## Grass Fires Ravage Eastland County Land

Grass fires ravaged Eastland County Saturday, taking a toll of about two and one-half sections of grassland between Eastland and Cisco and another three sections of land, northwest of Cisco.

With high winds blowing the Cisco-Eastland fire was not brought under control until sometime around midnight. Fire trucks from Cisco, Breckenridge, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman, Rising Star and Moran were on hand as volunteers fought the blazes.

Some brush piles still continued to smoulder Sunday morning. No cattle were reported lost and no houses or barns were burned in the two fires. Much fence damage was reported, however, and wooden ties of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad were also burned.

An estimated two and one-half sections of land were damaged in the fire east of Cisco, said Fire Chief Billy Jack Johnson of Eastland. The blaze started near Humboldt, he added, burning railroad tracks in its path, cutting south to the Base Line Road, then spreading over the area, east to the Don Kinead Ranch and north to Highway 89. It scorched an area about one mile wide and two and one-half miles long.

## Addie H. Williams Dies Tuesday; Rites Wednesday

Addie H. Williams, 60, a business man who resided in Ranger for 47 years, died Tuesday morning in his home.

Funeral services will be held in the First Baptist Church at 3 p.m. Wednesday with Rev. Ed Scarborough, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, officiating. Burial will be in Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

Graveside ceremonies will be conducted by the IOOF Lodge No. 350 of Ranger.

Mr. Williams was active in civic affairs, serving three terms as City Commissioner, and filling in as Mayor-Pro-tem. At the time of his death, he was serving his third term as president of the West Texas Water Association.

A member of the First Baptist Church in Ranger since 1918, Mr. Williams served five years as church treasurer, taught in the Intermediate Dept. for many years and was ordained as a deacon in 1924. He was chairman of the Body of Deacons.

Born Nov. 22, 1898, in Desdemona, he married Verdie L. Wilhelm in Dallas, June 20, 1920.

He was owner and operator of Williams Fix-It Shop at 114 Main St.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. S. Garbo of Arlington and Ruth of Ranger; six sons, A. J. and Kenneth of Ranger, David L., Bobby Gene, and Linden A. of Arlington, and Elmer of Chunute Air Force Base in Illinois; his mother, Mrs. Nora Fountain of Ranger; two sisters, Mrs. Lydia Herring of Fort Worth and Mrs. Amanda McCollough of Hobbs, N. Mex.; three brothers, Miley of Ranger, Eargle of Pauls Valley, Okla., and Rufus of San Antonio; and 11 grandchildren.

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Ranger Volunteer Firemen had their hands full, with a burning blaze inside the city limits destroying two garages, a car and grassland. They were also called to a grass fire on Wayland Road, Saturday afternoon.

Cause of the Cisco-Eastland fire was undetermined, with some reports indicating that burning trash was the cause and others saying that sparks from a passing train possibly set off the blaze.

From three to six trucks from the Cisco Fire Dept. were used in patrolling the two fires. Also assisting northwest of Cisco was the Moran Fire Dept. Several State Highway Department water trucks were used.

A fire guard, placed in front of the fire, northwest of Cisco, brought the blaze under control about 11:30 p.m. Saturday.

Some 3,000 acres of brushland were lost in a blaze, last month, near the site of the latest fire between Eastland and Cisco.

High winds between 45-50 mph, kept whipping up the flames, reports indicating, damaging the Willetton, Donovan, Leg, and Mitchum ranches and other land, nearby.

Eastland Fireman I. J. Carmack said the fire probably was much worse than the one which burned the area less than a month ago. No houses, barns or cattle were lost in the previous fire.

Burned over were the Huffman place, also known as the Red Padgett Place, the Don Kinead turkey ranch (which incurred no damaged buildings), land belonging to Walter Kirkland, and the R. C. (Bob) Pressley ranch. Vacating their home because of the smoke were the J. A. Pressleys.

