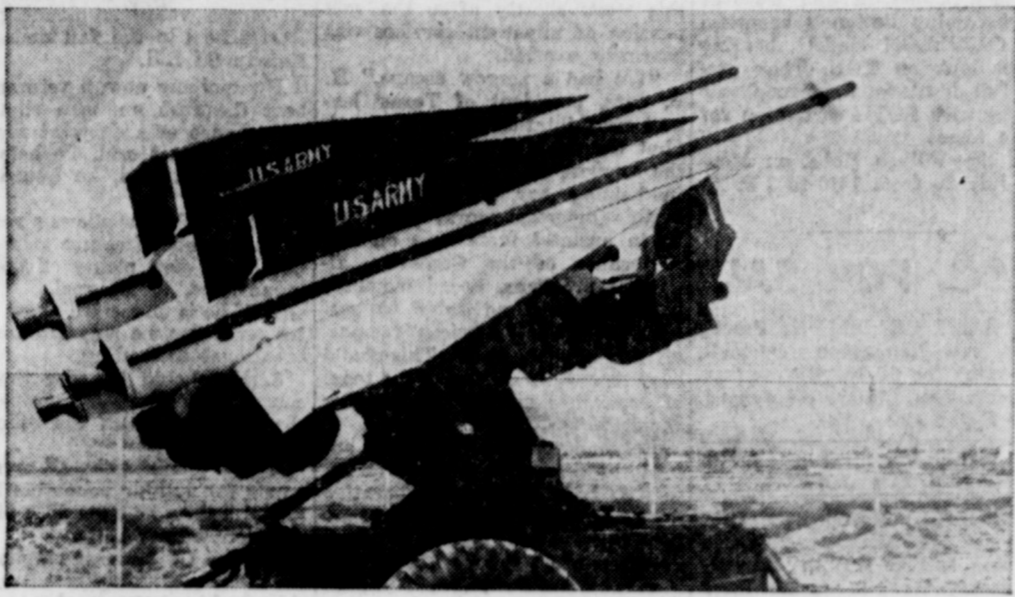
I. E. Talleys of Olden and Carl Talley Tour Northwest, Canada

Installation of Vapor Lights Is Completed Friday

Installation work on 5 new mercury vapor street lights along Highway 6 (South Seaman Street) has been completed by Texas Service Company, according to Frank Sayre, District Manager of the Company.

The last fixtures were put up Friday and replaced nine smaller lighting. City Council authorized the installation at its meeting of June 15th.

Mercury vapor lighting was first installed in the business district and along Highway 80 in 1950. Since that time it has become the standard source of highway lighting where increased lighting is required at low cost of operation. In addition to installing the new street lighting, TESCO will also be responsible for its maintenance.

Appeal Made For Public Support Of Texas Center

Gonzales - An appeal for public support for the Texas Rehabilitation Center of Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation was issued this week shortly after the suspension of in-patient services was narrowly averted.

"We had a narrow escape," H. P. Orts, president of Texas' largest rehabilitation facility, stated, "but we are in business and, with the support of Texans interested in helping our disabled citizens in this important work, we should be in business from here on in."

Because of the Center's financial problems, board members had deemed it advisable to suspend in-patient services temporarily effective July 17. This would have meant dissolution of the team of specialists in rehabilitation for which Warm Springs is noted.

Responding to a last ditch appeal for a loan of \$50,000 necessary to keep the Center operative were the Guadalupe Valley Electric Cooperative and Mrs. Jack Hutchins of El Campo. GVEC and Mrs. Hutchins have agreed to loan \$40,000 and \$10,000 respectively on the Foundation's pledge to pay from the eventual distribution of assets in a large trust in which the foundation is a beneficiary.

The acquisition of these funds, continued support by humanitarian-minded Texans, and a reduced budget resulting from a temporary reduction in the patient load to 50-55 patients should enable the Foundation to make the grade, Orts said.

"The quality of the medical service of which we are justly proud will not be impaired in any way, and we are confident that Texans will soon supply enough funds to permit the re-opening of the wards we have been forced to close down," Orts added.

Korea Veterans Advised To Apply For School Now

"Apply now. Don't get caught in the rush." This is the advice that Edward P. Onstot, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas, Texas, gave today to all Korea veterans planning to start school in the fall under the Korean GI Bill.

"By applying now, a veteran can beat the rush and can eliminate any chance of a delay at the last minute, Onstot said. To help veterans get started, he issued this check list.

1. Since the GI law allows a veteran to change his GI course only once, he should give plenty of thought in advance to his goal.
2. If he is undecided about what too train for, he may ask for VA vocational counseling.
3. He should be sure that his course has been GI-approved by the state in which the school is located.
4. He should make all arrangements for gaining admission to his school before he even files his application with VA.
5. The GI training application should be completely filled out and signed. The veteran should send it, along with a photostat or certified copy of his separation paper, to VA regional office.
6. A veteran with dependents should have the necessary proof of dependency.
7. A veteran should take along enough money of his own to tide him over the first two months of training. It takes about that long, ordinarily, for his first monthly GI check to reach him.
