MOORE about... EASTLAND

A friend of ours went west for the Labor Day holidays, and when he returned he was telling us about his trip.

"When I left Eastland I hit the road determined to make good time," he said. "Just before leaving I read where 31 Texans were due to die in traffic accidents and decided then I'd drive carefully.

"Pretty soon I was hitting along at 70 miles per hour and had a clear road ahead. About that time I turned on the radio and got the news that eight Texans and a lot more Americans already had died in holiday accidents. I slowed down to 65.

It wasn't long until I was back up to 70, though, and then I eased her on up to 80. Still a smooth road. Another news broadcast revealed that 16 Texans and scores of Americans were dead by then. So I dropped her on back down to 70. It wasn't long until I had her back up to 90 again though.

"This kept on for sometime, with the death toll increasing steadily and with me slowing down at each radio report, only to speed up again in a few minutes.

Then it happened. I came face to face with dead Texan Number 19. His car hit a culvert and he died instantly. A few cars had already stopped when I got there, but the ambulance didn't arrive for a few more minutes. I watched as they loaded up what was left of a good Texas taxpayer.

"After a bit I climbed back into my car and headed for home. For the remainder of the trip my speedometer didn't register more than 60 mph. I stopped at every stop sign. I used hand signals for the first time in months. I didn't pass on hills and curves. I drove, for the first time in a long time, as a person who wants to live to collect his social security should drive."

We thought for a long time after that. Does each one of us have to witness an actual death on the highway before we realize the true danger we face daily? And how long will my friend keep his speedometer at 60? Will he gradually work his way back up to 30?

We are afraid that folks are tired of reading slogans urging them to drive safely. But what else can be done to try to avoid death on the highways?

We personally believe that the work done by Texas Jaycees is helping. Jaycees over the Labor Day holidays placed wrecked vehicles on major highways throughout the state. That should have made many of them, and we believe it did.

We think that folks are going to stop making a game of breaking traffic laws. A little children, we don't do on the highways very often. A high patrolman is following us.

Sometime back we were handed a booklet entitled "I'm Mad, Too." It was written by a highway patrolman. We assured the fellow who handed it to us that we would read it. We didn't. At the time we tossed it aside, but this morning we picked it back up and did read it over.

We won't steal all of the copy, but this part interested us:

"Who do you expect a cop to be anyhow? Do you want your highway patrolmen to be a bunch of weak-kneed, jelly-spined apologists who smile at a speeder knowing that sooner or later he will cause an accident?"

Registration at Ranger College Begins Monday

Registration for the fall semester at Ranger College will be held next Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 14 and 15 beginning at 9 a.m. until noon, and from 1:30 p.m. until 3 p.m. in Cooper Library.

Registration for evening classes will be held the same evenings from 6 to 8 p.m. in Cooper Library.

Both day and evening classes will begin September 16.

Requirements for admission to freshman standing at Ranger College may be met in one of two ways. By presenting a high school diploma, or by individual approval and entrance examination.

Tuition is \$50 per semester for 12 hours or more, and the matriculation fee is \$10.

Graduates of Ranger College receive an Associate of Arts degree. All courses will transfer to any reputable institution of higher learning.

Courses leading to Bachelor degrees in Agriculture, Business administration, secretarial studies, accounting, education, foreign language, industrial arts, journalism, mathematics, physical education, science, social science, speech, art, and music education are taught.

Students entering pre-dental, pre-engineering, pre-law, pre-medical, pre-medical technologists and pre-pharmacy can take the first two years of work at Ranger College.

Sixty hours of college work are required for graduation from Ranger College, including 12 hours of English, six hours of math, six hours of science, six hours of American history, and six hours of government.

Schedules are available in the main office of the college from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. each week day, and 8 a.m. to noon on Saturday. Students who desire help in planning their courses are invited by school officials to visit the school this week and talk with the instructors.

Evening classes will be held four nights a week this fall. Each class meeting two times each week. Classes begin at 6 p.m. and run until 10 p.m.

A wide selection of courses are available in the night classes. These include history, business math, shorthand, English, government, education, office machines, typing, algebra, sociology, biology, chemistry and accounting. Also laboratories pertaining to objects requiring them.

Ranger College serves this part of the state with an institution of learning equal to the leading junior colleges of the state. A place where a student may obtain the first two years of college work in any chosen profession.

Ranger College provides any number of extra-curricular activities along with the regular courses. Football, track and basketball in the sports department. Band, course, orchestra and a precision marching group, the Rangeans are provided in the music department. These activities provide for the complete development of the students in Ranger College.

