AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Once out on the well-known limb, it is sometimes difficult to get back. Sometime ago in this column, it was predicted that the federal gasoline tax would not be increased to bolster up the lagging Highway Program. Similar predictions bordering on assurance were given in response to a great many letters protesting the President's recommendation that the tax be increased by 1-2c.

The ways and means committee, the taxing Committee of the House of Representatives, first rejected the request of the President, and instead voted to issue one billion dollars in bonds, and stretch out the Highway Construction Program to meet the financial crisis.

The committee has now reversed its original action, and has voted to increase the tax by 1c per gallon. The choice now is either to support the 1c increase or to let the Highway Building Program come to a virtual stop in many states.

The federal government contributes 30 per cent of the cost of federal highways. Basically, the shortage of funds is due to administrative changes which have made the program more costly than originally approved by the Congress.

Originally, the system called for 40,000 miles of highways at a total cost of 25 million dollars through 1972. The Bureau of Public Roads added some 2000 more miles, which increased the (Continued on Page 7)

Florence Crabb reports that her mother, Mrs. H. A. Cook of Abilene is doing fine after a fall she had this past Saturday.

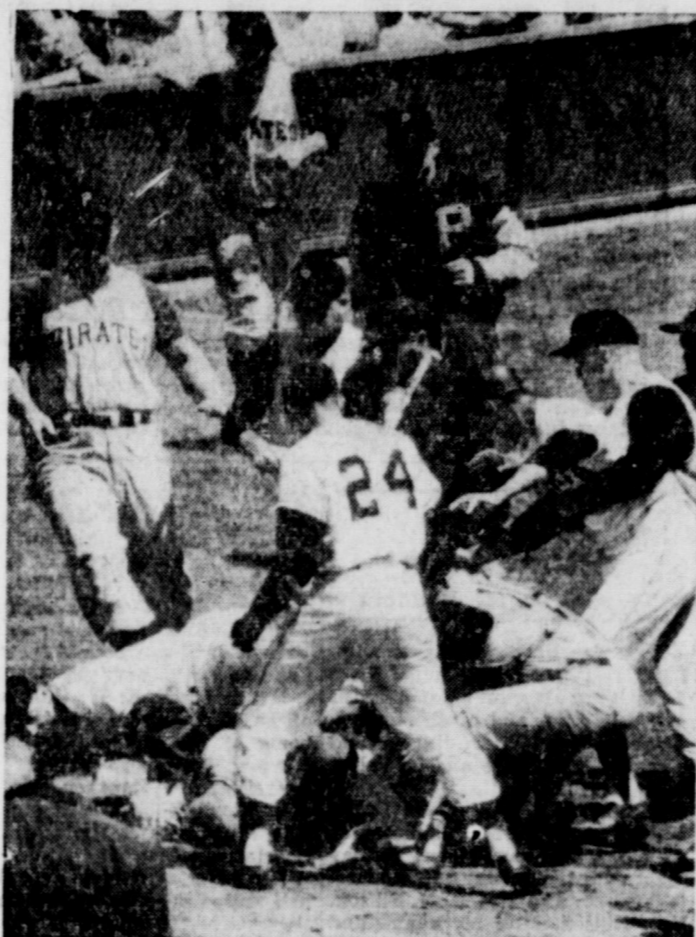

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Pre-Registration Date Announced by Siebert

Sixty first graders were on the roll at the close of business Wednesday afternoon as the deadline for registering first graders for the 1959-60 school year came close.

Friday has been set as the deadline date in order to make necessary arrangements in sectioning classes prior to the opening of school on Monday, Aug. 31. It is now estimated that there are from 10 to 15 first graders who are not yet on the roll, and parents are urged to complete the registration card.

Pre-registration will be conducted at both West Ward and South Ward Friday, Aug. 28 from 8 a.m. to noon for those students who will attend either school in the second, third, fourth or fifth grades during the coming school term. Students may report at any time during the morning to fill out their registration card.

It is now apparent, Siebert said, that one section or one complete

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

Resting in the little town of Cotulla in the Winter of 1920-21, with nothing to do, I began to observe my fellow guests in the hotel and probably that was the beginning of a life-long practice of studying other people. Mainly the guests were traveling salesmen. I can still clearly recall some of them.

One was broad-shouldered, with long arms, and he walked in a loose-jointed way—his name was Wellman.

Three were named Magee—two of them brothers and the other a son (and nephew, of course). The brothers had differed in the recent governor's race and the one who had supported Neff had a story he told to discomfort the Bailey supporter. The young man had been briefly, an actor and he had recently seen the New York stage sensation, "The Bat," the first—and one of the best—of the many mystery dramas.

Then there was a short, heavy-set man named Hackenjos, whose home—as I recall—was in Uvalde.

Then one whom I remember most vividly was there only once—for a stay of three days. He was handsome, widely read, had an excellent voice and was a delightful conversationalist. The fact that he hailed from Tennessee and that I had lived in Memphis gave us something in common. His name was F. W. Williams and his old home town was Povo, Tenn.

