Dr. Townsend Is District Eight VFW Surgeon

School Assignments For Local Grades Announced

All Eastland fourth grade students will be assigned to South Ward School this year, Supt. Wendell Siebert announced Saturday morning. No fourth grade classes will be held at West Ward during the 1959-60 school year.

Siebert said bus transportation will be furnished from West Ward to South Ward each morning and return transportation will be available in the afternoon immediately after the close of school. Charles Harris will drive the bus, which will depart from West Ward School each morning at 8 by way of Seaman Street, turning south at Seaman. For the convenience of those students living in the area northeast of West Ward, the bus will make a stop at the corner of Plummer and Connelley to pick up students and will make a stop at

the same spot in the afternoon to discharge students who might choose to get off at that location, Siebert said.

The superintendent also announced these changes:

First Grade—All students living in an area bounded on the east by Daugherty and on the south by Plummer will attend West Ward. So will all students and all transfer students in the first grade. Students living east of Daugherty and north of Plummer will be permitted to catch a school bus at the corner of Main and Halbyran for transportation to West Ward. Return transportation will be provided in the afternoon to the same spot.

All first grade students living east of Daugherty and south of Plummer Street will attend South Ward.

Second Grade—All students living west of Daugherty Street, all students and all transfer students will attend West Ward. All students living east of Daugherty will attend South Ward.

Third Grade—All students living west of Daugherty will attend West Ward as will all bus students and all students living out of the city whether they ride the bus or are brought to school by parents. All students living east of Daugherty will attend South Ward.

Fifth Grade—All students living west of Daugherty and all bus students who attended West Ward last year will attend West Ward. All students living east of Daugherty and all bus students who attended South Ward last year with the exception of those who have been individually transferred to West Ward.

Siebert said that parents who desire to transfer their children out of the assigned district because of extreme hardships may secure a request for transfer application from either of the elementary principals, and mail it to the superintendent's office so that it will arrive not later than Friday, Sept. 4. All requests will be individually reviewed and if it is possible to make adjustments they will be made and the parents promptly notified.

All Eastland schools will open at 8 a.m. Monday for a full day of operation. First graders will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. and all other grades will be dismissed at 3 p.m.

Teachers will remain on duty each day of school until 3:45 for conferences with parents and pupils.

Bus routes will be the same as last year. All cafeterias will be open Monday with the prices of meals the same as last year, 25c for elementary students and 30c for junior and senior high students. Extra milk will cost three cents.

Local School Budget Okayed at \$236,812

Local Taxes to Pay Q-Backers to... Just Third of Bill

A budget of \$236,812 was approved Thursday night for the 1959-60 school year by members of the Eastland Independent School District board of trustees. The budget is practically identical with last year's budget, showing an increase of approximately \$3,000, which represents the salary of one new teacher.

Board members unanimously approved the budget prepared by Supt. Wendell Siebert. Last year's budget called for expenditures of \$233,127, and actual expenditures totaled \$228,964. The District ended the year with \$3,073 in the transportation fund, and \$1,094 in the sinking fund. All other funds were depleted.

Estimated receipts for the coming year are listed at \$232,644.

That compares with estimated receipts of \$223,638 called for in the 1958-59 budget. Actual receipts last year totaled \$229,597. The budget, therefore, was within \$41 of being entirely correct in regard to receipts.

Local taxes will pay just \$75,513 of the \$232,644 estimated receipts. The remainder of the money will come from the state.

Here's where the money will come from: Local maintenance tax, \$50,375; sinking fund tax, \$25,137; county available fund, \$180; per capita state fund, \$58,816; salary and operation and state fund, \$89,205; vocational education state fund, \$1,150; transfers, \$1; and miscellaneous, \$1,629.

And here's where the money will be spent: Total Administration, \$16,894; instruction (including total salaries and supplies), \$156,373; other school services (bus drivers salaries, maintenance and operation of buses, etc.), \$11,361; operation of plant (utilities, custodians' salaries, janitorial supplies, etc.), \$13,050; maintenance of plant, \$5,200; fixed charges, \$6,196; furniture and equipment, \$1,500; retirement of bonds, \$23,132; interest on bonds, \$2,900; other debt service, \$200.

Additional Room Requested For Douglas School

A delegational of Negro citizens called on the Eastland School Board Thursday night requesting improved conditions at Douglas School.

