Two charges were filed this past week in Eastland County Court.

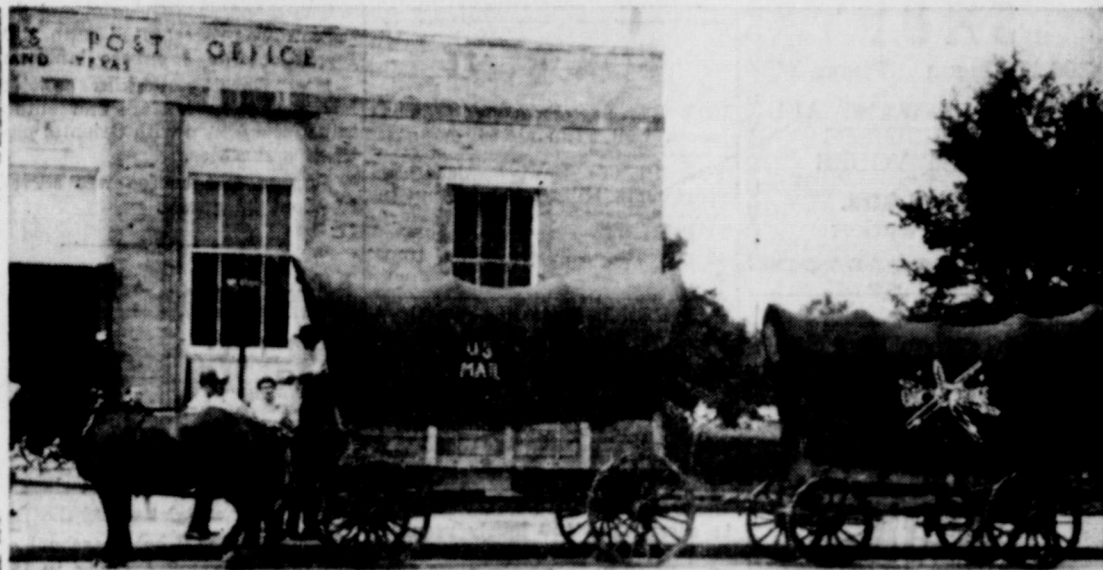
Joe Wheel Baccus was charged with driving while intoxicated and entered a plea of guilty. He was fined \$50 and court costs.

Judge Hart Is Voted \$1200 Expense Account

Eastland County Commissioners have voted to allow County Judge John Hart \$100 per month for "traveling expenses and depreciation on his car while on official business within the county."

The action was taken at the Court's regular semi-monthly meeting July 13, and the order set the date payment was to begin as June 1, 1959.

The \$1,200 a year expense account is the maximum which could be set under state law. Commissioner E. M. Bennett made the motion and it was seconded by Commissioner Carl Lamb. All members of the Court were present and all voted for the order.

Spaulding Hits Governmental Radio Controls

An Eastland radio executive lashed out at federal controls inflicted on the radio industry this week. Dick Spaulding, manager of Station KERC, called government controls of radio and television a definite trend toward communism.

Spaulding, in a talk before the Eastland Lions Club, told his listeners of governmental controls which require radio stations to contribute a certain percentage of their air time to public service. He said no such federal controls are imposed on newspapers, and termed them unfair to radio.

The new Eastland citizen also showed Lions some of the "rim-mieks" used by his station to complete attention. He told Lions that television has hurt radio on a national scale, with losses in advertising revenue of 50 percent in two years, but not on a local level.

Wheat Control Referendum Is Being Held Today

Eastland County farmers are voting today on 1960 wheat marketing quotas. Voting places in the county for the referendum are at the ASC office in the courthouse in Eastland and at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office. Polls will remain open until 6 p.m.

Farmers who will harvest more than 15 acres of wheat in 1960 are eligible to vote.

If quotas are approved support prices will be 75 percent of parity. If they are not approved the support price will be 50 percent of parity.

Purchase Grader

The Court also authorized the lease-purchase of a \$20,544 Caterpillar No. 12 motor grader from

Treasurer Equipment Co. of Abilene. The cost was less \$750 trade-in allowed for a six yard Garwood scraper and an \$11 auto patrol.

