You will say to each other, "This is the Place!"

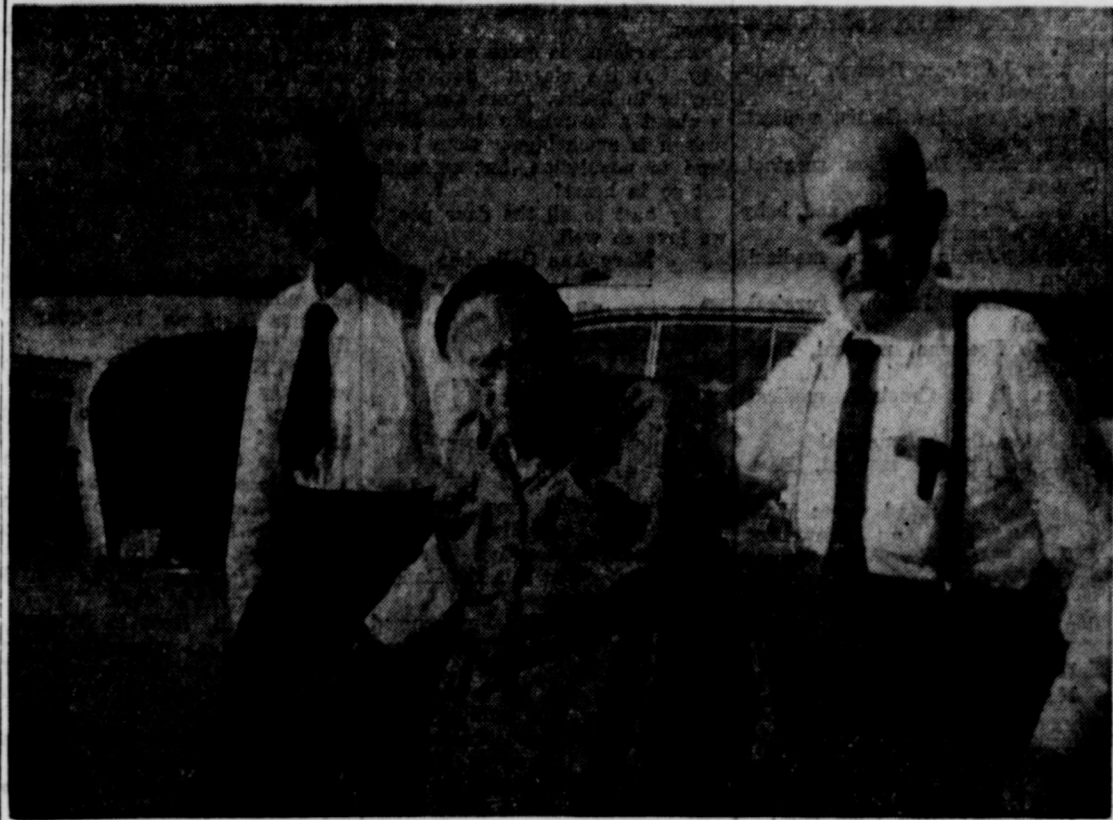

Rotarians Told of Atomic Energy Work

Eastland Rotarians were told Monday that if the work of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation is successful . . . we will have an almost unlimited supply of fuel, enough to meet our energy requirements for thousands of years into the future."

Making the prediction was Howard R. Drew, of Fort Worth, executive vice president of the TAERF, a foundation supported by 11 privately-owned Texas utility companies, including Texas Electric Service Co.

Drew was introduced by Frank Sayre, Texas Electric Co. district manager.

"During the early post-war years, we were deluged with fanciful stories about how the atom would revolutionize our way of living and be the instrument for providing undeveloped countries a standard of living equal to ours," Drew said.

Pointing out that disillusionment soon followed, he said sound work began.

"There is now no doubt that the power of the atom can be used to generate electric power," the speaker said.

Drew reminded Rotarians that fossil fuels — coal, oil and gas — are definitely limited. But he said Texas has more fossil fuels in reserve than any other area, thus predicted that the Southwest will be one of the first areas to use atomic power to generate electricity.