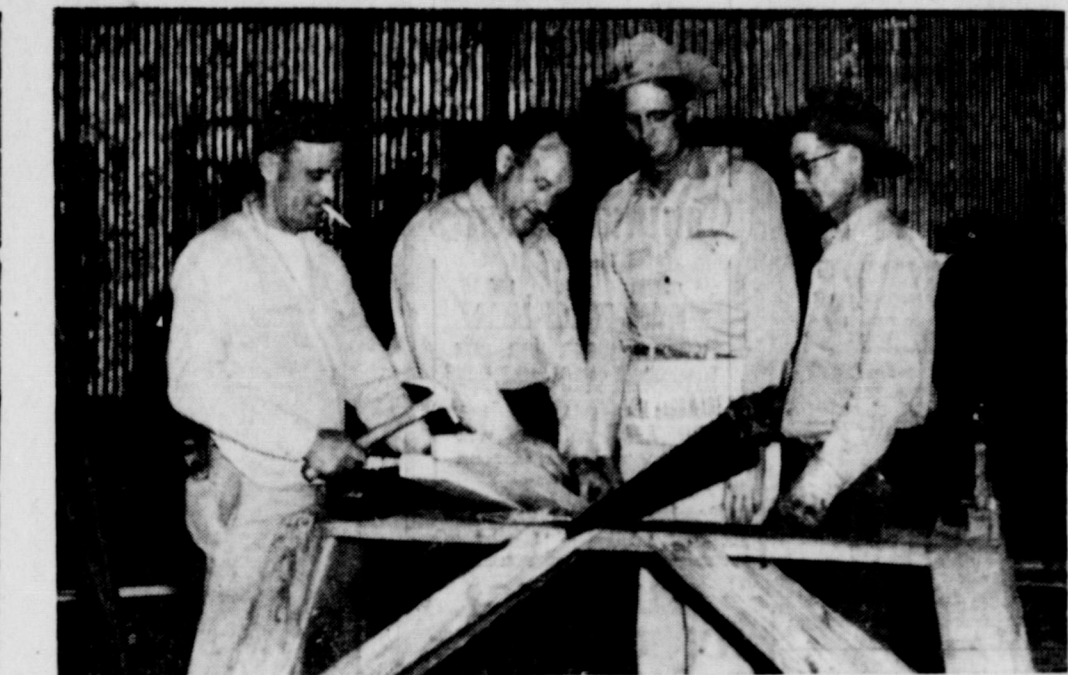
As the wind blew out of the north, the fire was confined to the south side of U. S. 89 where it started. Men on the scene said that the railroad timbers and poles along the railroad tracks were a complete loss.

An Eastland fire truck began patrolling the road south of the highway, east of Cisco, about 8:30 p.m., spraying water along the fence lines in an effort to prevent the spread of flying sparks.

## Rules Of Fishing Contest Are Given

Rules concerning the fishing contest of the Fort Worth Anglers Club to be held at Lake Leon on Sunday, April 19, have been announced by Dick Darmon, chairman and "father" of the contest, in "The Fisherman," official publication of the club.

Area fishermen can participate by obtaining membership and contest blanks to be made available in the near future.

Information, presented below, was taken from "The Fisherman".

Rules governing the contest will remain the same as in other years except that a crappie division will be added. Awards and merchandise prizes for crappie catches, as well as black bass, will be given away this year.

A delegation from Lake Leon and Ranger and Eastland attended the FWAC's annual banquet in February and extended an invitation to the club to hold the contest, held in previous years at Possum Kingdom, at Lake Leon.

The April "Fisherman" will carry a map of the lake with complete details on reaching it, camp sites, commercial camps, launching sites, inlet roads, etc.

The Eastland county delegation has waived for contestants the requirement of a fishing or boating license on April 18-19 to fish on the lake.

Darmon said that once again fishing in the contest must be done in teams, with two fishermen to a boat. Fish must be caught from daybreak to weigh-in time in order to be eligible. Fish must be uncleaned when weighed.

A current FWCA membership card is required of all entrants, and the entry fees will be \$2 per man, \$4 per team.

nish one set of trophies for the contest and a lot of extra merchandise prizes.

Darmon said that he expects more people to enter this year's contest than ever before. The addition of a crappie division is sure to bring more fishermen, and this time the lady fishermen will have an equal chance.

A detailed list of prizes, weighing-in station, and other details to be worked out will be carried in newspapers, and in next month's "Fisherman."

Membership and contest blanks will be available in the Ranger-Eastland area since many of Lake Leon's regular fishermen have expressed a desire to enter.

