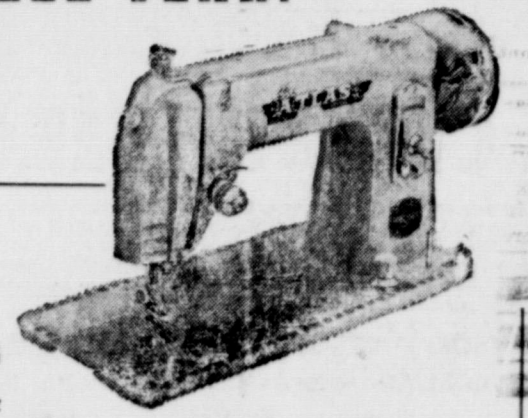

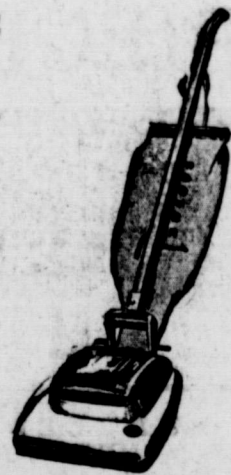

**Cottonseed Is Now Used As Protein Feed**

COLLEGE STATION — Cottonseed now has a market as a high protein feed for poultry and swine, says the USDA. Improved processing techniques have made this new use possible by lowering of the free gossypol content in the meal.

Prior to 1957, says the USDA, use of cottonseed meal for livestock rations was limited largely to cattle because of the gossypol, a pigment that is toxic to poultry and swine.

Although variable from year to year, the new market for cottonseed meal has been estimated by the USDA to have reached 300,000 tons annually in recent years. California, at the present time, is the largest market for the improv-

ed cottonseed meal, where in 1958 an estimated 200,000 tons went into poultry rations.

In the past, even when fed to laying hens at low, non-toxic levels, gossypol in unimproved cottonseed meal caused egg yolk discoloration. The improved cottonseed meals, however, can be fed at levels up to 10 percent of the total diet of hens with no adverse effect on yolks of eggs produced for the fresh egg market.

USDA's Agricultural Research Service began work early in the 1940's to improve cottonseed meal. Studies of the chemical and physical properties of cottonseed and of the pigment glands containing gossypol gave scientists of the ARS Southern Utilization Research and Development Division, New Orleans, an understanding of the role played by gossypol and laid the groundwork for producing cottonseed meal with a low gossypol content.

Further work indicated that the glands containing gossypol could be ruptured during processing by several means, and a large part of the freed toxic material could then be inactivated at a much lower temperature than was previously thought possible. Also, low processing temperatures favor high protein quality in the meal. However, achievements to date do not complete the research required to realize the full feeding potential of cottonseed meal, the USDA added.

**Moss Control To Be Discussed In Breck Meet**

The control of moss and other aquatic weeds in ponds will be the main topic presented in Breckenridge, Friday, July 17. Stock pond owners of Stephens County are urged to attend this meeting scheduled for 2 p. m. in the Stephens County District Courthouse.

"Many farmers and ranchers of this area have ponds choked with moss which interferes with fishing and cattle watering," commented Jack Gressett, local county agent. "That is the reason Ed Cooper, Extension Wildlife Conservation Specialist, has been invited to conduct this meeting," pointed out the agent. Cooper will also discuss fish stocking rates, how to clear muddy ponds, proper fishing methods, pond fertilization for increased fish production, and any other problem which may be brought up at the meeting. The specialist is one of the most outstanding wildlife men in the State of Texas.

Results of a moss control demonstration on the Ed Ford ranch near Ivan, will be outlined. The demonstration included the use of 2,4-D pellets on one-half of a three acre stock pond heavily infested with different types of moss. According to the manufacturer and this experiment, the chemical in the water will not harm fish or livestock.

**Texas Electric Purchases Plant In Burkburnett**

Burkburnett, Texas — Sale of the Burkburnett city-owned electric plant and system to Texas Electric Service Company for \$972,000 has been completed. Burkburnett city officials and officials of the electric company met with representatives of the First Southwest Corporation to retire the outstanding revenue bonds of the city's water and electric systems and to complete other details for transferring the property at midnight Wednesday.

