SCRANTON — The rapidly-growing Scranton Reunion is scheduled for Sunday, June 14, with close to 500 friends and former residents of this thriving farm and ranch community expected to attend.

An all-day program—including a worship service, outdoor picnic, entertainment and speeches—has been planned for the annual event which brings together residents and former citizens of this once-thriving community. More than 350 persons attended last year.

Second morning at 9:15 with registration in the Scranton Community Gymnasium. Church services will be held in the gym at 10:45 a.m. with Dr. Hugh E. Bradshaw of West Monroe, La., former Scranton resident, to be the speaker.

All ex-students who have become ministers, or any former Scranton pastors, are invited to be platform guests for the morning service.

A luncheon and visitation period is scheduled from noon to 2 p.m. Sunday afternoon. Each person will furnish his own basket lunch. Bill Ledbetter, a Scranton High School ex-student and now athletic director at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, will serve as master of ceremonies for the afternoon session which begins at 2 p.m.

Music will be furnished by Dr. C. E. Adams and the "Three Blind Mice," Abilene humorists and vocalists. A short business session will conclude the reunion. The reunion will be dedicated to John H. Shrader, a veteran school teacher and administrator in the Scranton and Callahan County area who now lives between Putnam and Scranton.

## Warford Is Winner Of Golf Tournament

Tommy Warford, young Ranger golfer who just graduated from Ranger High School, successfully defended his county golf title during the annual County Golf Tournament at Lakeside Country Club in Eastland.

Warford fired subpar golf to defeat Eastland's Don Doyle in the finals. The Ranger golfer was two under par for 18 holes and Doyle was one under. Tommy gained a 1-up decision.

First Flight champion was R. P. (Buddy) Haun. Haun downed Aubrey Kincaid 1-up in the finals. W. Q. Verner was consolation winner.

Second Flight champion was George Parrack. Odis Kelly carried Parrack three extra holes before losing 1-up on the 21st green. Joe Stephen was consolation winner.

Winner of the Third Flight was Virgil Moore. Moore beat B. J. Cox of Ranger 2 and 1 in the finals. James K. Smith won consolation honors, beating John Merritt of Ranger 3 and 1.

The Championship Flight consolation winner has not yet been determined.

The Doyle-Warford match was one of the closest ever in the finals. Both golfers toured the front nine in two under 34's. Warford was even par for the back nine and Doyle slipped one over. Warford gained his victory on the No. 5 green on the back nine when Doyle bogged the hole. The hole is considered the easiest on the course.

Doyle almost got even on the next hole, a lone five par affair.

## Here's Where State's Money Comes From

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles concerning state finances.)

In Thursday's paper a study of state expenditures was made and it was found that most of the State's money is spent for education, highways and roads and public welfare.

But where does the money come from? Despite all of the Austin talk about keeping state rights, the biggest single amount comes from the Federal government. A total of \$252,800,983 was turned over to the state by the U. S. government in 1958.

The highway motor fuel tax brings in the next largest amount, with the crude oil tax not far behind.

Most of the money comes directly from individual Texans, however. The fuel tax, motor vehicle licenses, cigarette tax, and auto sales tax are direct or indirect taxes which hit all citizens.

## County Guard Units Leave For Ft. Hood

About 30 members of Ranger's National Guard Unit will leave Sunday morning by convoy for two week's camp at North Fort Hood. They will return to Ranger Sunday afternoon, June 21.

Highlight of the summer training will be the annual Governor's Day parade and armored review on Saturday, June 13. Governor Price Daniel will review the 49th Armored (Lone Star) Division in a colorful ceremony which includes many award presentations, at that time. The division will crown Miss 49th Armored Division, one of 17 candidates elected by units, and a military ball will be held June 12.

Under the recent reorganization of the Texas Army National Guard, the Ranger unit has been changed from Service Battery No. 648, Armored Field Artillery, to Service Battery, Third Rocket and Howitzer Bn., Armored Field Artillery.

Company Commander is J. N. Williams. Warrant Officers are Joseph M. Nash, of Midland, supply officer for the battalion; and Paul D. Lewis, assistant adjutant of the battalion from San Angelo; First Sergeant of the Unit is William R. McGregor, and Master Sergeant is Allen Rushing, ammunition supply.