R. V. "Rip" Galloway, manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and Eb Richardson, the Lake Leon warden, have been instrumental in carrying the contest to Lake Leon.

Both men pointed out that while lakeside cabin facilities are limited, there are plenty of rooms to be had in both Ranger and Eastland. Also, lake shore camping grounds are available for those who wish to "warm up" Saturday and stay overnight for Sunday's contest.

Teams wishing to enter early may mail their names and addresses, with that of their fishing partner, to R. H. Darmon, 3583 Fryden, Fort Worth.

Each team entered should enclose \$4 and membership dues of \$2 for adults and \$1 for youngsters under 18.

Those wishing help in securing motel or cabin reservations should write to Galloway, Ranger Chamber of Commerce, or H. J. Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. They should state their preference for a place to stay, and list an alternate, indicating dates of stay. Those wishing to obtain rental boats for the contest should indicate it in a letter, as well.

## Gray Matter

The old Ringling railroad used to have its largest bridge over the Leon just east of the South Bassett Street auto bridge. This was a pretty fair sized structure, even measured by the standards of large railroads.

And of course you wouldn't keep the kids of the southern part of town from playing on the bridge as much as they could. I was one of them at the time.

Many a happy hour were spent climbing all over this old bridge. We didn't have to worry about a train catching us out on the bridge and not being able to get to either end. We knew when a train would be along about as well as the station agent at the T. and P. Station knew when his next train would be through town.

I don't know what it is about railroad bridges, but there is something appealing to boys about them. Anytime a small boy sees a big railroad bridge he gets the bridge-climbing urge as bad as a mountain climber getting the climbing urge in the Alps.

At sometime or other I guess we boys climbed almost every piling and beam in the old bridge.

When I first heard of the railroad was going out of business the first thing that popped up in my mind was a thought wondering about what would come of the lumber used in the bridge on the line. I shouldn't have worried about it, though, the bridge, or at least a part of it, is right next door to me out here on South Seaman.

It happened this way: When Joseph M. Perkins builds anything he builds it well. It so happened that at about the time the railroad was abandoned, Mrs. Perkins decided she would have another structure constructed in their back yard to use for an office. She had a lot of work to do with her duties as a member of the State Board of Education, director of the Red Cross, Women's Club and a host of other things.

So she prevailed on Mr. Perkins to erect her office space in the yard.

The general plan of this structure was that it would be a model of an old-fashioned red schoolhouse that Mrs. Perkins had attended as a child. So she put Mr. Perkins to work.

At that time lumber wasn't as convenient to get as it is now and Mr. Perkins hit on the idea of using some of the old bridge timbers from the Ringling Railroad. He bought a lot of these and took them to the sawmill for trimming. Standing as a bridge for about 20 years seasoned this lumber until it was as firm as a Russian veto in the UN.

Mr. Perkins got the best carpenter he could find and the two of them went to work.

I guess there may be more solid constructions in small buildings somewhere but I don't know where it is.

Mr. Perkins used extremely round corner-posts and rafters. He couldn't have built more solid if he had used concrete. Well seasoned lumber will turn a termite into a termite's afraid to look at Mrs. Perkins "Little Red Schoolhouse."

That's what she calls it. Right into it was completed the house was painted a good "schoolhouse red" color and Mrs. Perkins moved her office into the soundest building of its size west of the Brazos.

## BY CITY Non-Mature Tax Bonds Are Retired

City Commissioners approved the purchase of \$15,295 in general refunding tax bonds at a sub-par price at their Monday night meeting.

The bonds were purchased for \$11,500 at a ratio of 84.25 cents on a dollar. City Manager James Young said the overall savings to the City, including both interest and principal, would amount to \$7,700.

In other business Monday night, Mayor Cyrus Frost named Virgil Seaberry Jr. to assist him in making a "study of the city limits."

Mrs. Ruth Daniels appeared before the Commission to request a taxi franchise. A Committee composed of Jack Germany and Tom Wilson was named to meet with her.

A report from the State Health Board revealing one sample of city water did not fully meet their requirements was also discussed. The city manager explained that it was the first report in the last two years that did not fully meet the Health Board's requirements. Young explained that five samples of city water are taken each week and sent in. The one sample which did not meet requirements was taken from an outside tap, and Young said he felt certain the tap was not clean.