First Load of Peanuts Bought

Wayne White of the Staff Community, received a \$25.00 premium for the first crop of peanuts bought at the Ranger Peanut Company this year.

The Ranger Peanut Company purchased 9,952 pounds of peanuts from White Thursday. The peanuts were grown on the L. M. Miller farm, between Kokomo and Staff Communities. The field of peanuts measured 13 acres and averaged 23.20 bushels per acre. White received a good grade on

the peanuts. They graded 69 percent sound mature kernels, 7 percent other kernels, or 76 percent total kernels. There was 4 percent foreign material, 2 percent shelled kernels and 9 percent moisture.

The peanuts were planted April 23, and were harvested August 29, by O. B. Rone.

The field of peanuts brought \$188.90 per ton, which is Government Loan price. The total amount paid for the crop was \$848.31, plus the \$25.00 premium for the first crop.

T. C. Wylie, Manager of the Ranger Peanut Company, said "the prospects for the peanut crop this year looks good due to the rains that we have had."

He went on to say that the county average for last year was 32 bushels per acre. The early peanuts this year will not measure up to that average, but the later crop should since the rains of the last few days should help them a lot.

Now that I have chewed for a while, I want to say this. I feel like Eastland has about as fine a group of students in their actions and sportsmanship as you will find.

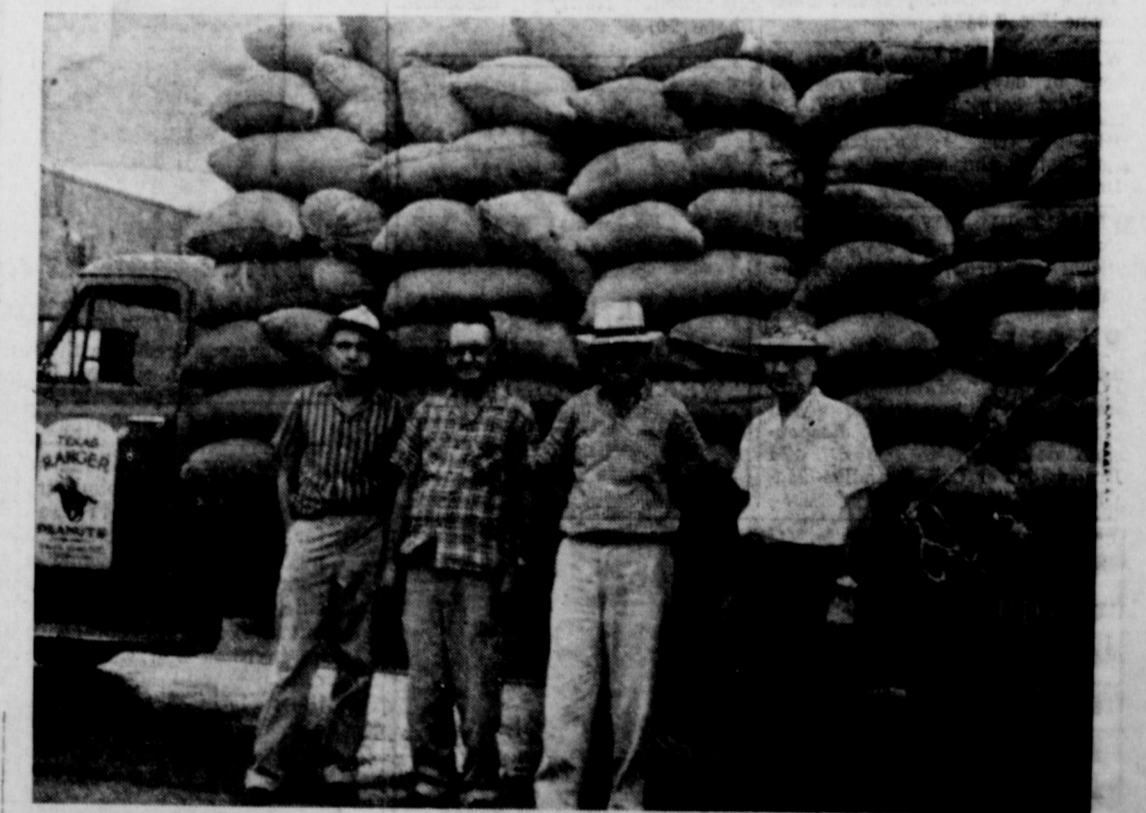
I guess that about wraps it up for this week on high school hill. Hope to see you again next week.
