Maverick Hopes Dimmed By Large Injury List

Put the 1959 Mavericks down as the hard luck team of the year. The Mavs, plagued by freak injuries, got the afternoon off Wednesday because of the large number of players on the injured list.

Eastland was due to meet Wylie in a return scrimmage Wednesday, but Coach Carrol Shelton called off the scrimmage because of the large number of injuries.

The injuries have seriously hurt Eastland's chances of fielding a strong team this year. A look at the injured list makes you quickly realize why.

Out for at least eight weeks is Jimmy McElreath, senior halfback who Coach Shelton has had high praise for this year. McElreath, a starter from last year, suffered a knee injury and an operation is a must, Coach Shelton said.

Also suffering from a knee injury and also due to be out for most of the year is Jerry Chaney. Chaney will probably also be operated on the first part of next week, and he is expected to be out for some six weeks. Jerry, another veteran, was the top tackle on the Mav roster.

Mickey Garner, who looks like the number one quarterback this year, is out with a bruised foot. Philip Lewis suffered a painful injury when his hand was stepped on in the Wylie scrimmage Monday and Marvin Agnew, co-captain, suffered a shoulder injury Wednesday morning.

Mike Carothers is out with a broken nose. Gary Cuipepper has an injured back. Don Massengill has a shoulder injury. Ray Edwards has a broken finger and Tommy Beck a sprained wrist.

That's 10 out of the 31 Mavs on the roster, and most of the other players have blisters that are slowing them down.

Coach Shelton said the injuries have happened in strange ways. McElreath hurt his knee making a quick turn. He wasn't even hit. In fact, Agnew, is the only boy

actually hurt in contact work, Shelton said.

The Mavs will have morning and evening workouts today and Friday, then a morning workout Saturday.

Saturday night Eastland is to scrimmage Stephenville at Stephenville. Starting Monday, evening drills will be the call of the day.

Eastland 4-H Club Boy's Work Praised

Dan Mize, 4-H Club member of the Eastland Junior High Club, is doing an outstanding job of feeding, grooming and training his Houston Scramble heifer, according to Curtis Boase, assistant county agent.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Mize of Cisco.

Dan won the heifer by entering Houston Fat Stock Show next scramble last March. With the certificate and a little extra money he purchased a registered Hereford heifer that he named Silver from Hasten McBride of Blanket. The heifer has been gaining an average of about three pounds per day for the last several months. Her weight now is 600 pounds.

Dan will show the heifer in the Houston Fat Stock Show next March and is trying hard to win the champion of the scramble heifers as did Jimmy Johnson, a Scranton 4-H Club member, last year.

He has been a very active 4H Club member having had beef steers and sheep for projects that he has showed in the Eastland County Livestock Show.

John Gerhardt, a Rising Star 4-H member, is doing very good with the steer he is feeding for the Eastland County Livestock Show next March. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Gerhardt of Rising Star.

John is teaching his steer to lead and has washed it once and brushed it every day. He built his own mineral box, feed trough and pen for his calf. He has showed Jersey heifers for the past two years in the Eastland County Livestock Show.

Dove Shooting Begins Sept. 1 In North Zone

Season opens for North Texas dove hunters Tuesday, Sept. 1, with perhaps one of the best crops in years, according to the assistant secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The new 1959-60 hunting and fishing licenses will go on sale after Aug. 29, according to the announcement. They will be effective Sept. 1, and all persons who hunt outside their own counties are required to have a new license. Fishing licenses also expire Aug. 31, and a new license is necessary for fishing outside the home county or with any kind of winding device.

Persons over 65 years of age are not required to have a license. Exemption cards are available at the regional offices or by writing to the Game and Fish Commission in Austin. Such cards are issued as a courtesy, and are not required.

Schools Will Open Monday

Some 750 young Eastland citizens will report to the classrooms here Monday, and for 70 of the youngsters—the first graders—it will be their first day in school.

School bells will ring Monday at High School, Junior High, South Ward, West Ward and Douglas Schools.

Pre registration will be conducted at both West Ward and South Ward Friday from 8 a. m. until noon for students who will attend either school in the second, third, fourth or fifth grades. Students may report at any time during the morning to fill out their registration card.

There will be no pre-registration at Junior High School. Students will register at the school Monday. High School students pre-registered at the end of school last year. Any new students at high school should report now to the principal.

