What is NATO? It stands for North Atlantic Treaty Organization, an alliance of 15 free nations, including the United States, which have banded together to protect themselves against aggression. These nations are Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Greece, Iceland, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Turkey, the United Kingdom and the United States.



What is its purpose? Primarily, NATO is a military alliance, but its great purpose is peace, not war. The 15 members of NATO have pledged that they will regard an attack upon any one of them as an attack upon all. They have also pledged to work together politically and to increase their ability to defend



How does NATO function? Each of the 15 member nations is represented in important discussions held regularly. Their main function is to defend a line which stretches from the Aleutians to the Middle East. 

our nation. It is a tragic and ridiculous to blindly refuse to use this great national resource of people past 44 years of age. M. H. PERRY Representing

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
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
