Mavs Invade Ranger In Search of Win Tonight

A battle royal is due to unfold tonight in the Ranger High School gymnasium, when the Eastland Mavericks journey into Dogland to renew an age-old rivalry.

The Mavericks will be favored to hand the Bulldogs a sound licking when the two teams clash on Ranger hardwoods in a District 7-AA basketball match.

Although neither team has managed to win a district game in their first two starts, the Mavs have by far the better performance record.

Eastland lost to Cisco, 46-41, and to Coleman, 76-71, in their first two circuit outings. Cisco and Coleman are the top two favorites in the district.

On the other hand, Cisco downed Ranger, 59-32, and Winters rubbed the Bulldogs, 68-38.

Dr. M. A. Treadwell was program chairman.

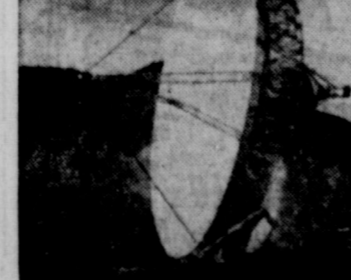

C-C Offers to Build Paved Airport Strip

Lighting Is Also Proposed by Group

Eastland Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee members Monday night offered the City of Eastland a plan by which the C-C would hard surface a runway at the City airport and install lighting facilities if the City would conduct a cost survey.

City commissioners, admittedly surprised by the "generous and unusual offer," quickly accepted the proposal. Representatives of the Chamber who met with the Commissioner were H. J. Tanner, Arthur Goldston and Dr. James Whittington.

The trio announced that the Chamber's Industrial Committee had met Monday afternoon and decided to go ahead with the plan to modernize the Eastland airport.

"We would like for the City to tell us what needs to be done and what it will cost us to do it," Dr. Whittington told the Commission. "If the cost is at all reasonable, we will take this over as a project to push through to completion."

City Dads Have Busy Session; To Retire Bonds

City Commissioners tentatively approved a 10-year lease of a strip of property to Kincaid Feed and Hatchery at their Monday night meeting.

Alvin Kincaid told Commissioners the lease, with a 10-year renewal clause, was needed so that a new automatic truck scale could be installed. The scale will lap over onto city-owned property by a matter of a few feet.

In other action, Commissioners changed their regular meeting night from Thursday to Monday. Meetings will be held on the third Monday of each month in 1959.

Mrs. George Mankey appeared before the Commission to request a franchise to operate a taxi company here. She was requested to make a cost survey and report back to Commissioners Tom Wilson and Jack Germany. No definite action was taken.

Commissioners unanimously approved a \$400 contribution to the City Library. The same has been granted the library for the last several years.

The Commission authorized City Manager James Young to advertise the call of an additional \$14,600 in water and sewer bonds. Young said the money to retire the bonds is now in the bank.

Purchase of a 1955 Ford truck was also approved. The truck will be used as a rural fire truck. King Motor Co. was successful bidder.

Commissioners also voted to charge \$50 for grave spaces in the new watered area of Eastland Cemetery. Lots in the old part of the cemetery will continue to sell for \$25.

E. C. Johnson, city auditor, appeared before the Commission and stated the City's new bookkeeping system is working smoothly. "I am very pleased," he declared.

GRAY MATTER

Recent Cold Spell Is Topped by Joe

The cold spell we had here a week or so ago was a humdinger. The editor of this paper said it was the coldest weather we've had here since about 1931. It might have been. On my back porch the thermometer stood at four above the other Sunday morning. That's cold! But it's not as cold as it was in February of 1929, (I think it was 29.) That was a cold spell that was really something.

We kids got a kick out of that one too, something the kids didn't get out of the one just past. School went on as usual.

The 1929 spell was different though. That winter was the first winter we used the present high school building. In building the structure the contractor made a mistake in burying the water pipes up the hill. He didn't bury them deep enough and when the temperature went to something like two or four below, depending on whose thermometer you were reading, the water pipes wouldn't take it. They froze so solid as ice can be. And with no water in the school building the heating system wouldn't work. No water, no steam, and no steam, no heat. No heat, no school, so the school authorities operating on the instructions of School Superintendent W. Z. Bates had to turn school out until we got the pipes functioning again.

