Ninty-Six Golfers Enter Local Tourney

Champ Golfers Play For Medalist Today

Clearing skies late Friday afternoon gladdened many a golfer's heart at the Lakeside Country Club in Eastland where the Ninth Annual Invitation Golf Tournament got underway.

Heavy rainfall during the week—more than six inches—with more than two inches coming Friday, killed out plans for a program event, and qualifying for medalist honors. Championship Flight golfers will compete for medalist honors during their first nine holes today (Saturday), however, and the program has been reset for July 4.

As it was, a few golfers played qualifying rounds, but most just turned in qualifying scores. Ninety-six golfers are entered in the event.

Match play got underway Saturday morning. Second round matches will be played Saturday afternoon, with semi-final rounds Sunday morning and the final matches Sunday afternoon.

Sane Driving Urged During 4th Holidays

The Fourth of July holidays, one of the most deadly holidays of the year as far as traffic officers are concerned, faces Eastland County citizens square on.

The County can be proud of its record this year, however, since only one person has met death on the highways. That compares to 10 traffic deaths in the county at this same time a year ago.

Local officers are just hoping that the county can still be proud after the weekend holidays are over. For the Texas Department of Public Safety lists the highway between the Eastland - Erath county line and Howard County as one of the danger spots in the state.

Eastland Police Chief Ray Laney, Sgt. C. A. Cockrell of the Highway Patrol and Sheriff J. B. Williams have all urged sane driving over the holidays. Sgt. Cockrell said the Highway Patrol would be out in full force July 3, 4 and 5. He said traffic laws would be rigidly enforced in this area and throughout the state.

Cockrell is in charge of a five county area and stationed in Eastland. He said that six traffic deaths have been recorded in his area so far in 1959, the last two having involved pedestrians. A truck hit and killed a little girl in Shackelford County and a Brown County girl was struck by a car and killed this past week.

The Eastland County trend, a one thousand percent decrease in traffic deaths, has not been the statewide trend. Traffic deaths are mounting in the state this year.

The Texas Department of Public Safety forecast 26 persons will be killed in traffic accidents next weekend.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director, issued the grim prediction along with an urgent plea to motorists to "prove we have overestimated by maintaining unusual alertness to the added dangers of holiday traffic."

He noted that the prediction of 26 traffic fatalities is one more than the 25 victims counted in a similar three-day Fourth of July period last year. The prediction is higher this year, he said, because of a definite upward trend in motorcides.

"Therefore, it can be said that the streets and highways of Texas will be potentially more dangerous during the celebration of Independence Day this year," Garrison said.

The Public Safety Director announced that "Operation Holiday" will be in effect starting at 12:01 a.m. Friday, July 3, until midnight Sunday, July 5. During this period all radar units available will be in operation, and the Highway Patrol force will be expanded by some 125 additional patrolmen from the License and Weight and Motor Vehicle Inspection divisions.

"We will do everything in our power to stem the tide of motorcides next weekend," he said, "but the main job belongs to the driving public, who must guard against dangerous driving factors such as speed too fast for conditions,



drinking and driving, fatigue, and just general inattention."

Garrison reminded also: "The fatality list, already nearing the 1,000 mark at mid-year, is shocking. But in addition we must remember the untold suffering of thousands of persons who are injured in highway wrecks in addition to the tremendous economic loss involved."

He pointed out that traffic deaths are up about 10 per cent at Baird last year.

Commissioners Court Had Problems In 1880

A lot of things have changed since 1880, but then there are a lot of things which haven't too. This reporter got rained in the courthouse the other day, and while there pulled down Volume 2 of the Commissioners Court minutes for inspection. The records, all written in longhand, are in good shape, considering that it has been 79 years since they were written. What the records show is that commissioners faced many of the problems back then that they face today. There was the problem of money spent on charity, the problem of where to get needed money and the problem of intoxicating beverage elections.

There were other problems then too. For instance, much work was being done then to "sufficiently define" the county's borders. J. H. Hudson, then county surveyor, was kept busy working with surveyors from Brown, Palo Pinto and Stephens counties staking out the county lines.

And in 1881 there was that election to move the courthouse. Cisco citizens were fighting hard to move the courthouse to that city.

In 1880 the Commissioners Court was composed of E. S. Boughter, Precinct 1; R. V. Jones, Precinct 2; A. J. O'Rios, Precinct 3; and J. F. White, Precinct 4.

