Bond Sales Lag

Eastland County is lagging behind two other counties in District 16 in the purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds, according to the latest report from the U. S. Treasury Department.

February sales of bonds totaled \$61,649 in the County. This figure came in behind Taylor County, with sales amounting to \$137,331, and Nolan County, with sales of \$73,768.

Cumulative sales this year total \$110,254 in Eastland County, \$295,724 in Taylor County and \$109,589, in Nolan County.

Eastland County ranks fourth in the district of nine counties in amount of goal achieved for the year. The County has gained 20.2 percent of its goal — coming in behind Nolan, with 26.6, Haskell with 22.9, and Taylor with 20.9. The 1959 goal is \$645,000.

Total sales in Texas during the first two months of this year were \$31,100,328, representing 17 percent of the state's 1959 goal of \$182.5 million. February sales in Texas were \$14,952,679.

Willacy County leads the state with 108.6 percent of its state goal attained.

February sales in the Fort Worth area totaled \$2,551,714, representing 18.5 percent of the 1959 goal of \$29,000,000.

Vertical Integration May Become Prominent In Texas Agriculture

COLLEGE STATION — Vertical integration, a practice common in many nonagricultural industries, is sweeping into agriculture and many people think it may become a dominant force in the future development of Texas agriculture.

Vertical integration means the linking together of two or more stages of production, processing or marketing activities under one management. The key feature is that decision-making, risk-bearing and supervision are centralized.

The present trend is toward "partial" vertical integration, which involves the linking together of certain specialized stages of production, processing or marketing.

Vertical integration may involve farmer-businessman arrangements

Samples Aid Study of Fish Life In Lakes

AUSTIN — Netting samples taken from lakes and reservoirs around the State aid greatly in providing information on fish life on these bodies of water for biologists, according to the Director of Inland Fisheries, Texas Game and Fish Commission.

A 1958 resurvey of two reservoirs and one lake tell biologists that in some waters certain fish remain dominant from year to year and in others there is a change. For example, in Oak Creek reservoir netting and seining samples indicated that bluegill sunfish have become the most abundant fish in the lake by a wide majority. This species has jumped from 20.89 percent in 1953 to 66.04 percent in 1958. The average size was much smaller.

A resurvey of the fish in the San Angelo Reservoir showed biologists that there is a continuing trend on this lake toward increasing numbers of rough fish and decreasing numbers of game fish. White crappie, once most popular, has decreased in average size. According to samples, white bass are the only game fish that have increased in relative abundance. Channel cats have decreased in numbers but are still a favorite of the fishermen, who sometimes catch exceptionally large ones.

Samples taken from Lake Nasworthy indicated that the fish population on the lake has changed very little. The trend toward dominance by gizzard shad and river carpuckers has increased slightly. Channel cats have increased slightly in number while white bass and crappie were not as abundant.

Game Violators Pay High Fines

AUSTIN — Trespassing continues the bane of game wardens. There were 59 persons arrested during February for trespassing on private property for their hunting, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

The monthly report showed a total of \$8,184.78 paid in fines for game violations. Court costs amounted to \$483 on the total of 258 arrests made by the wardens. Night hunting was next high on the list of violations. There were 36 arrests for headlighting.

Fishermen without licenses also came in for 34 arrests, while 27 paid fines for hunting without licenses.

The director warned again about fishing without licenses. "With the advent of warmer weather and more fishing, everyone should be careful about having his license," he said. "A license is required of all fishermen between 16 and 65 who fish outside of their home county, or fish with any kind of winding device anywhere, either in their home county or on the coast."

"Licenses can be obtained from so many sources there should be no difficulty in getting them."

The price of the Texas fishing license is \$2.15. This license is good either for coastal or fresh water fishing, or for non-residents who fish in Texas waters.

would do under actual operating conditions. One of the favorite spots to test-drive a car in this neck of the woods was Ranger's Eastland Hill. That's the hill in the west part of Ranger just this side of the swimming pool in that city.

We drive up that hill today and never give it a thought. Perhaps a lot of our people never noticed there was a hill there, but in the days before the paved roads that was some hill, mainly because it was so rough one couldn't drive up it very fast without bouncing right out of one's car. Therefore it was considered quite an accomplishment for a car to easily drive up Eastland Hill in high gear.

Curly has driven a car up this hill so much in the old days that I'll bet if he had a nickel for every time he drove up that hill demonstrating what a Ford would do he could buy himself another fine calf.

Not only were the starter and foot accelerator lever optional equipment on the Model T, but the spare tire was also. The extra tire was mounted on the back of the car in those days in what they now call the "continental" style. European car manufacturers didn't come out with anything new when they put the spare outside the car itself, that's where American manufacturers put it 33 years or more ago. It took them years to figure out how to put the tire inside and out of the way, and a lot of us wouldn't go back to the old style even if it was labeled the fashionable thing to do.

Along about 1927 the Ford spare was mounted on a rack made in the shape of the letter "Y". The tire was mounted on a clincher-type rim and the rim fitted around the extremes of the Y. The Ford people were very proud of this mount, it was stout and strong and firmly affixed to the car's body.

One of the fellows working for Bohning at that time was a young man by the name of Hackett. He was demonstrating to some of us boys down in their show room one day how strong this tire rack was. He grabbed the top of a mounted (Continued on Page Three)