He spoke of the vast store of information that Mike Connolly possessed. Colonel Connolly for years was editor of the Memphis News-Scimitar and he had crossed swords with Brann the lionelast.

"I wanted to know who wrote a poem and I had written to the Boston Transcript and the New York Sun, but without success", the traveling man said. "One day, I met Mike Connolly and asked him; he instantly told me who wrote it."

"What was the name of the poem?" I inquired, casually.

"It starts off, 'I'd rather live in Bohemia—'", he replied.

"Didn't John Boyle O'Reilly write that?"

At my remark, his mouth popped open and his eyes bulged. All the others in the room turned and looked at me, and I was sorry I had spoken.

"Yes," he said finally.

It just happened that I had read

the poem not long before and the author's name stuck in my mind—but my reputation as an authority on literature was thereafter firmly established in the Cotulla hotel lobby.

While Williams was there, one young "drummer" irritated everyone by claiming to have seen something more remarkable than the mountain, waterfall or whatever which had been the subject of the incident just told; and he had—by his own account—been the friend and advisor of any celebrity whose name was mentioned.

Williams was wearing an elk's tooth as a watch-charm and his young man commented that he had shot elks in the Canadian wilds with teeth twice as large.

Williams began, in an idle manner:

"We all know of course about the California gold rush in 1849; and about the Great Salt Lake where you can not sink; and also that the travelers on the treeless plains used cow chips for fuel."

Everyone nodded in agreement.

In the same quiet, off-hand manner, Williams continued:

"With that background in mind, I am reminded of a happening in a hotel lobby out West. There was a young man in the group who made stronger and stronger statements of things he had seen and did deeds he had done until at last a wizened little minister in a corner who had been silent said:

"We crossed the plains in other days;
We bathed in Salt Lake's brine;
We burnt that stuff
You're peddling now—
In 1849."

The brash young man was quiet thereafter.



IT'S THE LAW in Texas

SPECIFIC PERFORMANCE

What can you do if someone doesn't keep the terms of a contract with you?

You might (1) get money damages for your losses, (2) get back what you gave him as your part of the contract, or (3) get a court to order "specific performance" on his promise, on pain of contempt of court penalties such as fines or even jail sentences.

As a rule, a court performs money damages for a broken contract, since it is definite and often more easily enforced. But in some cases money won't do: For example, since no two pieces of land are alike, you could not take the money given to you in a contract to buy another piece of property "just as good".

And so courts, as a rule, enforce contracts to buy land by specific performance. They make the seller hand over the precise piece of property. Likewise you may get specific performance on contracts to buy or sell unique art goods like a painting of a great master of which there are no two alike.

You can seldom if ever get specific performance on personal service contracts which call for personal or confidential relationships, or special knowledge, good judgment, or skill. Their enforcement would be too hard for the court to supervise. But instead you may collect money damages; or perhaps in the first place you could provide in the contract for forfeiture of money for failure to perform.

No one can enforce specifically

an agreement to get a third party's consent. Captain Miles Standish could not make John Alden get Friscilla's consent to marry him.

Or suppose a man and wife own property together and the husband alone wishes to sell. No court will make the wife sell her half against her will.

Before a court orders specific performance it looks carefully into the "equities". Was the "injured party's" contract fair and free from fraud? Did he take unfair advantage of the other party? Or wait too long to claim his rights? Could he have carried out his part of the contract?

"ASSUMING" A LOAN

You can give some of your rights to other people, for example, the right to collect a bill; but it's a different thing with your duties. You need your creditor's OK firmly to assign your debts to another.

You can sell what you own, all right, but you can't shake a debt merely by getting somebody else to promise to pay it for you. Your creditor — who is a party to your contract — has something to say about who takes over your obligations.

Thus, your cousin, say, borrows from you and promises to pay the money back. He can't get out of it by getting his neighbor to say he will pay you for him unless you agree — and this takes a written contract.

Suppose you bought Abel's house on time for \$15,000 and had paid off \$5,000. Then, with \$10,000 left to pay, you get Joe Blow to buy the place.
How could Blow pay you for it? Well, for Blow it would be just dandy for you to let him take over the \$10,000 debt, pay you back your \$5,000 equity, and then pay off Abel the rest of your \$10,000 debt. Blow would save the cost of a new loan—if his credit was good enough to get one in the first place. So you set it up that way.

One day Blow blew; and you, yes you, hold the bag. True, you could turn over your equity to

total cost by about 1.2 billion dollars. As originally conceived, the highway system was to provide connecting links between the main towns and cities of the country. This was charged by the Bureau of Public Roads so that, at present, 42 per cent of the funds are spent to provide expressways within cities. The fact that during the recession last year the program was accelerated to provide employment is also a factor in increasing cost at the present time.

As it now stands, if the Highway Building Program is to continue on schedule, seemingly the only choice is to increase the tax on gasoline.