Members of the Court in 1881 were J. R. Brown, Precinct 1; J. C. Smith, Precinct 2; G. A. Jones, Precinct 3; and L. W. Trader, Precinct 4.

Records reveal the Court in 1880 didn't mind splitting a hair. When R. A. McNeilly of Stephens County submitted a bill for putting up posts on the Eastland and Stephens counties line, the Court authorized payment to him of \$5.81 1/4.

The Court faced the problem of a liquor election square on. When 25 persons petitioned for the election one was called for Sept. 4, 1880. When the election was held 98 persons voted against prohibition and 33 voted for. Dry forces were defeated, but the following year, and the year after that they petitioned for new elections.

The Court minutes show that the Commission in that year also faced charity cases. A widow with four children and no visible means of support was granted \$45 "until the next meeting of the Court." The Court met monthly. And there were many other examples of the county's aiding those in need.

It would appear, from reading the Court minutes, that a squabble over a petition in the old courthouse decided the issue of building a new one. In 1881 the Court called for bids on a small building to house county offices. M. Brodriek was successful bidder at \$380.

Taxes were a problem then even as they are today. The Court, in 1881, passed a tax levy of one-fourth of one percent to defray expenses of the county and another one-fourth of one percent for repairing public buildings.

And the minutes show that routine business was the thing which commissioners spent most of their time on then, just as it is today. The Court seemed to be more dignified, however, for a county officer, usually the sheriff, called the meeting to order each time the Court met.

Rainfall Here Totals 8.87

June rainfall climbed nearer an all-time record in Eastland Friday after more heavy rains fell.

Two and sixty-three hundredths inches of rainfall has been recorded here since Thursday. That pushes the total for the month to 8.87 inches, and the total for the year to 15.85 inches. More than half the moisture which has fallen in Eastland this year has been recorded in June.

County farmers and ranchers, already pleased with June moisture, weren't frowning about the new rainfall. Some said the additional rain wasn't really needed, but no one was willing to turn down rain in June, which is usually one of this area's driest months.

While the Eastland area seemed to continue to get the hardest rains, the entire county reported good amounts of moisture. Stock tanks in part of the county filled up, but many still could hold more water. There was not a great amount of runoff, considering the amount of rainfall which fell.

June of 1959 now ranks second only to June of 1940 as the wettest June ever. Rainfall that year

Dr. Isbell Will Study Addiction On European Trip

The National Institutes of Health are sending Dr. Harris Isbell to Europe for studies which will be the beginning of a "sabbatical leave" program.

Dr. Isbell was reared in Eastland and is the son of Mrs. F. T. Isbell and the late Dr. Isbell of Eastland. He is a brother of Mrs. Elizabeth Vaught of Eastland and Jim Isbell of Richmond, Virginia.

Dr. Isbell will sail from New York July 2.

He will study problems of addiction in Europe for a year and then return to the United States about July 1, 1960.

"This is the beginning of a program the National Institutes will have periodically for all their senior scientists. They will be allowed to study for a year wherever they choose in order to polish up on whatever is pertinent to their respective fields," Dr. Isbell stated.

Dr. Isbell will be based at Geneva, Switzerland from July through January. There he will be associated with the Addiction Producing Drug Section of the World Health Organization. While in Geneva, he will visit the ministries of health in Switzerland, France, Italy, Belgium, Holland, Denmark, West Germany and Austria.

Following the stay in Geneva, Dr. Isbell will be based in London from where similar studies will be made of England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales until March.

From March to June he will be in Stockholm, Sweden. Working with Dr. Leonard Goldberg at the Karolinska Institute in Stockholm, Dr. Isbell will study the program of the Swedish government of problems of alcoholism.

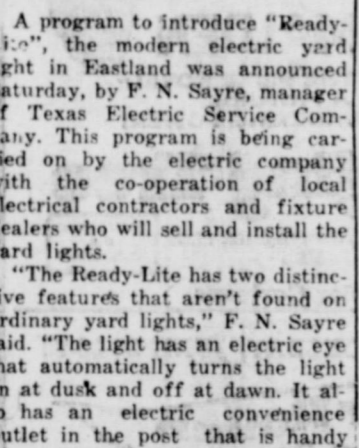
If one had told us that it would rain this much in June, we would most certainly have had to doubt his word. And we would still like someone to explain to us where all this moisture has come from.