An advanced detachment left Ranger Friday morning to make preparations for the main group.

Members of the Ranger unit are from Strawn, Cisco, Eastland, Dallas, Gorman and Morton Valley.

To prepare for its mission on the atomic battlefield, the division has stepped up its training program for the encampment. Unit tactics will be stressed and the division will be in the field for five days.

Training will center around military occupation specialty training, infiltration and hand grenade courses, range firing with eight-inch howitzers and 1.55 howitzers, firing M-1 carbines and 50-30 calibre machine guns.

## John W. Ducker Dies Wednesday; Services Held

John William Ducker, 63, a former Ranger resident who was a retired geologist and oil man, died at 6:15 a.m. Wednesday of a heart attack at his home, east of Mineral Wells.

Funeral services were held Thursday at 4 p.m. in St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Mineral Wells. Attending the services were a group of Eastland County residents.

Ducker, a native of Fort Worth, was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Ducker, well known in music circles in the early 1900's. She was Maud Peters Ducker, a soprano opera singer.

Mr. Ducker was active in civic affairs in Ranger. He was a member of the American Legion Tickville Band and the Episcopal Church. His wife, Mrs. Ruth Ducker, is a former editor of the Ranger Times who has edited the Daily Index in Mineral Wells since 1951.

Survivors also include a daughter, Mrs. Charles V. Brown of Midland; a brother, Louis Henry of St. Louis, Mo.; and two grandchildren.

## Don't Tip Off Thieves You're On Vacation

With vacation time here again, Police Chief Ray Laney today issued his annual reminder to citizens to take steps to avoid leaving tattletale signs around their deserted homes while on vacation.

Laney said that between the peak vacation months this year it is estimated that some 1,500 American homes will be burglarized every 24 hours. Those figures are estimated by the FBI.

The police chief recommended these pre-vacation steps to thief-proof homes:

- (1) Tell the postman about your temporary change in address and cancel milk and newspaper deliveries until you return home. A collection of unopened milk bottles, a stuffed mail box or a pile of newspapers on the front porch is an invitation to burglars who constantly watch for such signals, he said.
- (2) Notify police and tell them how long you will be away. The police will try to keep a watch for any signs of unusual activity at your home.
- (3) Inform a neighbor of your plans and give him your vacation address.
- (4) Do not leave cash or valuables in the house unless protected in an approved armored steel safe. Otherwise place valuables in the bank.
- (5) Securely lock all windows and doors. Don't just slam the door. Lock it with a key so the lock provides added security.

## Bond Sales Lag In County

Guy Parker, County Savings Bonds Chairman, announced today that Savings Bonds sales for the first four months of 1959 totaled \$184,578 which equaled 33.9 per cent of the county's 1959 goal. April sales in the county were \$50,492.

Sales for the first four months of the year totaled \$68,105,381 of which \$12,908,783 were purchased in April. Texas has achieved 31.8 per cent of its yearly goal of \$182,500,000.

County sales rated fourth in amount in the district and fifth in percentage of goal achieved. First in sales was Taylor County with \$93,865 reported; second was Jones County with \$54,426; and third was Nolan County with sales of \$50,756, achieving the highest percentage of its goal in the district—45.2.

These counties plus Fisher and Shackelford placed higher than Eastland County in reaching their goal. Nine counties compose the district.

April sales in the Fort Worth area totaled \$2,125,793, a figure representing 34.1 percent of the goal of \$29,000,000.

## World War I Veterans To Hold Open House

An open house meeting of Ranger Barracks No. 1871, Veterans of World War I will be held at the American Legion Hall in Ranger on Friday, June 12, at 7:30 p.m. according to W. H. Clarke, Barracks Commander. Wives, sons, daughters, and widows of World War I veterans will be guests of honor.

According to Department Commander R. Lee Davis of Orange, the Lone Star State now ranks among the top states of the union in the number of Barracks, or local units, which have been chartered during the past six months. Commander Davis further stated that from the national point of view, there are now nearly 2,000 organized Barrack units—including Ranger and other a r e a Oilbelt cities. This number, he states, is scheduled for a substantial increase during the forthcoming months.