The group, headed by Rev. Sanford Norris, pastor of the First Baptist Church (Colored) and Mrs. Vivian Jones, asked for two things. Rev. Norris asked that the Board add an additional room to Douglas School, and Mrs. Jones asked that her son, an 11th grader, be transferred to another school district, Abilene preferably, at the expense of the Eastland District.

Twelve grades are being taught at Douglas School this year for the second time.

The request for an additional room at the school came on the heels of a refusal by the Colored Baptist Church to allow use of a room in the church for that purpose. The church allowed the District to use a room last year, and the District paid for cost of improving the room.

The Eastland School District and the Cisco School District are paying, out of local funds, for one extra teacher at Douglas school now. Cisco high school students attend Douglas School.

The Board took no action at the Thursday night meeting, but met Friday morning to tour the Douglas building.

Vehicle Inspection Stickers Available September First

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety announced today the new 1960 motor vehicle inspection stickers will be available to Texas motorists beginning next Tuesday, Sept. 1.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director, recommended that Texans have their vehicles inspected early in the new inspection period which extends from September 1 to April 15, 1960. Vehicles not displaying the new sticker after April 15 will be operating in violation of the law.

"In the vast majority of cases," Garrison said, "this program has become a very minor inconvenience and expense to the motor vehicle owner — provided he moves early to comply with the law."

"The more than 4,500 authorized inspection stations over the State are capable of handling the inspection of Texas vehicles without delay if owners will not wait until just a few days before the deadline."

Garrison called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 11 per cent to four per cent.

He said 43.4 per cent of the cars inspected during the last inspection period needed some adjustment or repair and that the average cost for inspection, including the \$1.00 fee, was only \$2.02 per car.

Mr. Coplen, who was known to many in Eastland as Dabby the painter, was buried in Santa Barbara Cemetery with full Masonic rites Thursday. He is survived by his wife, Marie; his son, James Maurice Coplen of Eastland; two daughters, Mrs. C. R. Shepard of McCamey and Mrs. R. A. Yoder of Santa Barbara; and six grandchildren.

NEW LIBRARY BOOKS AT EASTLAND PUBLIC LIBRARY

July was definitely "Young Peoples' month," with our boys and girls reading 560 of the 713 books read during July. The Library has some new books just received which will be very interesting to our adult readers, announced the Thursday Club who sponsor the Library.

We have the new novel by Hamilton Basso, who wrote "The View from Pompey's Head." It is "The Light Infantry Ball" and is a brilliant novel of the years of crisis that led to the fall of the plantation South. The story centers around a young planter, John Bottomley whose life takes him from rice fields to the highest councils of government; it is this story that makes it one of those reading experiences long remembered.

"Home From the Hill" by William Humphrey is a novel which has gained high tributes from the critics. A dramatic narrative about entirely believable people, its setting is Texas.

"Lorena" by Frank G. Slaughter. This is one of America's leading historical novelists at his exciting best. Lorena is the story of a delicate dark-eyed girl whose fragile beauty belied her boundless courage and war cunning. She is the woman who helped Sherman to believe that war was hell.

"Love is a Wild Assault" by Elithe Hamilton Kirkland. This is the extraordinary story of Harriet Potter, who became legend during the stirring days of the battle for independence and who played

ed a dramatic part in the growth and destiny of her beloved and beautiful land. Elithe Kirkland has based this brilliant biographical novel on the long forgotten manuscript in which Harriet Potter recorded the story of her life, as well as on countless other documents and court records.

Mrs. Jos. M. Perkins sent the library five volumes of the "Lullaby Music Library" in honor of the Eastland Music Club. They were mailed from Chautauque, N. Y. where Mrs. Perkins has recently lectured.

New in the Junior division of the Library are three new sport stories and "Wagon Wheels" by Breyfogle, "Men of Flight" by Verrall, "A Flag for Lafayette" by Lane, "The Story of Eli Whitney" by Latham and "Big Country" by Edward Herron.

Twenty-three more books have been added to the 101 Significant book shelf, making us a total of 73.

Mr. and Mrs. David Pickrell of Ranger presented the Library the book, "Pioneer Women in Texas" in memory of Mrs. Annie Doom Pickrell who is the author of the book.