"The water all comes from the same place, and if it is not up to standards in one place it will not be up to standard in any place," he declared.

A committee of Seaberry, Robert Perkins and Frost was named to study a request made by W. C. Garrett to lease the City Airport. And a request to put down a water line loop from Valley and Dixie Streets to Sadosa and Dixie Streets was tabled. Young estimated the cost of the loop would be more than \$6000.

All commissioners were present.

## Now Is the Time To Watch For Sunning Snakes

AUSTIN — This is the time of the year when poisonous reptiles, such as the very unpopular but well-known rattlesnake, are coming out.

According to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary, Texas Game and Fish Commission, March is the month when the weather is just cool enough to keep the snakes in their dens and just warm enough to make it nice for an outing.

"This situation will not last long," declares the executive secretary. "Once the warm weather arrives in force, the rattlers will leave these dens and begin to slip behind the brushlands or just lie behind rocks and drowse in the sun."

Dodgen described the large catches made recently at Sweetwater a spook enough that there will be plenty of snakes in Texas when hot weather comes. Some four thousand rattlesnakes were captured during the two day snake hunt held at that ranching area.

"Be extra careful when on an outing," he warned. "These killers usually hide in places where you'd least expect them to be. Don't reach behind a rock or a stump until you've checked for snakes. When lifting wood from a pile, jab at it a few times to make sure there are no rattlers there. Know all the precautions a n d remember them when you're in a field."

## Joe Canaris, Native of Greece, Is Buried In Eastland Cemetery

The shutter of life snapped shut Sunday morning, claiming the life of Joe N. Canaris, owner of Canaris, Studio in Eastland.

Mr. Canaris, 71, died in Veterans Hospital in Dallas at 8:30 a.m. Sunday after an illness of several months. He had returned to the hospital Friday for check-ups, having previously been a patient there for several weeks.

Funeral services were held Monday at 3 p.m. in the Hamner Funeral Home chapel with Father W. B. Washington, rector of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, officiating. Military services were conducted at graveside at Eastland Cemetery.

Mr. Canaris first came to Eastland in 1918 after serving with

the AEF in France during World War I. He opened the Palace of Sweets and operated it for several years.

He was born July 16, 1883 in Sparta, Greece. He came to this country when just 12 years of age. His childhood sweetheart, the former Helen Ermelios came to this country in 1921 and they were married in Eastland July 3, 1921.

Mr. Canaris had operated a photography studio here since 1940, and previously operated studios in New York City, Breckenridge and Cisco. He was a member of the Greek Orthodox Church, the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

During World War I he served with Co. G, 64th Infantry, Seventh Division.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Nicholas of Eastland; one daughter, Mrs. Bessie Westmoreland of Abilene; three brothers; five sisters and four grandchildren.