Burkburnett citizens voted nearly 2 to 1 in a special election last April to sell the plant which the City has operated in competition with the electric company since 1933. Combining the city's system with that of the electric company will make possible the elimination of unnecessary duplicating poles, lines and guy wires in the city.

Sale of the light plant enabled the city to pay off and cancel the balance of its water and electric system revenue bonds, amounting to \$641,000. City officials have pledged the cash remaining from the sale to pay part of the cost of a city-wide sewer system and new sewage disposal plant.

Texas Electric Service Company's standard schedules of electric rates go into effect in Burkburnett Thursday. If these rates had been in effect for the past year, Burkburnett citizens would have saved a total of approximately \$20,000.

The electric company has completed construction of a new high voltage power line and substation to make greatly increased amounts of electricity available for Burkburnett customers. This construction is part of a \$375,000 expenditure the company will make for additional electric service facilities to serve customers in Burkburnett and to improve the street lighting system.

All former employees of the city electric system have accepted jobs with the electric company.

### AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—In May 1958, this column discussed the virtual impossibility of deporting foreign hoodlums, Communists and other undesirables as long as money was provided to hire lawyers. At that time there were pending in the courts 7,000 and 8,000 orders for deportation, but not a one of them had been deported. The House of Representatives has now passed a measure to prevent these long delays. The bill provides that the Appellate Federal Courts shall have exclusive review of ad-

ministrative decisions in deportation cases. This means that an alien can not continue to file frivolous and repeated petitions in crowded courts for the purpose of delaying and remaining in this Country indefinitely. In some cases, as many as 10 separate suits in 10 separate courts have been filed by one individual. Certain aliens are in the United States today, against whom proceedings for deportation were started more than 10 years ago. Murderers, narcotic peddlers, extortioners and those in organized crime across the Country are able to secure unlimited funds with which to stay in court. The legislation just passed by the House of Representatives will end this sort

of fiasco. This column in 1958 described the so-called William Heikkila case which was then current in the news. A more recent one is a character by the name of Marcello, ordered deported five years, 9 months and 24 days ago, but who is still in the Country. He appeared before the McClellan Rackets Committee and admitted that in all the years he has been in the United States he has not been naturalized. He is involved in a whole series of crimes. He also admitted before the Committee he is wanted in Italy on criminal charges. He took the Fifth Amendment before the McClellan Committee investigating racketeering. He and many others have remained in the Country by repeated

court action. As soon as one case was decided against him, he simply moved into another court and went through the same procedure. At present, there is no limit under existing law and not even a requirement that a judge to whom an alien makes application for relief from a deportation order, shall be informed that there was a previous determination of his case. The bill passed by the House this week will prevent this sort of action. Under a Supreme Court ruling in 1956, should an alien be denied entry into the United States, he could file a lawsuit, charging the privilege. No such thing was ever heard of in law until the Supreme Court made this decision. This is cured by this bill.

A second provision requires an alien to start any court action within 6 months from the time it has been administrative determined that he is to be deported. Under the present system, the alien can wait around for years while the Government is trying to obtain a passport for his departure. A third provision is that court action must be started in the Appellate Courts and not in Trial Courts where dockets are exceedingly crowded. The alien must bring his suit in the vicinity where he lives and where deportation proceedings were conducted, and not select a court all the way across the Country in order to delay. Repeated Court Actions are Prevented.

We can hope the United States Senate will also pass this measure and that the President will sign it in order to meet an extremely serious situation.

### Billy Gibbons Sets Camping Week, July 27

Hundreds of Boy Scouts and Explorers, under the leadership of their Scoutmasters and Explorer Advisors, have returned home after spending a week at Boy Scout Camp Billy Gibbons, completing its 28th season of camping. Local Scouts and leaders were present at the camp. "We camped ten per cent more scout campers than last year and we are very pleased with the results", according to Lowell Pouncey, chairman of camping and activities in the eight-country area. There were 421 Scouts and Leaders in Camp this season. He further stated, "we are grateful to the Scoutmasters and Advisors for their leadership in training the Scouts and together with the twenty-six staff members we feel we had the best in leadership and program. The food was good, the weather ideal, the advancement above average and the spirit and fellowship unexcelled."

