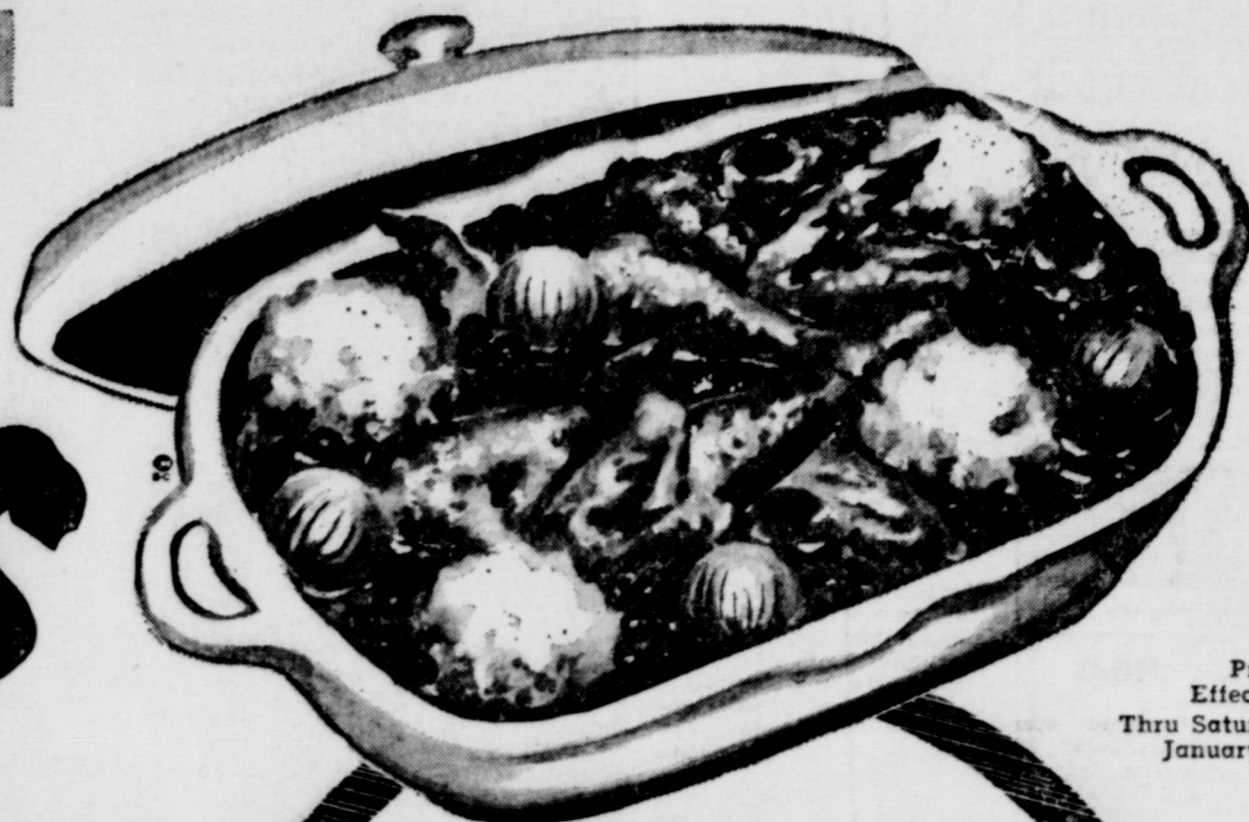

The urban or "city" 4-H Club is no longer an exception in extension work, according to statistics released by the USDA. The number of 4-H'ers living in urban areas has increased more than 28 percent since 1954. Country cousins are fast becoming city folks, while the distinction between farm and city boys and girls is virtually non-existent. Proof of these changing times and people can be found during the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago where approximately 1,300 youth assemble annually. The date this year is Nov. 30 to Dec. 4.
These future citizens come from all parts of the United States, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico. All are members of local 4-H clubs, and all have achieved top state rating in a specific 4-H award program. They represent the 2,200,000 rural and urban 4-H'ers who continually strive to "make the best better." Those who are selected each year by the State 4-H office to attend the National Congress, have accomplished just that. Many business firms and private citizens cooperate with the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work and the Extension Service to make the Congress possible. Not only are the trips paid for, but other valuable awards are provided for state and county 4-H winners. College scholarships will be presented to 200 national champions. What to Do With The Pricklypear?

College Station — Pricklypear—good or bad?

This is a question in the minds of many Eastland County ranchmen who often ask if pricklypear should be controlled or kept as an emergency feed reserve.

For over a century pricklypear has been used for livestock feed. On Texas rangelands it usually is considered an undesirable plant but does have some economic value as supplemental forage for cattle and sheep during winter and drought periods.

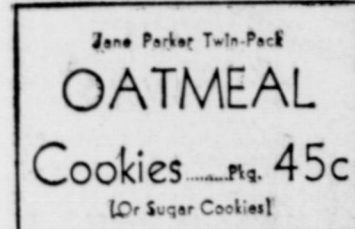
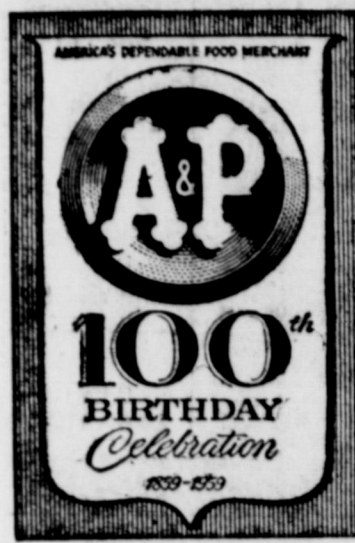
Frequently, ranchmen burn pricklypear for a supplemental roughage for cattle during winter. Burning consists of singeing pricklypear spines with a hot flame from butane or oil pear burners. Pear burners are constructed and operate much like a blowtorch. The spines should be burned enough that they cannot be felt when the pad is touched. If pricklypear is burned excessively livestock refuse to eat it, but they eat it readily when it is burned properly.