The American Petroleum Industry presented the Library a free copy of "The Age of Illumination" which traces the growth of the American Petroleum industry from 1859 to the present.

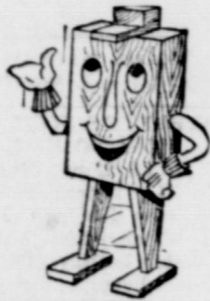

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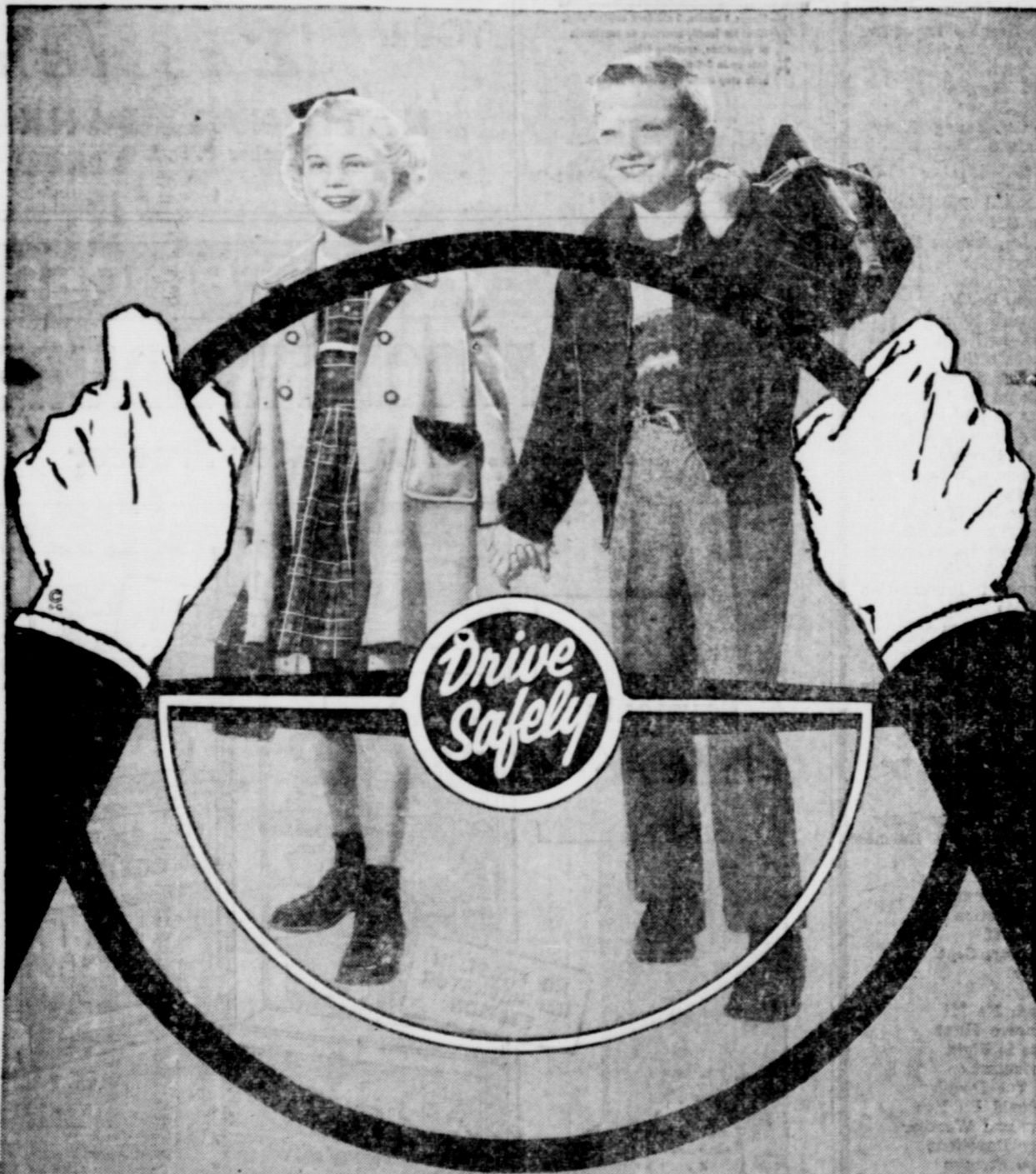
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
