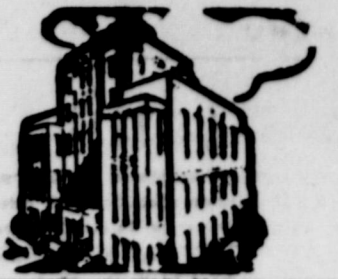

Noted Horticulturists Take Part In Annual County Orchard Field Day

Orchard men and home fruit growers over the county are cordially invited to attend the annual Eastland County Orchard Field Day to be held at Nimrod on March 24, according to County Agent J. M. Cooper.

The session is scheduled to get underway that morning with a talk by Tom Denman, horticulturist of the Agricultural Experiment Station, Stephenville, on Home Orchards. Denman will cover several phases of this subject with special emphasis on varieties of pears, peaches, plums, berries and figs that are adapted to this area of the state.

B. G. Hancock, horticulturist of the Texas A & M College Extension Service, will discuss "Orchard Management" and U. A. Randolph, horticulturist of the Agricultural Experiment Station, Montague, will discuss soils, varieties and management of grapes.

Several farmers recently paid a visit to the grape research station at Montague to confer with Randolph and to secure cuttings from many of the varieties that are being tested there.

Lunch will be served in the club house there at noon for \$1 per plate.

The afternoon session will be held at the Herman Schaefer orchard a mile east of Nimrod and will consist of a pruning demonstration by Hancock and a spraying demonstration by J. W. Foster of Weatherford and a demonstration of a new type of saw by Bob Perkins of the Perkins Implement Co. of Eastland.

Turner also urged farmers and ranchers to know more about various grasses. He said many farmers try varieties on their own without asking for SCS help, then find out that they are not adaptable to this area. He charged that planting grass not adaptable to this area is worse than planting no grass at all, for in so doing, the farmer loses money he has paid for seed.

Another practice Turner urged was keeping cattle off the range when grass is seeding. He said ranchers too often let their cattle harvest all of their grass seed, then turn around and pay \$1 a pound for more seed to re-plant.

Speaking of the cattle business, Turner said ranchers are going to have to learn again the hard lesson they were taught in 1952-53. Once again, he charged, ranchers are trying to run more cattle on their land than they have grass.

"Nearly every man who loses his shirt in the cattle business does so because he runs out of grass, not because he runs out of cattle," Turner stated. "The banker can ride through with a rancher who has grass."

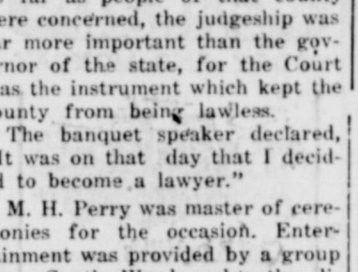

rows of peanuts to two rows of sudan (as thick as possible), returns his peanut hay to the soil and plants a rye cover crop. The roughage and cover crop are left on the land until the last possible moment before planting.

In following this system, George says his soil has become more fertile today than it was 20 years ago. He says it keeps the sand on his land, holds more water and returns fertility to the soil.

Also speaking at the meeting were Bill Heizer, SCS worker from Dublin. He spoke on the assistance the Service offers and the history of the District.

Soil Conservation supervisors of the Upper Leon District met Friday afternoon in Eastland and heard two prominent Erath County farmers discuss methods they use on their farms to "farm the land and still save it."

The camp was conceived and chartered 10 years ago this month. It is supported by 37,000 Texas Lions and their friends, who have contributed approximately \$1,500,000 to construct and operate the camp.

Its facilities are designed especially to serve the blind, deaf, mute and crippled. Fifteen permanent buildings — including a chapel, infirmary and giant recreation center—dot 504 hillside acres.

The camp, probably the only one of its kind in the world, is free to any eligible handicapped boy or girl in Texas between 7 and 16 years old. The camp's capacity is 720 a summer, and it has been operating at full strength since 1956.

The children camp out under the stars at Inspiration Point, learn to swim in a specially-designed pool, develop talents in the spacious arts and crafts building, many of the learning new skills; participate in stunt night and campwide activities — and have fun in general.

History of Church of Christ Here Is Traced

(Editor's Note—This is the fourth in a series of articles on Eastland churches. Next week's article will feature the Calvary Baptist Church.

On the third Sunday in May, 1920, the local congregation of the Church of Christ held services in the present building on the corner of West and South Daughtery streets, bringing to fulfillment the goal toward which they had been working for many years.

Each window of the church was made of art glass, and twice the windows of the south side of the building have been destroyed by hail storms, making it necessary to have the windows rebuilt in Waco, for resetting in the building. The auditorium, which has a capacity of 500 people, was originally hand-decorated, with Mrs. Allen D. Dabney, Sr. selecting the colors and decorations.

The church owns a parsonage near the church building. The entire cost was paid by 1926 and exceeded \$75,000, but the church property has increased in value until now it is worth much more.

The church has 335 resident members.

Judge and Mrs. Dabney and Mrs. Harry Woods are the only charter members still active in the church. Judge Dabney teaches two Bible classes at this time, as he has done in the past. He has been an outstanding leader in the church since its beginning.

Many outstanding preachers have occupied the pulpit of the Eastland Church of Christ. Presently, Otta Johnson is the minister here. Mr. Johnson is a graduate of Loyd University, a graduate of Louisiana State University, Denison and Rotan before coming to Eastland two years ago.

The Church of Christ is an institution of the Lord with each congregation acting independently of any other brotherhood or organization. There are two governing boards within the local church.

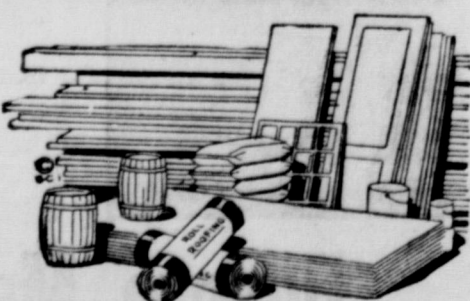