Supt. Wendell Siebert said that one section or complete grade will

of necessity be transferred from West Ward to South Ward in order to relieve the crowded condition. At the present time eight sections are assigned to West Ward and only seven classrooms are available. An announcement will be made in Saturday's Telegram and on radio.

Bond Sales In County Rank High In July

Eastland County savings bonds sales during July were the highlight of the entire Fort Worth area, a check of records in the 29 county zone reveals.

Sales of bonds in Eastland County during the month totaled \$18,682. That figure was topped by only three counties in the entire zone. Only counties to come out ahead of Eastland were Taylor (Abilene), Tarrant (Fort Worth) and Wichita (Wichita Falls).

Eastland County has now reached a total of \$307,062 in cumulative sales. That is more than 56 percent of the county's 1959 goal.

Guy Parker, county chairman, praised sales figures for this county, saying, "Every American who buys Savings Bonds is providing for his own future and adding to the strength of his country, both militarily and economically."

Funeral Services Held Wednesday For Jack Milford

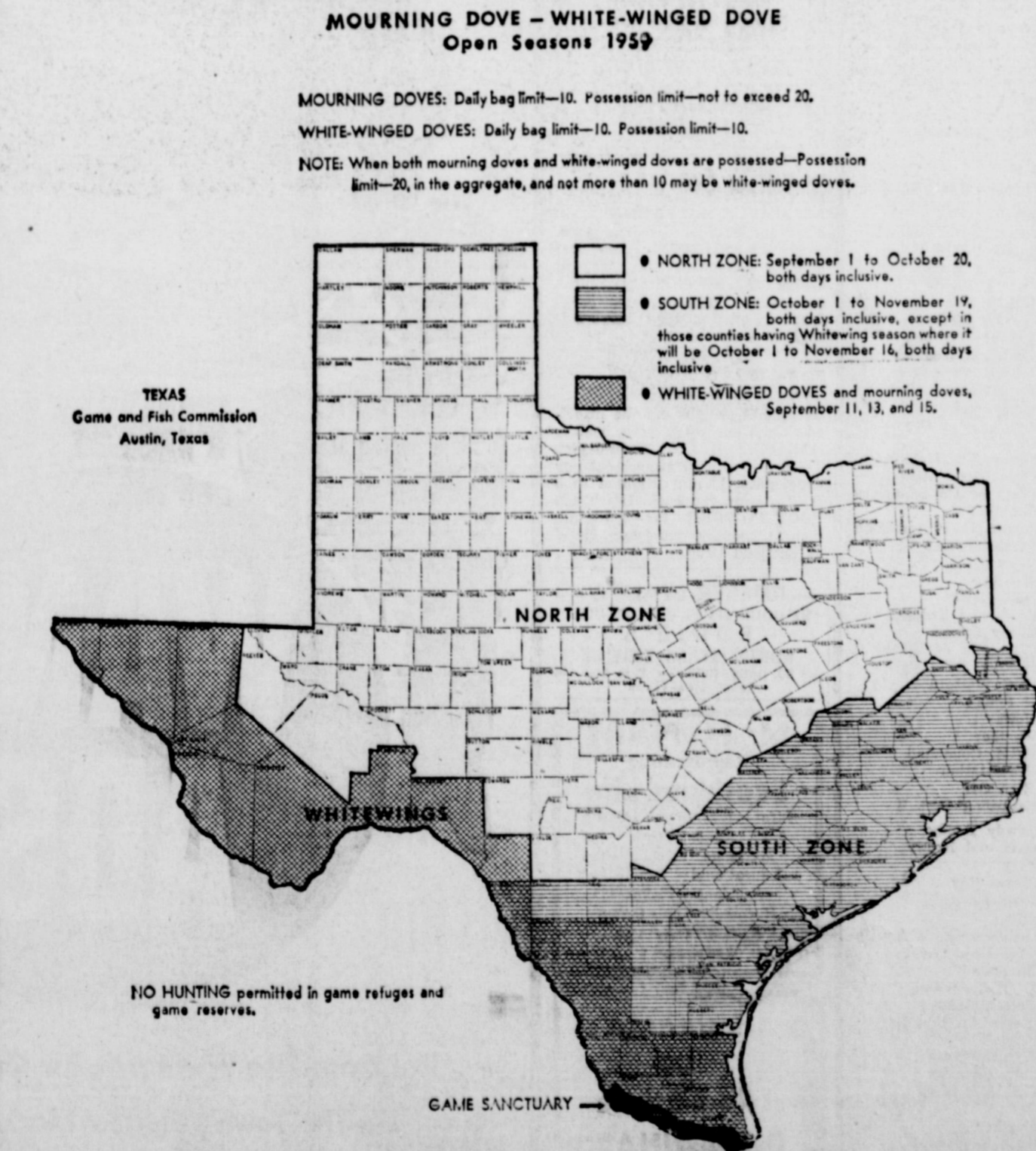

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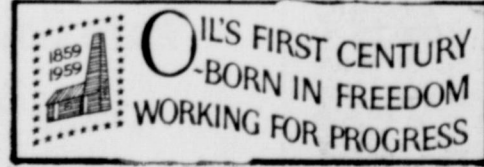
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I GIVE YOU TEXAS

By BOYCE HOUSE

St. John's Church in Richmond, where Patrick Henry delivered his "Liberty or Death" speech, is a white frame building which has been somewhat enlarged since that day in 1775. The church was chosen for the Virginia Convention because it was the largest meeting place in town. Jefferson and Washington were members of the convention.

I had always visualized Henry as standing in the middle of the floor—and even striding up and down—so it came as a surprise to be told that he stood in a pew.

It is a privilege to seat oneself in that very same pew where Patrick Henry stood as he thundered, "Is life so dear or peace so sweet as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it, Almighty God! I know not what course others may take but, as for me, give me liberty or give me death."

The baptismal basin disappeared from the church in early days but was found. The Indians were using the metal vessel to pound corn in. The basin is still to be seen in the church.

In the churchyard are many graves. One is that of Edgar Allan Poe's mother, who died in 1811. She was an actress and so it was forbidden to mark the grave. Some years ago, however, a monument was erected.

The Rev. Alexander Whittaker, early pastor, converted many Indians, including Pocahontas, whom he baptized and whose marriage ceremony he performed. He drowned in the James River in 1617 and the body was never recovered. A stone memorial stands in the churchyard.

