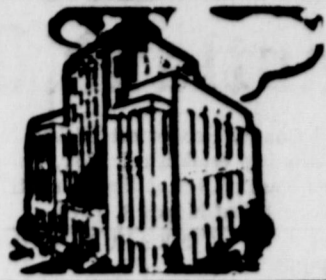

## Aquatic School Volunteers Are Needed in Area

Texas is one of eight Midwest states in which aquatic schools have been scheduled by the American National Red Cross this summer to provide special training for experienced and prospective camp counselors, leaders, and instructors in community and pool water safety programs.

The Texas school, which will be held at Lakeview Methodist Assembly Camp, Palestine, is scheduled for May 27-June 6.

Enrollment, through local Red Cross chapters, is open to men and women 18-years of age and older wishing to serve as lifeguards, summer camp counselors, and waterfront directors, or volunteer Red Cross instructors in their home communities. Instructor training in swimming for the handicapped will be offered as an elective course. Registration for the school is expected to total 80.

Several persons from Eastland County have attended the school, and volunteers are again sought this year.

The course, taught by a staff of Red Cross career and volunteer experts under the direction of Red Eradly, First Aid and Water Safety field representative, Marlin, will include instruction in swimming and lifesaving, first aid, and water safety.

HANAU, Germany — Army Sergeant First Class George L. Harvey, 33, whose wife, Peggy, lives in Gorman, recently participated with the 37th Engineer Group in Top Weight, a NATO command post exercise in Germany.

The exercise, sponsored by the Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe, was designed to strengthen communications and tactical teamwork among NATO countries and to test the combat readiness of units making up a part of the NATO shield of defense in Europe.

Sergeant Harvey, a communications specialist in the group's Headquarters Company in Hanau, entered the Army in 1943 and arrived in Europe in November 1957.

Local Boy Scouts will join five hundred Scouts and Explorers from fifty Troops and Posts under the guidance of Scoutmasters and Advisors at Camp Billy Gibbons June 1 through 21. The camp is in San Saba County, near Richland Springs, on Brady Creek and will begin its 28th season next month.

The camp program includes swimming, boating, archery, horseback riding, marksmanship, handicrafts, nature study, pioneering, Indian Lore and Scoutcraft. Council fire activities with Indian dancing, ceremonies, story telling, songs and stunts will highlight the camping activities. The promotion of Scouts in Scouting advancement in rank is made attractive with presentation of awards at Courts of Honor at the closing meal each Sunday noon.

"Each camping period opens Monday mornings June 1, 8 and 15 and closes Sunday afternoon."

The camp fee is placed at the actual cost of operating the camp and includes insurance of each camper from the time he leaves home until he returns. Scouts and Explorers should register through their Leaders and attend camp under the leadership of one or more adults.

I had the good fortune to take a ride in the fatherly automobile the other day and it's a real treat to ride in a car that gets you off the ground.

Just think of all the pleasure of driving along the highway at night a riding high enough to escape the headlight glare of the approaching traffic. That's something one can't do in these 1959 jobs. I found it a real treat to ride along in a car that didn't have the modern luxury of air conditioning but the good wholesome smell of fresh air. Fresh air is something most of us don't get enough of these days, and a good comfortable ride in a good-running Model T is a good place to get a sniff of God's nature.

Young Jonah practically rebuilt and overhauled the Model T himself. He, of course, never had the pleasure of riding in a Ford of this age at the time they were the current car, and had to have a few pointers on what some of the parts are so vastly different from anything found on the modern automobile.

For example the distributor on the Model T was a little different from the one on your car. This one had the coil under the dash and the coil is a real spark maker. Jonah was left to his own wiles though with his Ford. His dad, the garageman, is a pretty good Model T man himself and of course he had the advice and consent of that master mechanic who probably knows as much about Model T Fords as any man alive. Ned Jones, with a pair of pliers and a piece of wire Ned never saw the Ford he couldn't make run.

Some of us today laugh at a Model T Ford; it's so tall and ugly looking. But that height was useful in the day it was marketed. The Ford was just about the only car of its day a Farmer could use on the dirt and mud roads that comprised most of the rural areas of the land. A good Ford could take out over a plowed field and make knots where a lot of other cars couldn't run at all. The Model T had some things about it that haven't appeared on any other car since. For one thing, there was the three-pedal

## Funeral Services For Mr. Stanford Are Held Today

Elmer J. Stanford, a resident of Olden for 40 years, was found dead in his home Monday and an inquest verdict of suicide has been returned.

Peace Justice C. E. Owen of Eastland ruled that Stanford took his own life. A neighbor, Homer Lawrence, found the body at 9 a. m. Monday. Mr. Stanford was believed to have been dead since Saturday night. His wife was visiting her daughter at the time of the mishap.

Judge Owen said Mr. Stanford's body was found seated in a chair with a .22 automatic rifle between his legs. Two empty shells were found near the body. One shot entered Mr. Stanford's forehead and the other went through the ceiling. Mr. Stanford had been in ill health for several months.

He was born Oct. 2, 1891 in Arizona. He married Kathrine Woods in Olden July 24, 1951. He is survived by his wife, one daughter, Elmerette Downing of San Antonio, and two sisters.

**CONSTITUTION CURBS LAWMAKERS**  
In an earlier column it was pointed out that rights and freedoms as American citizens result from our state and national constitutions, our laws and our courts. To illustrate further, here are some of the restraints placed upon Congress and other agencies of government by our national constitution:  
1. Neither Congress nor anyone else can suspend the writ of habeas corpus (unless the public safety demands it during rebellion or invasion). All officers or others must obey a court and bring in anyone in their custody to see whether he is held lawfully.  
2. Congress cannot pass "bills of attainder", special acts to punish someone. Congress cannot by-pass the courts.  
3. Congress cannot pass an ex post facto law—a law which makes an act a crime which was not one when done, or which punishes the offender more than called for when done.  
4. Congress cannot tax exports from any state nor by regulation favor one state's ports over another's, nor make one state's vessels clear or pay duties to another state in order to enter.  
Besides these denials from within, the constitution curbs Congress and the executive and judiciary in the amendments, especially the first ten.  
Among other things, Congress cannot make a law respecting the establishment of religion or prohibiting its free exercise, or abridging the freedom of speech, of the press or of the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.  
The constitution also curbs the courts (for example, they cannot deny a person a fair hearing duly represented by counsel). It curbs the executive (he cannot, for example, take private property for public use without just compensation).  
The constitution, which divides the work of the three branches of government, winds up by telling where the rest of the power rests—just in case anybody gets any fancy ideas of dictatorship. There are things no state can do, for instance, "make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privilege or immunities of citizens of the United States."  
If there are any powers not given to the United States government or reserved to the states, they belong to the people. The constitution does not seem to limit the people.