Hamner Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

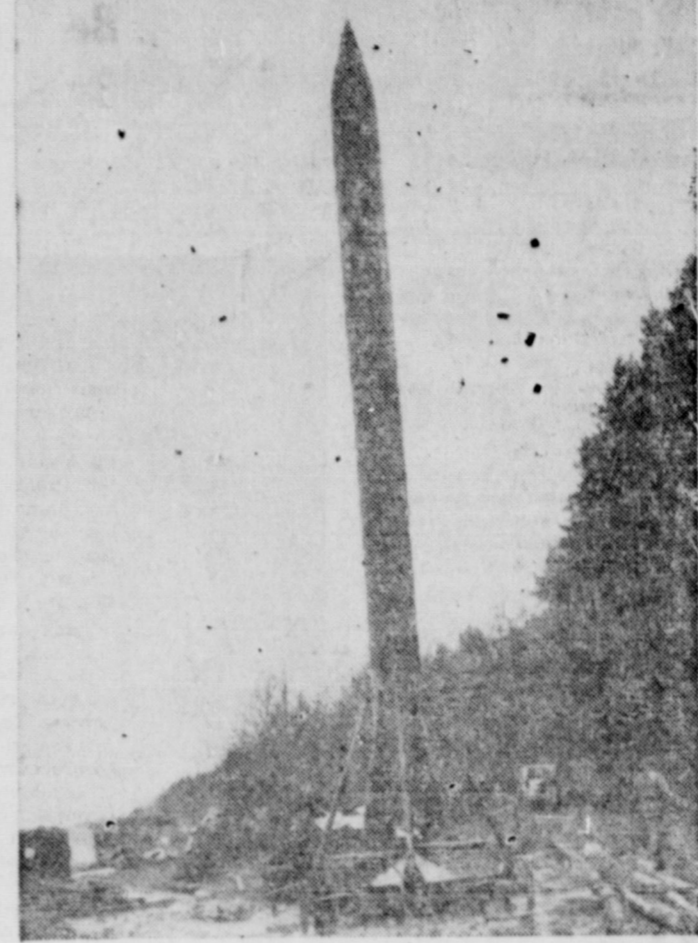

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## Soybeans Can Become An Important Crop

COLLEGE STATION—Soybeans have been grown in Texas for more than 40 years, but have not yet become an important crop although their potential value is recognized.  
Soybeans can be grown in most irrigated sections of Texas. In areas of higher rainfall, such as East Texas, yields are inconsistent under dryland conditions and the crop is not recommended unless irrigation facilities are available.  
Average yields under irrigation are approximately 25 bushels per acre, but some relatively large plantings have produced 30 to 40 bushels per acre. At this level of production, soybeans do not give as much cash return as grain sorghums. Soybeans, however, are valuable in a soil-improving rotation, and weed control following soybeans is not as serious a problem as following grain sorghum.  
Soybeans are adapted to about the same soil and climatic conditions as corn or cotton. They do best on well-drained, mellow, fertile and sandy loams, but good results can be obtained on most properly-drained soils if water is available for supplemental irrigation.  
They are usually planted in 36 to 42-inch rows at a rate to give 10 to 12 plants per foot of row. Date of seeding is important because of the sensitivity of the plants to day length and temperature. Optimum planting dates occur when the minimum soil temperature is above 65 degrees and the day length reaches 14 1/2 hours — May 15 to June 15 in about all areas of the state.  
The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has released a bulletin entitled Soybean Production in Texas. It discussed all phases of production including adaptation, production methods, fertilization, harvesting and storing. The bulletin is available free of charge from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for Bulletin 919.

One of the most important functions of the choker or bib style necklace is to make the face appear as lovely as possible. In order to do this the shape, color and texture of the beads should be in perfect harmony with the face and the costume.

The classic choker necklace of pearls appears in high fashion colors of white, shaded pastels or mother of pearl in such colors as navy, olive green and cyclamen. Textures will vary from the brogue, the pebbled, to the satin smooth finish. Pearls will also be found in combination with beads of different textures and colors. Because the eye is so attracted to the strand of beads, its selection should be given the same careful consideration as the neckline of your costume. The choker or bib produces pleasing roundness and also provides a soft transitional effect between the neckline and the face.

In selecting the choker, the size and shape of the head should be considered. The pearls should be kept in proportion to the face. A head that is large will make a thin face seem thinner, and a head that is tiny will make a large face seem larger.

The bib necklace that fits the base of the neck will add apparent width to the face and at the same time camouflage a bony structure.

An illusion of length may be created by necklaces which do not fit the base of the neck closely. Short oval loops of beads have a slight slenderizing effect. Longer strands of beads will increase the apparent length of the face and throat. A person with a prominent bustline should refrain from wearing a dangling rope of beads. One choice strand of pearls may be used with several costumes.

Handbags for Spring and Summer

Handbags of good leather are considered an investment and they

are the mark of a well-dressed woman. The leather handbag is a wise choice for wear with street and travel clothes. This bag should be simple in line and of durable leather. It should be as large as the proportion of the individual allows.

The trend is for bags to take on a new appearance this spring. They may be either slim and flat or softly gathered with contoured corners and a generally flattened silhouette.

The bag with handles is almost a "must" for travel. The handles are slim and less dominant. Look for the secure closure. Slide fastener compartments add to the convenience and safety of the handbag for street and travel wear.

To be smartly dressed for street or travel the material of the handbag should be the same as the shoes or harmonize with them. Select one of the basic colors for this accessory.