Camp Billy Gibbons is located in San Saba County on Brady Creek and is available year-around for camping and training by local Scout Troops and Posts. There will be a Troop Camping week, July 27 - August 2, when Troops and Posts that did not camp in June are welcome to bring their provisions of groceries, cooking and eating gear, tentage and under their leadership camp for this period of time. The Council will provide supervision for swimming, boating, archery and camp fire activities along with refrigeration and trucking service without cost to the Scouts. There is no fee.

Program plans have been announced to conduct special parent meetings with the Scouts to complete plans to attend. Reservations must be made through the Scout Office in Brownwood by July 20 giving the number who will camp during the week.

### Retailing Of Turkeys Is On the Increase

College Station - Retailing of fresh and frozen turkey parts is gradually increasing in Texas stores, according to Dr. R. E. Branson of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. At least one regional food chain has found a ready market for the product. Inadequate supplies, he said, rather than lack of consumer demand have been the main problem.

A survey of shoppers at a Texas supermarket handling turkey parts showed that they are steady users of the product. More than half the shoppers interviewed served turkey parts three to five times a month, said Dr. Branson. The turkey is sold in many forms such as parts, steaks, cut-up and patties. Retail food stores and processors are increasing their interest in year-round merchandising of turkey in these several forms. These new merchandising methods should be of interest to those food dealers desiring to maximize their share of the expanding market for this product.

The survey showed that the meatiest turkey parts are sold to higher income families as parts or as deboned turkey steaks. The bonier parts are purchased by lower income shoppers. Size, freshness, cleanliness and plumpness of the turkey parts are considered most by shoppers, he said. Those buying turkey parts rated them very favorably as to family acceptance compared with other meats such as beef, pork, fish and chicken. A wide variety of dishes can be made with turkey parts. Baking is the most prevalent method of preparation. Other methods include smothered, steamed, stewed, creamed, soup and salads, Dr. Branson added.

**LEMON-COCONUT CHIFFON PUDDING**  
1 package lemon pie filling  
1/4 cup sugar  
2 1/2 cups cold water  
2 egg yolks  
2 teaspoons lemon juice  
Grated rind of 1 lemon  
2 egg whites  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/2 cup shredded coconut

Combine lemon pie filling with 1/4 cup sugar in saucepan. Gradually add water and slightly beaten egg yolks, stirring to keep smooth. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a full boil. Break flavor capsule if undissolved; stir until filling. Remove from heat. Stir in juice and rind. Beat egg whites until foamy; gradually beat in sugar until mixture holds stiff peaks. Fold hot lemon mixture into egg whites; fold in coconut. Turn into dessert dishes. To serve, top with more coconut or with whipped cream. Makes 8 servings.

**DATE BRAIDS**  
1 1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/4 cup shortening  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1/2 cup warm, not hot, water (lukewarm for compressed yeast)  
3 packages or cakes yeast (active dry or compressed)  
2 eggs, beaten  
About 5 cups sifted enriched flour

Scald milk. Add sugar, shortening and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Sprinkle or crumble yeast into water (warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; lukewarm for compressed yeast). Stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture and eggs. Stir in about 2 1/2 cups of the flour. Beat until smooth. Add enough of the remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn dough out on floured board and knead until smooth and satiny, about 5 minutes. Form dough into a smooth ball. Press top of dough ball into greased bowl, then turn dough over. (This greases the top.) Cover and let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 45 minutes. Punch down. Cover and let rest 5 to 10 minutes. While dough is rising, prepare Date Filling\*. Use one-half of dough for each cake. Roll out each half into an oblong about 16 x 8 inches. Spread half the Date Filling the length of the center third of the oblong. Cut 15 slits in dough along each side of filling, making strips about 1 inch wide. Fold strips at an angle across filling, alternating from side to side. Place the braids on a greased baking sheet. Cover. Let rise in a warm place until doubled in bulk, about 50 minutes. Brush tops of braids with 1 egg yolk mixed with 2 tablespoons milk, then sprinkle each with 1 tablespoon sugar. Bake at 350° F. (moderate oven) about 35 minutes. Remove from baking sheet and cool on rack.

**\*DATE FILLING**  
Combine 1 cup chopped pitted dates, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 3/4 cup water, 1/2 cup pecans, chopped and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Heat in saucepan until boiling, and continue boiling until thick enough to spread.