So far, he declared, the economics of atomic power generation has not been worked out. **EASTLAND NATIONAL BANK** "On The Square" Member F. D. I. C.

Three Visitors Are All More Than 90

Two brothers and a sister, former Eastland residents, visited here recently. That may not be an unusual bit of news, but the fact that the youngest of these three was 92 is.

The three visitors were W. I. Hunt, 98, of Breckenridge, George Hunt, 94, of Dilley, and Mrs. Julia Mayes 92, of Abilene.

They were visitors in the home of Mrs. M. W. Grieger, George Hunt's daughter.

The two brothers and sister have a combined age of 284 years. They are the children of the late Rev. and Mrs. E. M. Hunt, who moved to Eastland from Grayson County in 1895. Their parents made Eastland their home the rest of their lives. Rev. Hunt died when 84 years old and Mrs. Hunt lived to be 96.

Rev. Hunt, a Baptist minister, was licensed to preach in 1867 and was an active minister, preaching all over the surrounding country for more than 30 years.

The oldest son, W. I. lived on a farm in Wayland for several years. He taught school and was county surveyor in Stephens County at one time. At one time or another he held almost every office in the county.

Adult Class In Homemaking Held In Eastland

Each year in June an adult class is organized to give instruction in some phase of homemaking. The class is taught by Miss Loretta Morris, homemaking teacher.

During the month this year classes have been held on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. Instruction and practice in clothing construction has been this year's agenda.

Each person attending is making a dress for herself or her child. They have been taught how to lay a pattern, stay-stitch, make darts, pleat, gather, set in sleeves, match plaids, use interfacing, cover buttons and buckles and make belts. They are learning to make garments that have a professional look.

A nursery has been provided for the children of the women attending. It has been kept by the girls who are taking the summer experience in homemaking. The students have also made typewriter covers, toys for children and have planned and carried out some type of entertainment. One group cooked their breakfast in the park, one gave a reception and another had a swim party and ate the supper they had prepared in the foods laboratory.

Moisture Here Good; County Rains Scattered

This June has been the wettest June in Eastland since 1940, a check of Weather Bureau records revealed this morning.

Heavy rainfall during the past three mornings has brought the area's yearly rainfall back up to near normal after five sub-normal months. Rainfall in June alone has amounted to 4.61, pushing the yearly moisture measurement up to 11.99. Average rainfall for this time of year is 13.85 inches.

This morning's rainfall amounted to just .05 inches. Monday morning .48 was recorded, and Sunday morning's official measurement was 1.29. Heavier measurements were reported in the north section of the city (the official gauge is in the south part of town).

Gray Matter

Progress is a good thing to have on one's side. It's good to see things progress. I don't suppose there is a more progressive little town in all of America than Eastland. We're making so many changes around here that face of the city is being lifted.

The telephone company is putting in a new building that will make phoning a lot less effort than the old system. We'll be dying to dial our friends and discuss the time of day with them. But progress also has its drawbacks. Every advancement also has its disadvantages. After the dial system goes into effect one will no longer be able to call central and tell her you're going to take a nap and to call you back in an hour and so to wake you up. This sort of thing just isn't done in the dial systems. There isn't anyone on hand to keep an eye on the clock for you. That's a disadvantage.

The new-fangled dial set-up may be the most modern thing on earth telephone-wise, but it will lose for the company's customers the personal relationship with the operator. I still like to hear Fibber McGee make a phone call from his little home in Wishful Vista. He always passes the time of day with the operator, and a lot of time one can get the information from the operator that he's calling about anyway. There's no use to call the bank, as they do in a lot of places, for the time of day when the telephone operator can give it to you.

Radio communication with Eastland and out of Eastland must be improving also. There are several antennas sticking up in the air around Eastland these days that haven't always been here. I noticed the other day that the highway department has one stuck up on their property. Also there is one north of town on the Breckenridge road that belongs to the Texas Electric Service Co. Lone Star Gas has one out at plant three that they didn't have when Sam Gamble bossed that plant. Hoffmann Company has one east of town as well as Sneed Contracting. Radio antennas are sticking out of Eastland like quills out of a porcupine.