Jim Puryear Named Ranger College Coach

Jim Puryear was named Athletic Director and Head Football Coach at Ranger College this week. Dr. Theodore Nicksick, president of Ranger College, announced Friday that Puryear, line coach at Ranger College the past year, had been named head coach to replace David Slaughter, who resigned to accept a similar position at Sul Ross College at Alpine. Puryear doesn't need an introduction to the people of Ranger. He came to Ranger as Assistant Coach in May 1958 and since that time has been an active member of the athletic department at the College, and an outstanding citizen of Ranger. Puryear received his M. S. and B. S. degrees in Physical Education at North Texas State College in Denton. He was line coach at Carrollton for three years before coming to Ranger. He is married and has two boys, Pepper, 22 months and Mike, 2 months. An assistant for the new coach has not been selected at this time, but Dr. Nicksick said, "Puryear has been given a free hand in selecting his assistant." There has been several applications received for the position, but no decision has been made. Puryear has scheduled an additional football game for the coming year in order to have more home games. The new game will be played with Northern Oklahoma Junior College Oct. 17 in Ranger. Upon hearing of Slaughter's resignation, Puryear said, "I have worked with Slaughter for four years and have enjoyed working with him. I wish him all the luck in his new position at Sul Ross."

Color styling is also important. Light, bright colors, such as the natural gold of Southern Pine, will make your rooms seem larger and more cheery. Darker colors tend to bring the walls closer if the area itself is large. A wide variety of modern finishes provides any color of your choice, without obscuring the wood grain. The colors are tinted into the finish with oils, and provide grays, blues, blonds or virtually and other hue in the spectrum.

There are a number of paneling patterns that are easy to fit. To get paneling that is stable in size and that will perform permanently, you should specify dry lumber. When the paneling is delivered, stack it on narrow separator sticks until you are ready to use it. This should be done in the living area where the paneling is to be applied, with all sides of the lumber exposed. Backs and ends of the paneling should be treated with a first grade penetrating sealer or other moisture resistant coating before installation. It should be blind nailed where possible. Several samples of the run of the wood should be finished to the desired shade before applying finish to the installed paneling. In deciding on the color, it should be remembered that the shade on a large wall area appears darker than in a small sample.

Little Used Attic Space Can Be Made Into Room

Many homes have little used attic or basement space that can be profitably transformed into attractive living areas. According to the Southern Pine Association, the home handyman can do most of the work himself by applying wood paneling directly to existing wall structures or surfaces. If the area in question has limited height, as is often the case with attics, it is usually desirable to employ a vertical arrangement. This will make the room seem taller. If there are two long side walls, however, a horizontal placement of the boards will increase the impression of lateral range.

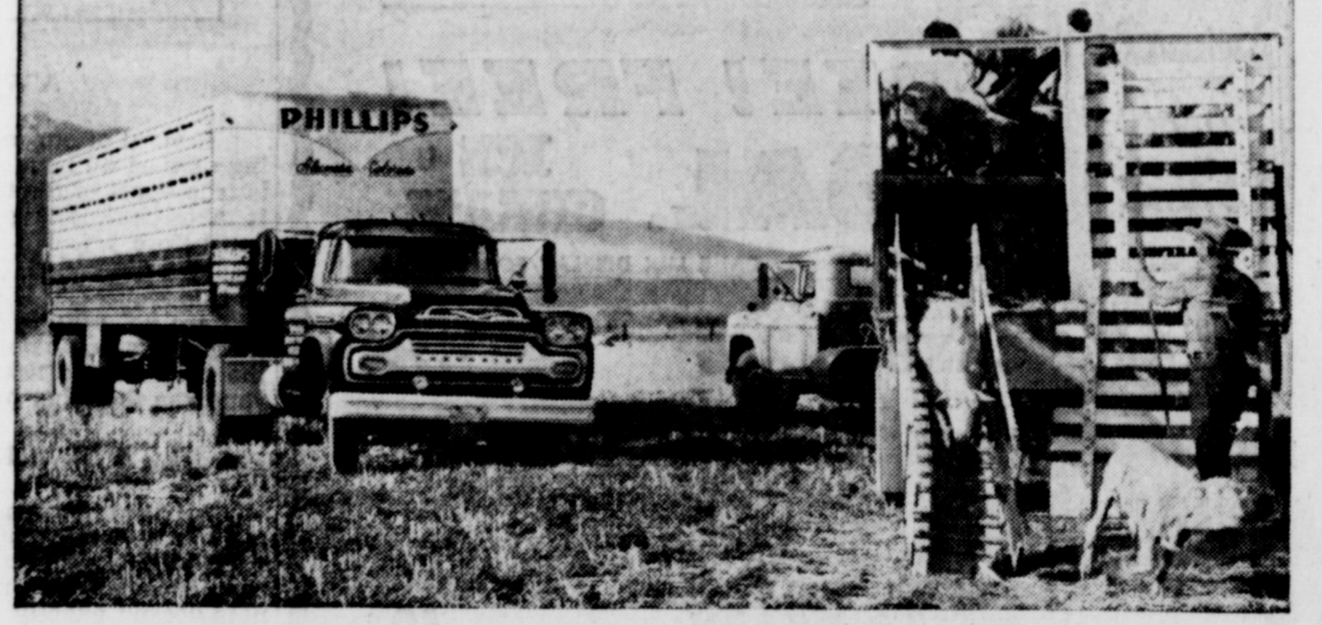