One of the graves is that of George Wythe, signer of the Declaration of Independence and first professor of law in America. Among his pupils were Jefferson, John Marshall, James Monroe and Henry Clay. Wythe died of poison administered by a nephew, an impatient heir. The guide said that Wythe lived long enough to change his will. What a melodrama!

The guide, by the way, was a pleasant, young man with reddish hair and his name was Usry. He

said he was prepared for almost every kind of question but that one day he was rather startled when a lady demanded, "How do you know that Patrick Henry really made a speech? He replied, "Well, for about the same reason that I know that people are buried in those graves." That seemed to take care of her skepticism.

Sometimes, in the Virginia Capitol, a Kentucky tourist would give him an argument when Usry would indicate the statue of Henry Clay and claim him for Virginia or a Texan would challenge a similar claim for Virginia when the bust of Sam Houston was viewed.

"Now, I emphasize that they were Virginia-born—and let them take it from there," he said, with a smile.

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TAKING THE FIFTH AMENDMENT

You have read of someone's "taking the Fifth".

Why does our constitution let people—some involved in crimes—keep or refusing to answer questions put to them in our courts, investigating committees, and government agencies?

Because no man can be called on to accuse himself or give evidence against himself.

Where did this rule come from? From the church canons. Long ago under common law witnesses or parties took an oath and talked a lot or a little as their consciences bade.

Later an English law put witnesses under an oath somewhat like the Church's oath; but the judge could subject them to sharp questioning, even torture. The King, for example, punished

"heresy and sedition" this way. England at last changed the law. Before any one had to take an "inquisitional" oath, some one had to accuse him of a crime or show that he was "notoriously suspicious". No more "fishing expeditions". No man had to accuse himself.

By 1700 no man had to testify if to do so could bring on his own punishment. The American colonies adopted this rule, and as the Fifth Amendment wrote it into our constitution as the Bill of Rights.

The fifth applies in two ways:

1. The accused need not testify at all in his own trial; or he can speak in his own behalf, but only when he or his own lawyer, (not the district attorney) wants him. Once he testifies though, the prosecution can cross-examine him—and then he may have to answer.

2. Witnesses called on to testify who are not the accused must testify, but not if their answers would tend to incriminate them. Sometimes, a witness will refuse to answer seemingly harmless questions. To answer them may open up the way to force him to give more incriminating answers.

Who decides if a question would tend to incriminate? The Judge. If he finds a question would not tend to incriminate, he may order the witness to answer or be punished for contempt of court.

In Texas the accused or trial need not testify in his own behalf. And if he doesn't the pro-