Victor Cornelius is adding a structure to his building. I don't know whether this is to be a private office for Lowell Snyder or whether this is to house his menu service. But whatever it is he's doing to his building it will add to the looks of West Main St.

And the hospital annex is really something. The board of directors of our hospital and all the workers who labored so long and diligently on enlarging the hospital certainly are deserving of any praise we can give them. They've done a magnificent job on the hospital and I'm sure their efforts will not go unnoticed. The Eastland Memorial Hospital is something any town could well be proud of, and it's got some communications conveniences in it that a lot of hospitals wish they had. Any time one wants to take a look at a real hospital all one's got to do is

drop by our own and take a peek at what's going on there.

One of these days I'm going to study up all I can on sun-dials and do something about the one in front of the hospital. Everytime I pass this dial it seems that someone has moved it. The last time I looked at it, it had been pulled from the base it rests on and was sitting freely on the stand. I would set it with my watch and the next time passing I'd compare it with my watch. It never did have the correct time any time I looked.

If I can find out how to set one of these dials so they'll tell the correct time during the daylight hours I'm going to see that this one is fixed, providing the board of directors of the hospital will let me. Of course I wouldn't want to do anything I didn't have official permission to do.

Our churches have improved themselves the past year or two. I guess most of the churches in town now are either air conditioned or air cooled. We've got our church sanctuary air conditioned by refrigeration and the educational part of the building is air cooled. A few years ago we didn't even have a cooling system of any kind, except electric fans, in our church. Now they've got it so cold sometimes people complain their feet are getting cold. In June too.

One of the best improvements I think we put in our church is the aid to the hard of hearing. These work off the amplifying system and they can be used directly to the ear or they can be used through a hearing-aid. We've got a dozen or 14 of these aids scattered throughout our sanctuary. We didn't have this system as late as two years ago. Actually the system was put in in memory of the late Frank Castleberry. He didn't want anyone to send flowers to his funeral, but instead put an amount of money equal to a floral offering into a fund to pay for the installing of a suitable amplifying system complete with hearing aids.

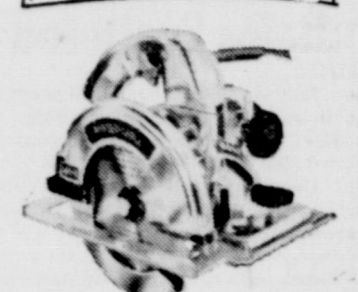

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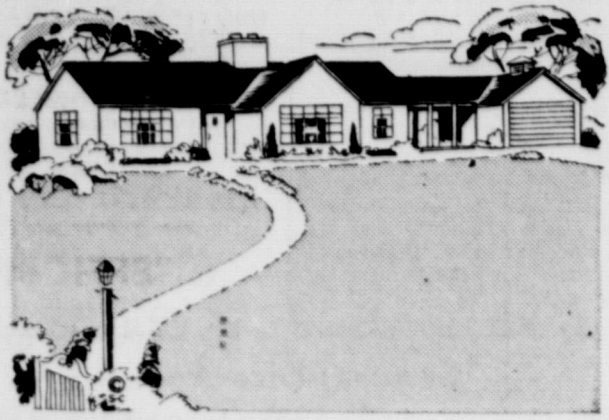

TESCO Director Will Attend Lab Dedication

J. B. Thomas, president of Texas Electric Service Company, and a director of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation will attend the dedication of the new John Jay Hopkins Laboratory for Pure and Applied Science of the General Atomic Corporation in San Diego, Calif., June 25.

The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, an organization composed of 11 investor-owned electric utility companies operating in Texas, is joint sponsor with General Atomic of the world's first and largest privately-financed program in controlled fusion research, which is seeking to develop methods which may make possible the economical generation of electric power through controlled fusion energy.

The Foundation and General Atomic are sponsoring a four-year controlled fusion research project, one of several important research programs being carried on at the new Laboratory. The project will be featured in a symposium on fusion research as part of the dedications program. Success in

bringing about a controlled, sustained fusion reaction would mean that man has tamed the hydrogen bomb for peaceful purposes and reproduced on earth the energy process of the sun and the stars. The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation was formed two

years ago by the 11 utility companies, one of which is Electric Service Company
