Prison Rodeo Opens In October In Huntsville
HUNTSVILLE — A star-studded cast, including daring convict riders and entertainers, plus a host of the nation's topflight television and recording artists will headline the 28th Annual Texas Prison Rodeo on the prison's \$1 million stadium each Sunday in October beginning at 2 p.m.
To get the 1959 rodeo series off to a flying start will be "Big Jim" Arness, the popular Marshal Matt Dillon of the TV series "Gun-smoke" along with Johnny Cash, whose country tunes are known from coast to coast. They appear on Oct. 4. On two successive Sundays, the world's wildest rodeo turns the spotlight on Dale Robertson and Tommy Sands on Oct. 11, and Steve McQueen and Johnny Horton on Oct. 18.
Robertson, star of TV's "Tales of Wells Fargo," and Sands, singing sensation, were just a few of the crowd-pleasers during the 1958 Rodeo.
McQueen has moved up on the entertainment ladder as star of the TV series "Wanted - Dead or Alive" while Horton is a byword since his recording, "The Battle of New Orleans" has taken the nation by storm.

New Licenses Required To Hunt and Fish

AUSTIN — "Don't ruin your hunt by overlooking the game laws," warned the Director of Law Enforcement, Texas Game and Fish Commission. "Before taking your gun from the rack, be sure you know all laws concerning game in your particular area. "Old hunting licenses expired August 31. Be sure to have your new licenses on you when you go out to hunt. Check your gun for a plug. Only three shells, including one in the chamber are allowed in it by law.

"Don't hunt on a piece of property unless you have permission from the owner or person in charge of it. Don't fire near a home or in a direction that might endanger some person, house, or even livestock.

"Hunting from a public road is prohibited by law and it's illegal to shoot from a moving vehicle. These are laws that have been in existence for quite a long time," said the director.

He then reminded hunters that many of the birds taken during the hunting season will have tags on their legs. "These tags should be returned to the Game and Fish Commission with information telling when and where the bird was killed."

He then warned hunters not to forget the changes in the water-fowl regulations. "If they can't be found in print," he said, "check with the warden in your area; he'll be more than happy to help you."

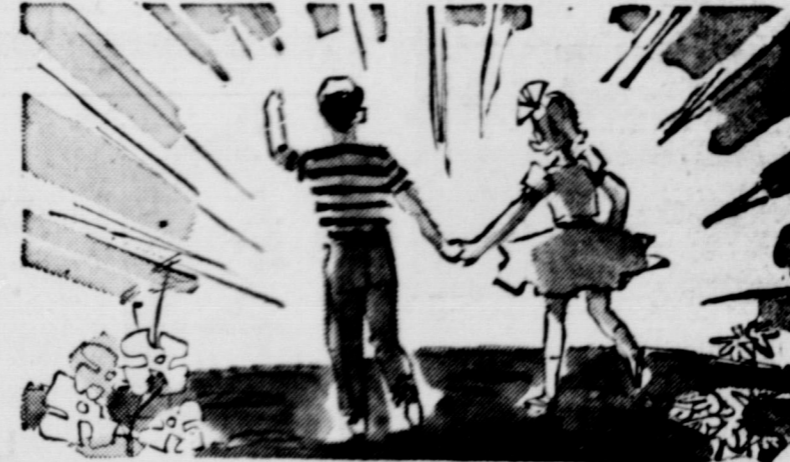

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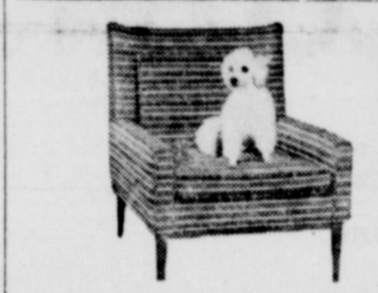

Starting to school is a big event in every child's life, and the experience will be a happy one, if your youngster is physically, mentally and emotionally ready for it. Children should not be entered in school unless they can meet certain practical tests to show they are ready: First of all, a child needs to know his own name and address well enough to repeat to others if necessary. Physically, he needs to be fairly independent and well-trained. He should be able to dress and undress himself, take care of toilet needs, and eat wholesome food without assistance. If he is able to run, climb and use his hands easily in simple construction and play, he will be more at ease with others. Check on his intellectual readiness. He should talk readily, using sentences, understand and carry out simple directions, and show a healthy curiosity and desire to experiment. It will help if he knows the names and uses of the common objects in his environment.

Health check-ups are very important. Be sure to include eye, ear, nose and throat examinations and dental check. Plan for the necessary vaccinations and immunizations. Build up general health with lots of rest and nourishing foods during the remainder of the summer.

School will mean a new social situation. He will be happier if he has learned to play with other children, respect their possessions, and assumes some responsibility for his own belongings. The emotional adjustment is difficult for a child who is still very dependent on others, shows marked fears, temper outbursts or moodiness. If he looks forward to school as a happy experience, and has learned to stay contentedly in another home or school for limited periods, he is ready to go. Check safety training, too.

Make certain your child knows the danger of passing autos, and how to walk safely on the streets or highways. He needs to realize the danger of sharp instruments, matches, electricity and machinery in motion. Only a few weeks to go before school starts. Have your beginner get off to a happy start.

Forty-four is a critical age for American workers today. Once a man or woman passes that age many businesses and industries consider him or her "too old" and will not hire them. This is a terrific waste of manpower and brain power and the situation grows worse as the person grows older. Because of compulsory retirement policies, many people are forced out of jobs in which they have long experience. And, to add to the tragedy, people 20 years younger than the usual retirement age often find they cannot change jobs because many companies consider 44 a hiring cutoff age. At the beginning of this year, 1.2 million workers past 44 were unemployed. And 30 per cent of the companies questioned in a recent survey admitted they have a policy of not hiring a worker who is past 44 years of age. The Labor Department ran another survey and in 70 per cent of the cities considered, more than half the jobs listed were employment agencies set an age ceiling on hiring. People need the assurance they can change jobs, or — if retired — find other employment to help them remain useful citizens and to earn money to pay for necessities. We have done a great deal to

assist our retired people — helping them obtain medical assistance and other types of aid — but we need to do more to help them help themselves. One way we can do this is to assure that age will not be a major factor in consideration of an individual for a job.

For this reason, I am co-sponsoring a proposal which would prohibit discrimination because of age against a person applying for a job with any company which holds government contracts. The measure is now being studied by a Senate Committee.

Older workers have statistically proven records of high production, good attendance and other assets. Men and women who are 40 years of age and older have a great deal of ability and experience to offer our nation. It is a tragic and ridiculous to blindly refuse to use this great national resource of people past 44 years of age.

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
