The Mavs play the Bluecats in Coleman Friday.

Larry Hollis was high scorer in the contest with 19 points. Otis Green had 10 for the Mavs, Clint Humphrey had five, Philip Lewis four and Stanley Reed three. John Adams was high for Cisco with 11 points.

The Maverick B team, paced by Martin Day who scored 10 points, downed the Cisco reserves 33-29.

In other District 7-AA contests, Winters beat Ranger, 68-38 in Ranger and Coleman downed Ballinger, 55-38 in Coleman.

Farming Still Fun For Wilson After 34 Years

Thirty-four years on the same farm hasn't taken any of the fun of farming away from Henry E. Wilson, owner of this week's mystery farm.

Wilson's farm, located eight miles southeast of Eastland, has 160 acres. It is his vocation and his hobby as well. With 84 acres in cultivation, Wilson raises just about every crop you can name. He has a peanut allotment of 29.9 acres and has a seven acre cotton allotment.

Like most Eastland County farmers, Wilson made the best peanut crop this year that he has made since 1950. Unlike many farmers, however, the long-time farmer managed to "make expenses" during the drought years.

In addition to peanuts and cotton, Wilson also plants corn, maize

and vegetables.

Eastland Man Lost At Sea

Word was received in Eastland Wednesday afternoon that Seaman Third Class James A. Blackmon of Eastland was lost at sea some times Wednesday in the South Pacific.

Blackmon was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Blackmon of 201 North Ammerman. His wife, the former Maidie Beth Johnson, has made her home with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Otta Johnson, 309 South Daugherty, while her husband was at sea.

A telegram received by Mrs. Blackmon stated that her husband had been washed overboard in heavy seas and the body had not been recovered. Seaman Blackmon, a graduate of Eastland High School, was serving aboard the Aircraft Carrier Bon Homme Richard. The carrier was participating in maneuvers in the South Pacific at the time of the tragedy.

Survivors, besides his wife and parents, include a 14-month-old daughter, Debi Jan; two brothers, Don and Joe; and his grandparents.

James was born July 12, 1936. He attended Eastland schools and graduated from Eastland High in 1955, entering the Navy soon after graduating. This was to have been his last cruise. He expected to be discharged in April.

Blackmon was a member of a Navy rescue unit, and although no details of his death were given, it is presumed that he was on a rescue mission at the time of his death.

He was a member of the Church of Christ, which his father-in-law serves as minister.

Memorial services will be held in the Church of Christ in Eastland Sunday at 3 p.m. with Durwood Boggs, Church of Christ minister from Dallas, officiating. James Fleming, Bethel Baptist Church minister, will assist. Boggs is a cousin of the victim's wife.

Postal Receipts In 1958 Top 100,000

Revenue Is Doubled In Past Ten Years

Postal receipts in Eastland remained above the \$100,000 mark in 1958 for the fifth consecutive year, but failed to show an increase over 1957, which was the second highest year on record.

Total receipts in 1958 were \$109,809, Mrs. Marene Johnson, postmaster, announced today. That makes 1958 the fifth best year in the local Post Office's history.

Receipts in 1958 lacked just \$545 doubling receipts of 10 years ago. In 1948 postal receipts here were listed at just \$50,677.

The chief contributing point to increased postal receipts since that time has been the huge amount of mailing done by the Victor Cornelius Theatrical Advertising Co. Cornelius estimated that the firm spent almost \$60,000 on postage in the past year.

During 1958 the Eastland Post

Office completed its 11th year as a first class office. Postal receipts climbed above the \$40,000 mark for the first time in 1947, and the PO became first class the following year.

Mrs. Johnson said that packaged mail increased during 1958, but that first class mailing was down slightly. She thanked local patrons for bundling their mail instead of throwing loose cards and letters in.

Private land available to eligible farmers for the purchase of land, for building and land improvement, and for domestic and irrigation water systems. In addition to the 4 percent paid the lender, the borrower pays the Government 1 percent for insuring and servicing the loan. Although the amortization of the loan may be up to 40 years depending on the purpose for the lender, at his option, may have the note redeemed by the Government at any time after five years. The note, held by the lender, is negotiable and may be assigned to another investor at any time. "The insured farm loan in an attractive investment for private lending institutions and individuals and has been well received here in Texas," McKay stated. "In fact, 928 of our more recent real estate loans totaling \$8,926,000 were made from funds provided by private credit sources. We anticipate that raising the rate of interest to lenders to 4 percent will result in a substantial increase in lender participation and thereby enable Farmers Home Administration to meet the credit need of more farm families."

You state that a person who becomes sixty years of age before Jan. 1 of this year, is entitled to poll tax exemption certificate for 1959. You are in error to the extent, that the individual must be sixty years of age before January first, 1958.

We use 1958 poll tax as a voting qualification in 1959. And this described person must have a 1958 poll tax receipt to vote in 1959, if his sixtieth birthday was at any time in 1958.

Our county tax collector and one of our best authorities on election law, J. C. Allison will confirm this. I also refer to chapt. 5, art. 5.09 Texas election code.

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Good Meal Masquerades Under 'Lion's Head'

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

Here's a recipe from Hong Kong called "stewed lion's head." But don't worry. There is no lion in it—just good, American egg noodles, pork, crab meat, and cabbage.

Oriental Meat Balls (Six servings)

One pound ground pork, two 6½-ounce cans crab meat, drained; 1 tablespoon sherry, if desired; or 1 tablespoon water, 1 tablespoon soy sauce, 2 teaspoons sugar, ¾ teaspoon ginger, cornstarch, 3 tablespoons salad oil, 1 medium head cabbage, cut in wedges; 2 teaspoons salt, 2 cups soup stock, 1 tablespoon salt, 3 quarts boiling water, 8-ounce package medium egg noodles (about 4 cups).

Combine pork, crab meat, sherry or water, soy sauce, sugar and ginger. Mix well. Shape into two-inch balls. Coat with cornstarch.

Heat 1 tablespoon oil. In it brown meat balls on all sides. Remove balls from pan.

Add remaining oil, then cabbage, and cook over low heat until slightly browned on all sides.

Add meat balls, 2 teaspoons salt and soup stock. Cover and cook over low heat 20-30 minutes.

Meanwhile, add 1 tablespoon salt to rapidly boiling water. Gradually add noodles—keep the water constantly boiling. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally until tender. Drain.

Stuffed Green Peppers (Six servings)

Three medium green peppers, 1 pound lean pork, ground; 2 teaspoons sherry or water, 2½

teaspoons soy sauce, ½ teaspoon sugar, 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 2 tablespoons salad oil, 2 teaspoons soy sauce, 1 teaspoon sugar, 2 tablespoons water. Cut peppers in half and remove seeds. Meanwhile, combine pork, sherry or water, soy sauce and ½ teaspoon sugar. Mix well. Stuff peppers with meat mixture and coat with cornstarch. Heat oil in pan; add peppers and brown lightly on all sides. Drain off drippings on pan. Combine remaining ingredients and add to peppers. Cover and cook over low heat 30 minutes.
