Hearsay Evidence Against Old Rip Should be Stricken From Record

If it pleases the Court, the Telegram would like to ask that the evidence submitted Sunday in The Abilene Re-porter-News pertaining to the story of Old Rip, Eastland County's immortal horned toad, be stricken from the record.

The Telegram charges that the evidence, proportedly given by Judge Allen Dabney, to A. C. Greene of the Re-porter-News staff, is nothing more than hearsay evidence, and is not admittable in any fair court of law and justice.

We charge that the story, quoting an unnamed source, has slandered the good name of Old Rip. We cannot believe that Judge Dabney gave the story any creditability, and certainly thing that the headline given the story by the Reporter-News was unjustified.

The cornerstone within which Old Rip was imprisoned for 31 years, can still be examined today. It rests on the lawn of the courthouse on the northside of the square. There are no holes in the stone while could have been used to slip in Old Rip.

As hard as it is for outsiders to understand, the story of Old Rip is true. Certainly by this time, that fact should be accepted .