Commissioners also recently completed a bond selling-buying deal with C. N. Burt and Co. of Dallas. The County sold Burt and Co. \$8000 worth of City of Eastland Waterworks and Sewer Revenue refunding 3 percent bonds (maturity dates, Oct. 15, 1964) for \$975 per \$1000, or a total of \$7,800.

Then the county in turn purchased \$5000 worth of Eastland School District refunding bonds at \$935 per \$1000, or \$4,675, and \$5000 worth of 2 3/4 percent City of Fort Worth general obligation bonds at \$900 per \$1000, or \$4,500. All money used was out of the permanent school fund. The county invests the money in order to keep it from being dormant.

Fourteen hundred and thirty-five letters were mailed out of Eastland this week by the Eastland High School Alumni and Homecoming Association announcing the dates of the second EHS homecoming.

The homecoming, which will be held every five years, is scheduled for June 17, 18, and 19 of next year. The first homecoming was held in 1957 when more than 1000 persons attended.

Two hundred and ninety of the letters were mailed to Eastland citizens and the rest went out of town. Included in the mailing were letters to ex-students now living in Alaska, Hong Kong and South America.

Jim Golden, Association president, urged anyone knowing of any ex-student to notify him. Ex-students who have changed their addresses since the last homecoming were also asked to send in their new addresses.

Golden said, "We feel that more people will be able to attend if they can start making their plans to do so now."

Uvalde Farmer Main Speaker at Peanut Meeting

A program planned to interest and inform the State's peanut producers will be held in Stephenville Friday. It is the annual membership meeting of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association and will be held in the Agricultural Auditorium at Tarleton State College.

According to Ben Spears, extension agronomist, the members will meet at 10 a.m. and the general session, open to every person interested in the Texas peanut industry, at 11 a.m. Featured speaker for this session will be Dolph Briscoe, Jr., well known Uvalde rancher - farmer - businessman and one of the State's best known conservationists.

Dr. Sydney Reagan, chairman of the Peanut Improvement Work Group, will report on items of interest to peanut growers including the latest developments in research work dealing with peanuts.

Following lunch which will be served in Stephenville City Park, courtesy of the SWPGA, a demonstration program will be given. James Dickens, agricultural engineer from North Carolina State College, will demonstrate newly developed automatic peanut sampling and grading equipment.

Clear Plastic Is Killer That Strikes At Infants and Children

There is a new killer in our midst! Actually it isn't so new. There have been deaths from this cause for a few years now. The tragic thing about this new killer is he strikes at infants and toddlers—children—the ones that can't protect themselves! This killer comes in several forms. He appears as a crib sheet,

pillow case, bib, and worst of all, a TOY. However, this killer is easily recognized by grown ups. It is the clear plastic that is used for so many purposes these days. Take shirts. Bags made out of this plastic are just perfect for protecting the shirt from dust and at the same time displaying the product.

But when such plastic materials are used as crib sheets? Last year in Texas, three infants, eight, seven and five months old suffocated because they accidentally pulled the plastic sheet over their face.

Pillow cases too, are just as deadly. Early this year a four month old child was found in bed with its head buried in a plastic pillow case.

A month later a plastic sheet claimed another victim. And still another month later a five month old infant playing with a plastic bag pulled it over her head and suffocated.

In addition one baby suffocated from a plastic bib, and just the other day a fifth 1959 victim died—suffocated by a crib sheet.

Already the total has almost equalled last year's toll. Plastic bags have an important and useful place in modern life IF they are used correctly.

You wouldn't let an infant play with a pistol. You don't use a razor for a teething ring. So why put something as dangerous as a plastic bag into the hands of an infant. When pressed to his face, the plastic clings. When the infant tries to breathe it clings all the tighter. The result is suffocation, because the little tike is unable to tear the material from his face.

So, protect little children from exposure to such plastic materials.

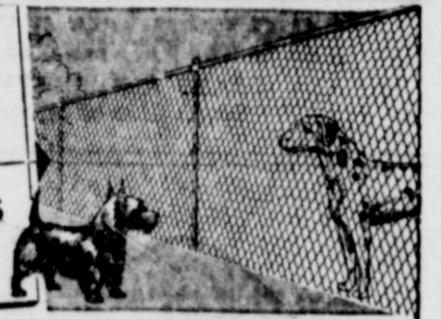