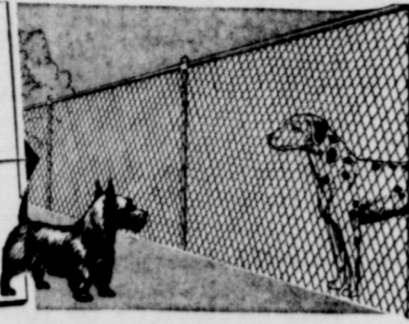

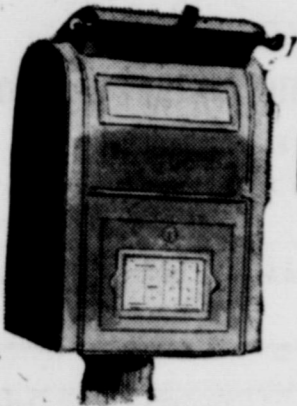

over last year, with approximately 100 more victims counted to date. This factor was taken into consideration by N. K. Woerner, Manager of the Statistical Services Section, in arriving at the estimate of 26 motorcides for the three-day holiday. Woerner reported that by coincidence, the average Fourth of July traffic death toll over the last eight years was 26. The highest toll for the three-day period was in 1954, when 33 persons were killed in traffic.

"In addition to the greater traffic hazard, July Fourth celebrations involve swimming, boating, picnicking and fireworks," Woerner noted. "Drownings, food poisonings and burns are of high frequency during this period. To protect life and property, the public should be extra cautious in all their activities."

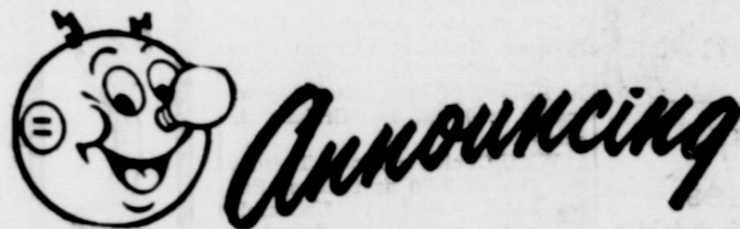

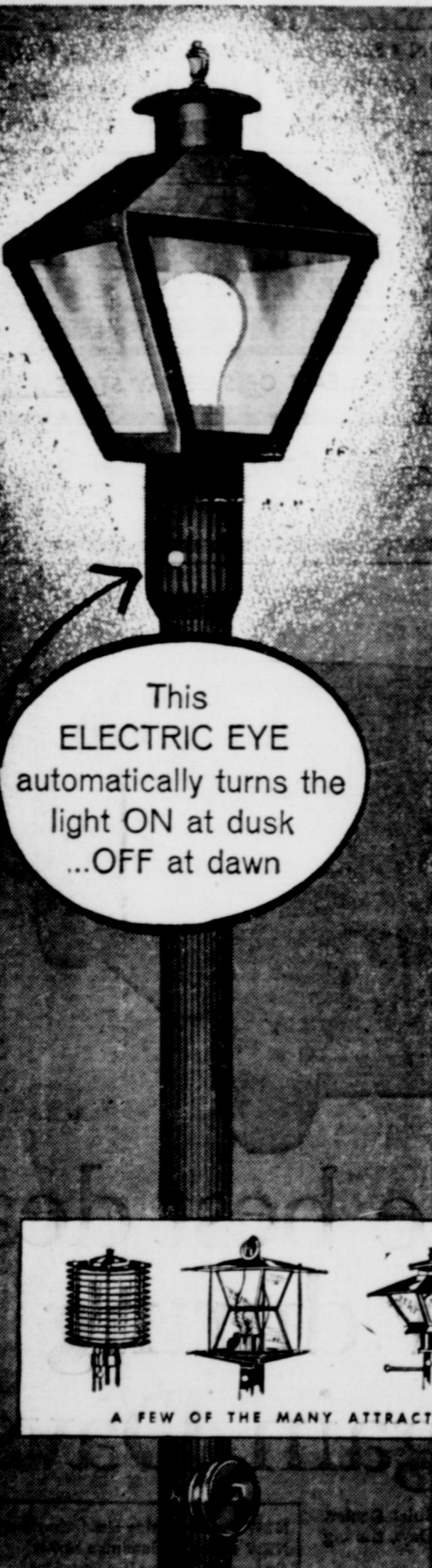