The freeze lasted for three or four days without a let up. Every stock pond, water trough, and lake in this part of the country froze over. Lake Eastland had so much ice on it that you could drive a team of mules across the lake. Or you could drive a car across it too.

We kids, of course, took to those ice-covered lakes and ponds like a duck takes to water and I was surprised to learn how many pairs of ice skates showed up. There must be a lot of transformed Yankees in Eastland. They certainly turned up on the laketops during that freeze, and some of those fellows were real good at skating.

But we native Texans didn't have to have a pair of skates to perform. We had our fun without benefit of storebought aids. We used our shoes.

Just south of those days was a school tank then known as Lyerla Tank. There was another farther south and somewhat east, just south of J. D. Pittman's present home, we called it Davenport's Tank. But during this cold spell most of us spent some time on the tank that was nearest the school.

We wanted to be close at hand in case they got the pipes thawed out enough to get water to make enough steam to heat the place. If school took up, we kids wanted to know about it!

For three or four days we had the times of our lives on Lyerla's Tank, playing our version of hockey. Our home made rules were the same as a game we called shinty, but instead of playing on earth, this game was played on ice.

Among the more livelier boys then living in Eastland was a big, fat, heavy-set fellow who lived in the house Harvey Kimbler now lives in. Our friend's father was the pastor of the Baptist Church here. That's the reason he lived in Harvey Kimbler's house. His name was Jack Nelson.

After the thaw began we continued to play on the ice for at least a day. It was only until about the middle of the afternoon one day that the ice of Lyerla's Tank got so soft that we considered it dangerous to be on. In spots it was covered with a thin layer of water and when walked on it sagged like the price of cotton.

Finally, someone offered him 50¢ if he would walk across the ice in his semi-melted state. He attempted to earn his 50¢. He did, the hard way.

Jack got out on the middle of the lake's ice and then things started popping. Ice was cracking all over the place and making noises like thunder during a spring thunderstorm. Poor Jack fell through.

Henry Van Geem, I think it was, ran up, shouting "Get him out, get him out before he drowns."

Carl Rostrammell was standing close by. He didn't get at all excited about it. He just looked down at Jack's unhappy state and said, "Let him go under first. After all, he's a Baptist. Let that deep-water Baptist be immersed before we get him out."

New Hope Church Enters 1959 Baptist Program

The New Hope Baptist Church north of Ranger has entered the 1959 Texas Baptist Church Achievement Program, pastor Frank Brooks said this week.

Sponsored by the Baptist General Convention of Texas, the program is designed to stimulate interest in small-church work. Outstanding achievements by pastor and churches in areas of church, community and world improvement are recognized.

More than 354 Texas Baptist town and country churches entered the program last year. Participating churches in a recent year recorded twice as many baptisms per member as the Southern Baptist Convention average.

Each church in the program sets up goals for advancement in the three areas. An inventory questionnaire furnishes suggestions for projects, such as health education, community recreation programs, citizenship training, race relation studies and world missions.

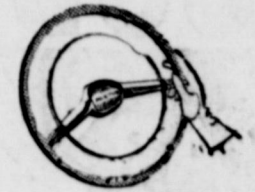

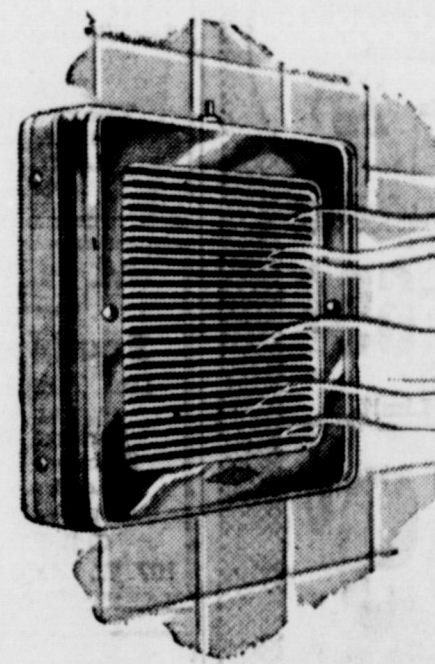
